





A petition signed by all the firemen A petition signed by all the firemen in the city, asking for an increase, was presented at the committee meeting, with a recommendation from Fire Chief Aitken that the wages of the men be raised. He pointed out that they had long hours at small recompense.

The present scale is as follows: First year men, \$1 75 a day; second year men, \$1 95; third year men, \$2 15, and fourth year and over, \$2 25.

Ald, Wilson presented a motion to the effect that the request of the men be granted.

Ald. Tancock thought that this was not definite enough, and suggested that the wages of the firemen be the same as that which the police receive.

Work Twenty-One Hours a Day.

"The firemen work 21 hours a day, while the policeman is on duty but eight hours," said Ald. Tancock, "I do not wish to discriminate between them, but one is entitled to just as much salary as the other."

He stated that the wages of the police ran as follows: First year men, \$2; second year men, \$2, 25, and third year men and over, \$2, 45.

The members of the committee were not in a position to state how much pay was held back for the pension fund, and it was suggested that the pay be equalized by taking the firemen out of their wages.



SON LIKES NEW WORLD His Father's Life Meets With

Detroit, Nov. 14. - Alfred Tennyson Dickens probably would be a con-servationist after Gifford Pinchot's heart, were he to reside in the United States any length of time. He came to Detroit Sunday morning via the Cleveland boat, and the first thing he encountered on his arrival was a bad cold. Mr. Dickens is an Australian, and proud of it. "Why, I teel at home here, he said, waving a couple-hensive hand that indicated not only Detroit but all the rest of the United States. "This is just like Australia. Our city of Meibourne is much the same as an American city and we see lots of Americans there. Lots of Australians come here, too, and they all teel at home in the United States, much more than they do in England."

Discussing the impressions that his tecture tour have left with him, Mr. Dickens warmed up toyishly and talked happily.
