

Quest. VIII. Who have died since last Conference?

CORNELIUS FLUMMERFELT.

Was born in New Jersey, United States; came to Canada about the year 1800 with his uncle Clowbine. He was converted to God about fifty years ago, and felt it his duty to be as useful in the church as his abilities and opportunities would permit. After labouring very efficiently as a local preacher for several years, he was called to the work of our Itinerant Ministry by the chairman of the Toronto District in 1833, and was admitted on trial by the Conference in 1835. From his first entrance into our ministry until his retirement from our regular circuit work, he was a faithful, devoted, and successful minister of the Gospel. His appointments were mostly to the remote and extensive circuits of our work; but he cheerfully entered on any field of labour to which he was appointed, however great its toils or privations; in all of which he was encouraged and assisted by his faithful and devoted companion. Seven years ago he had to request the relation of a Superannuated Minister, and settled in the village of Markham. As a Superannuated Minister he laboured faithfully as far as health and strength would permit, his labours and visits were always acceptable and profitable among our people. Last summer he visited his native place, and after his return appeared somewhat more cheerful and animated; but his bodily strength did not appear to be improved. In the spring he began most perceptibly to fail, yet he endeavored to take the appointments given him on the plan, and assisted in holding a protracted meeting on the 10th concession of Markham, he preached there and assisted in the prayer meeting on Sunday 27th of January. The week following, although without pain or any visible symptoms of disease he was exceedingly feeble. His weakness increased until the 3rd of February when he was confined

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Ap age enc We to his house, and during the following week sunk most perceptibly, and he became altogether helpless. His speech began so far to fail, that his aged companion and now bereaved widow could not comprehend what he said, although he appeared very desirous to talk to her; but the import appeared to be a statement of the peaceful and happy state of his mind. The only expression she could distinctly understand was very happy. When given to understand, by some of tasse who visited him, that they feared his affliction would be unto death, he replied "for me to live is Christ and die is gain." He departed this life on the 10th of February, in the 73 year of his age, and in the confident assurance of a blissful immortality beyond the grave.

ROBERT HOBBS,

Was born in Clarendon, C. E., in 1830, and converted to God under the manistry of the Rev. Wm. Morton in 1843, from which time until his death, he continued working in the fear of God, and the comforts of the Holy Ghost. He labored nearly two years in the capacity of a Local Preacher prior to his being called to the more active work in 1851. On the various circuits to which he was appointed, he was cordially received. His ministrations were very successful, and many yet cherish a grateful remembrance of them. During the that year of his labors on the Merrickville Circuit, his health so far failed as to oblige him to take a superannuated relation, under the ravages of consumption he continue I wasting away, but giving bright evidence of exemplary faith and patience, until the month of February 1861, when passing to his blessed reward, he uttered with his expiring breath, "The prize is in view."

THOMAS DRAKE, Junior.

Was the son of Thomas and Vashti Drake, of the Township of Yarmouth, C. W. He was born on the 22nd of April, 1838; and died at Aylmer on the 30th of April, 1861, aged 23 years. When about fourteen years old he experienced the converting grace of God, and united with the Wesleyan Methodist Church, on the St. Thomas Circuit, un-

der the ministry of the Rev. Richard Whiting. After being some time employed as a Local Preacher, he entered upon the regular work as a probationer, in the year 1858.

Brother Drake was appointed first to the Florence, then to the Gosfield and Amherstburgh, and last to the Romney Circuit. After a few weeks labor on the Romney Circuit, his health having failed, he returned to the parental roof. Still as health would permit, and opportunity offer, he employed himself in calling upon sinners to be reconciled to God. His removal to the better world was sudden and unexpected. Having engaged to preach in the village of Aylmer, on Sabbath the 28th of April, he repaired to the place, a distance of two miles on foot, entered the pulpit, but was almost immediately seized with paralysis of the right side. He asked for a drink of water, but in a few moments lost the power of speech, and became entirely helpless. He lived until half-past three o'clock the following Tuesday morning.

His conversion to God we believe was sound, his zeal in his Master's cause fervent, and his desire to be useful, deep, and abiding. The Master called him at an unexpected hour,

but he was found ready.

REPORT OF CHILDREN'S FUND COMMITTEE.

Your Committee have to report an increase of claimants upon the Children's Fund amounting to 56; there being 519 children last year, and 575 the present year. The ratio of increase in the membership being much less, the question arose, in what way could the income be made to meet the claims? The first consideration was the amount paid to superannuated ministers, which was found to be upwards of \$2,000; and the question arose, shall this amount be deducted from the aggregate But the smallness of the annual income of these brethren, and especially in view of a large abatement in their income made by the Board of the Superannuated Preacher's Fund at the present Conference, the Committee could not recommend a reduction in this direction. Equally reluctant is the Committee to recommend the increased per centage upon the full membership, which, if made, would have to be equal to 38c per member. The Committee, therefore, recommend to Conference the only practicable alternative, -viz., the inclusion of members on trial for the present year as well as of members in full connexion with the Church, That proportion, distributed, thus, will be only 34c per member.

