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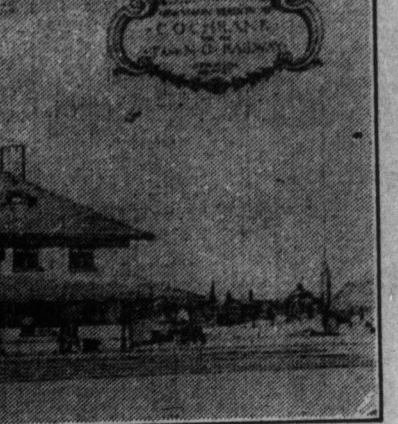

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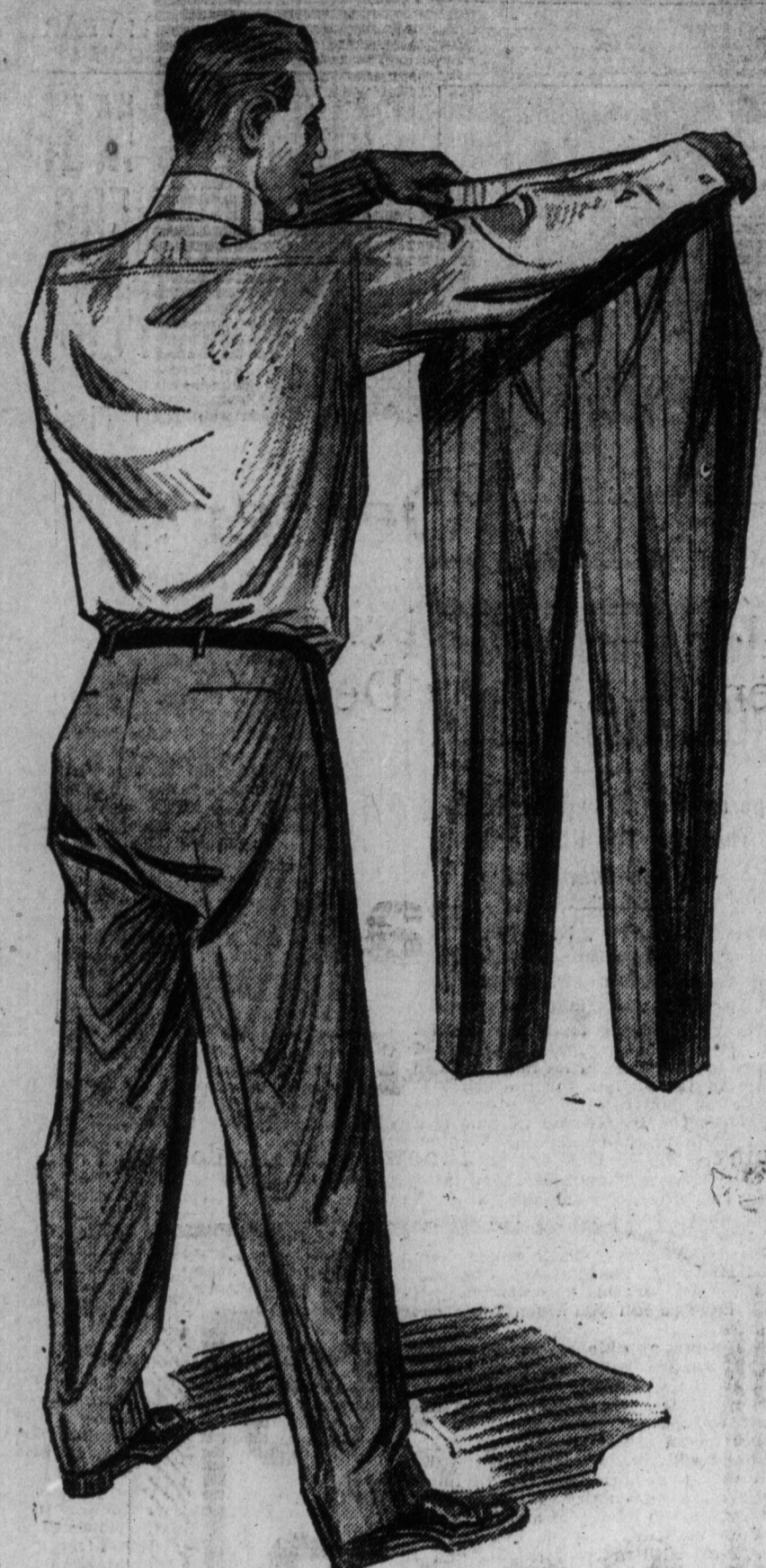

THEIR CRIES UNHEEDED YOUNG WOMEN DROWN

Tragedy in Ottawa River—Campers Thought Shouting Was in Jest.
OTTAWA, July 15.—Dorothy and Jennie Green, hotel maids, aged 23 and 32, were drowned during the night near Aylmer, Que., a summer resort. Their escorts, L. Loyer and E. Guerin, were rescued in an exhausted condition.

