### GRAIN CONTRACTS VALID

U. S. Court G'ves Important Decision as to Future Deliveries

St. Paul, Nov. 9 .- The United St. court of appeals handed down a decis upholding the validity of contracts the purchase and sale of grain for fute delivery, as it is practiced by the Chica b Board of Trade and the Merchants' Exchange, of St. Louis. The case is that of Thomas A. Cleage, jun., appellee, against W. H. Laidley and others.

Cleage, jun., dealt in about 14,000,000 bushels of grain, and less than 2 per cent was delivered. He testified that he did not intend to deliver or to receive any grain under his contracts, unless forced to do so in order to prevent his contracts being closed out under the rules of the board or the exchange. The brokers to whom he became indebted filed a creditor's petition in bankruptcy, upon which Cleage was adjudged to be a bankrupt. 

## STEPS TO AVERT A TARIFF WAR

With the Kaiser's Representatives.

Washington, Nov. 9. - The tariff day on the Hamilton city Mnes. The experts who sailed for Germany today go as missionaries of conciliation. As their instructions say: "For the purpose of conferring with experts designated by the German Government, with a view to reaching a common understanding as to all the facts regarding the tariffs of the United States and Germany material and relevant to the trade relations between the two countries, so that the German experts will fully understand the necessities, conditions and attitude of the American people as affecting the American tariff, and the American experts shall fully understand the necessities, conditions and attitude of the German people as

affecting the German tariff." The trade situation with Germany is very delicate. A year or more ago the Reichstag advanced the duties upon imports of all kinds, particularly agricultural products, to prohibitive rates. The German foreign office then made reciprocity treaties with Russia, Austria, Hungary, Italy and other countries, under which, by mutual concessions, the producers of those countries were given the minimum duties upon wheat and other breadstuffs, meats. provisions of all kinds, fruits, vegetables and other articles of food which are exported from the United States to Germany in larger quantities than from any other country. If the law was strictly enforced the duties on food products imported into Germany from the United States would be more than double those imposed upon similar articles from Russia, Austria, Hungary, Italy and other countries. To show its goodwill toward the United States the German Government made a very generous concession by agreeing to extend the same minimum rates to our products for one year, so that the trade between the two countries might not be disturbed, while an opportunity was given to negotiate a permanent ar-

rangement. This concession expires June 30, 1907. when, if a reciprocity treaty is not concluded in the meantime, the maximum duties will be imposed upon all imports into Germany from this country. These maximum duties are very mich higher than those now being paid -in some cases double, in other cases 50 and 60 and 75 per cent higher.