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REPORT OF THE SABBATH SCHOOL COMMITTEE.

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Your Committee are happy to report that they have received encouraging accounts from most parts of our wide field of labour. In many of the Districts, a growing interest in Sabbath School operations obtains; gracious revivals have taken place in some schools; teachers have been drawn to Christ by the lessons of truth they were addressing to others; children have risen up to call their instructors blessed. In some localities a great improvement in the observance of the Sabbath is attributed to the direct influence of the Sunday School. Several brethren write that a large increase to the membership of the Church in their Circuits may be traced to awakenings commenced in the school. One states that fifty children were converted during the year; and many adults, who were made partakers of saving grace, traced their first religious impressions to the instruction received in this nursery of godliness. Thirteen hundred and fifty-nine of the children in our schools are returned as meeting in class. In many instances there is reported a greatly increased zeal on the part of the teachers for the promotion of the salvation of the children, by drawing them at once to repentance towards God and faith in our Lord Jesus Christ; and the most gratifying success has attended these efforts, the number meeting in class being greatly increased in most cases where special exertions were employed.

Many of the ministers express regret that they are unable to visit the schools, having to preach three times on every. Lord's-day. It would, in the judgment of your Committee, be of great advantage to our Sabbath Schools could the Circuit Plans be so arranged as to admit of the ministers attending the schools at least once or twice a year, and addressing a short sermon to the children; and no circuit would sustain any loss, even though a regular appointment were occasionally interested into a Sabata Carlot.

merged into a Sabbath School service.

Complaint is made that in some places anniversaries are not duly observed. Your Committee are of opinion that in every school there should be an annual festival, with sermons on behalf of Sabbath School instruction, either on the preceding or following Sabbath. Hereby a greatly increased interest may be awakened in the minds of the children, and an opportunity given to the ministers for intercourse with them that could not otherwise be commanded.

Our own Catechisms are not used to the extent that they ought to be. Your Committee believe them to be the best embodiment of biblical teaching adapted to the understanding of children that can possibly be furnished. There are some schools in which our Sunday School Hymn Book is not used. This must surely arise from a neglect to become acquainted with its merits, for we are persuaded it is not surpassed nor equalled in suitableness to our wants by any other that may be supplied in its place.

The Sunday School Advocate has still far too limited a circulation, and we cannot refrain from urging upon our schools the desirableness of placing in the hands of all their children this interesting little paper.

We would also draw attention to the superior excellence of our own Libraries, and the facilities with which they may be obtained from our Book-Room.

Union Schools are still patronised by our people in many places where our own Wesleyan Schools ought to be sustained. As well might we divest our pulpits of their Wesleyan character, and encourage all forms and phases of religious teaching, as to denude our Sabbath Schools of a denominational supervision and control, leaving the children to be bewildered by conflicting teachings from those entertaining religious views at variance with each other, or to be darkened and misled by such obscure and unmeaning allusions to truth as persons are forced to employ when they would attempt to convey instruction and at the same time to conceal their own sentiments.

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Your Committee have to regret that from a very large number of the circuits there is no written statement of the spiritual condition and moral influence of the Bare statistical returns are not sufficient to enable your Committee to arrive at correct conclusions in regard to our progress in this great and important department of our Church. But we are happy to say that the accounts which have been furnished are of the most satisfactory and encouraging character. classes are being multiplied; the conversion of the children to God is engaging increasingly the solicitudes and exertions of teachers; greater efficiency is being attained in organization and management; the Divine blessing is descending as showers upon the thirsty ground, and a growing zeal is being awakened to hasten the day when all our children shall be taught of God.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CHURCH PROPERTY.

Your Committee have obtained the following informa-

tion from all the available sources:

The total number of churches returned is 736, other preaching places, 1351, making a total of 2087. There are 159 Parsonages, and 140 Burial grounds. The incompleteness of the returns renders it however impossible to furnish accurate information as to the two latter. No return can be made as to the aggregate value or capacity—of the amount of indebtedness, or annual income and expenditure. In order to obtain more accurate information on these subjects, your committee would recommend the preparation of District Schedules, being a fac simile of those for circuits relating to church property.

Your Committee beg to direct attention to the fact, that the title of much of our church property is in a very unsatisfactory state. In not a few instances no deeds have been executed, and in many others they have

not been placed on record.

Your Committee would also refer the Conference to the passing of an Act during the late session of our Legislature legalizing certain defective titles which shall be registered within a specific period. We venture to urge this on the immediate notice of Superintendents of Circuits, as the title of property may be jeopardized if not registered within twelve months from the passing of that Act.

MISCELLANEOUS RESOLUTIONS.

RESPECTING THE DEATH OF THOMAS FARMER, ESQ.

