as science and art everywhere. Science
smoothes the ground for art to follow,
never antagonistic, ever in unison."

"We must ever guard against the tendency to separate the science of art and
medicine. The more advanced methods of
observation, the carefulness and delicacy of
manipulation requisite in handling scientific
apparatus, render it in a measure imperative that one who adopts the scientific fields
of labor must withdraw from active practice.

"The physiologist must not only thoroughly understand the most sensitive electrical
apparatus and electrical law, but he must
be also a mechanic, a careful dissector and
a man of marked ingenuity. Truly, as
Oliver Wendell Holmes said, the greatest,
broadest, the most mutual and attractive of
sciences is physiology.

TRAIN ROBBERY.

A bill intended to put a stop to the rascally business of holding up and robbing trains has been introduced into the United States House of Representatives by Mr Caldwell, of Ohio. It provides that any person who displaces or removes a railway witch, "or does anything whereby a loca notive, car, or train of cars, is stopped obstructed or injured, with intent to rob or injure the persons or property passing over any railroad engaged in interstate com nerce, and where, in consequence of such acts, any person is killed, shall be guilty of murder." If the attempt does not result in murder the guilty person shall be imprisoned at hard labor for from one to twenty years. The same penalty is made throwing anything against a train or caus-ing anything to fall upon it, with intent to alagous to it in the Criminal Code of Canada, but that is because, so far, express robberies have been rare in this country The penalty in the case of attempted train nobbery with violence should be more severe than that stipulated. As in the case of the robber who is arrested while break. ing into a house, and who is found to have on his person murderous weapons, so in the case of car robbers arrested with loaded rearms in their possession, we would have the penalty of imprisonment for life imposed. If scoundrels of this description do not murder, it is not because they have not murder in their hearts. They do not carry life-taking weapons for nothing. If they are thwarted in their aims, they mean to kill. Why not put them where they will not have the opportunity?




