



> BOSTON, Dec. 4.—H. R. Emmerson, minister of railways and canals, and J. S. Willison of Toronto, were the principal speakers at the annual banquet of the Canadian Club at the club house, tonight. Henry M. Whitney spoke briefly. George Grant, M. P., spoke briefly. George Grant, M. P., was expected, but was unable to appear. Mr. Emmerson's subject was: "The New Canada." In his address, Mr. Emmerson presented an array of figures to show how Western Canada had developed within recent years, and how the eastern provinces had correspondingly benefitted. "These figures" said Mr. Emmerson, "are most gratifying from the Canadian

figures" said Mr. Emmerson, "are most gratifying from the Canadian standpoint, and, when measured against the relatively slow growth for the period between confederation and 1896, they give point to the view that a new Canada has really sprung into existence. 



Reports of Various Boards Received and Adopted.

The regular meeting of the common council was held yesterday afternoon, when the reports of the various boards were received and adopted, and several communications dealt with.

Mayor White was in the chair and there were present Ald. Holder, McArthur, Lewis, Bullock, Hamm, Macrae, Sproul, Pickett, Frink, Tilley, Baxter, McGoldrick, Common Clerk Wardroper and Marshal Coughlan.

The report of the treasury board was read and adopted.

Ald. Baxter moved that the section relating to the planking of North Rodney wharf be referred back to the board of works, not to be dealt with until the director brought in a report. A report should be submitted to see if something could not be done for North Rodney wharf that would be permancouncil was held yesterday afternoon,

ent.

Ald. Bullock thought the lumber might be bought as directed by the board, owing to the cheapness at the present times. It would be needed for North and South wharves if it was not used on Rodney wharf. He moved as an amendment the recommendation of the board be adopted but the material not used till the director reported.

The vote on the amendment of Ald. Bullock was a tie, the chair voting nay. The original resolution was then carried, the chair casting the deciding

vote.

In reference to the last section of the report, which referred to the petition of Silas Alward and others in regard to the laying out of a short street of about 160 feet long between the head of Spring street and Burpee avenue, Ald. Bullock said the accounts of the treasury board in this department were considerably overdrawn. This matter should have been brought to the attention of the board long ago. He was quite willing to admit that the work would be a benefit to citizens in that locality. The petition was also signed by two hundred citizens, many of them his friends, but he would venture to say that he could go around and get five thousand names to a petition praying to God that the taxes of the city be not increased. If the representative of the board would let the matter rest till next spring he would support it, but if he pressed the matter now he would have to oppose it.

Ald. Pickett, the alderman from that ward, said he liked consistency in these things. When the matter of buying timber in a hurry for planking Rodney wharf was brought up it received the support of the chairman of the treasury board, who now opposed this petition signed by two hundred residents, pointing out that the work was practically a necessity.

MARY M. MUIR.

Mary M. Muir sworn: "I have been practicing as a Victorian nurse since June last. I prepared Miss Clarke for the operation on Sunday. Miss Clarke was in a very weak condition previous to the operation. I did not see her after the operation. I heard no conversation between Miss Clarke and Dr. Scammell. She asked me if she would get over the operation. She said she did not expect to. She wanted to, but feared she would not. I told her I hoped she would."

DR. G. A. B. ADDY. Dr. G. A. B. Addy sworn: "I performed a post-mortem examination on the body of the deceased. I found the heart normal, but the lungs were in a diseased condition and a presence of tubercular bacilli. The oft, enlarged and flatulous, but there lence. 