Resolved,—That having received tidings of the death of Thos. Farmer, Esq., of Gunnersbury House, England, many years the lay Treasurer of the Parent Missionary Society, London; who, by the wisdom of his counsels, the fervour and consistency of his piety, and the munificence of his liberality, has rendered eminent services to the Wesleyan Methodist Church of Great Britain, but especially to its Missionary Society; this Conference takes the earliest opportunity to express its sense of the loss which the Church of Christ has sustained, not only in the parent land, but throughout the world, in the death of one so distinguished and useful, and todeclare its heartfelt

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sympathy and Christian condolence with the beloved and revered surviving widow and her esteemed family, and the Secretaries members of the Committee of the Wesleyan Missionary Society.

RESPECTING THE REGISTRATION OF DEEDS.

Whereas, the Legislature has, at its last session, passed an Act authorizing that Church Property, whose title had not been secured by registry, be placed on register within a limited time, thereby securing a legal title; therefore,

Resolved,—That each Superintendent be required at the ensuing Quarterly Meeting, to enquire into the title and register of our church and other property, and report a full account of the same at the Financial District Meeting, so that all our church property may be legally secured within the period specified by law, which expires about the first day of May, 1862.

PROVISION FOR MARRIED MINISTERS.

Resolved,—That this Conference, deeply affected with the very grave consideration of the painful embarrassment arising from the continual and rapidly increasing number of married ministers in our work, would therefore most earnestly recommend that every Superintendent of a Circuit be instructed to inform the Quarterly Official Meeting of the pressing necessity for making provision for an additional married minister in every Circuit where the continued labour of a single travelling Preacher has been rendered during the period of four years.

RESOLUTION ON TEMPERANCES

Resolved—That this Conference, deeply impressed with the conviction that the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors, affording, as they do such facilities and temptations to their use as a common beverage, are the fruitful source, and the direct cause of a large proportion of the idleness, poverty, and crime, which mar the prosperity of our country; and as the cause of these evils can be removed only by the example and personal influence of the christian and philantrhopic portion of the community, urges upon all the members of the Wesleyan Church to endeavour, by precept and example, so to influence the opinions and practice of the community, as will lead to the speedy adoption of such well devised Legislative restrictions upon the traffic in intoxicating liquors as will confine their use within the narrowest possible limits.

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RELATING TO THE BOOK-ROOM.

Resolved—That every Minister and Preacher is henceforth peremptorily required to settle his account with the Book-Steward at or before the meeting of Conference.

Resolved.—That in case of any Brother who is indebted to the amount of \$100 to the Book-Room, the Book-Steward shall be authorized to draw on the Treasurer of any connexional funds on which that Brother may have a claim, to the amount of not more than 25 per cent of his claim annually, until his debt is paid; and that a like proportion prevail when the indebtedness is larger than the sum named.

Resolved—That Brethren indebted to the Book-Room, they not being claimants on the connexional funds, be required to settle all overdue accounts and pay the same within two years.

RESOLUTION OF 1859.

Resolved—That the Financial District Meetings shall examine into the circumstances and probable income of the Domestic Missions, in the same way as in respect to Circuits, and suggest the amount that should be appropriated for the support or assistance of such Missions.

CHAIRMEN AND DOMESTIC MISSIONS.

Resolved—That the Chairmen of Districts forward to the General Superinter dent of Missions, the amounts recommended by the several September Financial District Meetings for the Domestic Missions, as soon as practicable, after the close of each meeting.

CANDIDATES' TRIAL SERMON.

Resolved—That this Conference requires Candidates for our Ministry to preach a Trial Sermon before the District Meeting by which they are recommended, or before a Committee appointed by the District Meeting, who shall report their opinion of the sermon, and embody it in the recommendation of such candidate to the Conference.

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THE ANNUAL ADDRESS

OF THE

CONFERENCE

TO THE

MEMBERS OF THE CHURCHES UNDER ITS CARE.

DEARLY BELOVED BRETHREN,

"Grace be unto you, and peace from God our Father and the Lord Jesus Christ." The relation subsisting between us renders it desirable that we should at our Annual Conference address to you such suggestions and counsels as may be, with the Divine blessing, promotive of your edification in the Lord. "For God is" our "record, how greatly we long after you in the bowels of Jesus Christ," praying "that your love may abound yet more and more in knowledge and in all judgment; that ye may approve things that are excellent; that ye may be sincere and without offence till the day of Christ; being filled with the fruits of righteousness, which are by Jesus Christ, unto the glory and praise of God."

We exhort you to join us in devout thanksgivings to God our heavenly Father, for the peace and general prosperity bestowed upon our Church throughout the year just closed. None of those causes of dissension and difficulty which have affected God's people injuriously in other years, and in other lands, have been permitted to befall us; but rather, we have been enabled to prosecute our work in the fear and with the blessing of the Lord, so that a good degree of success has crowned our labours.

