

People Tried to Get to Lanl on Rafts When Steamer Struck Rock.

Wellington, New Zealand, Feb. 14 .-About seventy-five persons are be-lieved to have lost their lives as a esult of the wreck of the steamship Penguin, which ran on the rocks off Cape Terawhiti last night. Twentyix bodies have been washed ashore. The passengers and crew, to the number of 100, embarked on hurriedly-constructed rafts and in the two small life-boats which were uninjured by the crash. Only twenty-six of the 100 are known to have reached land, although it is possible that a few more may be in fishermen's huts along





SMELTING BY ELECTRICITY. The electric smelting process which, it is announced, has been perfected by Dominion, should prove of the utmost


