Architect L. E. Carruthers Has Plans Completed for School Proposed for London So uth Which May Be Used For Central Structure.

Secretary R. M. McElheran, of the board of education, under instruction from Chairman A. Langford, is today study notices for the assembling of No. 3 committee at 4:30 o'clock Friday afternoon.

While no formal reference of the matter of immediate action in regard to the building of the 16-roomed school on the old collegiate site was made to the committee by the special board meeting last night, it was understood that the members of that committee will discuss plans for proceeding with the construction of such a school.

Architect L. E. Carruthers has on hand the plans prepared for the 17-room school, which under the proposals of the unit school scheme supporters it was suggested should be immediately constructed on the site owned by the board in South London, and on which the estimate used during the controversy was based. The possibility of using these plans in connection with the new proposition will probably be discussed.

Would Avert Confusion When Time Comes to Stake Claims.

[Special to The Advertiser.]
Ottawa, Jan. 27. — Three federal survey parties will proceed north in the early spring to undertake a traverse of the Mackenzie River for the purpose of providing for the erection of survey posts to which may be "tied" oil claims staked in the new oil regions. One of the parties will have headquarters at Fort Norman, another between Fort Norman and Providence, and the third at Great Bear Lake. At the present time there is really no

At the present time there is really no base line in that region for the delimiting of claims, and as a consequence considerable confusion may ensue and fractional claims may be staked. The traverse of the river contemplated is designed to furnish a temporary base line. Later it is proposed to extend the sixth meridian and to run a base line thence. A few settlement surveys have already been made along the Mackenzie, but generally speaking the territory is unsurveyed. If the new finds come up 40 expectations a new era for the land surveyer in Canada will have opened.



London, Jan. 27 .- In an official report

to the board of trade from the British embassy in Berlin on the industrial and economic situation in Germany, Secretary Thelmal declares that, reviewing the past two years, it is impossible not to be struck by the evidence of improvement in all departments of public and private life, with the important exception of state finance. Germany's chief weakness, he says, is her inability to arrest the outflow of paper money, and if ultimate financial collapse is to be avoided, the question arises as to how she can be saved. The time has passed when an international loan or credit would suffice.

Secretary Thelmal thinks that though it still shows signs of weakness, the Government's authority has steadily increased, and that the Socialists are a greater element of strength outside, than inside, the cabinet. The state machine is described as, too cumbersome, owing to a plethora of officials, but the country is slowly getting accustomed to the new rule and is more inclined to obey it. Remarking that it is impossible to estimate the extent to which Germany is restoring foreign trade while she refuses to publish official trade figures, the report says: "It cannot be doubted that German competition will be found and must, be reckoned with. Moreover, Germany starts with the initial advantage of lower cost of production as compared with other European goods."

Majority of Members of Opposition Party Are Against the Proposals, Claiming the Plan To Be Impracticable— Declares Japan Has Grave Responsibilities in Maintaining Peace in the Far East.

Tokio, Jan. 27 .- Resolutions suggesting that Japan approach the world powers in the interest of an agreement relative to restriction of armaments, has been submitted to the Kansei-Kai, or opposition party, by Yukio Ozaki, a member of the organization, and an advocate of curtailment of military and naval programs in this country. He asks that the resolutions be submitted for passage to the Japanese Diet,

The Conservative organ Jiji Shimpo, says the majority of the members of the opposition party are opposed to the project on the ground that it is idealistic and impracticable. The existing international situation, in the opinion of this newspaper, renders assurance of permanent peace difficult, it being pointed out that the refusal of the United States to join the League of Nations makes this fact quite evident. "Japan has grave responsibilities in maintaining the peace in the Far East." the newspaper declares, "and must complete and amplify her national defence. The 'naval holiday' idea held in the United States and Great Britain is not based upon motives which guarantee future peace, but upon curtailment of growing armament expenditures. It is questionable, therefore, whether M. Ozaki's proposition is feasible at present.

London. Jan. 27.—Gabriele d'Annunzio indulges in a violent d'Annunzio indulges in a violent invective against Premier Giolitti of Italy and the Italian Government in his book, "Five Days of Fiume," which has been distributed among members of the Italian Chamber of Deputies, says a London Times dispatch from Milan. The poet-soldier describes himself as "the greatest servant of the fatherland," and attributes his importance to the fact that he gave Italy an Alpine frontier and secured for her the eastern provinces of Friuli and Istria, it is said.

The Guild Socialists.

"Guild socialism of England has, in common with syndicalism, industrial unlonism. Guild socialists look to the abilition of the wage system and the establishment of full democracy. Their official organ is the New Age; 1906 marks the beginning of the movement. It denies the wage system, which considers labor as a mere commodity which can be bought and sold, the price of which can go up and come down, as the price of any other commodity. It does not deny trade unionism, but accept it as a basis of its growth. The trade union becomes an industrial guild. It advocates state ownership, and would substitute the state for the employer.

"There are four ways in which it might destroy the present wage system: First, by an act of parliament, by which the state would take over all industries: secondly, by a general strike; thirdly, by the transition of trade unions to industrial guilds with an offer of partnerships to the workers; and lastly, by the growth of the trade union into an industrial union and gradual control of the industry, the workmen slowly moving up and finally getting control, until the capitalist is merely a figurehead, with his money invested.

"If this movement grows, as it seems

merely a figurehead, with his money invested.

"If this movement grows, as it seems to be growing, it will end in the state taking over all of the seven basic industries of England, the one to the fore now being the mining industry.

Origin of Soviet.

"The soviet has its origin in the Russian agricultural life. First there is the willage soviet, then the district soviet, then the provincial soviet, and so on until the All-Russian Congress of Soviets is reached, which body finally governs Russia. For political purposes the whole of Russia is organized by industries rather than geographically. There are four elements in their political organization: the Bolshevists, now in control, who are extreme revolutionists; the Menschevists, not quite so revolutionary, but still extreme; the Social Revolutionists, and lastly the Cadets, a sort of constitutional democrats, who are represented by the middle classes.

"The whole trouble in Russia centred around the age-old land question. When the revolution came the peasants just took the land, and now it is the vow of every peasant to keep the land that he has. There is where you find the strength of the Russian Government of today. Before condemning them, wait to see what really is going on in Russia. It is a time to study and wait, rather than to criticise and condemn," concluded the speaker.

As it is obvious that the apples produced by each district each have their own characteristics, it is particularly necessary that the names branded on packages should emphasize distinctiveness. The object of adopting a general brand such as "Canadian" on apple packages from Nova Scotia, Ontario and British Columbia can only be to suggest uniformity of contents, and no one will seriously contend that any such uniformity exists, except as to size of container or grading. HEAMAN & SON MICHIGAN HARDEST HIT BY IDLE WAVE New

Led All States in Proportional Reduction of Employed.

Washington, Jan. 26.—The number of persons employed in industry in the United States the first of this month numbered 3,473,466 less than the number employed a year ago, the department of labor's employment service announced today on the basis of a first country-wide survey fust completed by a special stuff of investigators.

The employment service's figures represented a reduction of 36.9 per cent in the number of workers employed in industries as compared with January, year ago.

Michigan led the states in proportional reduction with \$2 per cent and Ohio and Indiana followed with a reduction in employment of 50 per cent.

The largest percentage of reduction in specific industries, 69 per cent, occurred in the automobile and accessories industry, and this was taken to account largely for the great reduction in employment in Michigan.

This industry, the employment service announcement said, employed about 5 per cent of the total workers in all industries in the United States a year ago. Second in rank in the reduction of employees was the building trades with approximately 52 per cent.