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You will join with us in grateful acknowledgements to the Lord for the rich and varied temporal blessings of the past year. It has pleased the Lord. after several seasons of comparative unproductiveness, to crown the past year with great abundance. The wants of man and beast have been amply met, and much of the depression and distress occasioned by the scarcity of preceding years, is removed. Let us, beloved brethren, in view of these facts, be more than ever careful to cultivate and exemplify that sense of dependence upon our heavenly Father, which these providences are designed to produce, that we may in all things approve ourselves as wise stewards of the manifold blessings of our God. Nor should we be unmindful of the fact that while other countries are rocked by revolution or scathed by war, our landis in peace. Unmoved we cannot be, while events so expressive of lawlessness sweep wildly along in the adjacent nation, and especially as we know that many of God's people are exposed to their violence. For these especially, let us offer our fervent prayers, that the days of darkness and distress may speedily disappear, and that peace in all its blessedness may be the possession of universal man.

For many of the blessings which as a people we enjoy, we are indebted, under God to the rule of our wise, and good, and noble Queen—whom may God ever bless!—we therefore gladly hailed, as a visitor to this distant portion of the Empire, the Prince of Wales, the illustrious son of our beloved Sovereign. The cordial and hearty reception with which all classes of our fellow subjects greeted him was highly gratifying to us, and especially so as knowing that the members of our Church were behind none in the heartiness and cordiality of their salutations. We are not, however, by these expressions of loyalty and attachment, to be understood

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as having looked with unmingled favour upon many of the scenes and acts associated with the visit of the Prince to this continent. We deeply felt, nor will we soon forget, the disrespect which was shown to our Protestant faith, the faith of our Queen and nation. Nor would we be supposed to convey, even by implication, a sanction of those dissipating and demoralizing festivities, so frequently employed to give interest to, or facilities for, the Prince's intercourse with certain classes of the people. tendencies of such we well know to be baneful, and we deplore the perverted taste which could select them for any object. We are fully persuaded that had the responsible advisers of the Prince, in deference to the judgment of the religious portion of the people, pursued a different course, that distinguished individual would most readily have followed it, and thus would have prevented consequences which many will long deplore.

It is of great importance that we bear upon our minds continually such a sense of responsibility as accords with the peculiary history of our Church. We, who a little over a century ago had no existence, are now a people spread over, not only a large portion of this great continent, but also over many of the islands and continents of the old world. Of this great-fact we make no boast. fathers, who now rest in God, and who were honoured instruments in promoting it, made none. To God belongs the praise, all the praise, -for the excellency of the power is His-His only. But does it not behove us, beloved brethren, to see to it that an instrumentality hitherto so richly endowed and so eminently effective, should lose nothing of its efficiency in our keeping? Ours is no ordinary responsibility; and in this light we-ministers and people-should constantly regard it. spread Scriptural holiness throughout the land is

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our duty, and every means necessary thereto should be diligently sought, and faithfully applied.

We have no new Gospel to preach, nor any new phase of the Gospel to exhibit. Those truths which comprehend 'the faith once delivered to the saints' by the prophets and the apostles, and by our Lord himself, are those only for which we contend; being convinced that the election of God and sanctification of the Spirit are only through "a belief of the truth,"-" the truth as it is in Jesus." Our purpose therefore is, God helping us, to preach Christ as "God manifest in the flesh," whose blood shed upon the cross made a full atonement, oblation, and satisfaction for the sins of the whole world; which, when apprehended by faith, becomes the means of obtaining a present, perfect, and everlasting salvation. "Brethren, pray for us, that the word of the Lord may have free course, and be glorified, even as it is with you."

The means of grace, public and social, which are maintained amongst us, leave us nothing to desire, so far at least as their adaptedness to our wants is concerned; but is not greater punctuality and regularity in attendance upon them called for? Is there not danger of the cares and seductive pleasures of the world preventing our regular attendance upon, or, at least to weaken our spiritual desire for them? Our Class and Prayer meetings are invaluable helps to personal piety: see to it, brethren, that they fail not in their effects through any fault of yours. Again, might not our public means of grace be rendered more spiritual and productive of good? We think that in many places there is room for much improvement herein. We fear that the good old Wesleyan method of singing our hymns, has, in not a few instances, been departed from, so that the spirit which such a portion of our service

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should generate is too little felt. Let us in every instance in which such departures may be charged upon us, return again as speedily and as fully as practicable; and discountenancing every thing having even the appearance of musical display, aim simply at worshipping God, "singing with the spirit and with the understanding:" making melody in our hearts unto the Lord."

