[Special to the ADVERTISER.] OTTAWA, June 22. - The House has been sitting since 11 o'clock this morning with sitting since II o'clock this morning with midday and 6 o'clock recesses. Such prog-ress has been made in committee with the Redistribution Bill that it will most likely be disposed of to-mrrow. Most of its objectionable features so far as Quebec concerned have been modified as a result of the opposition of the Liberals and an of the opposition of the Liberals and an arrangement arrived at between the two sides of the House during the 6 o'clock recess. The Queber re-arrangement has occupied nearly all of to-day's sessions but the unimportant changes in Neva Scotia, Manitoba and British Columbia were passed by the committee. The proposal of Col. Denison that West Toronto be divided into two divisions was voted down as was also ronto be given six members instead of four. The result in Quebec is briefly stated as follows: St. Johns (Liberal) and Iberville (Liberal) are united, Napierville (Liberal) and La Prairie (Conservative) are united, Vercheres (Liberal) and Chambly (Liberal) are united, St. Maurice (Conservative) and Three Rivers (Conservative) are united. These unions provide the four extra members required for Montreal, Hochelaga and Ottawa county. What the bill proposed was that Vercheres and Napierville, instead of being united as now, should be distributed among the surrounding constituencies. In the carrying out of this plan much of the gerrymandering was done. By the compromise by which these counties are united with adjacent counties the gerrymander is modified, but a number of counties represented by Conservatives (Liberal) are united. 

OTTAWA, June 22.—The House has been sitting since II o'clock this morning with midday and 6 o'clock recesses. Such progress has been made in committee with the Redistribution Bill that it will most likely be disposed of to-merrow. Most of its objectionable features so far as Quebec is concerned have been modified as a result of the opposition of the Liberals and an arrangement arrived at between the two sides of the House during the 6 o'clock recess.

The Onebec re-arrangement has occupied. The Quebec re-arrangement has occupied nearly all of to-day's sessions but the unimportant changes in Nova Scotia, Manitoba and British Columbia were passed by important changes in Neva Scotia, Manitoba and British Columbia were passed by the committee. The proposal of Col. Denison that West Toronto be divided into two divisions was voted down as was also an amendment by Mr. Corkburn that Toronto be given six members instead of four. The result in Quebee is briefly stated as follows: St. Johns (Liberal) and Jiberville (Liberal) are united, Napierville (Liberal) and are united, Napierville (Liberal) and La Prairie (Conservative) are united. Vercheres (Liberal) and Chambly (Liberal) are united, St. Maurice (Conservative) and Three Rivers (Conservative) are united. These unions provide the four extra members required for Montreal, Hocheiaga and Ottawa county. What the bill proposed was that Vercheres and Napierville, instead of being united as now, should be distributed among the surrounding constituencies. Diocesan Lay Helpers' Association in Engand and much valuable information had been received. Notice had been given to consider whether canon 9 on lay readers was adequate to the present needs and practice of the church in the diocese.

The report was received.



ALONG THE RAILWAY LINES.

The Dudley Dynograph Car-A Marvel-ous Piece of Mechanism,

ous Piece of Mechanism.

New York Times: The Dudley dynograph car is about to start on its annual summer inspection tour over several of the eastern railroads. The car is the property of P. H. Dudley, and on this trip will start out with many added improvements. For months Mr. Dudley has been working hard to overcome all obstacles which have confronted him on former trips, and this time he says he has the mechanism of the car in almost perfect order. Everything has been so arranged in the car by the owner and inventor that the exact conditions of the rails and roadbed, the motion of the car, speed, etc., will new be registered on a long roll of paper asthe car passes over the rails. The car is now at the Grand Central Station, and yesterday Mr. Dudley thoroughly explained its workings to a reporter for the Tribune. The car was built expressively for Mr. Dudley, and it is the home of the inventor and his wife as well as his workshop.

is the home of the inventor and his wife as well as his workshop.

