

TWENTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL SESSION

OF THE

SYNOD OF THE DIOCESE OF MONTREAL.

FIRST DAY-TUESDAY, 15TH JUNE.

The twenty-seventh annual meeting of the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal, was held on Tuesday, the 15th day of June, 1886.

Divine service was held in the Cathedral, and the Holy Communion was administered. The Lord Bishop officiated, assisted by Ven. Archdeacon Lindsay, Revs. J. F. Renaud, W. Robinson and J. Carmichael, Junr.

The Sermon was preached by the Rev. T. E. Cunningham, Incumbent of Aylmer.

The Synod assembled in the Synod Hall at two o'clock, when the Session was opened by the Lord Bishop with prayer.

The rolls were called by the Clerical Secretary

It was decided that the offertory at this morning's service be devoted to the Mission Fund of this Diocese.

It was moved by the Rev. Canon Norman, seconded by the Rev. Canon Robinson:

"That the Rev. Canon Empson be re-elected Clerical Secretary of this Synod."—Carried.

Notice was given of meetings of the Committees on Deaconesses, on Statistics, and on Sunday Schools.

The LORD BISHOP then delivered his charge to the Synod, as follows :-

I first desire humbly to thank Almighty God for permitting me once more to meet the representatives of this diocese in synod assembled. The business before us, with one exception, is not of an exciting nature, chiefly matters of routine and order; for this also I am grateful to the great Head of the Church. The blessings which attend peace and prosperity are amongst the best gifts bestowed on mankind. At the same time, I am deeply conscious that a season of quiet and ease may be accepted and enjoyed without a due sense of responsibility, that, like the prosperous man in the parable, each of us may be tempted to say, as we consider the diocesan funds, "Soul, thou hast much goods laid up for many years, take thine ease." I say we may be thus tempted, I do not maintain that we have so spoken; God forbid. But in a spirit of warning rather than in a spirit of fault-finding I propose for a few minutes to occupy your time with a brief review of the past in order that in the present there may be no flagging of our energies nor lacking in our interest, because there is no matter of sufficient importance to stir the feelings or quicken the pulse. I propose to remind you that we are stewards, both of temporal and spiritual

things; that our responsibilities as to the right use and the due maintenance of church possessions are weighty and great, both as regards those who preceded us and those who are to follow, and that this is not the time (because of our quiet) in which we may be slack in our duties as members of synod.

The first regular meeting of synod was held in 1859-twentyseven years ago. There were then five organized congregations in this city, viz., Christ Church, Trinity, St. George's, St. Stephen's (then called St. Ann's), and St. Luke's, none of them worshipping in the present large, commodious (I had almost said luxurious) buildings now known by these names. So far as buildings were concerned, those were the days of small things. Still let me remind you that the greater part of the progress made in church building was made in the first half of that which I suppose may be called the independence of the Montreal Church; the first half of that quarter of a century during which we have had synodical action. The same, or nearly the same, may be said of the great funds on which the maintenance of our Church, under God, depends, viz., the Mission fund, the Widows and Orphans fund, the Sustentation fund and the Superannuation fund. These funds were formed, or projected, in those early days of synod, and were liberally sustained. Have these funds advanced as they should have done during the last few years? The men of the early period of synod life labored, and we have entered into their labors. I do not attempt to prove my statement. I speak out of my own experience—and our synod reports are within reach. The whole history of our Church Society is extant, and much illustrative matter beside, where those, whose age or other cause has prevented their acquaintance with the details which have attended the growth of the diocese can, ascertain the full particulars; and I promise those who take the trouble that they will not regret the slight pains which it may cost them. They will find not only that they have extended their knowledge of many things particularly interesting to Montreal Churchmen, but that they will look with increased love and reverence on a generation now passing away, few of whom are before me, whose zeal and disinterested affection are as worthy of imitation as they are of reverent remembrance and grateful mention. I have told you of the five churches, small by comparison, which held the Church of England congregations in Montreal 27 years ago. In the country 61 churches were administered by 38 clergymen. Of these 38, fourteen are still with us, though not all in active service. Of the city clergy, three only remain out of the ten then in the parish of Montreal. With all this change, if you will examine the re-

ports now in your hands, if you will only consider, you will perceive how much in temporal things—in things which touch numbers, wealth, material prosperity—we have increased and multiplied. We have more than doubled the number of our clergy, and we have more than doubled the number of our Church buildings. And our Church membership has at least increased in due proportion. Never was the Church of England in this diocese numerically, even by comparison, stronger, nor outwardly more prosperous than at this present time. This is well. This is fit matter for general congratulation. Growth-persistent, steady growth—is a true sign of healthy life, and I have a right to enquire into and look for spiritual fruit, which surely follows steady healthy growth. In other words, the Lord has a right to expect in this His vineyard the good fruit which results from careful dressing and good husbandry. Brethren, how is it with you and your congregations? Does the Heavenly Husbandman find the fruits of the Spirit? Is there the evidence amongst you that our branch of the vine liveth and abideth in the Lord Jesus Christ? These thoughts have been awakened in me by the business which your Executive committee will bring before you to-day. Where are the fruits? For example: the work of evangelization in the poorer and more remote districts of the diocese; the lumber country of the Gatineau; the farming country north on the Ottawa? Evangelization is imperatively demanded, but to carry on this work men and means are needed. Where amongst our more favored people are the fruits? A great work has been going on up there for several years, and now unless a missionary spirit—and that is the true, unselfish spirit-be shown in the city-which is the heart of the diocese—and in the well-to-do country parishes, some of this work on which so much toil and life have been spent, and with so much of blessing, must be abandoned, and the field which is white to harvest (the harvest of the constantly extending field) must, so far as we are concerned, fade and fall, neglected and ungathered. It is true some of the city churches have done nobly in this behalf, and some in the country, for which I here and now express my deep gratitude to them and to God, who has stirred them up to such liberality; and the executive have done their best, according to their means. The Rev. Rural Dean Naylor, W. P. Chambers, A. J. Greer and others have, by their diligence and earnestness of spirit, brought within the pale of the Church many settlers in districts remote from their own centres? What shall be done with these? Shall we abandon them? Shall we leave them to fall back into the ignorance of religious truth and neglect of worship from

which they have been rescued? Our missionaries have opened up the work, but they cannot maintain it efficiently. There is work to be done, for example in the Upper Gatineau beyond the capacity of any two men, however zealous. Shall we leave the good seed to perish? Shall we treat it with the same neglect as at Arundel, the portion of the field so efficiently planted by the Rev. H. J. Evans some years ago? If we do, let us be silent as to our loyalty to the dear old Church of England. Money is required as well as men to carry on the work of Christ over areas so wide as these, and money does not flow into the mission fund as freely, in proportion, as in times past. I now ask each clergyman here to place the mission fund first on the list of collections to be made in each congregation. I ask each clergyman, from the country as well as in the city, to explain to the people-especially to the young growing up to Church knowledge and Church responsibilities—that they fall short of their duty, in the sight of God and man, if they fail to exert and deny themselves for the maintenance of those Church privileges throughout the diocese so liberally and thoughtfully established for their benefit by their predecessors. Let it be remembered that we are not so many separate, self sustaining congregations without corporate unity, but members one of another, necessary to one another, necessary for mutual help and health, so that if one member suffer the other members suffer with One great and right way to contribute to the poorer missions of the Church is that the older and more experienced parishes become entirely self-supporting. When you remove yourselves from the mission fund, you of course leave the more for the poor and needy. A motion standing over from last synod moved by the Rev. J. H. Dixon and seconded by the Rev. Rural Dean Longhurst, recognizes this as the true principle of mission education in temporal things, and I hope that it will have a prominent place and due discussion in the business of this synod. Another aid to mission maintenance as well as mission extension would be the employment of missioners-men set apart for the special work. I believe such visits would be very welcome both to clergy and laity, and would prevent the more isolated churches from falling into monotony and indifference. Of course a staff of such men would require support, and I would therefore wish you to give the matter your grave consideration.

Before leaving the subject of money I have to remind the clergy that, from this time, every clergyman on being licensed is expected to subscribe to the Widows and Orphans fund, in accordance with

a resolution of synod passed at its last session.

