ANCIENT CATHEDRAL DESTROYED BY FIRE

Rome, July 29—The magnificent Cathedral of Conversano, which was destroyed by fire a few days ago, was one of the most precious examples of twelfth century Apulian architecture. The building was begun in 1158, and took 200 years to complete. Its priceless archives contained a mass of documents dating from the early part of the fourteenth century. The fire, which has reduced the cathedral to a mass of ruins, was caused by candles used by workmen engaged in repairs in the organ loft.

DISSOLUTION SATURDAY; ELECTIONS SEPT. 21

Liberals Enter Conflict United and Confident With Reciprocity as the Main Issue—Conservatives Regret They Forced Issue

Ottawa, July 31.—The eleventh parliament of Canada was dissolved on Saturday, talked to its death by a stubborn and unreasoning minority, and the view of the determined opposition from the obstructionists the government thought a further year's time trying to pass the reciprocity bill was useless, and on Saturday afternoon, advised by his ministers, the governor general called a new parliament on September 21, providing for the holding of the writs forthwith to be returnable on October 7, and fixing October 11 as the tentative date for the meeting of the new parliament.

Hon. Mr. Fielding made the announcement to the correspondents at the council chamber. This was a characteristic comment to the House speaker and an indication of the issue on which the election will be fought. The long tension which had ended, and the announcement immediately ended the suspense. The word was heartily received in the Liberal ranks, where every member is confident of his return, and where a greater majority than has been expected after September 21.

In the ranks of the opposition, while the members were for some time apparently eager for an election, when the announcement was made they did not seem highly enthusiastic at the prospect, and it is openly said that some of the conservative members are sorry now that the election has been forced. They think a tactical mistake was made in announcing the party awaits certain defeat. There were others, however, who blamed the government for not having called an election in the past, and who are now ready to expect vigorous campaign.

It is planned that the government shall meet on October 25, the new parliament being opened by the Duke of Connaught, it is to be held in the city of Ottawa. In the case of the opposition, while the members were for some time apparently eager for an election, when the announcement was made they did not seem highly enthusiastic at the prospect, and it is openly said that some of the conservative members are sorry now that the election has been forced. They think a tactical mistake was made in announcing the party awaits certain defeat. There were others, however, who blamed the government for not having called an election in the past, and who are now ready to expect vigorous campaign.
