The Pastor conducts a Bible Class in connection with the Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor every Monday evening at eight, except the first Monday evening of each month, which is set apart for social intercourse and entertainment.

"The Life of Christ" is the subject of study in the class.

The Prayer Meetings in connection with the Christian Endeavor Society are held in connection with the Bible Class Monday evenings.

Regular Meetings of the **WOMAN'S FOREIGN MISSIONARY SOCIETY** are held the First Friday of each month at 3 P. M.

Regular Meetings of the **MCLAREN MISSION BAND** are held on the First and Third Friday of each month.

ORDINARY MEETINGS OF THE KIRK SESSION are held on the Second Tuesday of each month at 7:30 P. M.

THE REGULAR OFFERING FOR MISSIONS by means of Special Envelope is made on the First Sunday of each month.

All Church Funds are obtained by voluntary contributions

Packages of Envelopes for Weekly Offerings, and Special Envelopes for Monthly Contributions to Missions, may be obtained in the Vestibule before or after any regular Church service.

The Pastor will be glad to meet with any who wish to speak to him, at the close of either service on Sabbath, and will usually be found at Home every Friday after 4 P. M.

MISSIONARY, EDUCATIONAL AND BENEVOLENT FUNDS.

The General Assembly appoints collections to be made throughout the Church annually, for the following objects :—

1. **HOME MISSIONS.**—The Home Mission Field of our Church extends from ocean to ocean, but for purposes of administration is divided into the Eastern and Western Sections. The Western Section includes Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba, the North-west Territories and British Columbia. In this Section there are 332 Mission Fields and 920 preaching stations. Of these stations 265 are in Manitoba, 161 in the N. W. Territories, and 57 in British Columbia. During last year 272 missionaries, students and catechists were under appointment by the Committee, while a number more were appointed by the different Students' Missionary Societies. The amount asked for the current year for the Western Section is \$62,500. This congregation is responsible for \$400 toward the support of an Ordained Missionary in Surrey, B. C.

2. **AUGMENTATION.**—To assist weak congregations who are unable to give a salary of \$750 to enjoy the ministrations of a settled pastor. Congregations receiving aid from this Fund are required to contribute at the rate of at least \$4.50 per communicant for the support of their ministers. The number of congregations at present receiving aid is 147. Each year some of these augmented congregations become self-sustaining ; while as long as the Church continues to grow new ones will constantly be added to the list. Since the Fund was instituted in 1883, 199 augmented charges have become self-sustaining. The amount needed this year is \$32,287.

3. **FRENCH EVANGELIZATION.**—Missionaries, Colporteurs and Teachers are employed under the direction of the General Assembly's Committee in circulating the Scriptures and preaching the simple Gospel of Jesus Christ among the French-Canadians. A number of schools have been opened in different parts of the Province of Quebec. The Central Schools at Point aux Trembles have been enlarged and are filled with pupils, a good proportion of whom are of Roman Catholic parentage. The amount asked for the current year, including school and buildings at Point aux Trembles, is \$60,000.

4. **FOREIGN MISSIONS.**—For the support of missionaries in six fields : (1) Among the Indians in the North-west, we have ordained missionaries, lay teachers, male and female, and industrial schools partly supported by Government and partly from our Mission Funds. (2) In Trinidad, ordained missionaries and lady teachers ; there are a large number of schools, partly supported by the Government of the island and partly from the Foreign Mission Funds of our Church. The planters and English-speaking residents contribute liberally to our work in the island. (3) In Formosa, two ordained missionaries and a host of native pastors and teachers. (4) In Honan, six ordained missionaries, three doctors and a trained nurse. (5) In Central India, ordained missionaries, lady doctors and teachers, with a number of

native teachers in schools and college. (6) In New Hebrides, the oldest Mission of the Church, now largely provided for by the Australian Churches, three ordained missionaries.

To maintain the entire work over \$128,000 will be required from the Church East and West this year.

5. COLLEGES.—(1) Ordinary. Since the Common Fund, from which Knox, Queen's and Montreal received according to their respective needs, was abolished, the contributions of this congregation have been given chiefly to the Theological Department of Queen's University, though Knox is never forgotten. (2) Manitoba College :—This centre of the great Home Mission Field of the West still looks to the East for a large share of its support.

