CHATHAM, APRIL 13, 1882. An Old Friend Heard From.

The Aberdeen Journal of 9th inst. contains an interesting account of a social meeting of the members of the congregation of the North Parish Church, which was held the evening before in the City Music Hall.

The Rev. Wm. Wilson, pastor, presided and was accompanied to the platform by Rev. Mr. Bell of John Knox's, Rev. Mr. McClymont of Holborn, Mr. Brebner of Clarendon, Rev. Mr. Cowan of Rishelaw, Rev. Mr. Mitchell of West Chatham, Rev. Mr. Frater, and a number of the office-bearers of the Church.

The proceedings commenced with the company singing the 104th Psalm. Tea was then served, after which the Chairman, in the course of a very happy speech, remarked that this was the first social gathering of the congregation since he became the minister.

It was well to meet in this free and easy way, and that they might become better acquainted with each other. The North Parish Church was a synonym for a very large number of people, and a very large communion roll, which their friends across the road looked upon with suspicion; and he was glad to be able to say that they had never been in a more flourishing condition than they were at present. (Applause.) There were 2371 names on the roll, which was the largest Communion roll in the city, and he dared say in the country. The roll had recently been purged, when a considerable number of names had been taken off; but before that was done all the parties whose names were struck off had been visited either by himself or his assistants to see whether these names were of living people, and they found that there were a few who could not be accounted for, although the large majority were found to be the names of real men and women living in the city. The roll had been thoroughly gone over, so that they could honestly say that the roll of the North Parish Church consisted of living men and women connected with the parish. (Applause.) During the past three years 285 certificates had been issued to parties leaving the church, while in the same period 250 persons had joined, and in addition to this a large number of young communicants had been added. When he became their pastor the roll stood at 2340 but at the first of May next it would stand at 2420. (Applause.) Their roll was kept very strictly; and if it had been attended to in the same loose way that many rolls were throughout Scotland, he was confident it would show a membership of at least 3000. They therefore saw that he had within them the elements of growth. During the last three years 311 children have been baptized, and 210 young ladies have been confirmed. (Applause.) The Sunday School, he was glad to say, was in a most flourishing condition. In the month of May, 1879, the number of pupils was only 200, and now it was nearly 600--(applause)--who were looked after by some 50 teachers, male and female, who were all doing excellent work. (Applause.) They had also in connection with the congregation a Mutual Improvement Association, which had been taken advantage of by the young men with great enthusiasm, and he was proud to say that it was the most successful organization of the kind in the city. They had also an excellent choir, which helped them very much in their religious services. (Applause.) And if they put their shoulder to the wheel, and pulled together, there was no doubt they would get it. Would they not? (Great applause.) The members of Kirk-come, should also, he thought, be increased, so that the work might be more efficiently performed. He went on to say that the success and prosperity of the North Parish in the past was a guarantee of greater success and prosperity in the future. The Church of Scotland to which they belonged, was enlightening her cords year by year, and he believed a glorious future lay before the Church in spite of all that her enemies might say. The next twenty years would not be dissatisfying in operation, but it would witness greater trials for the Church than she had ever yet seen. But if the Church would but realize her strength and resources, she would have every encouragement in a just and glorious triumph in the future. Let her but carry on the work as she had been doing, and she would arrive at a point which the malice and envy of her enemies could not reach. (Applause.) If the Church would perform her duty faithfully, she would easily achieve the victory. (Applause.)

Rev. Mr. Bell also gave an address. He said he was glad to hear such a splendid account of his congregation as Mr. Wilson had given, and the wonder to him how two clergymen could undertake so much work. After referring at some length to the condition of the Church of Scotland generally, he concluded by congratulating the congregation of the North Parish on their prosperity. He thought the great element of success was in working harmoniously together.

Rev. Mr. Mitchell also gave a brief address, in the course of which he remarked that the success of the North Parish congregation during the past three years must have been a source of great gratification to themselves and to all connected with the church.

Mr. Cowan, of Rishelaw, also congratulated the congregation on its prosperity. He had seen it under four ministers, but never had he seen it so strong or in such a flourishing condition more thoroughly worked up under the ministry of Mr. Wilson. (Applause.)

