

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MANAGEMENT.

The time has again arrived at which to lay before the subscribers to the Toronto House of Industry and the general public the annual statement of its affairs and operations. The Trustees and Managers thankfully refer this year, as during so many previous years, to the wonderful success which, under God, has attended the management of the Institution. The funds of the charity are in a very satisfactory state, as will be seen by reference to the Report of the Treasurer hereto appended ; and a very large amount of relief has been extended to the various classes of recipients, the particulars of which are detailed in the customary statement of the Superintendent, together with that of the Medical Officer. Coal, bread, and soup,—in cases of sickness a liberal amount of groceries, and medical visits—have been granted, as heretofore, in the case of the outside poor, while a large number of deserving people, young and old, have found a comfortable home within the walls of the House. Everything in their power has been done by the various Officers, Committees, and Ward Visitors to discharge the trust imposed on them with due fidelity, so as to merit a continuance of that support on the part of the public which has hitherto been so generously yielded, and which is absolutely essential in order to meet the multitudinous cases of want which must necessarily exist in a city like Toronto. How far the Board of Management has succeeded in the

task may be seen from the following testimony recorded in their books by Mr. Langmuir, the Government Inspector of Hospitals, Asylums, &c. :—

“ *Toronto House of Industry,*
“ 24th August, 1871.

“ In accordance with the requirements of the Inspection Act, 1868, the undersigned, this day, made an inspection of this Institution, it being an establishment receiving Government aid. The several dormitories, day-rooms, store-rooms, and the domestic departments of the House were all visited, and the whole found in the most admirable order, and scrupulously clean and neat throughout. The two rear yards were in a very tidy state, and the ornamental portions of the grounds attached to the House are well and neatly kept. The beds (of which there were 89 made up during his visit) were very comfortable, and the bedding clean and of good quality, and quite sufficient for the requirements of the House.

“ Not a single complaint was received from any of the inmates ; but all expressed themselves as being perfectly satisfied with their treatment. They were all very cleanly in appearance, and were comfortably dressed ; and some of the women were very neat and tidy in their dress.

“ The general management of the affairs of this important public charity is all that could be desired, and the funds economically but efficiently expended so as to accomplish the greatest possible benefit : all of which is, in a great measure, due to the excellent system of administering its affairs, and the efficient and thorough manner in which the Trustees, Managers, and Com-

mittees perform their duty, as well as to the excellent domestic management of the Superintendent, Mr. Duckett.

TREASURER'S REPORT.

The Treasurer, HENRY ROWSELL, Esq., also submitted his Accounts in detail, with vouchers, duly audited and found correct, shewing the Receipts for the year 1871 (including balance from last year) as \$12,314.96, and the Expenditure as per vouchers, \$10,274.96, shewing a balance in hand 1st January, 1872, of \$2,040.00.

N.B.—Of this balance the larger portion is expended during the first three months of this year.

MEDICAL OFFICER'S REPORT.

During the past year I have visited a great many poor families in various parts of the city—from below the Don to Bishop Street.

I have prescribed and furnished medicine to some ; I have obtained the admission of others into the General Hospital ; some were taken into the House of Industry ; and others were supplied with the necessary food and fuel at their own homes, when it appeared best to afford relief in that way.

Several impostors have been detected among those applying at the House for relief on the ground of personal sickness ; but in no case did I find deception practised by those whom I was sent to examine at their homes, while in several instances the destitution was beyond conception.