I have, through God's mercy, been enabled to make my usual visitation of the diocese, having visited exactly 100 parishes, missions and stations, exclusive of the city churches: twelve priests and eight deacons have been ordained: three churches, three burying grounds and one font consecrated; 228 men and 357 women have been confirmed. There still seems to be a doubt in some minds whether or no the bishop should be received in response to his annual notice of visitation, in cases where there are no candidates for confirmation. Allow me to remind you that both my predecessors were severely tried by claims made upon them for annual visitation. It is thought by many that in his effort to overtake the work in one year, Bishop Fulford overtaxed his strength, and succumbed to fatigue and anxiety. There is no doubt in my mind that the continual travel proved too much for Bishop Oxenden, and was the immediate cause of his resignation. Learning from his experience, I have made my journeys less laborious than his were, by being, perhaps, less obliging in my arrangements. Instead of going whenever sent for, and in that way travelling two or three times over the same ground, I invite each deanery to make out an itinerary, and I visit the parishes in turn. But I think every effort should be made to receive me at the time appointed. I ought not to be regarded merely as an officer to administer confirmation. The bishop is overseer and chief pastor of his diocese, and he desires to see the working of a parish generally, as well as to enter into friendly and pastoral relations alike with clergy and laity, and it is unfilial not to receive him loyally and gladly, when he intimates his intention to visit the churches.

I have received a communication from the general secretary of the Domestic and Foreign Missionary society, requesting me to call your attention to the needs of the diocese of Algoma and the dioceses of the Northwest. I think the better way will be to read to you the paper itself, which certainly deserves your attention. At the same time I have reason to believe that the Bishop of Algoma is dissatisfied with the working of the Board of Domestic and Foreign Missions, and I recommend early application to him for information on this point.

The Girls' Friendly Society seems now to be fairly established and doing good work in the diocese. I have an excellent report of the year's work from the president, which will be read to you presently and to which I ask your attention, as I think much good may be done through this instrumentality.

The affairs of the Montreal Diocesan Theological College have recently been before the public in connection with the application SESSION.

I wish now, as Bishop of Montreal, to speak to you (the representatives of the Church in the diocese of Montreal) in the spirit of a father to his son, counting on your loyalty to me as your father and your bishop, to speak, that is frankly and earnestly, but in confidence and affection, whether in full agreement on all points or not. It is necessary as a Church family, that we should understand one another on a subject of common interest and importance. I desire especially to inform those amongst you who are too young or who entered the diocese too recently to have personal knowledge of events which took place here between thirty or forty years ago, about matters which happened both within and without our own body, in order that we may understandingly advise together for the common good, and that you may give me your support where that support is due.

McGill college was founded A.D. 1811, and belonged, by the will of its founder, in all things religious, to the Church of England. The trustees and professors were churchmen. Bishop's college, Lennoxville, was founded A.D. 1845, also in connection with the Church of England; but even then, in 1846, the late Bishop of Quebec, Bishop Mountain, contemplating the then impending division of his diocese, anticipated that the new diocese of Montreal would require separate provision for the education of its clergy, and adds that "Bishop's college will still be the reliance for that of Quebec." But to the great grief of our own body, McGill college was lost to our exclusive control by act of Parliament in 1852.

The Right Rev. Bishop Fulford, referring to this in his first charge, delivered to the then new diocese of Montreal in 1852 speaks as follows:—

"If we are to have a trained and educated clergy, we must look, for anything like a regular systematic supply, to training up a native ministry of our own. And there are some advances in such plan which could not be obtained any other way; though we may not at once be able to make every provision for this which seems requisite."

"It was hoped that by the establishment of McGill college in this city the Church would have possessed an institution capable of supplying us with what we require. The difficulties and disputes that have hitherto destroyed the usefulness of that munificent bequest are much to be deplored, and, on every public ground, I sincerely wish that they may be removed and settled. But whether it will ever become an efficient institution, and if so, whether we shall be able to associate ourselves with it, or otherwise to provide here for the education of candidates for the ministry, it is impossible for me to say. Still, in the meantime, we are not left wholly without resource. The college which the Bishop of Quebec, while administering the affairs of the undivided diocese, founded at Leunoxville in 1845, has already supplied us with no less than ten of our present clergy, and those not the least faithful of our body. And though it is not now within the limits of this diocese, it is still open for us to enjoy the benefit of it, and I have myself been appointed one of its trustees."

I shall return presently to our connection with Lennoxville, for I wish to be explicit on that head; but, first, I must finish what I have to say about our early association with McGill. No one now acquainted with the vigor and usefulness of McGill, in all that touches secular education, can imagine how feeble it was before the appointment of its present respected principal, Sir Wm. Dawson, and, without that knowledge, the full significance of the words I have just quoted cannot be apparent ; but I would have you lay stress on the words, "Whether McGill will ever become an efficient institution, and, if so, whether we shall be able to associate ourselves with it, or otherwise to provide here for the education of candidates for the ministry, it is impossible for me to say." I would on no account strain the Bishop's words, but is it not evident that he hoped the day might come when the Bishop of Montreal would be able to train candidates for the ministry in the city of Montreal? (The charge is printed in full in the Bishop's volume of sermons and addresses). There are other important passages which, if time allowed, I should like to read, but they are many, and would detain you too long. Still, that is the spirit of the whole. The Church of England must not stand apart from such educational establishments as are by law provided, if she would retain her influence in the province; but, accepting the fact of public undenominational education, she must supplement the secular advantages with careful religious training. This line of thought is especially clear in his address on the occasion of the opening of the McGill Normal school, in 1857, the Hon. P. J. O. Chauveau in the chair. Bishop Fulford died in 1868. Bishop Oxenden, in his first address to synod, in 1870, spoke as follows:-

"The training of our candidates for holy orders is not altogether on a satisfactory footing. The fact of our Theological college being at a distance places us at a disadvantage. And I should certainly be thankful if I could gather my candidates for the sacred ministry around me here at Montreal, where I could watch their characters and conduct, and superintendent their preparation for the

ministry. I feel unwilling, however, without more mature consideration, to interfere with the present arrangement as regards the college at Lennoxville. But if it should eventually be found desirable to move the theological department nearer home, I doubt not that I should obtain from the churchmen of the diocese the needed help to enable me to carry out the project. My present conviction is that, if we had in this city a theological institution with a building worthy of its character, it would prove an immense blessing to the diocese." The blessing has come, thank God.

Two years later, Bishop Oxenden returns to the subject in nearly the same words. In 1873 he announces his intention to found a training college in Montreal, and in 1874 he speaks of it as an established fact. From that date to the present time the college has been advancing and prospering. There has been no lack of students, and the number is continually increasing, and enquiry into the college statistics will satisfy everyone that our men are getting all possible advantages—secular and sacred—and that they are availing themselves of them to the fullest extent. We have had lately some twenty-one students studying at one time.

The college was incorporated in 1879, and affiliated to McGill in 1880, and this year it applied to Parliament for power to grant degrees in divinity to such of its students as had already obtained B. A. at McGill or some other satisfactory university. But the passage of the bill was opposed by (among others) the Bishops of Quebec and Niagara. In other words, the Bishops of Quebec and Niagara went before the Private Bills committee to thwart the passage of a bill which affected the advancement of the Church in the diocese of Montreal. I was engaged at the time in the annual visitation of the diocese, from which I was summoned to Quebec by urgent messages from the promoters of the bill. I went down most reluctantly to confront my Episcopal brethren before the Private Bills committee-a committee composed of gentlemen whom everyone respects, but who are not of our Church. Of course, the Bishops of Quebec and Niagara rose in opposition, because, in some way or other, they considered themselves wronged by the promoters of the bill. Now if in Montreal we should be thought to teach doctrines contrary to the teaching of the Church of England the Bishops of Quebec and Niagara have a proper court of enquiry before which to cite us. The Legislature at Quebec does not concern itself about Church of England doctrine, we must, therefore, seek elsewhere for the ground of their objections. We are driven to the conclusion that they regard the Bishop of Montreal as wanting in loyalty to the University of Lennoxville. Now let us enquire how the Bishop year of Bishop Oxenden's episcopate, at the time when it was well known that he had it in mind to found a divinity training college in Montreal, an important deputation from Bishop's college, Lennoxville. waited on the synod, and addressed it, with the object of entering into definite relations with the synod; certain motions "That is a standard or second to the synod and the following was carried.—

"That, in proceeding to the election of persons to serve as trustees and council of Bishop's college, Lennoxville, it be distinctly understood that such election shall not be in any way construed into a waiver on the part of this diocese of its right to establish a local theological institute should the bishop deem it, at any time, expedient to do so."