They were crossing the river about 11 o'clock last night in an old flat-bottomed boat which began to leak. Their shouts for help were ignored, because of the habit of boating parties to make such noises without regard to the fact that they were in danger. The boat was not until after 2 o'clock this morning that attention was paid to them.

The men were found clinging to the overturned craft. Loyer and the girls could not swim.

One of the sisters had been helped several times, when suddenly she was being dragged back on to the boat top her coat came off, and she sank to the bottom. The other sister was also forced to let go her hold. Their home was in Richmond, Ont. There is about 40 feet of water at the spot.

LIGHTNING HITS TROLLEY.
Passengers Near Chatham Shocked—Tilbury Robbery Recalled.

CHATHAM, July 15.—(Special.)—Fredericks W. Diehn, Eddie Quinn's accomplice in the Sovereign Bank robbery two years ago on a train between Chatham and Tilbury, has been arrested at Los Angeles, and will be extradited. The money, \$1575, was in charge of a bank clerk who carried it in a grip. Quinn took up his attention while Diehn switched the grip. Quinn is now doing time.

Lloyd Ross, son of Wm. Ross, near Blenheim, was found on the ground in an unconscious condition. His team and hay rake were found a short distance away.

A severe electrical storm passed over Chatham Township and Wallaceburg today at noon. One of the cars on the C. W. & L. E. was injured when lightning struck the trolley wire. Passengers were severely shocked.

One Flash Burns Barns.
ST. THOMAS, July 15.—(Special.)—A strange case of fire from lightning occurred at Iona Station this afternoon. There was but a single flash of lightning and one peal of thunder, but it struck the barn of George Rapelle, burning the building and hay crop. Neighbors saved the house.

At Port Talbot, Col. Talbot's old home, a centenary was held yesterday, when descendants of the first four families to take up land in the settlement had a reunion. Representatives of the families were present from as far distant as Calgary.

U.S. Abandon Khaki.
WASHINGTON, July 15.—The United States army has discarded khaki. The service uniform in the future will be an olive drab cotton cloth. Nine hundred thousand yards are needed each year.

Given a Briar Pipe.
Herbert Hickman, for over a year with Aerial 14 at Lombard-street station, is leaving the fire department to go into business with his father. Last night Capt. Gunn, on behalf of the men on the truck, presented him with a briar pipe, and expressed his sincere regret at losing one of the most promising firemen on the job.

Victim of Opium Habit.
Henry Keller, an Octogonarian, is identified by Grandson.
Henry Keller has been identified as the man whose body was found in the Western Cattle Market Wednesday morning. He came from Holland Landing and the body was recognized by his grandson, James T. Bell.

It is the opinion of the grandson that Mr. Keller's death was not due to suicide. For years he had been addicted to the opium habit. He latterly took to laudanum, and death is attributed to an overdose of that drug.
Mr. Keller was 79 years old and leaves a family of six children.
The body will be placed in the private cemetery of the family at Holland Landing.
It is unlikely that an inquest will be held.

WHO'LL BE ARCHBISHOP?

Rev. Father Whalen Said to Be Mgr. Sabretti's Choice.
MONTREAL, July 15.—(Special.)—Le Canada contributes the following despatch from Ottawa, touching the question as to whether the next archbishop of Ottawa will be an English or a French-speaking priest:

The French-speaking priests are at last under the impression that Mgr. Sabretti's candidate is the Rev. Father Whelan, an Irish priest of distinction. I am told, however, that Mgr. Begin, Archbishop of Quebec, has been informed as to what is taking place in our archdiocese, and that his grace will see that the interests and aspirations of the French-Canadian clergy in the Diocese of Ottawa are looked after.

Constant Dropping Effective.
Repeated protests of neighbors of the new reference library against the lack of aesthetic tone in the rank vegetation and miscellaneous debris which decorated the lawn of the Carnegie temple of wisdom have at last moved Park Commissioner Wilson to order the application of the spade and the shovel. The librarian says the residents seemed to have formed a league to write him letters, as he has for some time been receiving one a week from a different correspondent, couched in an identical language.

PUBLIC RIGHTS AND PRIVATE INTEREST.

