GENERAL NEWS.
-The net debt of the United States
increased \$617,699.14 during Febru-
ary.
-Several sections of Manitoba are in-
fested with wolves, and a number of
cattle have been destroyed.
-It is said that there is a lighthouse
to every 14 miles of coast in England to
every 34 miles in Ireland and to every
39 miles in Scotland.
-By the falling of a wall in Chicago
on Thursday eight people were crushed
to death and several others badly in-
jured.
-The village of Paks in Hungary was
nearly swept out of existence by a flood
on the Danube last week. Over 16,000
persons are homeless.
-Rev. T. De Witt Talmage says that
in three years and four months he has
received from his church \$628 net. The
church is heavily in debt.
-A very wealthy Montreal widow,
Madame Victor Beaudry, has expressed
a desire to contribute \$100,000 to aid
in the establishment of a French univer-
sity from ecclesiastical control.
-It is probable that England will
order a mobilization to take place
shortly in the neighborhood of
Honolulu as a protest against the
annexation of the Hawaiian islands to
the United States.
-The Brazilian Government has or-
dered 70,000 small calibre rifles and 35-
000,000 cartridges from the Lowes,
small arm manufacturers in Berlin,
Germany. This fact is causing some
speculation in military circles.
-Forty-four guns are fired for a
national salute of the United States,
one for each state. The national flag
is saluted with twenty-one guns, the
president with twenty-one and the vice-
president with nineteen.
-The man who went out to milk, and
sat down on a bowlder in the pasture
and waited for the cow to back up to
him, was the oldest brother of the man
who kept a store and did not advertise,
because he reasoned that the purchas-
ing public would back up to him when
it wanted to buy something.

Biggest Gun in America.
On one of the big lathes in the great
workshops at the Washington Navy
yard is a gun that, when completed,
will be the largest in America.
It is a 13-inch breech-loader, 40 feet
long, 40 inches in diameter, and will
weigh 135,500 pounds, or 60 5-10
tons.
It will fire a projectile weighing 1,100
pounds, requiring a charge of powder
of 640 pounds to accomplish this pur-
pose. The velocity and terrible force
of the projectile will be estimated by
the fact that the shell can penetrate a
nickel steel plate 27 inches thick. The
gun can throw a shell from eleven
to twenty miles at a cost of \$1,000 a
throw.
Another gun being made at the
yard which possesses great force is an
eight-inch breech-loader, 28 7-10 feet
long, 28 7-10 inches in diameter and weighs
34,000 pounds or 15 2-10 tons.
This gun fires a shell, weighing 250
pounds, eight miles. The projectile
can smash to fragments a nickel steel
plate 16 1-10 inches thick.
It will be noticed that the guns are
unusually long. The reason for this is
that the powder used at present burns
slower than the old style, thereby re-
quiring greater length to exhaust the
full power of the charge and give great
impetus to the projectile.
"There has just been finished in the
yard a plant capable of making a 36-inch
gun, which will be the largest in the
world," said Lieut. Green of the navy.
"We are almost in condition to begin
on one of these big fellows, as soon as
an order is received from the ordnance
bureau."
There is no gunshop in America, prob-
ably not in the world, where the
manufacture of guns has such careful
and expert labor employed, with such
perfect machinery, as right here in the
Washington Navy yard. The yard has
the largest crane for lifting ever made,
having a capacity of 110 tons. The
force at the yard can complete an 8-inch
gun in 90 days and a 13-inch Columbi-
d in six months.

Cumberland Salt Springs.
ATTENTION BEING DRAWN TO THIS VALU-
ABLE PROPERTY.
The acquiring of a number of the
Cape Breton coal mines by the Whitney
Sydney has already given an impetus
to the development of other deposits
through the province. Attention is now
being directed to the valuable salt
springs property in Cumberland county,
owned by Mr. J. S. Hiceman, Col. C.
J. Stewart, Judge Townsend and
others, and its development will add
another evergreening industry which
will contribute to the wealth and prosperity
of the province. Some of the brines
springs on this valuable property were
advantageously worked some years ago,
when the facilities for traffic were meagre
compared with those of to-day.
Though merely surface brine was used,
its paying qualities were established,
and the product was so highly esteemed
by the best dairymen, far and near,
when they learned that its use added
materially to the selling price of their
butter. From the character of the sur-
face brine there is no telling how great
the saline per centage will be after
boiling away the surface water. There is
a hard and soft wood in the immediate
vicinity, with the Springhill coallies
within three miles of the salt property.
The course between it and the railway,
moreover, is a water level, and it is
stated that the brine actually flows
to the railway. In these days of pipe lines
either cheap or otherwise, the question
of economical conveyance is, therefore,
readily solved. When it is considered
that in the whole of Canada in 1889
there were only 13 salt producers, with
an output for the year of 32,832 tons,
and this almost entirely confined to
Huron, Bruce and Perth, in Ontario,
the ownership of the only brine springs
in the maritime provinces becomes
of enhanced value. There are no less
than seven springs on the property,
which embrace an area of about seven
acres.—Record.