As nothing should be considered trivial or unimportant that is connected with the worship of God, we exhort you to the cultivation of a reverent spirit in the House of the Lord. He who commanded Moses to take off the shoes from his feet while He talked with him, is not, we may be assured, indifferent to our attitudes and demeanour while before Him in His house. The habit of kneeling while in prayer-certainly the most scriptural and becoming-has, in many instances, been entirely given up, while in some of our churches no provision has been made for such an attitude. We regret this, and carnestly exhort to a correction of such irregularities, assured that he who yields to an unwillingness "to bow down and kneel before his Maker," will not be found in a state of mind to profit yery greatly in the services of the sanctuary. To the means of grace-to all the means of grace-public, social, domestic, and private, as you value the favour of the Lord; as you desire a growth in grace, and as you look for the conversion and salvation of those associated with you in life; pay the most conscientious attention, making it your rule to act herein as you will wish you had done when you come to stand in the presence of the Lord in judgment. Then shall your profiting appear unto all, while you will delightfully prove, that "the path of the just is as the shining light, that shineth more and more unto the perfect day."

To you who are parents, we affectionately remind you of the importance of giving due diligence to train up your children in the nurture and admonition

That many of the children of our people are, apparently, lost to God and His Church, is a fact acknowledged and deplored by us all. But should not a fact, at once so painful and alarming, prompt us to a more faithful and earnest application of scriptural means for the moral and spiritual culture of our children? We assume that you have dedicated them to the protection and service of your covenant keeping God, in the ordinance of Christian baptism; that in this ordinance you have recognized their interest, with yours, in the new and everlasting covenant, and, as well, their relation to the visible Church of Christ. But, then, are these acts followed by that government in your families, which is according to godliness? Do you throw around them, with vigilant care, that protection from the ensnaring ills of life to which they are constantly exposed? Is your authority over their actions wisely and prayerfully maintained? The history of Eli and his family is admonitory in this respect: "And the Lord said to Samuel, behold, I will do a thing in Israel, at which both the ears of every one that heareth it shall tingle. In that day will I perform against Eli all things which I have spoken concerning his house; when I begin I will also make an end. For I have told him that I will judge his house forever for the iniquity which he knoweth; because his sons made themselves vile, and he restrained them not." This is strikingly contrasted by another declaration of the Almighty concerning Abraham: "And the Lord said, shall I hide from Abraham that thing which I do? seeing that Abraham shall surely become a great and mighty nation, and all the nations of the earth shall be blessed in him? For I know him, that he will command his children and his household after him, and they shall keep the way of the Lord, to do justice and judgment, that the Lord may bring upon Abraham that which he hath spoken of him." These instances of the different nature and effects of family government we exhort you to ponder with serious-

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ness and prayer; that they may minister to you that "correction and instruction" which the nature of the case may require.

To the youth of our Church, and we rejoice to know that we have many such enrolled in our membership, we repeat the memorable utterances on Mount Sinai: "Honour thy father and thy mother, that thy days may be long in the land which the Lord thy God giveth thee;" or, as the apostolic version renders it, "Children obey your parents in the Lord for this is right. Honour thy father and mother; which is the first commandment with promise; that it may be well with thee, and thou mayest live long on the earth." Labour, dear young friends, to carry with you, at all times and in all places, a deep reverence for the teachings of Holy Scripture, assured that every interest worthy of your attention is involved in such a course.

The field in which as a church we are called to apply our energies, is extensive and inviting. The whole of this northern portion of the great American Continent is open before us. That we have "fellow servants" in other portions of the Church, whose labours have not been in vain in the Lord, we freely and joyfully admit. Nevertheless we are persuaded that our commission, in many respects peculiar-peculiar now as when we first became a people—is not fulfilled; nor do we think it will be until "God is all in all." Our Missionary Constitution and training which impelled us to follow the early and scattered settlers of our country to their wilderness homes,-which constrained us to make the evangelization of the Indian tribes throughout our western wilds, an imperative and pressing duty still move us onward in the same glorious toil. To the French Canadians in the East, and to the dwellers in British Columbia on the Pacific, we are prosecuting successful Missions. Our encouragement in this great work, next to that which comes from the Lord himself, is your intelligent, prayerful, and hearty co-operation. This we are

thankful to add, you have hitherto accorded us; yet because of thousands still in pagan darkness and wretchedness; because of multitudes who are still the dupes of a vile and God-dishonouring superstition, let us bestir ourselves, that more thoroughly imbued with the spirit of our glorified Lord, we may more effectually than heretofore stem the torrent of human misery and ruin, and secure to Christ and happiness the lost ones of our land and world.

You will be required, in a short time, to exercise your rights as British subjects in the election of persons to represent you in the Provincial Parliament. We disclaim all intention to interfere with the freest action of your judgment in the use of the elective franchise: vet conscious of the dangers which the strifes of political partizanship are sure to create, we feel it our duty, affectionately yet urgently to press upon you the great importance of maintaining a Christian consistency under every circumstance which may arise. The loss which your piety is sure otherwise to sustain, and the injury which through you would befall the kingdom of our Lord, would be poorly compensated by any worldly triumph which might be obtained. Therefore "be sober, be vigilant; because your adversary the devil, as a roaring lion, walketh about," and at such times especially, "seeking whom he may devour."