The car is 40 feet long, and the instrument which records the defectain the rails, roadbed and the other things is situated in one end of the car. The instrument is worked by electricity and by the movement of the whoels of the car. The records are made with a system of littleglass tubes filled with red ink, and tapering to fine, pen-like points, which will trace on paper, as the car moves along at any rate of speed, anything that is desirable to know about the condition of the rails and roadbed. The paper used is about 24 inches wide, and it passes from one roller to another, both the rollers moving in connection with the wheels of the car. A strip of this paper eight feet long is used to each mile traversed, and the is used to each mile traversed, and the points of the little glass tubes mark on the paper the alignment of each rail, the de-gree of curvature as well as the elevation of gree of curvature as well as the elevation of each cure, the speed at which the car is moving, and the condition of the surface of the rails. Every variation of one thirty-second of an inch an over is recorded. In connection with the registering and tracing instrument in the car is a contrivance which automatically ejects a drop of blue paint unon each joint in the track where the end of one rail is one-sixteenth of an inch or more out of gar.

The dynograph car goes over the different systems behind a special engine, but does not travel faster than twenty miles an hour. Better results are obtained, Mr. Dudley says, when the car does not move at a greater speed. Along the route traversed by the car printed slips of paper explaining the meaning of the blue marks on the rails are handed to the foreman of the section gangs, and they immediately start out to repair the defects. This summer Mr. Dudley will go with his car over the Lake Shore Road, the New York Central, the Boston and Albany, the Old

Mr. Dudley will live aboard the car during his trip. He has fitted up comfortable quarters, and his wife will go with him. In the car are a well-equipped kitchen, library and a sitting-room, in which Mrs. Dudley has her plane.

The number of employes of this class was 153,235, and out of this number there occurred during the year 1,459 deaths and 13,172 injuries due to some form of railway accident. This means one death for every 105 and one injury for every 12 men engaged in handling trains. In no other employment, not even in mining, which is a most dangerous occupation, can such results be shown. The total number killed in coupling and uncoupling cars was 369 and the number injured was 7,842; while the total number killed in falling from trains and engines was 561 and the total number injured was 2,363. That is to say, 37,94 per cent, of the total number of deaths and 45.57 per cent, of the total number of injuries sustained by railway employes resulted while

RECIPROCITY AND DISCRIMINATION The Message of President Harrison

to the United States Congress.

Canal Tolls Discrimination and Rebates May Lead to Further Trouble.

A Washington dispatch says:
The Senate passed a resolution in February last to the effect that the President be requested, if, in his opinion, not incompatible with the public interests, to inform the Senate of the proceedings recently had with the representatives of the Dominion of Canada and of the British Government as to arrangements for reciprocal trade be-tween Canada and the United States. In

tween Canada and the United States. In response thereto President Harrison to-day submitted the following information:

THE PRESIDENT'S REPLY.

On the 15th day of April last, the Secretary of State submitted to me a report, which is herewith transmitted. Shortly after the report came into my possession I was advised by the Secretary that the British Minister at this capital had informed him that the Canadian Government desired a further conference on the subject

formed him that the Canadian Government desired a further conference on the subject of the discriminating canal tolls of which this country has complained. This information was accompanied by the suggestion that a response to the resolution of the Senate might properly be delayed until this futher conference was held.

On the 3rd inst., the British Minister, in connection with Hon. Mackenzie Bowell and Hon. George E. Foster, members of the Canadian Ministry, were received by the Secretary of State, and a further conference took place. In both of the conference roferred to, Hon. John W. Foster, at the request of the Secretary of State, appeared with him on behalf of this Government, and the report of the latter conference was submitted to me on the 6th inst.

ME FOSTER'S LETTER.

The correspondence is accompanied by a letter from Secretary Biaine under date of April 15 which gives the details of the negotiations up to that time and from which the President got the points for his message to the Senate. A letter from John W. Foster, under date of June 8, covers the details of the last conference, which was interrupted by the resignation of Mr. Blaine. After a recital of what led up to the second conference, Mr. Foster says in substance: "The Canadian commissioners opened the

"The Canadian commissioners opened the conference by stating that there seemed to exist some misunderstanding as to the conclusions resched at the conference of February last respecting the Canadian canal tolls. They had been informed that the American conferees understood that an assurance had been given that the discrimination which they alleged had been created against American ports and lines of created against American ports and lines of discrimination which they alleged had been created against American ports and lines of transportation by reason of the Montreal rebate was to be removed. This did not conform to their understanding, as all the assurance they intended to give was that the complaint of the Government of the United States should be taken into consideration by the Canadian Ministry on their return to Ottawa."

