# HANNAH ELIAS TAKEN TO PRISON

Police Smashed in Doors of Octoroon's House.

## SUED BY PLATT FOR BLACKMAIL

Authorities Laid Siege to Her Residence for Four Days, Finally Resorting to Axes.

New York, June 7.-With axes and rowbars a squad of detective sergeants mashed in the doors of Hannah Elias' house, it No. 236 Central Park West, at 11 o'clock tonight, and arthe notorious negress, who, as mailed him out of nearly \$700,000 withn the past ten years. The arrest of the woman on a criminal charge enables the aged prosecu-

tor to serve civil warrants that he has so long sought to serve.

As the doors finally gave way the detectives dashed into the house and up the stairs, following Kato, the woman's trusted Japanese servant, who ran to the upper floor in a panic when he realized that the citadel had been taken. The detectives followed

Japanese into the very chambe negress lay in her bed. She screamed when she realized that at last she was within the clutches of the law, and pleaded not to be taken from her house before morning. She begged to be allowed to remain until her physician could be sum-

moned. But the officials were deaf to entreaties. The warrant directed that the prisoner be conducted forthwith prison, and the detectives said they had no option in the matter. Efferts to serve a warrant on Mrs Elias in a civil suit had kept a crowd about her house for a week, and when the detectives attacked the doors with axes in order to serve a warrant in criminal action, which Mr. Platt finally had been prevailed upon to bring. there was a large audience. Kuropatkin Has Force Oper ating On Oku's Rear.

Russian Dispatch Says Turkey Ha Given Permission for Czar's

Fleet to Pass Dardanelles.

MOVE IS DUE TO ALEXIEFF

St. Petersburg, June 7 5:20 p.m.—A very active Russian force is operating on the Liao Tung Peninsula in the hope of impeding and possibly crippling the Japanese army commanded by General Oku, but its size and character are unknown. According to accepted stories here, Viceroy Alexieff insisted that Kuropatkin shou'd not

leave Port Arthur to its fate, and the advance of troops may be due to his pressure. The strength of the main army at Liao Yang has not been ap-preciably weakened by the force sent south, and the movement was not ordered by Emperor Nicholas. Assurance is given by a member of the Emperor's suite that the stories that the differences between Viceroy

Alexieff and Gen. Kuropatkin on this subject were referred to the Emperor, who in turn submitted them to the council of war, which agreed on the advisability of ordering an advance, are absolutely false. The informant resterated the statement cabled June that the Emperor is not attempting to impose his views upon Kuropatkin saying further that the Emperor con sidered that the military situation has point of the future.

The foreign office says it has not received a report from the Russian consul at Che Foo in regard to the rumored sinking of a large Japanese warship off Talienwan.

## The Oil Duties.

From the consumers' standpoint the most important feature of the budget is the reduction in the duty on coal oil. Had the Government gone over the whole range of commodities on the be more popular in the country. Cheaper coal oil has been demanded from one end of the Dominion to the other, but the Government had to be considerate of the oil producing and refining interests, a source of income to thousands of investors, great and small, representing an aggregate capital of several millions of dollars. Some reduction in the duty was made by the present administration, but there has been an undercurrent of dissatisfaction in the country, especially among the farmers, because it went no further. Lately there has been almost a crisis in the oil industry, cwing to the diminution of the Canadian output of crude oil, which has caused the partial shutdown of the refinery at Sarnia. The duty of 5 cents per gallon on crude oil, equal to about 100 per cent, prevented the importation of American crude to keep the refineries running to their full capacity. The annual consumption of refined illuminating oil and naphtha in Canada is 25,755,000 gallons, of which about 70 percent has had to be imported. The Canadian output of crude oil for the past fivvears has been:

The Advertiser makes no special claim to political prescience, but it may quote what it said on March 7 last as to the art and theory of dumping:

"Many of the great industrial plants of today are designed on a scale which secures the greatest economy in production, and if a plant of this kind is partially idle, it cannot produce goods so cheaply. Hence the desire of a manufacturer or combination of manufacturers to run their works to their full capacity the year round, instead of dismissing workmen and allowing valuable machinery to lie unused when the demand for their output slackens. In countries like the United States and Germany, where high tariffs prevent any serious foreign interference with the home market, the manufacturers may combine to fix the home price at a level which is considerably above the cost of production. In a period of over-production in the home market the lomestic prices they obtain do not necessarily fall with the decrease in their domestic sales, and in order to keep their plants running they are sometimes content to sell their surplus products in foreign markets at near, or below cost, recouping themselves by the profits of their sales at home. They may lose on their foreign sales, but the double transaction, domestic and foreign, is remunerative, as a whole, though not so remunerat ive as if the home market, with its higher prices, had absorbed their whole production. It is only in a season of depression that the American manufacturer resorts to this practice. Ordnarily a very moderate Canadian tariff is sufficient to prevent him from seriously competing in this country. competition is not a bad regulator of Canadian industry, provided it is fair not fair competition, and if it could be counteracted without involving the country in the perils of a permanent prohibitory tariff, there would be litposed to such a tariff on principle

IS STUDYING THE BIBLE NOW

Speech and Hearing He Will Enter the Ministry.

Shreveport, June 7 .-- In religious and medical circles the progress of the case of Julian Renfro, who was stricken deaf and dumb in Chicago last Tuesday night after he had challenged Providence to a demonstration of the Supreme Power, is being closely followed. With several physicians in constant attendance upon him, the hope was expressed today by his mother, who is Christian and church-going woman, that the boy ultimately will recover the use of his faculties.

If he dces, he anounces in a written communication that he will at once seek to fit himself to join the ministry. For Renfro, since his arrival here from Chicago, has completely changed his views, and is ministered to gaily as much by a clergyman as by a physi-

In religious circles it is felt that his condition is due as much to his blasphemy as to nervous attack, and the clare that if he ever does regain the use of the impaired faculties it wili be because he has confessed conversion and repentance.

The circumstances of Renfro's attack were most dramatic. He was employed in a Chicago tannery as a shipping clerk. Last Tuesday night, with four ompanions, he engaged in a game of whist. The conversation turned on religious topics and three of the young men expressed a firm belief in God.

Renfro scoffed. "I would believe in God if I could," he said, "but I have read a great deal of Ingersoll's writing and am unable

to have faith." "Why, there are manifestations of God all about you," suggested one of the young men. Again Renfro scoffed.
"Fellows," he said, "if God would demonstrate himself to me in some way if, for instance, he should strike deaf or dumb, or blind, I might

admit his existence.' With the words on his lips the young man turned pale, his arms shot out in front of him, and his lips began to move convulsively, but no sound proceeded from them. He began beating his ears with is hands and the next instant he fell face forward on the floor unconscious.



There is something of irony in the fact | that one of the most immediately suc-cessful church works ever produced should have reached the green old age of should have reached the green old age of threescore and ten years before being hard in a progressive city like London. On the occasion of a first production, then, it may be of interest to know that the "Stabat Mater" is a religious prose poem, by Jacobus de Benedictis, written toward the close of the thirteenth century, and is one of the finest examples extant of mediaeval Latin composition. Its popularity among ecclesiastics and extant of mediaeval Latin composition.

Its popularity among ecclesiastics and composers alike has gained for it a permanent place in the Catholic Church service, a setting of it being regularly sung between the epistle and the gospel at high mass on the third Sunday in September, and on Friday in Passion week; or, divided into three sections, as office hymns on those days. In England and on the continent. Its separate stanzas are often interposed between the fourteen stations of the cross. Joequin, Palestrina, Pergolesi, Hayon and Astorga have written six of the finest settings known, Palestrina being the composer of two. For religious inspiration these works of bygone days have never been surpassed, nor their posi-tion disputed. Rossini was a skeptic, and that fact, together with the sensuous beauty of his "Stabat Mater" is respon-sible for much of the criticism as to its

appropriateness that has been leveled at pedantry could be unmoved by the opening novement, the unaccompanied quartet, or the glorious "Inflammatus."