In the face of such a declaration I cannot see how the friends of Lennoxville can expect the Bishop of Montreal to forego the great advantages of a training college in his own diocese. Yet, if the existence of the college be not the affront, I am at a loss to know where the wrong comes in. I do not see why two bishops of our Church should appeal to members of other communions to protect them from the aggressions of Montreal.

I have already shown you that no relation which the diocese of Montreal bears to the university of Lennoxville forbids the foundation and maintenance of a theological training college in Montreal. I hope, also, I have made it clear that the Montreal Diocesan Theological College does not create a new institution for the granting of degrees, but only seeks to confer divinity degrees on candidates already in possession of the B. A. degree. The college would crown as it were, for the benefit of its own Church the work of Mc-Gill, which is purely secular. I am now obliged to show you that the advancement of the university of Lennoxville has not been equal to the growth of our own diocese. The number of clergy in Montreal since 1850 has more than doubled, while, so far as I can learn, the number of graduating divinity students at Bishop's college is usually about three, each year. Sometimes less, sometimes more. If of late we had been dependent on Lennoxville for a supply of clergymen, most of our missions would now be vacant. Dr. Lobley, in his report to the S.P.G., 4884, on the occasion of his resignation of the post of principal of Bishop's college, Lennoxville, states that, after seven years' laborious work, nineteen students have completed their divinity course and been ordained. Two men and a fraction per annum to be divided between the dioceses of Montreal and Quebec! It does not seem, therefore, on the showing of Dr. Lobley that Lennoxville has made much advance in

numbers (so far as divinity graduates are concerned) since Bishop Oxenden complained that his missions were vacant as much from want of men as from want of money. Lennoxville has received in its time a great deal of support both in this country and in England. The S.P.G. reports show how liberally the venerable society has treated it at all times, and I can quite believe that those closely associated with the university are disappointed and angry that we are not content after all. I am vice-president of Lennoxville, ex officio. It came to me unsought in common with any or all the bishops of all dioceses located in Lower Canada, present or to come. If, for instance, the diocese of Quebec or Montreal should at a future time be divided, the bishop of the new diocese would be vice-president of Lennoxville ex officio, and the senior bishop would be president of the university, whether bishop of Montreal, Quebec, Eastern townships, or Labrador, or however the said bishop might be called. I do not question the dignity or usefulness of the office, but it must not be exercised to the prejudice of the spiritual advancement of the Church over which he presides, which is the first duty of every bishop. I am sorry if the establishment of a training college in Montreal should rob Lennoxville of any part of its patronage or its importance. The very fact that I am an officer of the university (although without my seeking) has made the present controversy very trying to me, but I have no choice. It has been thrust upon me. I cannot let the liberties of the diocese of Montreal fall through my default. As Bishop of Montreal, the Montreal Diocesan Theological College has claims upon me, as well as the vice-presidency of Bishop's College. I cannot leave the Church in Montreal to starve because Lennoxville fails to provide a succession of pastors. During the last thirty-five years the University of Mc-Gill has raised itself to a state of great efficiency, and, naturally enough, young men come from the schools of the province to finish their education in Montreal, rather than in a remote country village, whatever its beauty and social advantages. No individual is responsible for this. No one can can change it. Before the foundation of the Montreal Diocesan Theological College young men came year after year to McGill, who, as they advanced in judgment and learning, felt the call to the ministry, but because the Church had nothing to offer them in the way of education in the city, they ultimately went into another diocese or followed another profession. They were seeking instruction; we were needing men to instruct. Surely, then, it was time for the Church in Montreal to rise and provide the education, if it was in her power. The day had dawned at last when McGill could be serviceable to us once more. The time had come when, under new conditions, Montreal Churchmen could have the advantage of a collegiate education such as the founder of McGill had in contemplation for her sons—a wide, liberal secular education joined to a special course for divinity. The students of our affiliated college enjoy all the privileges of the university, and can compete for all her honors, while special provision is made in our college for necessary instruction preparatory to the taking of holy orders. But McGill has suspended the granting divinity degrees, in deference, chiefly, to the desire of each Protestant church body to confer degrees through its own training college. It would be more than is reasonable to ask our McGill trained men to go to Bishop's college, Lennoxville, for any degrees. It would be a complication and a burden which no one would have a right to impose. McGill University, with its affiliated coffer.

The failure of the bill is so recent that I am not in a position to tell you what steps the Montreal Diocesan Theological College will next take to obtain the power which is needed to make its work complete. Of course it will not rest content under apparent defeat. This synod accepted representation in Bishop's college as late as 1870 and the very most has been made of that act in the recent controversy. Whether the association of ourselves with Bishop's college is an advantage to the Diocese of Montreal is an open question. Bishop's College is (I use the word for the sake of clearness) a denominational university. It is just what McGill was before the amended charter, and here in Montreal at least, denominational education, as I have already stated, did not prove a success. Loyalty to the Church does not require us to bring up our children and educate our young men apart from those of their fellow citizens who differ in religious opinions. Quite the contrary. A narrow, onesided view of life has never been found to promote or guide religious progress. In the McGill schools and university we have all we need for progressive secular education. We cannot be too proud of our university. Rising from her low estate as a denominational university, the Alma Mater of Montreal provides for all her sons and daughters that knowledge of men and things which is necessary to the possibilities of existence in the colonies. All she fails to give is religious training, but that is a very great omission, and one that the Churches must strain every nerve to supply. The Church of England has had great difficulties to contend with in Canada. The bill for the "incorporation of the Church Society," and the bill for the "management of the Church temporalities" of this diocese,

passed only after great opposition, and notwithstanding the warm support of such men as the Hon. Mr. Lafontaine, then premier, and the Hon. Mr. Hincks (the late Sir Francis); but nothing that happened then can compare with the opposition raised against the bill which proposed to give to us in Montreal full educational powers, both secular and religious. We have really been opposed by Lennoxville Churchmen for the sake of Lennoxville. Could we here in Montreal stand side by side with Bishop's college in giving to our sons divinity as well as secular degrees we should, as a matter of course, be the stronger body; and Bishop's college (they say), in consequence, would be injured. Possibly. But Lennoxville will still suffice for the needs of the province of Quebec, for which it was originally founded. And suppose that Bishop's college should suffer loss? Every one would be sorry, but we must not lose sight of the fact that the college exists for the sake of the Church, and not the Church for the sake of the college. The Church of England cannot sit down calmly in the midst of all her differing brethren and alet the eager throng, asking for knowledge at her hands, go by without help, because the college at Lennoxville is sentimentally injured. Montreal must maintain her divinity college in the face of all difficulties. She will gain for it all the advantages, both in education and honors, which belong to divinity colleges everywhere, whether in the mother country or the colonies. I trust, therefore, as Churchmen, you will support your bishop in this matter. I do not ask you to take sides for or against the Montreal Diocesan Theological College. I ask for something far wider and more lasting and more worthy. I ask you to restore to Montreal its lapsed educational advantages, to give back its collegiate independance, to heal its Church wounds, to enable it to train for itself an educated and efficient clergy.

And now a different theme. I regret to notice that the Church in Frelighsburg has lost one of its most valuable and influential members, the late Colonel Westover. He was a man of quiet, unobtrusive demeanor, but one whose Christian character made him a great power for good in the large circle of relatives and friends in the Eastern Townships. We miss his presence here to-day, for as a pillar of the Church he supported us in all good works. To his own immediate neighborhood, he was a great benefactor, and it will be long before the void made by his death will be filled. His gain is our loss.

I fear I have detained you longer than usual, but the importance of the late controversy relating to the Montreal Diocesan Theological College bill must be my excuse.

M. Society.

As the Prov. Synod meets this year, the nomination referred to should be made at the approaching meeting of your Diocesan Synod. I enclose the names of those already holding the position.

Montreal, 14th June, 1886.

To the Right Rev. the Lord Bishop of Montreal :-

My Lord,—With reference to the Deed of Donation passed before W. de M. Marler, Notary, on the 1st November, 1881, whereby I gave subject to certain trusts and conditions, the property being official No. 612, of the St. Antoine ward of the city of Montreal, to Trustees for the benefit of the Montreal Diocesan Theological College, I beg to say that I am ready to convey the said property, free from all conditions or restrictions, to yourself and your successors in office, provided:-

1. That the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal, at its next assembly, resolve that it is expedient that the said property should be held by yourself and your successors for the purpose of said college.

