

#### LABOR LEGISLATION IN NEW ZEALAND

New Zealand like its neighbor colony, Australia, has of late years been experimenting a good deal with labor

First of all, New Zealand tested a long-winded Oppositionists. right to strike after their grievances had been submitted to a court of arbitration In 1903 this law was amended by withdrawing the right to strike, and the workers claim that since then they have met with little else but rewerses in the arbitration court, the result being numerous strikes, notwithstanding their prohibition by the law. It is admitted that compulsory arbitra-

A new bill is now before the colonial parliament which completely remodels the present law, and has called forth the strong denunciation of organized labor, which demands the restoration of the law in force prior to 1903. The proposed new law imposes a penalty of £10 on strikers, with a further penalty of £1 for every week the strike continues. In addition to this there is provision for a penalty of £200 for a lockout, and one of £50 for every week during which it continues. Special penalties are provided for strikers whose refusal to work involves danger to the public health or safety, such as ways and tramways. Fines for

For the present conciliation boards councils of conciliation are substituted, composed of a magistrate and assessors from the industry concerned. In the event of the council's failure to settle a dispute, it may state a case for the arbitration court, which is to have added to it assessors engaged in the industry concerned, but not parties to the dispute. The court is empowered to fix a "needs" wage, I. e., such as workers of average skill and energy for work done over and above the earning capacity of the average. This measure is likely to bring strong

Sixty-five mempers shall continue to be the representation, and the number of people living within the old boundary divided in by sixty-five shall give the unit of representation for all the other provinces. Representation will be given the territory added to Quebec on the same plan, but in fixing the basis of representation its population will not count. The President Hears Favorable Reports at Oyster Bay Conference.

Oyster Bay, N. Y., July 20.-The President was in conference several hours on Saturday with Attorney-General Bonaparte, Acting Secretary of State Robert Bacon, Enrique Creel, Mexican ambassador to the United States, and W. I. Buchanan, formerly United States minister to the Argentine Republic and Panama, and one of the foremost authorities on South and Central American affairs.

It is understood that the situation in Honduras, Guatemala, Venezuela and other South American storm centres was gone into at length. As he was leaving, Secretary Bacon expressed the belief that the South American troubles had simmered down until there was no further cause for alarm.

Secretary Bacon came by automobile from New York to attend the meeting at the Hill. He brought with him the Mexican ambassador and Mr. Buchanan, both of whom had accompanied him to New York from Washington.

Upon his arrival Secretary Bacon was asked about a press dispatch from the City of Mexico, in which it was stated that the United States and Mexico, or one of those countries alone, might establish a protectorate over Guatemala, if President Cabrera continued his rule or ruin policy. After reading the dispatch the secretary smiled and said he had heard nothing

of the matter. Senor Creel said that the present method of maintaining peace in Central America has been working well for the last year, and that he believed it would continue to do so as long as the United States and Mexico were bound by treaty to see that one of the countries did not encroach upon the rights of another.

### FREIGHT RATES TO BE HIGHER

Mr. James J. Hill Says That an Advance Is Neces-

New York, July 21. - That the raising of freight rates will be the only OFFER \$100.000 way out of the present financial problem in the country is the opinion o Mr. James J. Hill, president of the Great Northern Railroad, who has just arrived here from a fishing trip in Canada. He is not in favor of e cut in wages as a means of increasing the net earnings of a railroad. Mr. Hill says:

"There is no alternative but to raise rates. The credit of the railroads has been seriously impaired. The way to enhance credit is to increase rates. The manufacturers who decry an advance in rates fail to appreciate that without an improved credit the railroads will be unable to expend the hundreds of millions which hitherto have made prosperity possible to themselves and employes.