Disclaiming, as we do, any intention to prescribe the course you should take in the selection of your representatives, yet we are firmly persuaded that moral and spiritual considerations should take precedence over those which are merely political. We should greatly prefer as our law-makers those who so far bow to the law of God as to give their influence fully and readily for the suppression of intemperance,—who would seek to promote the due observance of the Sabbath of the Lord, and other objects of like character. Nor do we think that you will consider us overstepping the bounds of duty when we ask,—Should not our efforts to wrest from the

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hands of secular monopolists the noble endowment for the superior education of our youth, have your practical approval at such a period? In the very general and earnest co-operation of our churches and congregations, throughout our united Province, we had a satisfactory appreciation of the position which as a Conference we have taken. Mistaken, and, we fear, in some instances, designing men have laboured to misrepresent the true object of our efforts. But we rejoice to know they have failed signally and fully in their purpose to array you against your ministers. Our object is now acknowledged to be unselfish and patriotic, and is approved by the enlightened and impartial of all classes. Combined and persevering effort at this juncture will secure that justice which has been too long withheld.

The eminent services which Victoria College is still rendering with increasing efficiency and usefulness to our Church and country render it imperative on us to sustain that Institution with efficiency. We are justified in making our strong and repeated appeals to you on this matter. If not to you dear brethren, to whom shall we make them? Our University has been the means of imparting to very many of your sons and ours, the blessings of a sound and Christian education. A general, united, and no very great effort, would place the College in a position of financial ease and efficiency. Bear with us, therefore, brethren, on this important subject, and join with us in persevering and systematic efforts to attain the object we so earnestly desire should be fully realized.

We cannot close this address to you without exhorting you to care and diligence in the culture of your minds and hearts. The age in which we live is remarkable for many things, and for none more than the free use of the press. Books are issued with wonderful abundance and variety. Against novelties in religion we affectionately warn you. Abide by the ancient landmarks, and cultivate a profound reverence

for Holy Scripture, Of human productions the writings of Wesley, of Fletcher, of Berson, of Clarke, and of Watson, have not been superseded by the modern efforts of genius, however profound and attractive. We strongly recommend to you our standard works, as supplying food for the heart and imparting light to the understanding. If other books are desired, and your leisure will admit of a more general acquaintance with literature, be assured you need seldom go beyond our own Book Room for the supply of your wants. With these helps seek the improvement of every talent the Lord has entrusted to your keeping, and by which you may serve His church, extend His kingdom, and promote His glory. Your own best interests, for the present as for the future, will be thus most effectually promoted; for "Him that honoureth me, I will honour, saith the Lord,"

And now, dearly beloved, we commend you to God and to the word of His grace,-supplicating in your behalf the richest supplies of Divine unction. With affectionate concern our hearts yearn towards you in the spirit and love of Christ. We have no interests separate from yours. We have no greater happiness, next to fellowship with Christ by the Spirit, than in witnessing your prosperity in the knowledge and love of God and of His Son Jesus Christ our Lord. We trust to come to you according to our appointments, prayerfully and considerately made, in the fulness of the hope of a prosperous year. Let us have your co-operation in all the measures so long proved to be necessary and valuable; then will "the Lord of Hosts be with us, and the God of Jacob be our refuge." Amen, and Amen.

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THE ANSWER

OF THE

BRITISH CONFERENCE

TO THE

ADDRESS OF THE WESLEYAN METHODIST CONFERENCE

IN CANADA.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,

It has afforded us great pleasure to receive your affectionate address, and to welcome your esteemed Representative, the Rev. James Spencer. The bonds which unite us to you are intimate and strong. Addressing you at the time when the Heir Apparent to the throne of these realms is visiting your country, we remember with interest that you share with us in the blessings of the British Constitution, and enjoy, as we do, that combination of freedom with order which tends to ennoble a people. But other and holier ties unite us. We are one with you in Christ. His spirit diffuses through our hearts a common life; and we and you have been called and consecrated by Him to the highest work that can occupy the human mind, -the announcement of the great facts of his life, and death, and resurrection, and enthronement at the Father's right hand; and the setting forth of Him as a Refuge of the perishing, and the one source of spiritual life.

The circumstances under which we are met have awakened in our hearts devout gratitude to God. The past year has been marked by cheering tokens of the Divine presence and blessing; and we have to report a

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net increase of 17,516 members in Great Britain, with 30,892 on trial; and in Ireland, of 3,129 members, with 1,826 on trial.