During the evening a number of songs were rendered with much acceptance by the following ladies and gentlemen--Miss Dickinson, Miss W. Cooper, Mr. W. M. Cooper, and Mr. G. Youngson. The choir, under the leadership of Mr. Cooper, also sang several glee and anthems; and Mr. Kirby presided at the organ and piano, and played a solo on the former instrument.

The usual votes of thanks were awarded; and the proceedings, which were very enjoyable, were brought to a close by the choir and company singing the National Anthem.

A Swiss experimenter is said to have produced artificial mother-of-pearl which cannot be distinguished from the genuine. The compass has been found to be sensitive to certain atmospheric perturbations which do not affect the barometer.

In a series of lectures in Chatham, the American mission is teaching modern science to the native schools. Great interest is manifested. Electricity has been applied to piloting; a water-wheel furnishing the power, which is transmitted by two dynamo-electric machines with connecting wires to the pile-driver at a considerable distance away.

Observations upon Russian railways have resulted in showing, for the period of six months, that seventy-seven per cent of the fractures of trees occurred when the temperature was below zero; four per cent at zero, and only nineteen per cent at higher temperatures.

Dr. Werner Siemens considers the use of the electric light to be absolutely free from risk of fire, even in the most inflammable structures. Contrary to general belief, the electric tension required is so low that no measurable spark can pass between two wires or to other objects.

An examination of recruits drafted into the German army states that a long series of careful measurements have established not only that the height of a man varies very considerably at different times of the day, but also that this variation occurs with great regularity in every individual. The greatest change in height observed was an inch and a half.

Prof. Tommasi-Creselli has lately shown that malarial infection may be caused by the keeping of house-plants, even in districts where malaria is unknown. The unwholesome influence, however, is not due to the plants themselves, but to the damp earth surrounding them and the heated and badly ventilated condition of the rooms in which they are kept.

The gleam of falling water, according to Mr. J. S. Gardner, attracts certain insects, quite as powerfully as does artificial light. In Iceland he has observed moths after moths to fly deliberately into a waterfall and disappear. He thinks trout prefer broken streams on account of the self-abundance of the insects, and that it is usually supposed--because of the greater attraction of the water.

Dr. Helot, of Bolbec, France, gives a case of an epidemic of diphtheria in a previously healthy village near Caen. A triple diphtheria had thrown quantities of animal refuse into a pond near his home, and when it was denominated as a nuisance, the mud and water were applied to the land as manure. A severe epidemic of diphtheria broke out and lasted six months. A similar error was committed a second time, and with the same results.

It has been held by some medical men that the best treatment of frozen individuals is the gradual application of heat, while a few experimenters have claimed that the warming should be rapid. To settle the matter, Leptachinski has made a series of very careful experiments upon dogs, with the following results:--Of twenty animals treated by the method of gradual resuscitation in a cold room, fourteen perished; of twenty placed at once in a warm apartment, eight died; while of twenty immediately put into a hot bath all recovered.

A consideration of various phenomena has led Dr. C. W. Siemens to suggest the hypothesis that the sun derives from interplanetary space hydrogen, hydrocarbons and oxygen, by which its heat is kept up. The products of combustion--aqueous vapor, carbonic anhydride and carbonic oxide--are returned to space, where they gradually become separated into the original gases through the action of the solar rays at a moderate temperature. Thus the heat diffused in space by the sun is not wasted, but is made to serve its own energy by preparing fuel for the continued existence of its fires.

A remarkable phenomenon due to refraction has been twice witnessed by Herr Hackmann-Hansen in Norway. On both occasions, at about three o'clock in the afternoon, a rose-colored stripe appeared, stretching across the sky from northwest to east. From the middle of this rose a vertical column of a somewhat lighter red color, and inclining to its western side to a shade of yellow, the whole being intensely bright. In about ten minutes the colors gradually faded, leaving behind a blackish-gray streak. The striking appearance of this vertical column recalled to the observer the descriptions in past ages of bloody crosses seen in the heavens, and regarded as prophetic of coming wars and pestilence.

"Jumbo."
