**H**IS Excellency the Lieutenant Governor having been pleased to dissolve the late General Assembly, and order Writs to issue for electing Members to form a House of Assembly, to meet in General Assembly on the fifth day of January instant, and the said General Assembly having been, by Proclamation, prorogued to this day, then to meet for dispatch of business, the Clerk of the Crown in Chancery delivered to the Clerk of the Assembly a Roll containing the names of the several Members, returned by the Sheriffs of the several Counties, as duly Elected; which are as follow, to wit:—

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And Isaac Woodward, a Member for the City of Saint John, having refused the Oath tendered to him by the Commissioner, upon the grounds of his being of the profession of people called Quakers, he made solemn Declaration or Affirmation, as prescribed by the Act of Assembly of the 26 Geo. III, cap. 19, and subscribed thereto; whereupon the several Members took their Seats.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by Isaac W. Jouett, Esquire, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, requiring the immediate attendance of the House in the Council Chamber.

The House accordingly attended, when the Honorable Chief Justice Chipman said—

*Gentlemen of the Legislative Council, and  
Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,*

I am commanded by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to inform you, that he doth not think fit to declare the causes for which he has summoned this General Assembly, until there be a Speaker of this House of Assembly; it is therefore His Excellency's pleasure that you, Gentlemen of the House of Assembly, do repair to the place where the sittings of the House of Assembly are usually held, and there choose

choose a fit person to be your Speaker ; and that you present the person who shall be so chosen, to His Excellency in this House, forthwith, for his approbation.

And the House being returned,

Mr. Allen, then addressing the Clerk, proposed to the House for their Speaker. Hugh Johnston, Esquire, a Member for Queen's County, which was seconded by Mr. Weldon.

Mr. Johnston then arose and declined the honor tendered to him, when Mr. Wyer proposed Charles Simonds, Esquire, a Member for the County of Saint John, which was seconded by Mr. J. M. Wilmot.

Mr. Chandler then proposed John Allen, Esquire, a Member for the County of York, which was seconded by Mr. Weldon.

Mr. Allen then arose and declined the honor offered, when Mr. End proposed William Crane, Esquire, a Member for the County of Westmorland, which was seconded by Mr. Weldon.

Mr. Crane also declining, Edward B. Chandler, Esquire, also a Member for the County of Westmorland, was proposed by Mr. Weldon, and seconded by Mr. Crane.

Mr. Chandler likewise declining, Mr. Simonds was the only person in Nomination.

The House then called Charles Simonds, Esquire, to the Chair, when he stood up in his place and expressed the high satisfaction he felt at the honor conferred upon him :

He was then taken out of his place by Mr. Wyer, and Mr. J. M. Wilmot, and conducted by them to the Chair. When standing on the upper step he returned his acknowledgments for the great honor they had been pleased to confer by choosing him as their Speaker.

Mr. Simonds then took the Chair.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by Isaac W. Jouett, Esquire, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, requiring the immediate attendance of the House in the Council Chamber, whereupon Mr. Speaker Elect, with the House, attended His Excellency ;

And being returned,

Mr. Partelow moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to alter and amend the Laws now in force for the Election of Members to serve in General Assembly.

Leave granted.

Mr. Speaker then reported that he had addressed His Excellency to the effect following :—

“ May it please Your Excellency,

“ The Assembly having received your Excellency's commands, returned to the place where they usually sit, where, in the exercise of their undoubted right, they immediately proceeded to choose a Speaker : They have elected me to that important and honorable situation, and they now present me to be approved of by your Excellency : aware, however, of my insufficiency, I pray that Your Excellency will be pleased to disapprove of their choice, and command them to elect a more fit Person.

The Honorable Mr. Chief Justice Chipman, then spoke as follows :—

“ Mr. Simonds,

“ I am commanded by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor to acquaint you, that he approves the choice which the House of Assembly has made of you to be their Speaker ; and that relying on your integrity, discretion and ability, he doth allow and confirm your Election.

That he, Mr. Speaker, then further addressed His Excellency, as followeth :—

“ May it please Your Excellency,

“ I submit with due humility to your Excellency's will and pleasure, and it now becomes



becomes my duty, in the name and on behalf of the Assembly, to lay claim, by humble Petition, to all their ancient and undoubted Rights and Privileges, more especially that of freedom of debate, freedom from arrest, free access to your Excellency whenever occasion may demand, and that the most favorable construction shall be put upon all their proceedings; and on my own behalf, I have to entreat your Excellency, that any error which I may commit may not be imputed to His Majesty's faithful and loyal subjects, the Assembly of New Brunswick."

