—Several young men from

tending to go to farming on his own

account on the Pacific coast, and E.

C. Pelton and Leslie J. Cole, who

have been in the employ of Rhodes,

Curry & Co. Mr. Pelton, who has

been foreman for twelve years, was

presented with an address and a

looket and chain by the employ-

ment, and a gold watch by the firm,

and Mr. Cole received an address and

gold ring from the employes, while

the firm presented him with \$50 in

cash.

—The two-year-old colt, race re-

sulting from the colt, was recently

published in the Post, was trotted

on the driving park last Saturday

afternoon. The colts chosen to decide

together, but Sir Charles instantly

took the lead and increased his lead

to the finish, winning by four or five

rods in 1.34. The second heat was a

repetition of the first except that the

winner was Sir Charles by 1.39.

Whatever Sackville Grey may have

done elsewhere, he showed no signs

of being a trotter when on the track,

and his defeat was as complete as

the most ardent advocate of standard

breeding could desire. It is true

that the colt had not been to the

track for some time, but it is not

troubling in a sulky before, but it is

also true that he gave no indications

of being able to compete with Peter

Blair's progeny under any conditions,

although he might have done better

in a road race on the highway.

is a firm believer in standard breed-

ing and has bred a mare this season

to Dornbrook.