The Sackville W. C. T. U. has much

A Wonderful W. C. T. U. Year.
NOTES FROM THE TEMPERANCE FIELD.
The year 1892 has been a wonderful
year of progress for the Canadian W. C.
T. U. The passing of the bill for Sci-
entific Temperance Instruction in two
legislatures in the Maritime Provinces,
and the appearance of a woman before
the bar of the House to plead for this
most important measure. The plebiscite
in Manitoba, with which the W. C. T.
U. has much to do. The woman's de-
putation to Premier Abbott at Ottawa,
and the expression of sympathy with
women's enfranchisement. The passing
of the bill in the Ontario House for
the prohibition of the sale of narcotics
to minors, the W. C. T. U. having given
an advice and assistance to the framing
thereof. The cordial reception given the
Quebec Provincial W. C. T. U. by dig-
nities of the Roman Catholic Church,
British Columbia is solid work for tem-
perance. All this, with the steady every
day hand-to-hand fight, will surely tell.
The department of Scientific Temper-
ance instruction in National W. C. T.
U. under the supervision of Mrs.
Mary B. Hunt, Massachusetts, con-
tinues its important work with never
ceasing vigilance. Legislation has been
secured, making the study of the nature
and effects of alcoholic drinks and other
narcotics, in connection with the laws of
hygiene and physiology, compulsory for
all pupils in the public schools in thirty-
six states and all the territories, includ-
ing the district of Columbia and in all
military and naval academies and Indian
and colored schools. Mississippi is the
last state won for this education during
the past twelve months. Hopes are
entertained of securing the adoption of
this law by three or four more states
during the present year.
The receipts of W. C. T. U. Coffee
House at Bozeman, Montana, were four
thousand dollars during the year 1892.
After years of prohibition in Kansas,
the number of convicts in the States
prison has fallen off sixty percent.
The next World's W. C. T. U. Con-
vention will be held in Chicago, im-
mediately following the National W.
C. T. U. Convention in October. Prom-
inent speakers from all countries will
address the meetings which will be truly
cosmopolitan.

Poultry Notes.
The following rules, says an ex-
cellent, should be followed in select-
ing eggs for hatching purposes: 1.
Have the eggs of normal size and uni-
form, avoiding large or small eggs,
and also those that are not smooth
and free from excrescences. 2. Aim
to secure eggs from certain hens that
are mated with a male of your selec-
tion. 3. Collect the eggs several times
a day, during very cold weather, in
order to avoid having them become
chilled. 4. Wash the eggs and free
them from dirt before placing them in
the nest. 5. Give the hen only ten
eggs in winter. 6. Make the nest
in a warm, quiet and secluded place.
Soft marsh and loamy vegetables
should be sated, as if intended for
the family table, when given to the
hens. If this is done they will want-
er with them, and should have one
pure and clean at least three times a
day, as they should when fed whole
grain.
A hatched laying hens produce an
egg shell about 137 pounds of chalk
or limestone annually, and require its
equivalent in lime in their food in
some form. Wheat bran contains
about 1 1/2 pounds, and whole wheat
about 2 1/2 pounds of lime in 100, while
clever hay contains nearly 20 pounds
in 1000, and green clover a little less
than five pounds. It is therefore de-
sirable to supplement the grain feed
with oyster shells, unless they can be
net in their gravel or in some other
way.
A little oatmeal at the morning or
noon feed about once a week keeps
the bowels active, and makes the
glossy plumage that is often such a
marked feature in the prize birds at
the poultry shows.
The farmer who has a bit of marshy
land near his house where the grass is
not of much value for cattle feeding,
may do well to enclose it with a
fence and put geese there. They like
such feed, and are profitable poultry
when rightly managed. A small yard
to themselves and feed carried to
them is better than allowing them to
roam.

MARSH MATTERS.

At the meeting of marsh proprietors at Middle Sackville on Monday steps were taken to provide remedial legislation for the irregularities which have for years past presented themselves to the commissioners and prevented the proper administration of affairs.

The exports for January last were \$4,975,152 against \$15,643,162 for January, 1892. The imports were \$9,160,000 against \$7,256,337 for January, 1892. The comparative figures for the seven months of the fiscal year are for exports, \$29,879,232; imports, \$22,483,137; duty collected, \$12,229,776. For 1891-92 the figures are: Exports, \$77,382,211; imports, \$63,889,625; duty collected, \$18,071,721. The increase for the present fiscal year is, therefore, \$1,850,671 in exports, \$5,583,422 in imports, and \$1,338,005 in duty collected.

There are a number of interesting features in the report of Messrs. Dowdall Bros., which has just come to hand. During last year, 1,182,999 cwt. of butter, valued at \$11,965,284, and 1,305,329 cwt. of cheese, valued at \$23,712,884, were imported into Great Britain. It will be seen that the margarine imports are rather more than twice the quantity of butter imported, but only about one-third of the value. In Great Britain there are now 23 margarine factories, but Holland still stands at the head of the list as the largest margarine manufacturing country in Europe. In their butter exports to England the following countries show a decline: Denmark, Sweden, Holland and the United States, while Canada, France and Germany shows as steady a tendency toward an increase. To the end of 1892 the quantity of butter imported from Ireland 26 co-operative farming creameries. Of butter, bacon, hams, eggs and poultry, the imports were valued, for the year, in round numbers at \$40,000,000 sterling.
