Third Day's Session of the Royal Council.

The Proposed Plebiscite Strongly Indorsed.

They Have No Use for the Royal Commission-Election of Officers.

GALT, Ont., Feb. 23.—At the third day's session of the Royal Council of Templars of Temperance a motion was carried that this Grand Council learns with great satisfaction that petitions to the Local Legislature are being placed in circulation asking that body to enact a law prohibiting the traffic in intoxicating liquors in this Province, and instructs the executive committee to forward to the utnost of their ability the circulation of such petitions among the select councils and members of the order. A motion was catried that this Grand Council desires to place on record its extreme disastisfaction with the appointment, parsonnel and conduct of the troyal commission on the liquor traffic. Although the appointment of the commission was generally regarded as a political move to stave off for a few years the direct issue upon the question of prohibition, there was a hope that inquiry would be prosecuted in a fair and able manner. This Grand Council regrets to express the opinion that a great mass of the matter gathered by the commission is utterly valueless, and the general character of the inquiry absolutely farcical.

In view of this opinion we urge the pressing of the straight issue of prohibition upon politicans and Parliament immediately and at every opportunity.

Chaplain McCabe has a characteristic letter in the last number of the "Christian Advocate" concerning the relative progress of the Roman Catholic Church and the Methodist Episcopal Church, in which he shows that the total income of the Roman Catholic Propaganda in 1891, with all the world to collect from, was \$1,271,947. The income of the Missionary Society of the Methodist Episcopal Church for 1892 was \$1,269,483. Of that sum only \$10,000 came from foreign lands. An increase of \$3,000, and the Methodist Missionary Society will pass the Roman Propaganda. PASS THE "POI!"

The Staple Food of the Kanakas, and

The Staple Food of the Kanakas, and Hew it is Prepared.

The famous staple food of the Hawaiian Islands, "poi," still holds its supremacy over all other edibles. Its origin is so ancient that it is forgotten. It is the product of a species of the caladium lily, called taro, and is grown like rice, in the mud.

duct of a species of the caladium lily, called taro, and Is grown like rice, in the mud.

When mature the root gets to be enormously large, and when broken apart in its raw state it presents a mottled appearance, purple and white, and is very toothesome indeed. The leaf, too, is utilized and makes excellent greens for the table. The root is usually first cooked and the skin clipped off. After the inner portion is broken into fragments it is known to local commerce as "pai-ai." The process of reducing this to the edible state is simple. It is placed on a broad, smooth surface, usually a plank of stone slightly hollowed, and then with a stone mallet the mass is beaten into a thick paste. Another reduction by the application of water brings it to dough-like consistency that resembles gray mush, and this is "poi."

When ready for the table it is served in calabashes, and is caten with this plain, unvarnished fingers. Some like their "poi" thick, so that a sufficient mouthful can be gathered upon one finger; others prefer it thin. It goes, therefore, by the name of one-finger, two-finger, or three-finger "poi," according to its consistency.



IRON AND BONUSES.

Though the Dominion Government has een memorialized by many representative bodies to reduce the enormous duty on pig iron it has resolutely refused to do so. The present high duties are a distinct injury to every manufacturer of goods into which iron enters as a constituent, because it compels him to charge higher prices for his products than would be necessary could he obtain his raw material free. Thus demand is lessened and fewer workmen employed. But the tax does not press so heavily upon the manufacturer as it does upon his consumers, for the reason that the manufacturer can unload a great portion of the burden on those who are compelled to buy his goods.

We are not surprised, therefore, to find both the farmers, who form the great mass of the consumers, and the manufacturers united in the demand that the Tupper tax on iron shall be materially reduced now. These men have long since reached the conclusion that the duties are vexatious and unjustly oppressive, and they do not see the propriety of dallying longer with them as Finance Minister Foster proposes.

The farmers will be heard at Ottawa before the session is over, and so will the progressive manufacturers, and it will be well for Mr. Foster if he heeds their complaints, and provides for a radical reduc-tion of the duties. Already the Board of Trade in Toronto has taken action. It is not prepared to go as far as representative farmers' organizations have gone, but it will send a deputation to Ottawa to urge the reduction of duties in bar, hoop and sheet iron so as to enable the manufacturers of Canada "to sell at lower prices in the home market and extend their foreign trade." This is a confession that every reduction in duty on necessaries of life means a lowering in the price to the consumer and an extension of trade in the markets of the world that farmers and wage-earners will not be slow to note. But the Toronto Board of Trade will further urge that a further bounty be given to the producers of pig iron, without any reduction in the present duty. The avowed object of this change is to encourage the development of iron mines and the erection of furnaces in

Canada. In the interest of the great mass of taxpayers of Canada we protest against any such increased taxation. At the present time the consumers of this country are taxed \$4 50 on every ton of iron which they import. The Canadian mine-owners are also paid, out of the public purse, \$2 of a bonus on every ton of pig iron that they produce. Is it any wonder that our farmers and wage-earners comp ain of the heavy taxes that they have to pay to help along men that can well afford to be self-supporting, but who are always clamoring for fiscal props and ready to have the public treasury

exploited in their behalf. Instead of being increased, the duties and bonus now paid on pig iron by the Canadian people should be abolished or decreased by two-thirds. Our experience has been that the man who is engaged in a profitable business will develop it, and make it pay without asking that his fellows shall be taxed for his benefit, and we are shall be taxed for his benefit, and was convinced that if our iron deposits are of good quality, they will be worked up in good quality, they will be worked up in due course as legitimate commercial undertakings. But what right has the Dominion Government, at the bidding of a jew capitalists, to tax the whole people for their benefit? We are told that the bonus is to encourage mining. But mining is a comparatively small industry. If we are to have the bonus system, let us encourage the men who need the bonus most, and pay the greater portion of the taxes. Who ever suggests that the farmer shall be paid by Government a bonus of 10 cents a bushel for his wheat or barley, or \$1 a hundred on his cattle, or 2 cents a dozen on his eggs? And if the farmer were bonused, as he is not likely to be, who would deny the right of the wage-earner to have a Government bonus added to his have a Government bonus added to his weekly wage? Professor Newcomb reported that his estimate of the persons subject to foreign competition was 905,585, or 52-10 per cent. of the industrial population, concluding with the observation: "If trade were entirely free, the fraction of our industrial population injuriously subject to foreign competition would not exceed 7 per cent." In other words, 93 per cent. of the people are taxed to protect and enrich 7 per cent.

LIBERTY IN LACED BOOTS.

Proposition to Modernize the Goddess of Liberty.

Washington, Feb. 23.—Mr. Butler, of Iowa, has introduced in the House (by request) a bill to establish a truer figure of American constitutional liberty, and another to amend the great seal of the United

other to amend the great seal of the United States.

The first provides that after July 4 next the Goddess of Liberty shall be represented by a young woman of full stature, with mature development and proportions, wearing high laced boots, reaching midway between the ankle and knee; hose reaching to the thigh; short skirts, reaching downward to a point just above the knee; closefiting bodice and sleeves to the elbow; and a cap molded from a blue pansy bud. She is to bear for arms, at her left hip, in place of a staff, and lightly supported over her aight shoulder a ponholder extended, and on her breast, instead of a shield, an American ballot in black and white.


