Startling Condition of Province's Finances

INDEPENDENT AUDIT REVEALS EXTENT OF DEFICIT AND DEBT

Capital and Current Debt More Than \$17,000,000 — Deficit of More Than \$700,000 at End of Last Fiscal Year-Interest Account Nearly Hali of Ordinary Revenue

Fredericton, June 7-New Brunswick has a capital and cur-

rent debt of over \$17,000,000. Its capital and current debt and obligation amount to over \$20,000,000.

New Brunswick has an estimated revenue this year of \$1,-564,365, and an annual interest charge of \$630,500, which includes \$246,500 for Valley Railway bonds issued.

New Brunswick's estimated ordinary expenditure this year will exceed its estimated receipts by nearly \$150,000 and, by adding the Valley Railway interest, about \$400,000.

The public debt in 1908, when the Hozen government came into power, was \$5,834,533. In 1916, exclusive of Valley Railway

bonds, the debt was \$9,109,059, an increase of \$3,274,525. There was the amazing deficit of \$703,583.27 on ordinary revenue and expenses at October 31, 1916, instead of an imaginary surplus of \$12,000.

These are the figures of Price, Waterhouse & Co., as supplied in their preliminary report, after a complete examination of the books of the province. This amount of nearly three-quarters of a million will have

to be funded in order for the Foster government to start out with

The foregoing were some of the startling and outstanding features of the budget speech, delivered in the legislature this evening by Hon. C. W. Robinson, in place of Hon. Robert Murray, provincial secretary-treasurer, who had to relinquish that duty on account of recent and continued eye trouble.

A DISCOURAGING STATEMENT. The people of New Brunswick have been prepared during the recent campaign and by revelations in the past four years, for a serious statement, but the facts as presented by Hon. Mr. Robinson tonight, in such a direct and uncom-

Premier Foster, and his colleagues and supporters, have nothing to conceal from the public. The plain, unvarnished facts from the books of the province, by the most expert accounting firm in Canada or anywhere else, Messrs. Price, Waterhouse & Co., will be placed before the legislature and the people, and upon their report the government must and will act.

A preliminary statement that there was a deficit of over \$700,000 at the end of the last fiscal year, is most startling and disquieting, but the other facts as presented, showing that New Brunswick after eight years of Hazen and Flemming, Clarke and Murray, as premiers, has a debt and obligations of over twenty millions, and an interest account of nearly half its ordinary revenue, are surely sufficient to rouse the people from their lethargy, bid them inquire what the end is to be, and how the province is to raise the money to meet these vast

The new government has been in power two months. There has not been time to do anything but try and clean up the mass of unfinished business, and the departmental messes that were left over. Week by week useless expenditures have been lopped off-some of them large and many of them small, but all adding to the total of economy. The facts must, however, be faced.

The former government involved the province in tremendous obligations, they did not hesitate to draw upon the vast provincial credit, they provided many use less public works, and made some expenditures that were almost criminal-such as the Southampton Railway bond issue, They did not hesitate to give away any public rights, they provided lav ishly for expenditures by which their friends profited, and the public paid.





HON. DR. PUGSLEY SPEAKS ON CRISIS AS IT NOW STANDS

Ottawa, June 7-In response to The Telegraph's request for a summary of the political situation as it now stands, Hon. William Pugsley this afternoon gave your correspondent the following statement: What many of us have feared has happened. There is to be no coalition.

The correspondence between Sir Robert Borden and Sir Wilfrid Laurier shows the following important facts, namely:

That when the prime minister approached the Liberal leader his professed desire was to avoid an election during the war. He knew that there was a very strong sentiment in Canada, not by any means confined to Quebec, that conscription should not be enacted by this parliament without a referendum, so as to get the opinion of the people upon the question; yet, without making any offer of referendum, the proposal of the prime minister as formulated is that general election.

In other words, instead of getting the opinion of the people in a manner which would enable them to vote upon conscription as was done in Australia, free from all the passion and prejudices which a general election would arouse, he proposed that Sir Wilfrid should, by joining the government, commit himself to inscription and then plunge the country into the turmoil of a general election in the midst of the war, thus inflicting on the people the very evil which he, the prime minister, at first professed his desire to avoid.

In my opinion to have taken the view of the people by a referendum would have been infinitely the better course and one which should commend itself to every patriotic advocate of compulsory service who would desire to see it successfully carried out, and to have a united Canada rather than have the people torn asunder by political and racial differences. In Sir Wilfrid's statement to the prime minister he, Sir Wilfrid, uses this language:
"AT THIS AND PREVIOUS INTERVIEWS I ALWAYS STATED TO

YOU THAT WHENEVER CONSCRIPTION WAS ADOPTED AFTER A CONSULTATION OF THE PEOPLE I WOULD CERTAINLY URGE IN EVERY POSSIBLE WAY OBEDIENCE TO THE LAW."

This should have appealed to the good judgment of the prime minister and induced him to offer a referendum; when, if conscription was favored by the electors, all the people of Canada, as well those against conscription as those in favor of it, would, I am sure, have cheerfully yielded to the will of the ma-

Sir Robert Borden has, it seems to me, lost a glorious opportunity of bringing about a united feeling among the people of all the provinces as to the best methods to be taken for winning the war and for entering upon that high and mighty purpose which would inspire the souls of a united nation. It seems most lamentable that the glorious record written by our Canadian boys at the front should be marred by the spectacle of national divisions and racial dis-

Some promising re-cruits were lost when required to wait for medical examination, as there are not enough doctors at the local recruiting stations. Sinclair, acting in the interest of the new prohibition act, produced a witness to offset the evidence given on last Wednesday by the defendant and his wife to the effect that there was no liquor in any other part of their home other than that seized by Inspector Crawford, on the day following the seizur of a valise at the Union Station. The case was closed this morning and the magnitude. was closed this morning and the mag-istrate adjourned it until tomorrow at twelve o'clock to deliver judgment.

Mr. Sinclair called Harold Upham, an electrician with the Knox Electric concern, Dock street, to prove that liquor had been seen by him on the premises of the defendant in Leinster street.

To this evidence Mr. Mullin took strenuous objection, saying that the case was adjourned on Wednesday with the understanding that any further testical strength of the stre

was adjourned on Wednesday with the understanding that any further testimony on the part of the prosecution would only be in rebuttal. Mr. Mullin said that the evidence about to be taken was not admissable.




