### The Mammoth Parade

The big feature of the day was the mammoth parade in the morning. The different organizations and firms in the city and from different communities in New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Maine vied with one another in producing something out of the ordinary and their efforts were entirely successful. The parade was a success in every way. The floats were numerous and finely gotten up. Many of the schemes of decoration were entirely original and the different bodies of men in the grand parade showed to great ad-

The show was certainly a credit to the originators of the affair and to the committees and organizations who were responsible for the carrying out of the schedule. No little praise can be given to Lieut.-Col. H. A. A. Powell, the grand marshall, for the excellent manner in which he planned the formation of the procession, using King street east on the south side for the formation of the fire departments, with independent floats on the north side of the street. London, Aug. 14.—The British government will offer prizes amounting to £64,000 for airplane competition in order to develop safer types of machines. Major-General J. E. B. 