ON EQUAL TERMS.

They contended that the Canadian canals were open to citizens of the United States on exactly the same terms as to British

The Secretary of State, in reply, recognized the correctness of the claim of the commissioners that the canals were open to citizens and subjects of the two countries alike, but he urged that the discrimination which was against American ports and lines of transportation to the seaboard, was in plain violation of article 27 of the treaty, and that the conduct of Canada was in marked and unfavorable contrast to that of the United States, which gave free transit through its canals and on the great lakes to all commerce without regard to the lakes to all commerce without regard to the route over which it passed to the sea.

AT A convention held yesterday Hon. Edward Blake was chosen Home Rule candidate for South Longford, Ireland. It is probable that Mr. Blake will be returned by acclamation. The Home Rule majority is about 3,000 in a total vote of 3,300.

THE BULLETIN, the organ of the American Protective Tariff League, now makes the following proclamation: "Wages will be reduced and advanced from time to time in obedience to laws beyond the power of man to control, no matter what kind of tariff we may have, just as the price of beef will be high one year and low the next." This is an absolutely true statement. But it plays ducks and drakes with the assertion, too often heard in political campaigns, that high tariffs on imports increase wages. They not only do not increase the actual wage of the worker, but they seriously decrease its purchasing power.

A WRITER in the North American Review for July makes this strong and sensible denunciation of the custom of wearing mourning. The writer well argues that the custom is outworn; it is an anachron ism in the nineteenth century. It is unchristian; it clouds the spiritual signficance of the resurrection with the ever present expression of temporal loss. It is cruel; it forces helpless and innocent people into action which entails privation and unnecessary suffering. It is untruthful; it makes false outward show of changes in sentiment. And it is essentially vulgar; for it presses private affairs upon public notice; it thrusts claims of fashion and frivolity upon a time which most greatly moves the heights and depths of being; and it forces its superficial worldliness into the fiercest threes which can ever rend human nature. Why then do we still wear mourning?

At an early hour this morning Grover ated without a ballot. Cieveland was nominated as the Democratic candidate for the United States Presidency. On the first ballot, the Chicago convention gave the ex-President seventeen more votes than were necessary to a choice, two-thirds of the total vote being re-

quired. The selection of Cleveland is a strong testimony to the power of that statesman as a leader. Vithout intrigue, without agitation or organization of any kind on his part, Cleveland is for the third time selected as the representative of the Democracy in the conflict for national pres-tige. There was an organized opposition to him in New York because he failed to carry that pivotal State in 1888, and thus lost the Presidency; but it has been recognized that it was not Cleveland's blame, but discansion within the ranks that caused the defection. Now, while Tammany has protested against and worked to prevent Cleveland's renomination, its leaders have promised to support the ticket, and it is probable that they will do so. They will doubtless profit by the example of the Republicans, who had a very bitter fight over

the renomination of Harrison, but are now trying to excel each other in the art of get-

ting together in brotherly unity. It speaks well for the United States that the respective parties have put men at the head of their tickets that are of unex-ceptionable private character. Cleveland and Harrison differ, and differ widely, in their views regarding the details of government, but as unprejudiced outsiders we readily concede that they hold their views honestly. They are not the candidates of what is known as "the machine." They are not put up to be Democrat or Republican without regard to the consistency of their public actions. In a very arge degree, the two men are representatives of the best elements in each of the espective divisions of the United States people, and a strong, vigorous campaign will be the result. It will be an educative conflict beyond a doubt. On the great dividing issue the two men and their supporters are wide apart. The Republicans indorse the McKinley Bill, with all its vexatious and restrictive provisions. The Democrats, despite a "straddle" report on the taxation question, take strong ground in favor of tariff reduction, and ffirm that taxes should only be imposed for revenue, not for the benefit of classes