2. That the Legislature of the Province of Quebec at its next session pass an act empowering the said Montreal Diocesan Theological College to grant Degrees in the manner set forth in the Bill lately before the said Legislature.

3. That the consent to this arrangement be had of the said Corporation and of the other persons whose consent is necessary to the validity of the same.

Dr. Davidson enquired whether there is a petition before this House from the Governors of the Theological College for degree-conferring powers.

The CLERICAL SECRETARY stated that he had no such petition.

Dr. Davidson then moved, seconded by Mr. H. D. MOORE:_

"That all the words in the original resolution be struck out, and it be resolved that inasmuch as the Secretary of Synod has declared that he has no petition from the Montreal Theological College, an independent corporation, requesting the action referred to in the Dean's resolution, the present matter is ultra vires of the Synod, and should not at present be entertained."

Rev. Dr. HENDERSON explained that a petition for degreegranting power was sent by the College authorities to the Legislature, and was by the Legislature referred to the Synod for its endorsation.

Dr. Davidson's motion was ruled out of order.

Dr. Davidson then moved in amendment, seconded by Canon Robinson:-

"That all the words in the original motion be struck out, and that the following be inserted instead:—That it is inexpedient to increase the degree-conferring bodies as proposed."

At one o'clock the Synod adjourned until two o'clock.

That this Synod, recognizing the excellent work done by the Theological College, and being desirous to strengthen and develop this valuable institution on true Church of England lines, does hereby authorize the Bishop and the Secretaries of this Synod to petition the Quebec Legislature to grant to the Montreal Diocesan Theological College the power of conferring Divinity Degrees upon persons having the B.A. degree from recognized Universities, upon the following conditions, viz.:

"1st. That the College title deeds be vested in the Bishop of Montreal and his successors, with no theological restrictions other than those of the recognized formularies of the Church of England.

"2nd. That no property be hereafter accepted by the College under conditions which would restrict the theological teaching of the College more than it would be restricted by the said formularies of the Church of England.

"3rd, That one-fourth of the Governors of the College be elected annually by this Synod by ballot.

"4th. That the Theological College Act now petitioned for, shall not come into force until approved by this Synod."

At six o'clock the Synod adjourned until eight o'clock p.m.

REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE.

The Executive Committee begs to make the following report of its proceedings during the year 1885-6, to the Synod of the Diocese of Montreal at its twenty-seventh annual meeting in June, 1886.

MEETINGS.

The appointed quarterly meetings were held in August, November, February and May; a special meeting was held immediately after the closing of the Synod, when the various sub-committees were named; and an adjourned meeting was held on the 1st instant.

GRANTS.

Missions of Aylwin and North Wakefield.—It was resolved that the grants to these missions be \$360 each, and that any contributions received from Messrs. Hamilton for missions on the Gatineau, shall go into the Mission fund, and be applied towards these grants.

Chelsea and Templeton-A grant at the rate of \$315 per annum.

Lachute and Arundel.—A grant at the rate of \$250 per annum.

Mascouche and Terrebonne.—A grant at the rate of \$200 per annum.

North Shefford and South Roxton.—A grant at the rate of \$300 per annum.

Portage du Fort and Bryson.—A grant at the rate of \$350 per annum.

Rev. W. P. Chambers.—A special grant was made of \$50, part of a donation received by the Bishop for missions on the Gatinean.

Rougemont.—\$100 granted to the asssistant minister there.

Portland.—Under special circumstances, explained by the Bishop, a grant of \$250 for one year was made to the mission of Portland on condition that the people there raise \$200 for the missionary.

GRANTS FOR 1886-7.

It was resolved:—That the following scale of grants for the year 1886-7 be adopted, on the understanding that the said grants are not to be regarded as permanent or forming any precedent for the future; but that the Committee on Grants do, during the coming year, revise the whole scale of grants and mission work and arrangement of the Diocese, by means of a deputation to be specially appointed—which deputation shall, during the coming year, visit each parish or mission receiving aid from the Mission Fund, and examine into its position and capabilities, with a view of reducing the grant from the Board, and of increasing local contribu-

SUPERANNUATION.

The following clergymen have been superannuated:-

Archdeacon Lonsdell, to retain his position as Rector of St. Andrews, to be relieved from the more active duties of the parish, and to receive \$120 per annum from the Superannuation fund in addition to the grant from the S. P. G.

Rev. P. DeGruchy, to receive \$360 per annum from the Superannuation fund, and be permitted to reside in the parsonage and occupy the property in compensation of his care of the property, and for any repairs that he may make, all repairs to be at his charge; and further, on condition that he do such duty as the Bishop may assign to him at Milton during the continuance of this arrangement. It being also understood that he shall be entitled to receive for his own benefit whatever the congregation at Milton may contribute.

Rev. E. G. Sutton, to be relieved from the more active duties of the parish, and to receive from the Superannuation fund \$108 per annum, the sum of \$292 being paid by the S. P. G.

Rev. Canon DuVernet, placed upon the Superannuation fund on condition that he do such duty in this Diocese as the Bishop in his discretion may from time to time prescribe.

Rev. Thomas Everett placed upon the Superannuation fund from November, 1885, on the same conditions as in the case of the Rev. Canon DuVernet.

The following resolution was adopted: "That clergymen who may be superannuated be given to understand that all claims admitted, and grants made, are subject to such rules as now exist or may hereafter be made in reference to superannuation."

ENDOWMENTS AND TRUSTS.

The following report for the year ending December 31st, 1885, was adopted:—

The Committee on Endowments, to whom the statement with regard to Parochial Endowments and Trusts, prepared by the Clerical Secretary, was referred, beg to state that they have checked over the statement in question with the returns from the different Parishes, and find the same correct; and they recommend that such statement be dopted as the report of the Executive Committee on the subject of the Parochial Endowments and Trusts for the past year.

BOSCOBEL AND NORTH ELY-

The sum of \$50 has been paid to the Treasurer of the Synod by the congregation of North Ely for investment. The North Ely congregation, in common with Boscobel, entered into an agreement about twelve years ago, to pay for a certain amount of borrowed money which was invested in the parsonage at Boscobel, \$6 per annum to the clergyman, being interest for the borrowed money. The money thus borrowed (\$100) was one-half of the proceeds of sale of a piece of land donated to the mission for the benefit of the resident clergyman.

BUCKINGHAM-

In this parish there are no endowments. There are two churches. A parsonage with about 1½ acre of land attached, and a burial ground.

CLARENDON-

No change in endowments. There has been an addition to buildings, in the shape of a church shed, 120 feet in length, cost \$250. Improvements in the glebe at the expense of the incumbent, amounting to the value of \$40. No other changes to report.

CHRISTIEVILLE-

No change in endowment of the church here. \$600 for the clergyman, and \$200 for the school, annual charge on the Seigniory of Bleury.

NAPIERVILLE GLEBE.

A report by the Chancellor, on the church property at Napierville was received as follows:—

Montreal, 14th May, 1885.

Dear Canon Empson,—I am in receipt of yours of this day's date and the deed of donation and letter enclosed therewith.

As far back as the 1st of September, 1873, I reported to our then Treasurer, Mr. Brydges, that, in my opinion, neither of the lots described in said deed could be sold without the consent of the legal representatives of the donor, the late Major Christie; both lots having been by said deed declared to have been "appropriated in perpetuity and exclusively," for the purpose of Divine worship according to our ritual, "in the building to be erected on the said pieces or parcels of land; and that the same be consecrated as a church."

By letter dated 13th January, 1874, addressed to me by Mr. McGinnis, the agent of the Christie estate, with reference to an attempt made by Mr. Lockhart, the then Incumbent of Lacolle, to sell a portion of the property; he stated that he was willing to assist the Bishop in perfecting a sale of the whole property, provided the proceeds were added to the general endowment fund of the church, "to assist in supporting such missionaries as were not sufficiently remunerated.

On the 21st January, 1874, Bishop Oxenden suggested in a letter addressed to me, "that the dispute between Mr. McGinnis and Messrs. Lockart and DuVernet," (the latter one having reference to a property in Henryville, which had also been given by Major Christie) should be referred to the Endowment Committee, and I replied that I did not see any use in such a reference unless all the parties interested agreed to abide by the decision of the committee. Since then the matter appears to have lain dormant.