It is gratifying to us to know that the accession of members to our churches has not been confined to two or three Districts, but has been diffused over the land. Our Connexion at large has shared in that revived spirit of prayer and expectation which has been called forth in the churches generally, and, in answer to prayer in the name of Jesus, the rich baptism of the spirit has been vouchsafed, giving to the truth of Christ a mightier energy, and subduing many to the obedience of faith. In the presence of God thus acting upon the minds of men, piercing them with conviction, filling them with joy and peace in believing, and imparting to them the new life of spiritual and holy affections, we feel that we are nothing; and from our hearts we exclaim, " Not unto us, O Lord, not unto us, but unto Thy name give glory, for Thy mercy, and for Thy truth's sake."

We have listened with deep interest to the statements contained in your Address, in relation to the prosperity with which you have been favoured, and the conflicts through which you have passed. In contending against the establishment of a Collegiate system of education from which the distinctive truths and precepts of Christianity should be excluded, you have done well; and we shall rejoice to learn that your efforts have been crowned, as you anticipate they will be, with complete success. It is our cherished conviction that religious truth should be interwoven with the entire process of intellectual culture and moral training. God's government of man, its great principles and solemn issues, together with the facts and arrangements of the mediatorial scheme, ought never to be shut out from any department of human inquiry; and many branches of general knowledge can then only be contemplated aright, when they are viewed in the light shed on them by these loftier and more sacred truths. Your own seat of learning, Victoria College, distinctly

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recognizes this fundamental principle; and we rejoice to hear of its continued and increasing efficiency and prosperity.

The circumstances of the present day summon us all to deep thoughtfulness, to earnest prayer, and to active effort for Christ. Around us we see the restless heaving of states and kingdoms, and we mark a feeling of insecurity and apprehension widely diffused among nations whose temporal interests-to say nothing of higher motives-should bind them to ach other. In the world of mind, we find collisions of thought and principle on subjects of vital and everlasting moment; and we espec ally view with regret the unfolding of rationalistic systems, which proudly set aside the most precious truths of the Gospel, and which would leave to Christianity only an empty and powerless name. But, amidst all this, we see that God is putting forth His power to save and bless. There is awakened at the present time, we believe, a deepef religious feeling than has existed for many years. The people of Christ are roused to a vivid apprehension of the truth, that it becomes them all to live daily and hourly in the spirit of entire self-dedication to Him; and devoted men are going forth, in prayerful dependence upon the Saviour, to seek the very lowest and degraded of our race, and to endeavour to win them to Him. These considerations encourage and sustain us; and in the strength of Him who has promised, "Lo, I am with you always, even unto the end of the world," we would go forth to our respective spheres of hallowed toil, assured that as we preach His word, His spirit shall apply it to the consciences of men, and thus "the dead shall hear the voice of the Son of God, and they that hear shall live,"

It is with much satisfaction that we learn how valuable have been the services of your beloved President, and of the other honoured brethren to whom you refer. We cordially accede to your request, that the Rev. Dr. Stinson may preside over your next Conference, with the

Rev. Henry Wilkinson as Co-Delegate; and that the Rev. Dr. Wood may be continued as the General Superintendent of Missions. And now, as we close these expressions of our fraternal regard, we sincerely pray, that the same gracious Providence which has guarded and kept you during the past year, may still be over you for good; and that your next annual assembly may be a time of holy triumph, each of you rejoicing in the manifest tokens of the Divine approval, and in the abundant success of his efforts in the cause of our common Master.

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ADDRESS OF THE CONFERENCE

OF THE

WESLEYAN METHODIST CHURCH IN CANADA,

TO THE

CONFERENCE IN ENGLAND.

REVEREND FATHERS AND BRETHREN,

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resident.

Immediately after the opening of the Conference, your answer to our last address was presented and read. We receive with unfeigned gratitude your affectionate recognition of our unity; and cordially reciprocate your expressions of esteem and confidence. The Rev. James Spencer made a statement to the Conference of the kind and brotherly manner in which he was received by your venerable body, as our representative; and we are satisfied that his intercourse with you, and the opportunity he had of furnishing evidence of our harmony and prosperity, will serve to strengthen those bonds of fraternal concord, which so happily exist between us. "Having the same love, being of one accord, of one mind," we shall not fail "to attain unto all riches of the full assurance of understanding, to the acknowledgment of the mystery of God, and of the Father, and of Christ."

You have referred in appropriate terms to the visit of His Royal Highness, the Prince of Wales, to this portion of the dominions of Her Most Gracious Majesty, our beloved Queen. The enthusiastic loyalty of Canada was fully demonstrated on that occasion, and was scarcely in anywise diminished by the extraordinary policy pursued by those who directed the public and private

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movements of His Hoyal Highness. But little regard was paid to the Protestant Constitution of the Empire, and on various occasions no proper deference manifested toward the religious convictions and Christian principles of a large majority of Her Majesty's faithful and loyal subjects in Upper Canada. We cannot forbear the expression of our deep regret on these accounts, but our love and loyalty to the throne of England cannot be disturbed by errors of men; and we remember that we are the servants of the "Prince of the kings of the earth," whose progress in the conquest of nations is not accompanied by noisy demonstrations of public joy, but who nevertheless "shall not fail, nor be discouraged until he have set judgment in the earth and the isles shall wait for his law."