Having signally failed to browbeat the Ontario Government, to influence public opinion and to discredit the province and its municipalities with the British investor, the opponents of the Whitney-Brock power policy are now concentrating their last desperate effort on the federal authorities.

A document has been put into circulation purporting to give the opinions of Dr. Albert Venn Dicey, K.C., Vinerian professor of English law in the University of Oxford on the Cobalt cases and on the London power case. The learned council admits that the legislature has power to pass the acts in question and that they are valid, but holds that the governor-general has unlimited power of disallowance.

The character of that information can, however, be gathered in part from the nature of the replies made to the various questions, particularly the fourth. The professor says that "the idea naturally suggests itself that a so-called law which without compensation confiscated the property of an individual or of designated individuals, or imposed upon an individual or on designated individuals, liability for a contract into which he or they had not in fact entered, might be held invalid as not being a law at all."

BRITISH TRADE PROGRESS. Every now and again complaint is made that British manufacturers are behind the times, that they are indifferent to the means necessary to develop new markets or to hold their own in the old, that the productive capacity of their workmen is inferior to that of American or German artisans, and so on in almost endless variety.

A recent Blue Book on British trade proves anything but a deterioration in British productivity. The export trade of the mother country rose from \$1,600,000,000 in 1904 to \$2,130,000,000 in 1907, and even for last year stood at \$1,885,000,000, notwithstanding the slump which affected all exporting countries.

THEIR EXPERT OPINION NOT AS COUNTED UPON

Prof. Dicey, in Survey of Florence Mining Co. Litigation, Admits the Power of Province.

In the cases of The Florence Mining Company versus the Cobalt Lake Mining Company and Smith versus City of London, opinions were sought on the legal merits of the questions raised from A. V. Dicey, K.C., LL.D., Vinerian Professor of English Law, Oxford, honorary LL.D., Cambridge, Glasgow, and Edinburgh, and author of several standard works on legal subjects.

Mr. Dicey was retained by the Electric Power Corporation interests of Ontario with a view of obtaining the present Ontario Government. Mr. Dicey's opinion was evidently not so favorable for the power interests as was hoped, and on that the law is with Sir James Whitney. The matter is dealt with editorially elsewhere.

The opinions following have not been given general circulation, but there is nothing to be gained by concealment. The two cases, namely, the Cobalt case and that of the City of London (London power case) appear to raise the following questions:

First question—Does the B.N.A. Act, 1867, s. 92, ss. 13, confer upon a provincial legislature (in this instance the Legislature of Ontario) power to deprive individuals of substantive rights, and especially of property rights without compensation?

Second question—Does the B.N.A. Act, 1867, s. 92, ss. 13, confer upon a provincial legislature to make any law in relation to the enforcement of civil rights in the province, and thus appears to confer upon such legislature power to deprive individuals of substantive rights, and especially of property rights, without compensation.

Third question—Does the B.N.A. Act, 1867, s. 92, ss. 13, confer upon a provincial legislature to enact a law staying actions for the enforcement of the substantive and actually acquired rights of individuals?

Fourth question—Does the B.N.A. Act, 1867, s. 92, ss. 13, confer upon a provincial legislature to enact a law staying actions for the enforcement of the substantive and actually acquired rights of individuals?

Power of Governor-General. Third question—Does the B.N.A. Act, 1867, s. 92, ss. 13, confer upon the governor-general power of disallowance of a provincial legislature? Answer to third question—The whole working of the constitution of the Dominion, which is created under the B.N.A. Act, 1867, appears to depend upon the possession of, and the use by the governor-general, of this unlimited and general power of disallowance.

Fourth question—Are the provincial acts relied upon in the Cobalt case, (Edwards v. The Queen, 12 & 13 Edward VII, c. 12, and 7 Edward VII, c. 15) and in the London power case, (The Electric Power Corporation v. The City of London, 1909) valid? Answer to fourth question—As regards this question with some hesitation, on the whole I am of opinion that they are valid, i.e., they are not beyond the power conferred by the B.N.A. Act, 1867, s. 92, ss. 13, on a provincial legislature; but it is right to add that these acts, taken as a whole, and particularly the B.N.A. Act, 1867, s. 28, seem to me practically to have a "retroactive" effect so strange and manifestly unjust that it is possible the court may say the Privy Council—might be inclined to hold them invalid.

The Remedy. Fifth question—Generally, what remedies have individuals for injustice worked or which might be worked by the Ontario Acts in question? Answer to fifth question—The injustice and impolicy of these acts is almost too manifest to require to be stated; they may directly affect only property and civil rights in a particular province, they must affect the credit and confidence of the Dominion of Canada as a whole.