I have only to say now, that after a perusal of the deed, I see no reason to change the opinion which I gave on the 1st Sept. 1873, and that I fail to see how Lacolle can claim to have any legal interest in the property in question.

The committee appointed to enquire as to the legal tenure of the property known as the Missisquoi High School, beg to report, that the legal title to the property is vested in The Lord Bishop of Montreal, and successors, in trust, to keep and maintain in the building erected on said property a High School, with a good and sufficient number of competent teachers, to be kept open and ready for the education of the children of the neighborhood and others desirous of being educated therein. And on failure so to do for a space of six months, the property should revert to the parties who originally conveyed the property, who (your committee now understand) are all dead.

As no claim of forfeiture has ever been made, the legal title is still in the Bishop and his successors.

In the opinion of your committee no other uses can be made of the said property than that above stated.

It was decided that when the forms for statistics are sent out notice shall be given that the grant from the mission fund shall be cut off from any parish or mission failing to answer satisfactorily the questions which are asked for the purpose of obtaining statistics of the Diocese required by the Synod.

MEETINGS OF THE COMMITTEE ON GRANTS.

It was resolved that the several Rural Deans should be invited to attend meetings of the Committee on Grants, or to send in any statements they may have regarding missions in their several Rural Deaneries, accompanied by the statistical information required by the Synod.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON CANONS.

The committee on Canons beg leave to report, that in accordance with the instructions of Synod, embodied in the resolution printed on page 185 of the Journal of last session, they have prepared and now submit the following as the Canon on Superannuation as finally amended by Synod:—

1. Each clergyman shall pay an annual fee of five dollars and also take up an annual collection in aid of the fund in each church and station within his charge.

2. Any clergyman may, for the time he has been in the Diocese, pay up all arrears at the rate of five dollars a year, from 1870, when the fund was established, and such payment of arrears shall be treated as part of the payments required under clause four of this Canon.

3. Any clergyman of the Diocese now in arrears in annual payments to the Superagnuation Fund for a period of over two years, shall be allowed to pay up such arrears in instalments of five dollars per annum in addition to the annual subscriptions. And should any arrears remain unpaid at the time superannuation is allowed, the balance then remaining due shall be deducted from the first payment of the grant from the said fund.

4. No clergyman shall be eligible for superannuation until after ten years active service in the Diocese, and until he has paid his annual subscription for ten consecutive years, and has also taken up a collection in aid of the fund every year after this Canon.

5. Each clergyman having complied with the above, upon being superannuated, shall receive a grant of three hundred dollars per annum, and in addition thereto, ten dollars per annum for each and every year of active service in the Diocese above ten years; but in no case shall the allowance exceed in the aggregate four hundred dollars per annum.

6. Until the fund shall have an income of twelve hundred dollars a year, it shall be allowed to accumulate untouched.

7. In case of the superannuation of any dergyman prior to the time referred to in section six, the amount of grant payable under section five shall be paid, as far as necessary, from the surplus interest of the Clergy Trust Fund, presently applied to the Mission

Fund, the balance of said interest at the end of the year being given to the Mission Fund as heretofore.

8. Any clergyman satisfying the Executive Committee that he is incapable of, or being reported by the Lord Bishop of the Diocese as unfit for full duty in the diocese, shall, if in good standing, be entitled to superannuation, and to payment of a yearly allowance as hereinbefore provided.

9. The resolution passed at the 17th session of Synod (p. 108) is rescinded, as also all previous canons on the Superannuation Fund which conflict with these rules.

The committee also beg leave to report that, in accordance with the resolution of Synod printed on page 183 of the Journal of last Synod, they have prepared, and now submit the following amendment to the Order of Proceedings, namely, that rule 27 be amended by the addition of the following words after the word "synod" in the ninth line thereof:—

Two or more of such printed Journals, with a statement attached to each, mentioning the number of pages therein and certifying the same to be a true copy of the original minutes and proceedings of which it is the printed copy, signed by the Bishop or other presiding officer and countersigned by the Secretaries, and sealed with the seal of the Synod, shall be kept of record by the Secretaries, and shall serve and avail and have the same force and effect as the said original minutes and proceedings.

The committee further beg leave to report, that they have prepared and now submit the following Canon respecting the Widows and Orphans Fund, in accordance with the instructions contained in the resolution of Synod printed on page 181 of the Journal of last session:—

CANON.

In future, every clergyman applying to be licensed to a charge in the Diocese of Montreal, shall, before being so licensed, agree to subscribe and pay the sum of five dollars per annum to the Widows and Orphans Fund of said Diocese, and, on being so licensed, shall pay said amount annually to the Treasurer of the Synod of said Diocese.

REPORT ON THE QUEBEC SCHEME.

Your committee have carefully considered what is known as the Quebec scheme, and are unanimously of opinion that the best interests of both clergy and laity will be furthered by its adoption in this Diocese.

The principal features of the Quebec scheme, briefly stated, are:—

The Diocesan Board receives the contributions of the missions to the stipends of the clergy, and charges itself with payment in full of those stipends directly to the clergy at quarterly periods.

The missions are assessed by deputations specially appointed for that purpose, and disciplinary measures are provided in the event of non-payment of the assessments.

The stipends of the missionary clergy are uniform, according to the term of service in the Ministry.

A Board of Enquiry is elected at each meeting of the Synod for each Rural Deanery, which boards, on the motion of the Bishop, are charged with the investigation of any difficulties which may occur in any mission of the Diocese.

All appointments to missions are made by the Bishop, subject to the concurrence of the board.

Your committee would earnestly impress upon the Synod the great advantages of adopting these several features of the Quebec scheme, for the following, among other reasons:—

1st.—Because their adoption would relieve the missionary clergy from all anxiety as to the payment of their stipends, and would enable them to give their undivided attention to the work of their Ministry.

2nd.—Because your committee believe their adoption would enable the Executive Committee to exercise a moral pressure upon the missions which would stimulate the people to increased liberality, and enable the committee to materially improve the stipends of the missionary clergy.

3rd.—Because their adoption would establish a uniform scale of stipends for the missionary clergy, so that no matter where a missionary was placed, he would receive the stipend to which his number of years service in the Ministry entitled him.

4th.—Because their adoption would enable the Bishop to place and retain clergymen in missions to which they were best fitted by their special gifts. Their adoption would also enable his Lordship to effect any changes he might deem advisable, as no changes would unfavorably affect the stipends of the clergymen removed.

REPORT OF COMMITTEE ON EDUCATION.

The report of your committee on this important question, will be this year unusually brief.

The condition of the Montreal Theological College is thus briefly described by the Principal, Rev. Canon Henderson:—

"The number of students on the College roll is 21. Three have this year taken the degree of B.A. and two obtained honours at the B. A. examination. One student is following the course in Hebrew and Chaldee; one has taken the College Testamur while six have obtained prizes in Divinity. The number of subjects for examination at the end of the session was eight. The teaching staff consists of six lecturers and two tutors. Five hundred and two volumes have been added to the library. The value of real estate and endowments is \$41,144."

St. John's school, under the charge of the Rev. Arthur French, is a private institution, but it has always reported to the Synod, and its head master writes as follows:—

"Notwithstanding the epidemic which prevailed in the city "last autumn, the school year just closing has been a satisfactory one. In all, 46 boys have been in attendance, 40 of whom, being members of the Church of England, received instruction in the Bible, Prayer-book and Catechism. We have lost the able assistance of the Rev. F. G. Scott, who has gone to England for "Clerical work. We are indebted to the Rev. Dr. Norman, for his visitation of the school. We shall at all times welcome any member of the Educational Committee, and prefer that the visit be made without notice."

There are no strictly Church schools in the Rural Deaneries of Iberville and St. Andrews. In that of Clarendon there are two, one at Danford Lake in the mission of Aylwin. The property belongs to Mr. Luke Heeney, and the average attendance is 15. At

North Wakefield, the Rev. H. S. Fuller reports that there is a school-house and grounds at Stag Creek, on Church property. The Bible is read and the Church catechism is taught. No proper deed has as yet been executed. Mr. Fuller remarks that there is danger of support being withdrawn from his school, owing to the formation of a Commissioners school district.