To which the Honorable Mr. Chief Justice Chipman replied,

" Mr. Speaker,

" His Excellency has commanded me to assure you that he hath the greatest confidence in the loyalty and attachment of this House of Assembly, to His Majesty's Person and Government, and in the wisdom, temper and prudence, which will accompany all their proceedings; and that he doth readily and willingly grant and allow to them all their privileges, in as full and ample a manner, as they have at any time heretofore been granted and allowed."

And that His Excellency was then pleased to make a Speech to both Houses, of which he, Mr. Speaker, said he had, to prevent mistakes, procured a Copy, which he read to the House, and is as followeth :—

" *Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,*

" *Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,*

66 **T**HE Act of the last Session for increasing the Representation of three of the Counties in the Province, one of which was without any distinct Representative, having received the Royal Assent, I thought it right to put the Law into immediate effect, and in meeting you at this time in General Assembly it affords me much satisfaction that I can congratulate you on the propitious circumstances, in which, compared with many past years, this Province is placed.

" It has pleased Providence to reward the industry of the agricultural part of the community with an abundant harvest.

" Our Commercial interests and prospects stand high, notwithstanding all the difficulties with which public credit has been assailed in Countries exercising a direct influence on the Commercial welfare of our own, and I am therefore justified in assuming that this fact, so advantageous to the public at large, is not less honorable to the judgment and integrity of those engaged in this great branch of Provincial prosperity, than a gratifying proof of its being conducted upon sound and enlightened principles.

" From this favorable state of things useful Institutions have been extended, which, it is hoped, will in their progress prove highly beneficial to the rising spirit of enterprize which evinces itself among all classes. I however regret that in this prosperous condition I cannot include our Coast Fisheries, in which there is no material improvement, but which, if rightly managed, would prove an inexhaustible source of wealth.

" *Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,*

" I shall direct the Treasurer's Accounts to be laid immediately before you, and I am happy to say that you will find them to exhibit, upon the whole, a satisfactory statement of our Finances, affording safe grounds for anticipating that at no very distant period you may be enabled, by judicious management and wholesome economy, to make such provision as will ensure prompt payment at the Treasury, and thus render your appropriations most available for the purposes intended.

" *Mr. President, and Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,*

" *Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,*

" The objects to which I have now principally to call your attention are the ordinary affairs of the Province—a Province eminently favoured by nature, and which, under wise and steady Legislation, cannot fail to prosper. To you, Gentle-  
men,

men, has been confided the all-important task of calling its resources, and the talents and energies of its people into full activity;—from you must emanate almost every measure by which the Country can be affected, either for good or evil, and the calmness of your deliberations, with the soundness of your views, will, I earnestly trust, produce such decisions and results as will fulfil the expectations of a loyal people: for myself, feeling, as I do, that my duty to the King is inseparable from that which the true interests of this Province demands, I have only to reiterate the assurance that I desire nothing more earnestly than opportunities of co-operating with you in the furtherance of sound practical measures of general utility. There is, however, one subject to which I have to call your particular attention, that is, the enactment for regulating the Statute Labour on the public Roads, which will shortly expire; and I need not attempt to impress upon your minds in the renewal of this important Law, the benefits to be derived by the Country from a better mode of applying that labour, particularly in the Towns, where local circumstances, and the condition of the Inhabitants, point out the necessity of a different system.

“I shall take an early opportunity of communicating to you, by Message, some measures of importance, which I am commanded by His Majesty’s Government to lay before you.”

On motion of Mr. Weldon,

*Resolved*, That a Committee of Privilege be appointed, to whom may be referred all matters which may hereafter arise, that may in any way be supposed to affect the Privileges of this House.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Weldon, Mr. Johnston, Mr. Street, Mr. Allen, and Mr. Chandler, be a Committee for that purpose.

On motion of Mr. End,

*Resolved*, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, in answer to his Speech.

*Ordered*, That Mr. End, Mr. Brown, and Mr. L. A. Wilmot, be a Committee to prepare the Address.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

*Resolved*, That a Standing Committee be appointed to examine and report upon Public and Private Accounts.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Partelow, Mr. Robinson, Mr. Woodward, Mr. Taylor, and Mr. Stewart, be a Committee therefor.

On motion of Mr. Weldon,

*Resolved*, That a Committee be appointed to revise the Rules and Regulations of the House of Assembly of this Province, and make further Rules and Regulations for the government thereof.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Weldon, Mr. Hill, Mr. Crane, Mr. Johnston, and Mr. Wyer, be a Committee therefor.

