SIR WILFRID IS TO SPEAK IN HOUSE ON MONDAY NEXT

Vote to be Taken Then on Amendments By Monk and Borden—Conservative Leader Gets a Raking

Ottawa, Nov. 25.—The house closed a short sitting today as a preparation for Monday, when Sir Wilfrid Laurier will speak, and the vote will be taken on the naval amendments of Mr. Monk and Mr. Borden.

Liberal speakers insistently declare that there is no difference between the two, and that one emanates from the Nationalist camp and one from Conservative headquarters.

Mr. Fowke, Liberal, of South Ontario, said that while the government had shown its loyalty to the British crown by undertaking the construction of a navy, the Conservatives could only affirm their loyalty with words and a resolution against the navy.

Colonel Sam Hughes said the elections in Quebec for the last 100 years had generally turned on pettyfoggery of Great Britain.

Dr. Clark, Liberal, of Red Deer, said the government's naval policy had been endorsed by both political parties in Britain.

Mr. Borden's amendment was a great deal of trouble for Mr. Monk. Last session Mr. Monk was in solitary confinement and captured the entire omnibus. He had even invaded the driver's seat, and though he was not, he had been permitted to occupy a front seat in the speaker's gallery.

What had become of the proposed contribution to Britain? Where was the offer of a Dreadnought in Mr. Borden's amendment? If a German war was imminent a year ago it ought to be more imminent now.

BIG ELEPHANT WAS HARD TO POISON

New York Animal Which Killed Keeper Given Five Hundred Times as Much as Would Kill a Man

New York, Nov. 25.—It took 500 grains of cyanide of potassium, a deadly poison, to kill the Gypsy Queen, a death elephant, today, in execution of the death sentence passed on her for the murder of her keeper, Robert Schindler, on Oct. 29 last.

More than one grain is ordinarily fatal to man, and the first convulsive symptoms supervene almost before the victim can get down the glass from which he drank. But the Queen swayed backward and forward, flapping her big ears, for ten minutes before she showed the least uneasiness.

It was forty-four minutes before she was pronounced dead.

The poison was given her in three pill-falls of bran mash in which had been sprinkled 100 capsules, each of five grains of cyanide. She had been starved for 24 hours and ate greedily. At the end of twenty minutes she shivered in all her vast bulk of 7,000 pounds, her knees weakened, her trunk grew rigid, she rolled her eyes, and fell. In the next ten minutes she got up four times, struggling against the chains that bound her. At the end of twenty minutes her breathing was imperceptible, but forty-four minutes after her first swallow she showed the least uneasiness.

The Queen was eighty-seven years old, born in Africa, and one of the largest elephants in captivity. She stood eight feet seven inches high. Of recent years her temper has not improved, and last October she picked up an unaccustomed keeper, who had been warned not to go near her, slammed him against the wall of her cell, and then trod him into a pulp.

A few days ago she grabbed at another keeper, but he kept cautiously out of her reach. Nevertheless, her trainer never lost faith in her. To prove her docility he took her out today a few minutes before her execution, and led her through her park. She seemed willing enough to perform and submitted to be caressed before she was led to her death.



**The Evening Chit-Chat**  
By RUTH CAMERON

**A**N INTERESTING little suggestion along the line of out-of-the-ordinary things that women are doing came under my notice while on a vacation trip to Grand Manan this fall.

Only, I suppose one should call it "jam," rather than "bread and butter" that these three women were earning, for the little venture I want to tell you about was merely a side issue with them, teaching being their vocation.

Grand Manan, be it explained for those whose geography doesn't go into such minute details—is an island belonging to Canada and lying off the coast of Maine. It is a quaint and picturesque isle, inhabited mostly by fisher-folk and having a most magnificent coastline and tremendous cliffs three or four hundred feet high, said to resemble the coast of Norway. Now tourists and summer folk have just begun to appreciate the beauty of this place, and the native people have not yet become sufficiently used to these guests to know how to supply their wants.