The Rev. A. J. Greer reports that 50 children attend the school in his parish, and that twenty-four out of that number receive regular instruction in the Church catechism. The property is vested in school commissioners, but there seems little practical difficulty in making it a permanent Church school, inasmuch as the pupils appear to be the children of Church people. Mr. Greer remarks that great difficulty is experienced in obtaining the services of a member of our Church to take charge of the school.

The Rev. W. P. Chambers states that only one of the common schools in his mission is without a Church teacher, but laments the irregular manner in which grants from the C. & C. S. Society have been sent.

Your committee regret to say that in the Deanery of Bedford, Church education has not progressed since last year. The Rev. Canon Davidson has a Church school for boys in operation in his parish, and the Rev. J. J. Roy has established one for girls at St. Hyacinthe, but both these are private property. The Dunham Ladies' College is closed, and the Missisquoi High School at Sweetsburg is in the same condition. The building itself is in a very dilapidated condition. The school at Farnham is not in operation this year in consequence of the expenditure having exceeded the income last year.

In the Deanery of Shefford, there is no existing Church school, but a fund is collecting at Granby for the establishment of one.

In the Rural Deanery of Brome, there is a Church school in Bolton Centre. The Rev. F. H. Clayton states that this school has been carried on most satisfactorily during the past year, as a model school, under an efficient teacher holding a Model School diploma. The government inspector has visited and examined the school this year, and expressed himself much pleased with the results. The municipality granted this year fifty dollars towards its support, and the congregation of St. Patrick's church, recognizing the great benefit arising from the existence of such a school in their midst, have contributed the funds needed, over and above the fees paid by the pupils. The Colonial Church and School Society formerly gave a grant of forty dollars per annum, but this has been withdrawn, as the Society is apparently concentrating its energies

their e fees y forbeen orgies upon the French work. It should be added that the school at Bolton Centre is not a mixed school, but a girls school only.

A clergyman writes:—" People do not encourage Church schools, "because they are considered an injustice to other Christian" bodies, and cannot easily be maintained, owing to the paucity of "Church members. They are generally regarded as a hindrance to "the success of efforts in the direction of superior schools under "the Protestant trustees."

There is one method of solving this difficulty, and that is, by endowment or supplemental grants. There might be a local endowment, as in the case of Granby, or a Church Education Fund established under the care of the Synod, and small grants made annually to such parishes as are striving to establish Church schools. The prospects of Church education cannot be said to be encouraging at present in the rural districts.

As regards the general question of raising the tone and quality of education throughout the Province, it may be briefly said that this matter is occupying the earnest attention of the Protestant Committee of Public Instruction at Quebec, that their efforts are tending in that direction, and that both the Universities of McGill and Bishop's college are combining to bring this about. It is hoped that churchmen will endeavour to keep pace with the demands of the times, and provide schools furnished with all intellectual advantages, based on the religious teaching of our Church.

IMMIGRATION.

The Rev. J. H. Dixon has resigned his office of Immigrant Chaplain, and it is vacant. The late Archbishop of Canterbury issued a letter addressed to the great Church societies in England, urging more religious care for the emigrants. The S. P. G. and S. P. C. K., acting together, organized a system to carry out this work. The Archbishop appointed the Rev. J. Bridger to be the Clerical Superintendent, at the principal points, under his management. Suitable boarding places are provided, and committees of Christian ladies look after the emigrants till they go aboard the vessel. The utmost care is taken about the arrangements of the ships. The Bishop of Liverpool, as often as he can, holds a service for emigrants on the out-going vessels, and a clergyman accompanies the vessel when possible. The Rev. T. W. Fyles has been appointed to meet the emigrants at Quebec, and is paid by the S. P. C. K. A clergyman is also appointed.

It was resolved unimously:—"That the Rural Deanery of Hochelaga respectfully request your Lordship to ask the Executive Committee for a grant to support an assistant to the City Missions, to take charge of the work among emigrants and sailors, which the Rev. J. H. Dixon has resigned, and which was supported by the Colonial and Continental Society."

It was recommended that a report of the City Missionary's work be published for distribution among the congregations which subscribed for the work.

DEANERY OF BEDFORD.

My Lord,—The 24th annual meeting of the Deanery of Bedford was held in the Academy, Bedford, on Thursday, May 27th, 1886.

There were present 6 clerical, and 13 lay representatives.

The number of cures in the Deanery has been reduced to 10 by the division and the formation of the new Deaneries of Shefford and Brome. Of these, 7 are Rectories, 1 a Parish, and 2 Missions.

PARSONAGES.

The new parsonage at Rougemont has been completed, and is now occupied by the clergyman in charge. It is a neat and commodious house, and reflects great credit upon the people of that place, to whose untiring exertions and liberal contributions, its erection is mainly due.

INSURANCE.

All the Church property in the Deanery is insured, except that in the rectories of Clarenceville and St. Armand East, upon which "no insurance" is reported.

CHURCH SCHOOLS.

There have been no strictly Church schools in operation during the past year. The Ladies' College at Dunham has been closed since the retirement of the late lady Principal, but it is hoped that it may be re-opened at no very distant date as a Diocesan institution. Unofficial information has reached me that negotiations are in progress for the sale of the school building at Farnham to the School Commissioners of that town, experience having proved that it is impossible, owing to the limited Protestant population, to keep up a Church school without an annual pecuniary loss.

MISSION FUND.

The usual missionary meetings have been held in all the parishes of the Deanery. The attendance at most of the meetings was good, and the interest marked. The contributions for the year amount to \$648.03, being \$153 more than was promised, and \$148 more than was received from the fund.

STIPENDS.

The stipends of the clergy show some little improvement on preceding years. The highest paid by any parish is \$1,000, the average being about \$700.

Centre, has been repaired and improved. St. Paul's, Mansonville, has been finished, and a chancel chair and font, beautiful in design and execution have been added. A new commodious porch has been added to Grace Church, Sutton. A new cabinet organ has been procured for All Saints' Church, Abercorn.

PARSONAGES.

The Rectory at Knowlton, and the parsonage at Iron Hill, have undergone considerable repairs.

INDEBTEDNESS.

There is a debt on the parsonage of Adamsville, of \$500, also a debt on St. Patrich's Church, Bolton Centre, of \$410.10.

INSURANCE.

The Church property of the Deanery is all insured.

ENDOWMENTS.

The sum of \$80.10, has been added to the Endowment Fund of Glen Sutton.

CLERGYMEN'S STIPENDS.

Adamsville and East Farnham, Glen Sutton, Iron Hill, West Brome, report stipends under \$600, and three parishes report an average.

MISSION FUND.

The annual Missionary meetings have been held in the different parishes of the Deanery. It is pleasant to report a small increase on last year.

A temporary arrangement has been made to supply Brome Corner with a weekly service.

There is no change in the amount expected from each parish of this Deanery for the Mission Fund of the Diocese.

REPORT OF THE RURAL DEANERY OF CLARENDON.

My Lord,—I beg to present the following report of the work and condition of the Church in the Rural Deanery of Clarendon.

The fourth annual meeting was held at Shawville, the twenty sixth day of May.

After celebration of Holy Communion in St. Paul's Church, the Deanery assembled at the parsonage at 10 o'clock, for the transaction of business.

There were present 9 clergymen and 9 laymen.

Reports from the various parishes and missions were read, showing a gratifying extension and development of the Church.

All the parishes in the Deanery are reported, and in most cases very fully and satisfactorily.

It is however suggested that for various reasons, chuchwardens should be thoroughly acquainted with the different features of Church work carried on in the parish, and should conjointly with incumbents keep records of Church familes, communicants, Sunday schools, confirmations &c., as well as of the financial affairs of the parish.

WORK IN THE LUMBER CAMPS.

The Revs. H. Plaisted and W. P. Chambers, have visited the men working on the Desert and other rivers flowing into the Gatineau, using in their services a litany compiled for the purpose and authorized by your Lordship.

The Rev. A. J. Greer presented the following report:-

During the past winter, I visited 9 lumber shanties and eleven depots or farms; distance travelled to accomplish this about 450 miles; time occupied 20 days. In all between 450 and 500 men were visited, the employers being Messrs. Gillis Bros., Gilmour & Co., and Grier & Co. I found in all 52 churchmen, the remainder being Romanists and dissenters.