On motion of Mr. Street,

*Resolved*, That a Committee be appointed to examine what Laws have lately expired, or are near expiring, and report thereon to the House.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Street, Mr. Chandler, and Mr. Robinson, be the Committee therefor.

On motion of Mr. J. M. Wilmot,

*Resolved*, That a Committee of Trade be appointed, to whom shall be referred all matters which may in any way affect the Trade of the Province.

*Ordered*, That Mr. J. M. Wilmot, Mr. Wyer, Mr. Burns, Mr. Robinson, Mr. Stewart, and Mr. Woodward, be a Committee for that purpose.

On motion of Mr. End,

*Resolved*, That the Reverend Doctor Somerville, be the Chaplain of this House.

On motion of Mr. Brown,

*Resolved*, That no Petition be received or Bill brought in after the 16th day of February next, except by special leave of the House.

On motion of Mr. Freeze,

*Ordered*, That *Two Hundred Copies* of His Excellency's Speech be forthwith printed for the use of the Legislature.

On motion of Mr. Taylor,

*Resolved*, That a Select Committee be appointed to take into consideration the state of all the Roads of Communication in the Province and to report the same to the House, and also to report what sums it may be necessary to grant for repairing and improving as well the Great Roads as Bye Roads.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Taylor, Mr. Connell, Mr. Partelow, Mr. Crane, Mr. End, Mr. Johnston, Mr. Clinch, Mr. Weldon, Mr. Miles, Mr. Freeze and Mr. Street, be a Committee for that purpose.

On motion of Mr. Hayward.

*Ordered*, That the House do on Thursday next go into Committee of the whole, in consideration of His Excellency's Speech.

On motion of Mr. Gilbert,

*Ordered*, That the Journals of this House be daily, or as soon as a Copy thereof can be prepared by the Clerk, printed, and that the Printer do furnish *Two Hundred Copies* for the use of the Legislature.

Mr. Partelow, by leave, presented a Petition from the Trustees of Saint Andrew's Church, in the City of Saint John, praying that a Bill may pass, to perfect the title of the said Trustees to certain Lands and Tenements belonging to that Corporation, in the said City; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and lie on the table.

On motion of Mr. Wyer,

*Resolved*, That a Committee be appointed whose duty it shall be to take into consideration all matters relating to Light Houses within the Province, and report thereon from time to time to the House.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Wyer, Mr. M'Leod, Mr. Johnston, Mr. Palmer, Mr. Robinson, Mr. Stewart, and Mr. Woodward, be a Committee therefor.

On motion of Mr. Brown,

*Resolved*, That a Committee be appointed to take into consideration all matters connected with the state of the Finances of the Province, and report thereon to this House.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Brown, Mr. Crane, and Mr. Partelow, be a Committee therefor.

Mr. Partelow moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to perfect the title of the Trustees of Saint Andrew's Church, in the City of Saint John, to certain Lands and Tenements belonging to that Corporation, in the said City.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in was read a first time.

The House adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10 o'Clock.

## WEDNESDAY, 21st January, 1835.

### Prayers.

Mr. Partelow moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to authorize the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Saint John, to dispose of certain enumerated Lots of Land held in trust by them, and belonging to the Marine Hospital in the said City.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

Read a second time,

A Bill to perfect the Title of the Trustees of Saint Andrew's Church, in the City of Saint John, to certain Lands and Tenements belonging to that Corporation, in the said City.

Mr. M'Leod, by leave, presented a Petition from the Justices of the Peace for King's County, praying an Act may pass authorizing an Assessment to be made on the said County, for erecting a new Gaol, and also that a sum may be granted towards the completing the same; which he read.

*Ordered,* That the said Petition be received and lie on the Table.

Mr. Partelow, by leave, presented a Petition from James Moran, George Brown, Ebenezer Vaughan, and 71 others, Inhabitants of the Parish of Saint Martin's, in the County of Saint John, praying a grant may pass in aid of individual subscription towards the erection of a Breakwater at Quaco Creek; which he read.

*Ordered,* That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee of Trade.

Mr. Robinson, by leave, presented a Petition from Robert W. Crookshank, Thomas Barlow, E. D. W. Ratchford, and others, Merchants of the City of Saint John, praying for a remission of part of the Duty on Foreign Wine, when the same is imported direct from the Country of its growth; which he read.

*Ordered,* That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee of Trade.

Mr. Chandler, by leave, presented a Petition from John Humphrey, and others, praying a grant may pass towards the erection of an Aboideau over Hallo Creek, on the Great Road in Westmorland; which he read.

*Ordered,* That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee on Roads.