Thus the dividing lines are well defined. It would be idle to prophesy as to the esult. It always is idle to speculate as to the outcome of United States elections, for as often as not it is the unexpected that happens. THE RIGHT TO ARGUE FREELY In a recent issue we alluded to a rumo that Mr. Myers, county crown attorney of Dufferin (not Wellington, as was stated), had been asked by Sir Oliver Mowat to resign his office because of public advocacy of Continental Union. A published correspondence shows the rumor to be founded on fact. Mr. Myers, however, has declined to resign, holding that he would thus become a party to his own condemnation. The onus of dismissal, if dismissal it is to be, is thus laid on Mr. Mowat.

The Toronto Mail does not agree with Sir Oliver, holding that "the more advanced portion of the civilized world, comprising the communities in one of which it is our happiness to live, has now embraced in its fullest extent the doctrine of liberty of opinion. The world has been brought through much tribulation the final conclusion that truth is her own best guardian, and that in respect to all questions alike, religious political or social, our only security for a right decision is perfect freedom of discussion. * * Sir Oliver must know that the Canadian people will not suffer a great question, when once it has been raised, to be disposed of otherwise than by fair discussion, and that the only way they can be ultimately induced to discard and detest the idea of political change is to convince them that they are better governed and

happier as they are."
So far the Toronto Mail. The Toronto Globe takes ground on the main principle not very different from the Mail. "It is no treason," as Sir John Thompson has recently said, "for a person to champion that or any other radical change so long as he proposes to bring it about by constitutional means." But the Globe takes the point that what Mr. Myers might do in the way of advocacy with pro-priety as a private citizen he should not be llowed to do as a public official.

It must be admitted that there is some thing in this point, especially if it is enforced all along the line. But why Col. 

With the advent of the hot summer days the old discussion as to the best drink for sustaining the energies of laborers under prolonged efforts in the open air has been revived. Farmers and other employers have for a long time pianed their faith to beer as a beverage for their workmen, but oatmeal has for the last few years been rapidly growing in favor, and apparently with just cause.

A strong support to the advocates of oatmeal has been given by a recent experience on the occasion of the conversion of the broad gauge which has been retained so deggedly by the Great Western Railway Company in England to the narrow gauge now adopted universally in that country. The conversion had to be effected with the utmost dispatch, and the length of line to be transformed was over 200 miles. Fire

Five thousand men worked two successive days of seventeen hours each, with only short intervals for meals. VIENNA, June 22.—The exhibitions of the Georgia Magnet, who will in future perform as Miss Anneta Astoria, have broken down

Georgia Magnet, who will in future perform as Miss Anneta Astoria, have broken down after a series of riotous disturbances unprecedented in the history of entertainments in this country.

She made her debut in this city some time ago, and was received by a distinguished audience. Many members of the aristocracy were present, and Prof. Krafft-Ebing, of the Vienna University, made her a special study. In an interview he said that he had noticed that the young woman, although possessed of unusual muscle, never attempted a trick without first placing her antagonist in the most disadvantageous position. He showed how she did her feat of holding up a billiard sue despite the combined efforts of several men to lower it. After several successful performances, a party of young men applied on the stage what the professor had taught them, and the result was a partial failure of the Georgia Magnet's feat. The audience hooted and yelled, and the police had to be called in to preserve order. From Vienna the young woman went to Graz. There her exhibitions were the scenes of the most riotous demonstrations. Several young athletes appeared on the stage to test her so-called magnetism, and rofused to take the disadvantageous positions which her manager tried to give them. The first two sections of the bill define "options" and "futures;" the third names as the articles to which they shall relate as "cotton, hops, wheat, corn, cats, rye, barley, grass seed, flaxseed, pork and other edible products of swine," and the fourth imposes a license of \$1,000 on dealers in options and futures and a tax of 5 cents on each pound of cotton, hops, pork, lard, bacon and other edible products of swine, and 20 cents a bushel on each bushel of the other articles which are the subject of any "options" or "futures" contract which such dealer, as vendor, shall make either in his own behalf or on behalf of others.