As to the nature of the work done, as the shanties are deserted during the day by all save the cook, I found it necessary to be at each shanty for the night. After supper, and the preparations for the following day's work were completed, (such as axe grinding &c.,) I asked for the men's attention to the reading of a portion of God's word. Then a shortened form of evening prayer, a sermon preached, and whatever reading matter I had distributed. Every shanty received a part of a year's number of Leisure Hours, Sunday at Home and Good Words with some tracts. These were supplied by kind friends in Montreal and our good Rural Dean.

on of rmon Every SunsupI was well received in every district, the men were well behaved, attentive and reverent. The literature was especially sought after as the men, cut off from home, church and civilization, are compelled to spend the long winter nights and Sundays without any of the privileges of a settled country.

I was sorry, from lack of time, to be compelled to return home and give up this work, as at 150 miles from our parsonage I was only on the borders of shanty life. I had urgent requests from several agents to continue my work on the Du Moine, Black, Notre Dame and Ottawa Rivers, which would require about three months.

During my trip, I baptized two children, one 40, the other 55 miles from Thorne. I administered Holy Communion once, and that to an aged school teacher, who was formerly a regular communicant in our mission, but now living with a family 12 miles from the nearest neighbor, and 40 miles from a clergyman.

No work has been done among the men on the Black, Du Moine, and Upper Ottawa Rivers.

MISSION FUND.

The following parishes have contributed more than their assessments:—

Aylwin, Bristol, Clarendon, Portage du Fort, and Thorne. Neither Chelsea nor River Desert were assessed, but they contributed, the former \$16.75, the latter \$5.50, Hull contributed its assessment.

CHURCH EXTENSION.

The mission of Chelsea, for many years without the services of a resident clergyman, has been re-occupied, and the Rev. Geo. Johnson placed in charge. He sends the following account of his work:—

REPORT OF CHELSEA MISSION.

Since our appointment to this mission, six months ago, we have been doing all we could to resuscitate and extend the work of the Church here.

Of course we are entirely left to ourselves, but we are much en-

couraged by the kindness and co-operation of our few Church people. We have found some 23 families, and 9 or 10 individuals in the district belonging to the Church, and who are glad to have their clergymen amongst them. I feel convinced that, in the course of a few years, with God's blessing, Chelsea may become a strong mission. We feel our responsibility, and have determined to do our utmost to secure for the Church her rightful position here.

At present, I hold services at Chelsea, Ironside and Templeton. At Chelsea our congregation consists strictly of Church people, the average attendance being from 35 to 40. At Ironside, where a Church of England service was never held before, to my knowledge, we have a mixed congregation averaging from 40 to 50. At Templeton, 8 miles from here, we have generally the little school-house packed to greet us. Two or three good churchmen amongst the people here act as a rally for the rest.

The work at Ironside is very interesting. The people seem to enjoy the service, joining heartily in it. On Saturday afternoon, I have a gathering of children at Ironside, as I cannot well have a Sunday school.

We had hoped to get our church building moved nearer the village, as it is felt that it is somewhat out of the way especially in winter, but I fear we are to be disappointed, as it is difficult to procure a suitable site.

The matter is not quite settled, but in the event of our being unable to secure another and better site, the feeling is to make the best of what we have. The people at my request gave a thankful Easter offering towards painting the church.

I am hopeful of the work here. I trust however that in our struggle for existence, we will not be too heavily taxed financially. I have already drawn the Rural Dean's attention to the fact that, instead of receiving \$350 grant as at first the mission was given to understand it should receive the mission is to receive only \$315. This means that our few people are to raise \$359. To my mind it seems hardly fair to expect it, and especially in view of needed improvements about the church building, and the great necessity for a parsonage, which must be built at the earliest opportunity.

several years, spent his summer holidays at Chelsea, and kept the mission alive) should not be forgotten.

The missions of Thorne and Aylwin, have developed to such an extent that it has been found necessary to make two missions of each.

Resolutions were adopted by the Raral Deanery to the following effect:—

1st. That the mission of Thorne be divided according to the lines shown in a map of the Rural Deanery now in the Synod office.—
The part set off to be called the Mission of Leslie, and the division to take effect after Easter, 1887.

2nd. That the portion of the mission of Aylwin, embracing that part of the Township of Aylwin, west of the Kazuabazua plain, together with the Townships of Alleyne and Cawood, and the Wiggins settlement in Low, constitute a new mission under the name of Alleyne. It was further resolved to petition the Lord Bishop of the Diocese, to take the necessary steps to give effect to the proposed divisions, and to ask that the missionaries sent should be in Priest's orders. All of which with the exception of the appointment of the missionaries, has been done.

It is to be regretted that nothing has been done, or can be done with our present limited working force, to furnish spiritual ministrations to the workmen, 500 or more in number, along the line of the Pontiac and Pacific Junction Railway. Nor has it been found possible to carry out the recommendation of the Deanery meeting of last year, as to the desirability of ascertaining the number of members of the Church of England in the extreme eastern and western part of the Deanery.

St. James' church, Wright, and its burying ground, were consecrated during the year, also St. James' church, Hull, St. John's church, Quio, and the cemeteries in Bristol and Cawood.

Steps have been taken to organize a District committee of the S.P.C.K., and also a Sunday School Teachers' Institute.

The Clerical Lending Library of the Deanery has received an addition of £15 worth of valuable books presented by the associates of Dr. Bray. Your Lordship is requested to appoint a board of trustees for the library.

The following changes have taken place:—The Rev. J. Senior, who has labored part of the year in Portage du Fort and part of the year in Bristol, has been appointed to Lakefield.

The Rev. Thos. Everett has resigned Bristol and removed to Montreal. The Rev. N. A. F. Bourne has been appointed to Bristol. The Rev. E. MacManus to Portage Du Fort.

The Rev. H. Gomery has resigned Onslow and removed to Huntingdon. The Rev. A. B. Given has been appointed to Onslow. The Rev. H. S. Fuller has resigned North Wakefield, and the Rev. C. Boyd has been appointed to succeed him. The Rev. Geo. Johnson has been appointed to Chelsea.

Two fully ordained men, willing to go to the forefront of the battle, will be needed for the two new missions of Leslie and Alleyne.

In conclusion, My Lord, allow me to direct attention to a few facts connected with the Church's growth in this extreme western part of the Diocese.

1. The Church is growing and strengthening. Thirty years ago we had but 2 parishes now we have 14, and room for at least 2 more.

Twenty-two years ago we had 223 communicants; one parish alone now reports 340 on its list, and the whole number is 1171.

Thirty years ago we had 4 churches, now we have 22, every one of which was built or re-built during that time.

A parish which in 1853 gave \$69.64 for all Church purposes, this year gave \$1,080.20. Another which in 1864, gave \$57.50, this year gives \$896.34.

2. The greater part of the Church's work in the Deanery is of a missionary character, as much so as any work in Canada.

3. The Church's missionaries in that district are as devoted self-denying, hard working a band of men, as are any where to be found. The rapid development of the work testifies to this.

4. That the future Canadian leaders in theology, law, commerce and statesmanship are to be furnished by just such vigorous and intelligent communities as are scattered over this Deanery.

5. That while the Church of Christ need never expect to be free from anxieties, yet if she can present herself continuously, firmly, and in the spirit of her Divine Head, to the people of this new country, in the fullness of the Divine Commission, her Apostolic order, and her scriptural teaching, as agents in God's hands for infusing hope of eternity, deepening spiritual life and forming the best type of human character—she will secure to herself an enduring place and name.

RURAL DEANERY OF IBERVILLE.

The first meeting of the re-organized Deanery of Iberville was held in the town of St. Johns, on the 27th day of January 1886. There were present 7 clergymen and 6 laymen. Morning Service was held in St. James Church at 11 o'clock. Archdeacon Evans of Montreal, delivered an admirable sermon appropriate to the gathering together of clergy and laymen for counsel and the consideration of the general good of the Church. The service was well attended by the parishioners. The Holy Communion was celebrated and the offertory was devoted to the Mission Fund. A business meeting was held in the Rectory at 2.30 p. m., when matters of interest were discussed and arrangements for quarterly meetings made, the first to be held in the Synod Hall, Montreal, the 14th day of June.

This Deanery contains 5 rectories, 2 parishes and 4 missions.

RESIGNATIONS.