Mr. Hill moved for leave to bring in a Bill, for the appointment of Firewards, and the better extinguishing of Fires which may happen in that part of the Parish of Saint Stephen, commonly called Mill Town, and its immediate vicinity.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

Mr. Wyer, by leave, presented a Petition from Joseph Walton, and 22 others of the Grand Jury, for the County of Charlotte, praying that an Act may pass authorizing the Grand Jury to examine and audit the County Accounts; which he read.

*Ordered,* That the said Petition be received and lie on the Table.

Mr. Street, by leave, presented a Petition from J. T. Williston, and others, of the County of Northumberland, praying that the House may adopt measures, either by a Legislative Grant or otherwise, in order that the Public may be furnished with correct Reports of the Debates; which he read.

*Ordered,* That the said Petition be received and lie on the Table.

Mr. Ford, by leave, presented a Petition from John Wheten, and others, of the County of Kent, praying the House may adopt such measures as will secure to the Public authorized Reports of the Debates of the House; which he read.

*Ordered,* That the said Petition be received and lie on the Table.

On motion of Mr. Street,

*Resolved,* That the Petitions of John T. Williston, and others, and John Wheten, and others, praying the House to take under their consideration the subjects of the Reports of the Debates, be referred to a Select Committee to report thereon.

*Ordered,* That Mr. Street, Mr. Chandler, Mr. End, Mr. Crane, Mr. M'Leod, Mr. Woodward, and Mr. Clinch, be a Committee for that purpose.

Mr. Brown moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to authorize and empower the Justices of the Peace for the County of Charlotte, to Lease a part of the Public landing at Salt Water in the Parish of Saint Stephen, and to invest the proceeds in making improvements on the premises, and for the support of the Poor of the said Parish.

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

Mr. End moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to alter the time of holding the November Term of the Inferior Court of Common Pleas, for the County of Gloucester.  
Leave granted.

Mr. L. A. Wilmot gives notice, that he should, on Tuesday next the 27th instant, call the attention of the House to the subject of the Boundary Line, between the State of Maine and this Province, and submit certain Resolutions thereon.

Mr. Wyer, by leave, presented a Petition from Duncan Thomson, a Licenced Teacher, praying to be remunerated for Teaching a School at the Parish of Saint Andrews, in the County of Charlotte, for one year, ending in 1834; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and referred to the Committee of Supply.

Mr. Palmer, by leave, presented a Petition from James Wallace and 16 others of the Grand Jury, for the County of Westmorland, praying that an Act may pass, authorising the Grand Juries of the several Counties in the Province, and to examine and audit the County Accounts; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and lie on the Table.

On motion of Mr. Crane,

*Resolved*, That the Petitions from the Grand Jurors for the Counties of Charlotte and Westmorland, praying to be allowed to audit the County Accounts, be referred to a Select Committee to Report by Bill or otherwise.

On the question for adopting the Resolution, the House divided.

Yeas 9.

Nays 12.

It was therefore decided in the negative.

Mr. Partelow moved for leave to bring in a Bill, to revive an Act intituled "An Act for the more speedy and effectual punishment of persons keeping disorderly Houses."

Leave granted.

The said Bill being brought in, was read a first time.

Mr. Chandler, by leave, presented a Petition from Robert Scott, Esquire, and others, Inhabitants of the County of Westmorland, praying that an Act may pass, to erect the Western part of the said County into a separate and distinct County; which he read.

*Ordered*, That the said Petition be received and lie on the Table.

Mr. Wyer, by leave, presented a Petition from Daniel B. Roberts, of Indian Island, in the County of Charlotte, praying compensation for teaching a School at that place, for the term of Six Months ending in June, 1834; which he read.

Mr. Weldon, from the Committee appointed to revise the Rules and Regulations of the House, and to make Rules for the Government thereof, Reported, that they had attended thereto, and prepared a number of Rules; which he read; and they being handed in at the Clerk's Table, were then again read.

*Ordered*, That the Report be accepted.

On motion of Mr. Weldon,

The House went into Committee of the whole, in consideration of the said Report.

Mr. Hill in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that they had gone into consideration of the Report of the Select Committee referred to them, and had agreed to the several Rules, by them

them reported, and they being severally read at the Clerk's Table, were agreed to by the House, and are as follow :—

### Rules

#### FOR GOVERNMENT OF HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

1. That Prayers shall be read every day by the Chaplain of this House, at the first opening thereof.

2. No Member to come into the House, or move from one place to another, with his Hat on.

3. While the House is sitting, and any Member speaking, no Member is allowed to speak or whisper, so as to interrupt him, unless it be to speak to Order.