Whereby hangs my tale.

About ten years ago these three girls began coming to Grand Manan for their summers. For a year or two they stopped at one of the native "hotels" ("mit said"), then they rented a cottage. Friends visited them and told other friends of the beauty of the spot. "Other friends began to say, 'Can't we come too and share the expense?' The three girls demurred at first, but finally yielded and thus, with two or three guests, there started what is now known all over Manan as "The Cove Girls' Settlement."

Last year the Cove Girls had twenty-seven guests who paid nine or ten dollars a week.

They have bought the cottage which they originally rented and added to it a large barn, another cottage and a cooper's shop which belonged with the second cottage, and also several acres of land.

The cooper shop had a large stone fireplace. They have left that intact as the great amazement of the natives, who expect stone to wall it up and put in a good Franklin stove. In the barn, right beside the hay, they have slung Gloucester hammocks, and many of the guests sleep there although dressing and undressing in the house.

With the cottages they have worked the miracles that a grit of taste and energy and a little money sometimes accomplish. Almost all the painting and papering they have done themselves. Everything about the place is in perfect taste from the dainty cretonne hangings at the windows to the artistic blue vases over the fireplace, which are kept forever overflowing with nasturtiums.

I said the three girls were teachers. That wasn't quite correct. Two of them teach but the third is a lady of leisure. With her mother she comes down early in the spring, opens one of the cottages, superintends the planting of flowers and vegetables and in a general way gets things a-rip.

From their long experience on the island, the girls know its every resource. They know just how to get the best table supplies reasonably. They know where to get horses and boats at good prices. They know all the places that are interesting to visit. And lastly, but by no means least, being "city folks" themselves they know what "city folks" like and don't like.

With such a plant and such an equipment it is any wonder that as the natives put "the eye pick" in the money hand over fist.

Because of the paucity of space I have had to give you just the bare outlines of this little story, but I trust I've told you enough to give you the idea.

What these girls have achieved through their own initiative and a group of bright girls with long summer vacations could do for any charming but not over-exploited spot.

**BUILDING BOAT TO GO MILE A MINUTE**

Marvelous Craft Now Being Constructed in London to Race for International Trophy

London, Nov. 26.—Nearing completion at Dixon Brothers and Hutchinson's yard, Southampton, is an 800-horse-power hydroplane, which is being built to the order of a London marine motorist, who will send her to the United States next summer to win back the international trophy which is now held there.

Although the owner's name is kept a close secret, it is believed that the boat is being built for the Duke of Westminster, who has a passion for this dangerous form of racing. The new craft is similar to, but more powerful and larger than the Duke's boat, the "Duchess," which is a 400-horse-power, 120-foot-long twin screw boat fitted with two 12-cylinder motors, each of 100-horse-power. Reaching on a basis of horse-power per ton, the speed of the new boat should not be less than 62 miles per hour.



Pittsburg, Pa., Nov. 25.—An old municipal experiment in training for better citizenship has begun in this country with the purchase of 600 acres of farm land, on which 50 boys, all wards of the juvenile court, shall be taught, close to nature, to become good men.

A committee of prominent citizens, led by David B. Oliver, formerly controller of public schools of the city, and a brother of Senator George T. Oliver, originated the idea, and, aided by the county commissioners, is carrying it out.

Mr. Oliver, who is one of the wealthiest men in Pittsburg, has found that frequently the "bad boys" make the best men, and he is giving his time and money to the project, which really marks a new era in the care of juvenile court children. The only noteworthy institution like it is at Industry, N. Y., but that is a state institution.

On the land, which is thirty miles from Pittsburg, will be built cottages which will accommodate twenty boys. A head farmer will look after the youngsters.

