Philadelphia, March 28.—A disastrous wreck occurred on the Reading Railroad, two miles from Ashland, Pa., by which three men were killed and as many injured.

Binghamton, N. Y., March 28.—Passenger train No. 4, on the Delaware and Hudson Railway, which left this city at 12:40 p.m. yesterday for Albany, crashed into accommodation train No. 17 about a mile east of Wellsbridge. Engineer Frank White, of train No. 4, had an arm broken, and Fireman Fred Pierce was caught between the engine and tender and crushed to death. Engineer William Lagrange and Fireman Fred Cooper, of train No. 17, were both injured, the former, perhaps, fatally. The wreck took fire and several freight cars were burned. A steel gun of the largest caliber costs about \$100,000. The ordnance of our modern navy is therefore one of the most coatly items for which Congress is expected to display a patriotic generosity. NEWFOUNDLAND AFFAIRS.

The Situation Satisfies Frenchmen—Comments by the London Times.

London, March 28.—The Journal Des Debates, of Paris, in an article on the Newfoundland question, expresses satisfaction with the convention recently concluded. It regards the presence of Queen Victoria and Lord Salisbury in France as an excellent symptom of the situation. England, it says, has acted perfectly correct towards France, but has displayed remarkable weakness in dealing with Newfoundland. Commenting on the calls of the British press to suppress the Utreecht treaty, the Journal reminds them that the same treaty gave Gibraltar to England. The Journal says France will relinquish none of her rights.

The Times, commenting on the foregoing, warns France that England does not intend to drag on her colonies, and reminds Newfoundland that foreign opinion asks whether she has any desire to become a French colony.