4. When any Member intends to speak, he is to stand up and address himself to the Speaker, and if more than one rises to speak, the Speaker is to determine who is up first, and the Member, named by him, is to speak, unless he give way to the other.

5. No Member is allowed to be standing while another is speaking.

6. When any business is in debate, if any Member arises to speak to a new business, any other Member may, but Mr. Speaker ought to interrupt him.

7. When any Member or Mr. Speaker speaks to Order, the question of Order must be decided previous to the business being proceeded in.

8. When any question is put and a division demanded, those that are for the question are to rise, and those that are against the question are to remain sitting.

9. When a motion has been made and seconded, that matter must receive a determination by the question, unless the previous question or an adjournment is moved and carried, or the motion is withdrawn by the Member who made it.

10. When a motion is made and seconded, the Member's name who made the motion is to be inserted in the Journal.

11. After a question is propounded, no Member may speak more than once to the matter, except the Member who made the motion, and he may be allowed to speak once in reply.

12. When a question is decided by vote, the number of both the affirmatives and negatives, and also the Members' names, shall be inserted in the Journal, if insisted upon by two or more Members.

13. That the Journal of the day be read the next morning, prior to any other business.

14. That the Sergeant at Arms do not permit any person to come within the House, while it is sitting, except the Members and Officers attending.

15. That all persons who will question any return of Members to serve in General Assembly, to question the same within fourteen days after the meeting of the House, and so within fourteen days after any new return shall be brought in.

16. That the House will not enter into a Scrutiny of Votes, polled at any Election of Members to serve in General Assembly, unless a Scrutiny was duly demanded of the Sheriff.

17. That any Member bringing in a Petition shall, in his place, acquaint the House with the general purport of the Petition, and ask leave for it to be read, which must be seconded before it is read.

18. That the Speaker cannot take the Chair for the purpose of proceeding on any deliberation, or doing any business whatever, except to receive the Usher of the Black Rod, or a Message from the Council, or to enforce the attendance of Members, unless at least fourteen Members, including Mr. Speaker be present; but for

the purpose before mentioned, any number exceeding four, including Mr. Speaker, shall be deemed sufficient after the hour has arrived to which the House may be adjourned.

19. That if any Member obtain leave of this House to act as an Attorney or Counsel, in any matter at the Bar of the House, he shall not speak or vote as a Member upon such a matter.

20. That every Member be heard in his place, touching any charge brought against him, or any matter respecting his Election, return or privilege, or whenever his private interest is affected, but is to withdraw before the House proceed thereon.

21. That in case any offensive matter occurring in debate, the same shall be immediately noted down in writing, and noticed in the House the same day, otherwise it shall not be afterwards considered by the House.

22. That all Orders of the Day, which, by reason of any adjournment, shall not have been proceeded upon, shall be considered only as postponed to the next day on which the House shall sit.

23. As it might deeply intrench on the privileges of this House, for any Member to answer an accusation before the Council, either in person, or by sending his answer in writing, or by his Counsel there—It is Ordered, that no Member of this House shall either go to the Legislative Council, or send his answer in writing, or appear by Counsel to answer any accusation there, upon penalty of being committed to the Sergeant at Arms, or to Prison, during the pleasure of this House.

The House adjourned until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

"THE HUMBLE ADDRESS OF THE HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY."

"MAY IT PLEASE YOUR EXCELLENCY,

**W**E the Representatives of His Majesty's Loyal Subjects the People of New Brunswick, thank Your Excellency for the Speech you have been pleased to make at the opening of this Session of the General Assembly.

"The Royal Assent to a Bill increasing the Representation of three Counties in this Province, is an additional proof of His Majesty's gracious regard for the interests of His Loyal Subjects; and we duly appreciate the promptness with which Your Excellency has carried this measure into operation.

"It is a matter of great satisfaction to know, that the present circumstances of the Province may be considered propitious, when compared with many past years.

"The abundant harvest by which the labours of the husbandman have been rewarded, cannot fail to excite deep feelings of gratitude to that Being from whom all blessings proceed.

"That our Commercial interests stand unmoved by the embarrassments which have affected other Countries, is a circumstance, creditable as well to the exertions of the Mercantile Body as to the principles, by which those exertions have been actuated.

"We

"We hope, with Your Excellency, that all the useful Institutions now in operation, will, in their progress, prove highly beneficial to the rising spirit of enterprise, which evinces itself among all classes; but we sincerely regret that so copious a source of wealth as our Coast Fisheries, should by any improper management, be found in an unprosperous condition,

"We thank Your Excellency for directing the Treasurer's Accounts to be laid before us, and we rejoice to hear that our Finances are in such a state of progressive improvement, as to enable us, by judicious management and wholesome economy, to insure prompt payment at the Treasury,—a measure absolutely necessary to render our appropriations available for the purposes intended.