GATHER EARLY AT SHELTER

Salvation Army Had Thirty-Five Under Roof Last Night SOME OF THE CASES

Sailor Boy Who Found Himself in Spain With \$6—Twice Stowed Away Before Reaching St. John—One Man With 10 Cents

With the Winter Port fairly started the demand for beds, and assistance at the Salvation Army shelter is on the increase. During this week more than thirty have been sheltered each night and last evening the total reached thirty-five. Many are without any means of support, and look to the army, to help in some way or other, when the wood yard is proposed to those who are able, there are few who refuse the offered work, and opportunity to help themselves. Each day brings new cases. Last night a bit of a lad, who looked as if he had not had a good meal for many days, told how he had shipped from an American port, and been paid off in Spain with six dollars, the balance of his pay having been signed away to a shipping master. As there was no chance for him to ship out of a Spanish port, the lad stowed away in a steamer bound for England. On arrival there he found conditions bad, and not being able to ship, stowed away once more and landed at Sydney, C. B., and then made his way to the Winter Port, where he arrived friendless, and homeless. Another man arrived with ten cents after paying his way from Montreal, having heard there was plenty of work here for all.

The last man to arrive was a convert from the Torrey mission, who had decided to turn over a new leaf, and live a good life. He was brought in by a business man in the city, who after he had arranged for his bed, prayed with him, that God's grace should be the power to enable him to overcome. Last Sunday the shelter was visited by one of our workers, and many favorable comments made by the men who listened to the prayer that was offered, and the good advice given. Adjutant W. R. Carter, the officer in charge of the Metropole and Shelter was absent the other day if the wood yard was still in operation, and where he secured the wood, and what was done with it after it was manufactured into kindling. The reply was, the wood yard is still in operation, and is a success, for since its inception many who were in the habit of asking for work, have left the city, as it was not work they wanted but charity; thus they have been able to find out the desiring in many instances. The wood is bought from one of the city dealers and \$3 a cord is paid for it, and not less than three cents on an average are used each week. The wood is sold to those who want dry kindling, and is delivered in to the houses for \$1.20 a load of eight barrels. The stock in the second-hand clothing department, or salvage as it is termed, is very low, as the demands have been very numerous from others who are interested in assisting the needy. No doubt there are many who are lacking in all kinds they have discarded and the army is only too pleased to receive and put it to a good use. A postal card to Adjutant W. R. Carter, S. A. WILL BE ALL YEAR SERVICE FROM HERE TO WEST INDIES Weekly Steamers On the New Run and Fast Railway Connection With Montreal

Referring to the two new C. P. R. steamship services in which St. John is interested the Montreal Herald says: "The service with the South American ports will be the first in the field, as it will not involve the building of a special fleet of steamers but will be operated in the first instance with a line of monthly freight boats which will run between South American ports and Montreal in the summer months and St. John in winter. It is expected that the first steamer will leave this port when navigation on the St. Lawrence opens in the spring. "In the case of the West Indies service the conditions are different. The shallow harbours of most of the West Indies restrict the size of not more than 25-foot ports demand steamers of special construction. The harbor of Basseterre, the capital of St. Kitts, is little more than an open roadstead exposed to the south east winds. The trade necessities demand that the boats shall be swift, roomy and comfortable for passengers. It will necessarily take time to construct a sufficient number of vessels of this type to constitute a weekly service. These steamers will run from St. John, N. B., all the year round and Montreal's connection will be maintained by fast railway services, both passenger and freight."

SNOW FALLING AND TWENTY EIGHT MILE WIND A BLOWING

First Real Storm of Season Just Two Days Later Than the Opener Last Winter

Today's snow storm, which is practically the first of the season, is reported by meteorological observatory as just two days later than the first of last year, which was on the 24th. On that occasion the weather was somewhat colder and during the night three-quarters of an inch of snow fell. The following day however the temperature went up to 28 and the snow disappeared.

The snow is melting as fast as it falls. The velocity of the wind at noon was reported as twenty-eight miles an hour, and it was the same at Point Lepreau at 11.30 this morning.
