(Montreal Mail, Independent). The lavish—even if necessary—expenditures in the process of development at Halifax, St. John and Quebec are significant sequels of the Laurier government's railway policy. The Transcontinental section of the Grand Trunk Pacific plan has opened up possibilities for these ports that never would have been probabilities had the transportation plans of the existing railways been adhered to. The idea that the maritime provinces should not be allowed to develop while the system of government owned and operated railways obtained there, was one which permeated both parties under skilful manipulation of the railway lobbies. The champions of the government system could do little more than hold their own as the price of holding their peace. Whatever the extravagance of construction of the Transcontinental, it is a project which enabled and even forced a maritime province port development that otherwise would have been retarded or strangled. The maritime province members who fought for the outlets of the Transcontinental in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia now have the satisfaction of knowing-but not yet to the full-the value of their services. 



Gold Recovered From a Dentist's Rea-lized Seventy Pounds Value

If gold is one of the rarest and most valuable metals it is also one of the most widely diffused. We all handle gold. We have it in our purses as mon-ey, round our fingers, wrists, on necks, as rings, bracelets or necklets, and we wear it in our mouths as fillings for our

The amount of gold used by dentists is very considerable, and even dentists have no idea of how much goes to waste in the workshops where they make plates and the like. Some little time ago plates and the like. Some little time ago a Cheltenham dentist was moving house. A friend, standing in his dismantled workshop, which was in the basement of the house, remarked that there must be a good deal of gold in the floor.

The dentist thought it over and decided to take the floor up. He made a profit of \$70 after paying expenses from profit of £70 after paying expenses from the tiny particles of gold recovered from

There Was Only One Royal Whipping Boy-The King's Ale-Taster

Many curious old court appointments have been abolished, but there are still very quaint posts about the throne. There is, for instance, a Marshal of the Gentle Archers. He is the commander of a company of Scottish archers who have the right of acting as the king's bodyguard when he is in Scotland. Their uniform is the ancient archer's color—Lincoln green. They practise in an Edinburgh public park.

There is a king's verderer for the Forest of Dean. This is probably the most ancient of all court appointments. A "verderer" is a sort of gamekeeper in charge of deer, and the office dates from early Norman times, when the hunting of deer was the favorite royal sport. The holder of this office is elected at a special court presided over by the Lord High Sheriff of Gloucester.

It is only a few years since King Edward VII. abolished the offices of King's Ale-taster and Royal Rat-catcher. The Royal Rat-catcher had a handsome salary of £250 a year, with allowances for the upkeep of his dogs and ferrets. This latter office dated from the time of Charles II. the Gentle Archers. He is the com-

Charles II. There is still a Steward of the Chil-There is still a Steward of the Chiltern Hundreds. Any M. P., can have the post for the asking. In fact, he is compelled to ask for it if he wants to resign his office, as in theory no M. P. can resign except on accepting "an office of profit" under the crown. The profit is exactly £1 a year, and, as far as is known, no M. P. has ever touched that sovereign, as the first thing a retiring M. P. does after obtaining the office is to resign it. The office dates from the days when the Chiltern district (in Bucks) swarmed with outlaws.

News traveled slowly in Queen Elizabeth's time, and the slowly in Queen Elizabeth's time, and the first news she had of the taking of Nova Zembla by the Dutch was found in a bottle picked up by a Deal fisherman named Tonfield, who forwarded the message to the lord high admiral.

Queen Elizabeth was struck with the idea, and decreed that all bottles with inclosures found on the coast should be forwarded to the lord high admiral, Tonfield being appointed uncorker. The post survived for centuries.