"We are deeply impressed with the great importance of that trust reposed in us by our fellow Subjects,—a trust, the duties of which, we shall best perform, by adopting (within the limits of our power) that wise and steady system of Legislation which cannot fail, under Providence, to call into action those energies and natural advantages which this Province and its Inhabitants possess; and we assure Your Excellency of our firm conviction, that it is your earnest desire to adopt such measures as may conduce as well to the honor of our King as to the welfare of his Subjects, a desire with which His Majesty's Representative in this Province shall ever find the House of Assembly most ready to co-operate.

"The Laws for regulating Statute Labour on the Public Roads, shall receive that attention which so important a subject demands.

"Your Excellency may rely upon our sincere desire to give a candid and dispassionate consideration, to all measures which Your Excellency may, by command of His Majesty's Government, be pleased to lay before us, and also to all other measures which Your Excellency may communicate to us by special Message."

Being returned,

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

The Honourable Mr. Secretary Odell, by command of His Excellency, delivered the following Messages:—

**“New Brunswick.**

*“Message to the House of Assembly, 26th January, 1835.*

“ARCHIBALD CAMPBELL.

“THE Lieutenant Governor communicates to the House of Assembly, a Copy of a Dispatch from the Secretary of State, in answer to the Petitions of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, on the subject of Timber Duties.

*“Downing-street, 2nd May, 1834.*

“SIR,

I HAVE the honor to acknowledge the receipt of your Dispatch, No. 15, of the 18th of March last, transmitting Petitions from the Legislative Council and House of Assembly of New Brunswick to the King and both Houses of Parliament, praying that no alteration may take place in the Timber Duties; but that the Timber Trade of the Province may continue to receive that protection which is believed to be essential to its existence. I have to acquaint you, in reply, that it is not the intention of His Majesty's Government to propose to Parliament any alteration in those duties affecting the Trade of the present year, and that no step will be taken without the fullest consideration of the Colonial interests involved.

*“Message to the House of Assembly, 26th January, 1835.*

“ARCHIBALD CAMPBELL.

“THE Lieutenant Governor, in obedience to the commands of His Majesty's Government, communicates to the House of Assembly the Copy of a Dispatch from the Secretary of State, with its Inclosures, assigning the reasons why His Majesty has not been pleased to confirm the Act passed by the Legislature of this Province in the year 1832, “to provide for the Custom House Establishment,” and expressing the confident expectation of His Majesty's Government that the House will, in lieu thereof, substitute a Bill making an effectually permanent provision for that service.”

*“Treasury Chambers, 15th March, 1834.*

“SIR,

I AM commanded by the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury to return herewith the Act of the Legislature of New Brunswick, submitted to this Board in your letter of 3rd of November last; and also, to transmit a copy of a Report of the Commissioners of Customs, of the 7th instant, thereon, and I am to request that in laying the same before Mr. Secretary Stanley you will call his attention to the terms of the Address to His Majesty from the House of Assembly, dated 31st March, 1831, to which this Act is stated to have reference, and to the Communication from this Department to Lord Howick, of the 4th January, 1832, and will observe to him that my Lords cannot, by any means, consider that the provisions of the present Act fulfil the pledge given by the House of Assembly in that Address, “to make a permanent grant to His Majesty of £1,250 sterling, per annum, for the payment of the Officers of Customs, either in gross or in such other way as His Majesty might direct, payable annually, out of the duties received by virtue of the Acts of the Imperial Parliament, in the event of all such duties being paid over to the Treasurer of the Province.” My Lords, consequently, cannot recommend that the Act should be approved of, or should be permitted to pass into a Law, more especially as it has been a paramount object, in the arrangement made with the Legislatures of other Colonies, to secure a permanent provision for the payment of the sum to be contributed from the Colonial Funds towards the expences of the Custom's Establishments.

“The desire of my Lords to bring the question of the provision for the payment of the Custom's Establishment in New Brunswick to a distinct and amicable settlement was sufficiently evinced in the readiness with which they acceded to the proposal in the Address of 31st March, 1831, and to the immediate directions they gave for carrying that proposal into effect, so far as related to the relief of the Colony, from all charge for the Custom's Department exceeding the amount of the proffered contribution, without awaiting the passing of an Act by the Legislature.

