Parla, Nov. 25.—General Joffre, commander-in-chief of the French forces, today issued the following general order to the army: "On November 25 France issues a great loan to provide funds for expenditure on the national defence. All the appeals she has made since the beginning of the war have had ready responses. This, because every-one knows the riches of France; because everyone has confidence in her dustinies, and a favorable termination of the struggle. "All these who subscribe fulfil the duty of good Frenchmen. They also will find their advantage in it. Whoever pays in 87.25 francs will receive an obligation bearing five france interest annually, an invest-ment in French bonds at five and seventy-three one-hundredths per cent.