EX-MAYOR FISHER SUPPORTS BYLAWS

Mr. Garland Sends Open Letter—Great Interest in North Toronto Voting.

NORTH TORONTO, July 15.—(Special)—No public matter of recent years has aroused a fraction of the interest which to-day attaches to the vote of Saturday next, when the sewerage and parallel roads bylaws come up for final disposal by the ratepayers at the polls.

The open letters of Ex-Mayor John Fisher and Nicholas Garland, each of whom has had a long and honorable connection with the town, will go far toward reassuring those who had not previously decided to support the two measures.

The accompanying letter of Mr. Warren is dictated largely by personal considerations, and appears wholly unrelated to the parallel roads matter, and is not intended to reflect on the sewerage question.

Now that a large number of leading townsmen have signified their hearty approval of the bylaws, it is hoped that a large and representative vote of the ratepayers will be secured.

John Fisher, ex-mayor of North Toronto, has written an open letter to the citizens of North Toronto, in which he declares that the bylaws should be carried on July 17 should be carried.

The letter is as follows: To the Citizens of North Toronto: As a very old resident and ratepayer of the town I take the liberty of writing to you with regard to the important vote which you are to cast on Saturday, the 17th of July, on the bylaws for the purposes of establishing a sewerage system and the opening up of roads parallel to our main thoroughfares, Yonge-street.

With regard to the first question, you are aware that the bylaws create an increase in population and that it is absolutely necessary on sanitary grounds that a sewerage system be adopted, otherwise the town would be subjected to various diseases resulting in costs and expenses far exceeding the cost of the sewers, leaving out other considerations of health and comfort.

You are no doubt aware of the steady increase in the price of land in North Toronto and that the municipality is unable to purchase land as cheaply as they can at the present time, and that unless they seize the opportunity of obtaining land for the sewerage system now, in a few years' time the cost will be many times what it would be if prompt action were taken at the present juncture.

There might be some room for difference of opinion as to whether the bylaws are absolutely unfair to the ratepayer, but those who have considered the matter fully and who are capable of forming an independent opinion, will be of the opinion that the best course has been taken in that regard. If these bylaws are passed we would escape the expense of raising the money to carry out the sewerage system, but also an opportunity for us to make permanent the result then accomplished, and at the same time giving us the chance of saving tax money for North Toronto to become not only one of Toronto's most desirable residential suburbs, but also to be one of the cheapest and best governed towns in Ontario.

I am informed that some of our residents are opposed, on the ground that the bylaws are an increase in tax levies. This result I do not anticipate. The growing assessment will easily pay the necessary taxes. For instance, this year our assessment increased about 35,000, providing \$670,000 annual revenue, nearly seven times as much as the previous year. The increase in the expenditure required for the bylaws, and the assessor is of the opinion that the increase in the expenditure will fall upon this year's levy it will be an easy matter for the council to meet the payments without increasing the tax burdens.

If our council had resorted to the local improvement system in financing the work, the taxpayer would have had the special levy before him for the next thirty years; as it is, it will melt away unnoted as the annual general levies; consequently, the same result will be achieved by the same method has been adopted.

I trust you will agree with my attitude on these public questions by supporting both the parallel roads and the sewerage bylaws. I am, yours respectfully, Nicholas Garland.

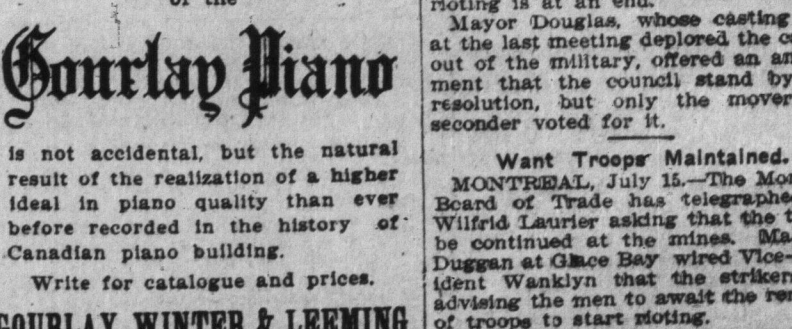

Retorna Home to Find Five Dead. OTTAWA, July 15.—To get home after an absence of upwards of two years and learn for the first time that five of his loved ones were dead is the experience of a Youth named St. Armour belonging to Notre Dame de la Salette, Quebec.

A year ago last April the landslide occurred at La Salette, and of the thirty-three victims over a dozen have never been recovered. Five of those killed were members of the St. Armour family. Young St. Armour has been working in the bush far north of La Salette ever since.