“My Lords would suggest that the Lieutenant Governor should be instructed to call the attention of the House of Assembly to this circumstance, and to the unequivocal terms in which the offer of the permanent provision of £1,250, per annum, specifically charged upon duties, accruing under Acts of the Imperial Parliament was made, and to express to the House the confident expectation of His Majesty's Government, that the Legislature of New Brunswick will not hesitate to redeem the pledge thus distinctly given and unreservedly accepted.

" We Report, That Your Lordships were pleased, by Mr. James Stewart's letter, dated 4th January, 1832, to acquaint us that with the view of relieving the Province of New Brunswick from some portion of the annual charge of £7,144 for maintaining the Custom's Establishment in that Province, you had acceded to a proposition which had been made by the House of Assembly in an Address to His Majesty, wherein they proposed to make a permanent grant of £4,250 per annum, towards defraying the expences of the Custom's Establishments at the Ports of Saint John, Saint Andrews, Miramichi, and their dependencies, such grant to be made either in gross or in such other way as His Majesty might direct, and payable out of the Duties secured by virtue of the Acts of the Imperial Parliament. Your Lordships, at the same time, desired that we would instruct our Officers at New Brunswick to retain, in each year, out of the Revenue which might be collected by them, the sum of £4,250, for the payment of the Salaries and expences of the Custom's Department, and to draw Bills on the Receiver General of this Revenue for such further sums as might be necessary for that purpose, and the necessary directions were accordingly issued by us to the Collectors and Controllers of this Revenue in New Brunswick.

" That by the Act of the House of Assembly of New Brunswick, which your Lordships have been pleased to refer for our consideration and report, and which proposes to have been passed for the purpose of carrying the foregoing proposition into effect, it is provided that there should be annually included in the estimates for the ordinary services, towards the support of the Custom House Establishments in the Province the sum of £4,250 sterling, out of the monies arising from the Duties which might be collected in that Province within the year for which such annual appropriation should be made, the same to be applied by the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief for the time being, and paid quarterly by Warrants of His Excellency, by and with the advice and consent of His Majesty's Council in the Province, in twenty days after the payment over and account exhibited of such Duties, by the principal Officers of Customs, upon which we have to observe that the proposed enactments appear to be entirely opposed to the principles which governed your Lordships in acceding to the proposition which had been made by the House of Assembly at New Brunswick, in as much as your Lordships in acceding thereto intended that the grant of £4,250 should be the first charge upon the Duties collected by the Officers of this Revenue in the Province, and be retained therefrom, in quarterly proportions of £1,062 10 0, for the purpose of being applied towards defraying the expences of the Custom's Department of the Province, whereas by the Act above referred to, the total amount of Duties collected is required to be paid over in the first instance to the Receiver General of the Colony, and no part of the grant of £4,250, can be issued from the Colonial Treasury until twenty days after the Collector and Controller shall in each Quarter have paid over and accounted for the total amount of Duties received by them within that period, and then only under the Warrant of the Governor with the advice of His Majesty's Council in the Province.

" We beg leave, further to state, that in the event of the annexed Bill being passed into a Law, the greatest inconvenience would arise to the public service, in as much as the Collector of St. John would be under the necessity of sending his Accounts to the Colonial Secretary, who resides at Fredericton, which place is ninety miles distant from St. John, before he could obtain the Governor's Warrant of Payment upon the Colonial Treasurer, resident at St. John; and the Collector of St. Andrews in like manner, and for the same purpose be required to send his Accounts to Fredericton, from which place to St. Andrews, is one hundred and fifty miles distant, and having obtained the Governor's Warrant for payment, it would be necessary for him to proceed to St. John, a distance of sixty miles, before he could obtain payment of the amount from the Colonial Treasurer; who as before stated, resides at that place. Under the foregoing circumstances, we beg leave to offer our entire concurrence in the opinion expressed by Mr. Secretary Stanley, that should the Act be confirmed, the Officers of the Customs in the Province of New Brunswick would still be dependent upon the annual votes of the House of Assembly, no specific funds under the direct control of His Majesty's Government, having been appropriated to the payment of the Officers' Salaries, and as the Annual Grant of £4,250, cannot in our opinion be considered as a permanent provision within the meaning of Your Lordship's minute, transmitted to us in Mr. Stewart's letter of 4th January, 1832, for defraying the expense of Custom Establishment of New Brunswick, we cannot recommend that His Majesty's assent should be given to the Bill in question.

" I HAVE the honor to acquaint you that His Majesty has not been advised to confirm an Act passed by the Legislative of New Brunswick in 1832, intituled "An Act to provide for the Custom House Establishment in New Brunswick.