In the important ministerial work assigned us in the providence of God, we have again to express our gratitude for those accompanying influences of the Holy Spirit, by which alone we have achieved success. That "power from on high" is the secret of Christian prosperity,-is the safeguard of our spirituality as a people, and the real defence of our orthodoxy. The outpouring of the Holy Ghost, resulting in the conversion of sinners, is the divine vindication of our scriptural theology, and is also a perfectly satisfactory reply to the speculative fancies of neological theorizers. "We preach Christ crucified, unto the Jews a stumbling block and unto the Greeks foolishness; but unto them which are called both Jews and Greeks, Christ the power of God and the wisdom of God." The past year's experience has verified the truth of the Redeemer's promise,-we have had peace in our borders-success in our labours, and our returns show our numbers to be now 48,281 in full membership and, 5148 on trial.

We have frequently had occasion to refer to our extended Missionary work. Our brethren in Hudson's Bay—in the Canadian Indian work—in Lower Canada among the French, and those who are laying the foun-

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dations of civil and religious society in British Columbia, are all faithfully engaged in their glorious toil, but we have this year to report the commencement of Wesleyan Missions among the German population of Upper Canada. God has been pleased to raise up instruments for this great work, who have already been successful in a good degree, and we are persuaded that you will rejoice with us that our way is at length opened to preach christ's gospel to the much neglected and numerous people of this land who are of German origin. Thus also it will be regarded by you as it is by ourselves, that ours is pre-eminently a Missionary Conference, seeking to gather to Christ the thousands who emigrate from various lands as well as the multitudes who are born within our widely extended territory.

Your appropriate and just observations in reference "to a Collegiate system of education, from which the distinctive truths and precepts of Christianity should be excluded" are highly appreciated by us. On the principles you commend, we have from the beginning conducted our own noble Institution; the University of Victoria College. We have perseveringly contended, and not without prospect of success, for a more just and equitable distribution of the endowment set apart for the benefit of all classes, and for the establishment of a system of University Education embracing the various denominational colleges of the land, which are engaged more successfully than others in promoting the religious welfare and intellectual culture of the youth of Canada. While we cheerfully recognize the rights of others, we shall not fail to maintain our own with that vigor and independence which has marked the career of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in Canada.

Last year, through the care of a gracious providence our ranks were not diminished by the death of any of our beloved brethren; this year three have departed this life. One venerable brother for some years had been laid aside from our active work, but in the early part of our history as a Church, he faithfully devoted himself to the work of saving souls, and was eminently successful. Two others deceased were comparatively young, but gave great promise of usefulness. They rest from their labours. But God continues to raise up those who supply their places, and we have at the present Conference received 27 into full connexion and 26 on trial.

With gratitude to God for the continued health of our beloved President, whose zealous, faithful, and efficient services have been unremitted through the past year, we again with great unanimity and earnestness, request that you will appoint the Rev. Joseph Stinson, D. D., as our President at the Conference of 1862. We have also with a view to the general interest of the various departments of our work, directed that the President shall travel at large, that our beloved people even in remote places may have the benefit of his wise counsels and Christian ministrations.

Our retiring Co-Delegate the Rev. R. Jones has fully justified our expectations respecting his usefulness, and the honorable discharge of the duties of his office. We thank you for acceding to our request for the appointment of our esteemed brother, the Rev. H. Wilkinson as Co-Delegate for this year, but we deeply regret his inability to attend the Conference in consequence of personal affliction. At our request, Mr. Jones has supplied his place, and we earnestly pray that God would speedily restore our beloved but afflicted brother, and enable him to fill the office to which he has been appointed, and long remain among us as an efficient and successful labourer in the Lord's vineyard.

The Conference requests that you will appoint the Rev. James Musgrove as the Co-Delegate of our next Conference. CANADA CONFERENCE.

TO THE

CONFERENCE OF EASTERN BRITISH AMERICA.

REVEREND AND DEAR BRETHREN,

Anxious to perpetuate the fraternal union and intercourse which have been auspiciously begun between the two Conferences of the Wesleyan Methodist Church in British America, we again present to you our Christian congratulations and peaceful greetings. The great and glorious work in which we are engaged, in its essential features, is alike in all places, and we have but one grand remedy to propose for the radical evils of fallen human nature. "God forbid that we should glory save in the Cross of our Lord Jesus Christ." In these days of speculative error and vain philosophy we rejoice, not so much in the strength and symmetry of our ecclesiastical constitution, as in the clear and well defined system of doctrine which has been transmitted to us from our fathers-the same which the Apostles of our Lord delighted to proclaim, and which is still accompanied with the Holy Ghost sent down from heaven; resulting in the edification of believers and in the conversion of sinners.