Canon Du Vernet, owing to continued ill health, has resigned his charge, and the following resolution in connection with the same was unanimously carried at the Deanery meeting:—"That the Ruri-Decanal meeting having heard with profound regret that the Rev. Canon Du Vernet M.A., at present Rector of Chambly, has been forced through ill health and increasing infirmity, to seek retirement from the active work of the Ministry and take a superannuated relation to the Church, this meeting desires to place on record its high esteem of him personally, as a true and faithful minister of the Lord Jesus Christ and of the Church of England in Canada. At the same time praying that He whom he has so long served, may cause great grace to rest upon him during the remainder of what has been an earnest active life, and that to him at evening time it may be light."

The Rev. A. Bareham has resigned Franklin, and has been replaced by the Rev. N. P. Yates, B.A. The Rev. T. A. Haslam has resigned Huntingdon, and the Rev. H. Gomery appointed by his Lordship to this mission. The Rev. S. Forsey supplies for the present the duties at Chambly.

CHURCHES.

The churches at Chambly, Christieville, Lacolle, Hemmingford and St. Johns, have all undergone repairs and improvements, to a lesser or a greater extent, and are in a state of good preservation. The churches in Franklin and Havelock are greatly in need of

repairs. The church at Hallerton requires pointing outside and considerable repairs inside. At Lacadie the church is in a wretched condition. It would be advisable to remove the building at Savanne and re-build in the centre of the mission.

The Sabrevois church needs painting.

RECTORIES AND PARSONAGES.

The new rectory of St. Johns is completed, (a handsome two-story brick house) costing about \$4,000. Through the liberality of the late Miss Baldwyn, daughter of the first rector of this parish, eight shares of Montreal Bank Stock were transferred, during her life time, to trustees for the benefit of the parish. These shares were sold and formed a building fund, which has been augmented by the efforts of the Ladies' Aid Association to the amount of \$800.

According to deed of gift, the remains of the late Miss Baldwyn are interred beneath the church, and a suitable tablet erected by the vestry in memory of her father, and in grateful recognition of her liberality.

All the rectories and parsonages in the Deanery are in a good state of preservation and well maintained.

INSURANCE.

All such buildings apparently are insured, with the exception of Sabrevois. The church has not been insured for years, and the new parsonage has not been insured since it was built, three years ago, although the promise was made by the wardens that it should be insured at once.

MISSION FUND.

The amount raised in this Deanery exceeds that of last year, and more than equals the sum expected, the total being \$487.44.

CLERICAL STIPENDS.

We are most thankful to be able to report to your Lordship that there is not a single parish in arrears, the two missions slightly deficient when reports were received, having since made good the balance.

GRANTS FROM THE MISSION FUND.

Ormstown is now self-sustaining, and ranks as a rectory.

Franklin and Havelock having each guaranteed to raise the sum of \$300, the Mission Fund is relieved by this amount.

RURAL DEANERY OF SHEFFORD.

My Lord,—I desire to submit the following report of the Rural Deanery of Shefiord, for the year 1885-1886.

Since the separate constitution of this Deanery, it has held its meetings quarterly at various localities within its bounds, the attendance of both orders at these meetings being highly encouraging and in the aggregate very representative, fully justifying the expediency of their being frequently convoked—while the well sustained interest in the Church's work, the hearty co-operation of the whole chapter during the year, and the mutual advantage of repeated and possible intercourse, has proved the wisdom of your Lordship's action in dividing the late Deanery of Bedford, as far as concerns that portion of it within my jurisdiction.

There are in the Deanery 2 rectories, 3 parishes and 2 missions, served at the present time by eight clergymen, there being one vacancy at West Shefford caused by the resignation of Rev. A. B. Given. The Rev. S. Moore has been appointed to work in the parish of Waterloo.

CHURCHES.

During the year the church at West Shefford has been opened for Divine Service and takes its place amongst the best of our country churches; but a small fraction of the cost of erection has been collected outside of the parish, and the speedy completion of the interior has been due to the united untiring efforts of the late incumbent and parishioners—only a small debt amounting to less than one-tenth of the cost preventing its early consecration.

IMPROVEMENTS AND INSURANCE.

Some considerable improvements in church property are also reported as having been effected in the other parishes of the Deanery, and the whole property of the Church is returned as sufficiently insured.

MISSION FUND.

We have held missionary meetings, which have been a success a new departure has been the holding of them on Sunday—and the deputational work intra-Decanal. We have a well founded confidence in this plan, and look for even better and more effective results in the coming year.

The Deanery has exceeded the amount of subscriptions to the Mission Fund expected from it.

Four parishes, viz., Granby, North Shefford, South Stukely, and West Shefford have done better, and two, Waterloo and Boscobel, a little less than last year. Milton, exceptionally situated and shorn of a chief source of financial strength, by a new arrangement of parishes, contributed but a sixth of its former amount.

In all, the sum of \$325.72 has been paid in to the fund, while the Deanery has been in the receipt of \$1,150 as against \$1,300 of the previous year.

CLERICAL STIPENDS.

The stipends of the clergy are not not up to the mark of mediocrity, except in the two rectories of Waterloo and Granby.

ARREARS.

All the rest, as reported, are practically under \$600. The arrears from three parishes, viz:—Boscobel, North Shefford, and South Stukely, amounting to \$115, are said to be partly good.

QUEBEC PLAN.

In this connection, the Deanery has expressed itself unanimously in favour of the plan for the payment of stipends known as the Quebec Plan or any other anologous system of a graded scale of salaries—by which, since it can be proved feasible, at least the stipulated Synodical rate will be secured to the missionary, and a fair prospect of increasing emolument realizable to him, in return for length of service in whatever field of labour he may be working.

The Deanery trusts that this important question will not at this session be treated to its annual shelving, but receive the prompt and faithful consideration which it surely deserves.

CHURCH POPULATION.

While in the Deanery we have suffered a loss of 13 families, or almost double the number of individuals that died or removed last year—showing the drift of the Church population—still from the fact that the number of actual communicants during the last twelve

Of work among the French, nothing can be reported as done, but if the means and men can be found, we have reason to think that an area in the North Eastern portion of the Deanery could be well worked up by a travelling French-speaking missionary, and this we are on the eve of attempting, trusting to God for a measure of success in this direction also.

DEANERY OF ST. ANDREWS.

The annual meeting of the Deanery of St. Andrews was held in St. Simeon's Church, Lachute, on Monday the 14th of June inst. At 11.15 a.m., there was a public celebration of the Holy Communion, when the Rev. J. Cattermole delivered an able sermon on the duties and responsibilities of the Ministerial office.

At 2 p.m., the members clerical and lay, assembled for business. The reports of the various parishes and missions were read and discussed.

It was found that while some had fallen below the sums fixed as their assessments to the Mission Fund, others, particularly Buckingham, Papineauville and Lachute, had raised over the amount expected. After due deliberation, it was resolved that the same rates of assessment be continued for another year.

A committee was appointed to consider and report upon the desirability of an exchange of two out-stations between the missions of Lachute and Lakefield; this committee to consist of the incumbents of the said parishes and Mr. F. C. Ireland.

A resolution was unanimously passed, repeating the opinion of this Rural Deanery, "that it is very necessary, in the interest of the Church, that a clergyman be appointed to Arundel as soon as possible, and urging that a grant be made by the Executive Committee for that purpose."

ilies, or yed last om the twelve A communication from the Rural Deanery of Shefford, in reference to lay representation of the different Rural Deaneries on the Executive Committee and to the Provincial Synod, was read by the Chairman, but no action was taken thereon.

A discussion having arisen regarding the accumulation of arrears of salaries in certain parishes, it was resolved "that some means should be devised to prevent such accumulation being permitted to go on from year to year."

Several changes have take place during the year:—The Rev. Wm. Sanders has been appointed to the mission of Lachute and Arundel; the Rev. J. Ball has removed from Mille Isles to Portland; the Rev. C. Boyd from Lakefield to Wakefield in the Deanery of Clarendon; the Rev. G. Johnston of Chelsea, in the same Deanery, holds a service in West Templeton; and Mr. Harris, student of the Theo. Coll, has been sent for the summer months to Arundel. The mission of Mille Isles is vacant, while the parish of St. Andrews is practically so by the retirement of the Ven. Archdeacon Lonsdell M. A., from the more active duties of the parish, the Sunday services being kept up by Mr. Harte of the Theological College.