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Steady Upward Movement In Some of the Stocks

Steel Trust Shares Mount Steadily Higher—New Record Made in Lake-of-the-Woods.

World Office, Thursday Evening, July 15. Out side of a few speculative issues trading at the Toronto Stock Exchange to-day was on the quiet side. Business was dull, the stocks in the main being inactive. The regular mid-summer apathy has apparently taken hold of the exchanges and for the present at least an easy running and listless market is looked for.

The continued strength of Lake of the Woods was the one prominent feature of the Canadian exchanges to-day, this issue selling up to 125 on the local market, a clear gain of five points above yesterday's closing figures, thus making a very high record for the year. In Montreal the shares sold as high as 125 1/2. Dominion Steel was easier both here and in Montreal, closing at 44 1/2 on the exchange here, and advanced again to change half for the common. Rio sold down half a point on the morning market, but recovered later and closed around yesterday's figures.

C. P. R. has been much in the limelight of late, and advanced again to almost a point. Twin City was dealt in to a small extent around yesterday's figures. The regular quarterly dividend of 1 1/2 per cent has been declared on these shares, payable August 16.

In the mining section La Rose and Nipissing were both strong. Nipissing selling up to \$11.10 on the Toronto exchange and \$11.15 at the Standard. La Rose remained firm around \$6.45. The investment side of the market was dull. Small blocks of Dominion at 204 being the only trading on the banks.

Wall Street Pointers. There is at this writing no material change in the general stock market situation. The investment side of the market is still in a state of uncertainty, but the steel trade is most favorable. 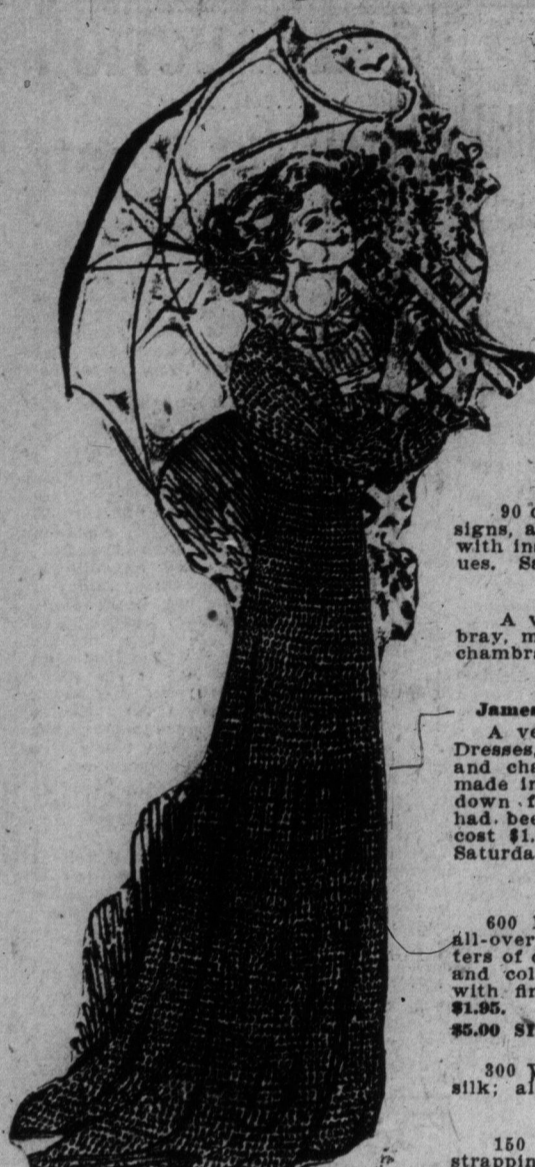

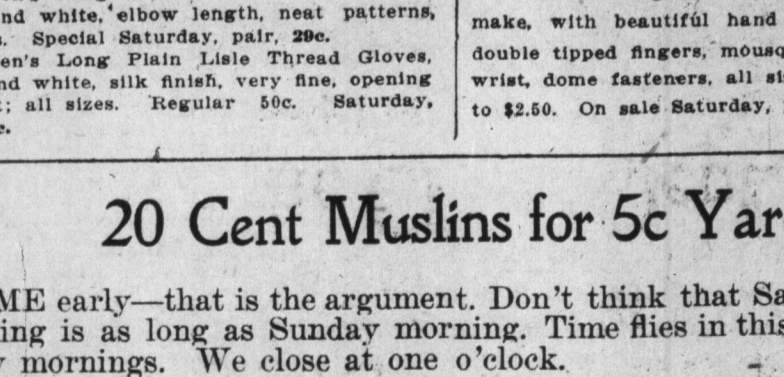
