

PRESIDENT MCKINLEY

Shot Twice on Friday While at the Big Buffalo Exposition.

His Wounds Are Very Serious, Although Not Necessarily Fatal—The Would-be Assassin an Avowed Anarchist of Polish-German Extraction.

BUFFALO, N. Y., Sept. 8.—President McKinley was shot and seriously wounded by a would-be assassin while holding a reception in the Temple of Music at the Pan-American a few minutes after 4 o'clock this afternoon. One shot took effect in the right breast, the other in the abdomen. The first wound is not of a serious nature, and the bullet has been extracted. The latter pierced the abdominal wall and has not been located.

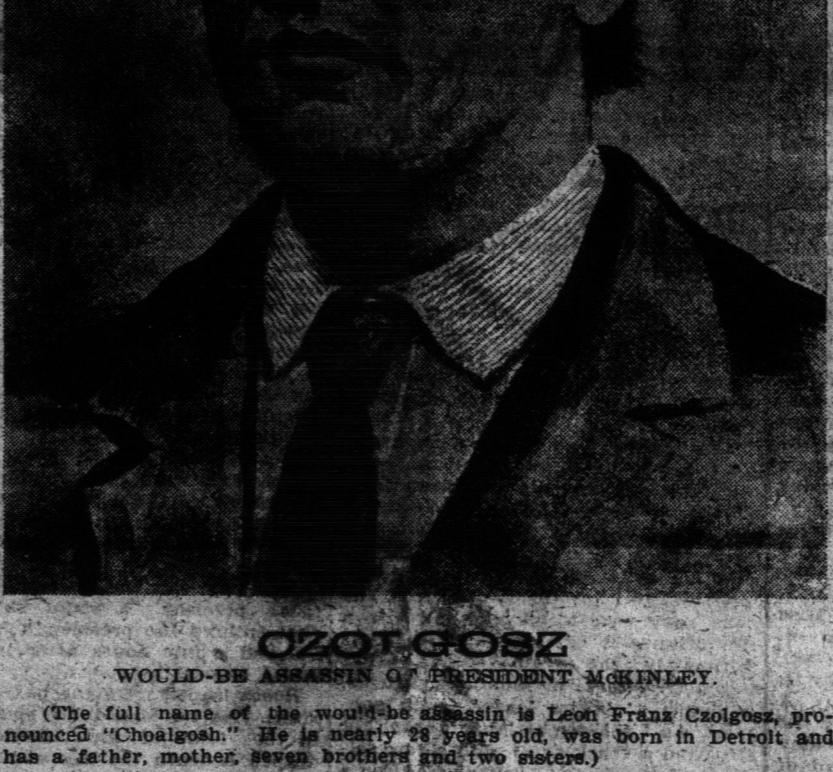
The following bulletin was issued by the President's physicians at 10.45 p. m.: "The President is rallying satisfactorily and is resting comfortably. At 10.15 p. m. temperature, 100.4 degrees; pulse, 124; respiration, 24." (Signed) F. M. Rixey, M. D.; Mann, R. E. Parke, H. Mynter, Eugene Wamb.

It was a few moments after 4 p. m. while President McKinley was holding a public reception in the great Temple of Music on the Pan-American grounds that the cowardly attack was made. Standing in the midst of a crowd numbering thousands, surrounded by every evidence of good will, pressed by a motley throng of people, showered with expressions of love and loyalty, besieged by multitudes all eager to clasp his hand amidst these surroundings and trying to cheer in the midst of an admiring army of sight-seers, the President was struck by the assassin's bullet.

(The full name of the would-be assassin is Leon Frank Czolgosz, pronounced "Chozigosh." He is nearly 28 years old, was born in Detroit and has a father, mother, seven brothers and two sisters.)

THEN CAME A COMMOTION. Three men threw themselves forward with one impulse, and sprang toward the would-be assassin. Two of them were United States Secret Service men, whose duty it was to guard against just such a calamity.

At this time the crush was terrific. Spectators crowded down the stairways from the galleries, the crowd on the floor surged forward toward the rear, while a hoarse cry welled up from a thousand throats and a thousand men charged forward to lay hands upon the perpetrator. For a moment the confusion was horrible. The crowd surged forward regardless of consequences. Men shouted and fought, women screamed and children cried. Some of those nearest the door fled in fear of a stampede, while hundreds of others from the outside struggled blindly forward in the effort to penetrate the crowd.

THE SECOND BULLET WAS PROBED FOR. The walls of the abdomen were opened, but the ball was not located. The incision was hastily closed, and after a brief and hasty consultation it was decided to remove the patient to the home of President Milburn. This was done, the ambulance being used for the purpose.

ANARCHISTS ARRESTED. CHICAGO, Sept. 6.—Six men were placed under arrest in this city tonight on the charge of being implicated in the plot to assassinate President McKinley. The men were all found in one house at the corner of St. Johns place and Zarron avenue. The arrests were made on information from the police officials of Buffalo, who said that the men were members of a society to which the assassin of the president belonged, and that they had knowledge of the plot.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 8.—The excitement of life and death, no man living can count upon the continuance of existence for any length of time. Among these exigencies are disease, accident, and the bullet of the assassin, which we have heard of in the past forty hours.

ONLY TEN YEARS. NEW YORK, Sept. 6.—President McKinley's recovery would mean that his would-be assassin could be confined in prison for ten years, the maximum penalty under the present code for New York state. Two methods of procedure could be adopted. The prisoner could be arraigned before a justice of Erie county and he could demand a retrial and would have the right to counsel and time to prepare his defense.

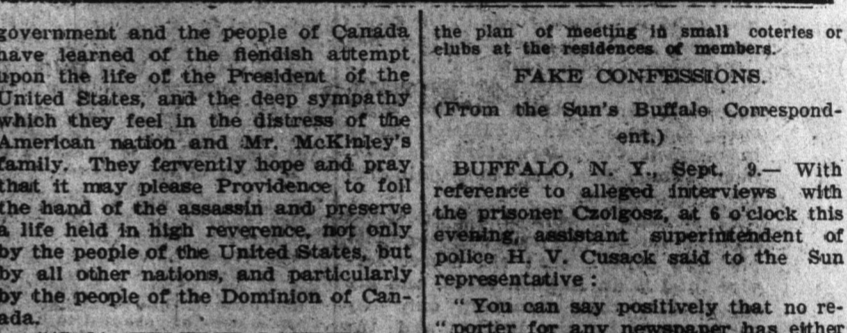