6. MINISTERS' WIDOWS AND ORPHANS FUND.—To provide small annuities for the widows and orphans of ministers who die in the service of the Church. Each minister connected with this Fund must contribute a stated amount annually.

7. AGED AND INFIRM MINISTERS' FUND.—An effort is being made to secure an endowment for this Fund. In the meantime \$15,000 is required for this year to enable the Committee to pay the small annuity of \$200.

For the above objects contributions are made on the first Sunday of each month in special envelopes provided for the purpose. If contributors wish they may indicate how their gifts are to be applied. The amount not specially designated will be apportioned by the Session according to the needs and claims of the various schemes.

As will be seen from the above statement the total contributions of the congregation during the year 1892 for Missionary, Educational and Benevolent purposes are \$1617.29. It is gratifying to note that this is slightly in advance of the amount given in 1891, when the liberality of the people rose far above any previous year.

But while the whole amount is greater than ever before, it must be noted that this is due to some gifts for special objects, and that the regular Monthly Offering is less than that for the previous year by \$30.00, being only \$972.65.

A number have contributed to Missions this year through the Monthly Offerings who never gave before, but a few who largely increased their subscriptions in 1891 considered it a special effort for that year only and fell back again to smaller amounts.

During the year it has been our privilege to receive a number into full communion with the Church upon profession of their faith in Jesus Christ, and to welcome some who have brought certificates from other congregations. But the number of removals during the year has been large. More certificates have been granted by the Session than have been received. A number of families have removed from the bounds of the congregation and an equal number have not come to take their place. This need not surprise us, however, as there are few towns in this part of Ontario where the loss sustained by the removal of families is not felt to a greater extent than among us.

A larger number than in any previous year have been removed from us by the hand of death. Many of our aged Christians have passed from Church fellowship on earth to be "forever with the Lord." But not with those who had lived out their full three score and ten or four score years as death satisfied—mothers in the prime of life, youth and maiden in the very flower of early manhood and womanhood, the infant of days, are among those we mourn. We trust that of all it can be said: "Asleep in Jesus, blessed sleep."

During the year we have had no special tokens of blessing and no special discouragements. We trust, however, that when "the books are

opened" the life and work of this congregation during 1892 will be found to have a definite place in the history of the Kingdom.

While we continue to keep the even tenor of our way, let us guard against luke-warmness and formality; let there be in all our services that freshness, that quiet enthusiasm which comes from continued personal intercourse with the living Christ.

Fourth Annual Report of the McLaren Mission Band.

During the past year there have been fifteen regular meetings of the McLaren Mission Band.

With forty-six names enrolled, there has been an average attendance of nineteen.

As a means of raising money, pennies and mite-boxes were distributed. The whole amount realized, together with the proceeds of our Annual Entertainment, was \$40.10. Besides this, in May we sent a box valued at \$11 to the Birtle school.

Meetings of the past year have been rendered interesting and instructive by our President teaching short lessons about the New Hebrides Missions, sometimes followed by brief papers on the work done there. Letters from missionaries have also been read, and the smaller children have taken part in the meetings by singing and reciting missionary selections.

SABBATH SCHOOL REPORT.

In reporting the work of the past year, we, the Teachers and Officers, desire to acknowledge with gratitude the loving-kindness of our Heavenly Father vouchsafed to us through another year.

The work has been continued with more or less encouragement during every Sabbath of the year.

The greatest source of encouragement to us is to see the pupils from among the comparatively young taking their stand for Christ.

During the year eight of the Sabbath School scholars have professed their faith in a personal Saviour and entered into full communion with the Church. This number is small when compared with the two previous years, but it must be remembered that a very large proportion of our older scholars are already communicants.

Another source of encouragement is the general good order that prevails in the school.

The Teachers meet once a month for conference and for giving attention to matters affecting the practical working of the School.

The School is supplied with a number of papers. Fifty-five copies of the Sunday School Times, suited for the teachers and older scholars, are distributed every Sabbath and intended to go into as many families with their healthful and instructive matter. A copy of the Westminster Teacher is also supplied to every teacher. Other papers are distributed among the younger portion of the school, such as Cottager & Artisan,

Gospel Light, Forward, Children's Record, Band of Hope, Child's Own Magazine, and the Sunbeam for the primary class.

A collection is taken every Sabbath. The first Sabbath of the month the offerings are devoted to Missions and the remaining Sabbaths to ordinary expenses of the school.