" The inclosed Letter from the Secretary to the Treasury, with the report, by which it is accompanied from the Commissioners of Customs, will explain to you the grounds on which His Majesty's confirmation of this Act is withheld. I have no doubt that the deviation of the House of Assembly, from the course which was expected, in consequence of its Address of the 1st of March, 1831, has been unintentional; and that the House will readily supply the defects that are pointed out in the annexed papers. You will therefore, transmit to the Assembly, by Message, the present dispatch, with its enclosures, and will state to them the confident expectation of His Majesty's Government, that they will substitute for their recent measure, a Bill, making an effectually by permanent provision for the Custom House Establishment.

" THE Lieutenant Governor submits to the House of Assembly a Draft of a Bill which has been prepared in England, and transmitted here by order of His Majesty's Government, for the management and regulation of the Post Office in New Brunswick,"

Brunswick," together with an Extract of a Dispatch from the Secretary of State explanatory of the Provisions of the Bill, and of the views of His Majesty's Government respecting the proposed arrangements, from which, the reasons for this mode of presenting the Bill to the consideration of the Legislature will be apparent.

*Extracts from a Despatch from the Right Honorable the Secretary of State for the Colonial Department dated Downing-street, 5th October, 1834.*

THE Representations which have from time to time been received from the Legislature and inhabitants of several of the Colonies in North America, respecting the internal Postage in that part of the British Dominions have not failed to attract the serious attention of His Majesty's Government, and I have now the gratification to send you an Act passed in the late Session of Parliament, which I hope will prove the means of settling this important question to the satisfaction of all parties. The Act provides that so much of the Statute 5 Geo. 3 cap. 25, as authorizes the taking of certain rates of inland Postage within His Majesty's Dominions in North America, shall be repealed from the time when His Majesty's consent shall be signified to Acts of the Provincial Legislatures, imposing the same or other rates of Postage, and making such regulations for the management of the Post Office by the Post Master General or his Deputies, as to the Legislatures may seem expedient.

You will observe, that in order to give effect to this Act, certain Bills must be passed by the Provincial Legislatures and receive the Royal Assent; and I need scarcely add, that to establish a practicable system, it is essential that a uniformity of view should pervade their Bills. His Majesty's Government therefore, in order to secure those important conditions, has thought it best to direct the preparation of one common Bill to be submitted to the Legislative Council and Assembly of each Colony affected by the present measure.

I have the honor to enclose the Draft thus prepared, which you will cause to be brought before the Assembly. You will at the same time assure the Assembly, that the Bill has been framed with the most anxious deliberation on the part of the Post Master General and my Predecessor, and with the most minute attention to every detail which it embraces.

It was found impossible to devise any practicable plan for keeping separate the accounts of the Post Office Revenue and expenditure in each possession in North America; and when the accounts were blended, no mode of distributing the surplus Revenue appeared to be free from serious objection, except to apportion it according to the gross amount of Postage collected within each Colony. A provision therefore, to this effect, has been made in the Imperial Act of Parliament. In order however, to admit of any other plan which might be preferred by the Provincial Legislatures, a power has been left to them to alter this clause by local enactments. I should scarcely anticipate that at the present time any more eligible expedient is likely to be suggested than the one adopted by the Imperial Act; and as any alteration of it could not be carried into effect until agreed to by each separate Legislature, it is perhaps to be wished, that at any rate, for a period sufficient to try the remainder of the proposed measure, the provision made by Parliament on this point should remain untouched.

I shall now proceed to offer a few explanatory remarks on the Bill proposed to the acceptance of the Legislative Council and Assembly of New Brunswick.

The projected Tariff of Postage effects a considerable reduction upon the existing Rates, more especially in the longer distances. The tendency of this arrangement to encourage intercourse between the more widely separated portions of His Majesty's extensive Territory in North America, will not fail, I feel assured, to meet the approbation of the Legislative Council and Assembly. In settling the scale of postage, His Majesty's Government has been guided in a great measure by the Report of a Committee of the House of Assembly in Upper Canada, which sat about three years ago, and which is understood to have founded its recommendation chiefly on the rates of charge in the United States.

In the important matter of the charges on the conveyance of Newspapers, and printed periodical works, His Majesty's Government has not been unmindful of the representations which it has from time to time received of the wishes of the people in British North America; a rate of Postage is proposed in the present Bill, which is little more than one half of the rate charged in the United States, and which is as low as it could be, unless the papers were conveyed for nothing; a course which might render the amount of business in the Post Office perfectly unmanageable.

It will be observed that the Bill confers on the Deputy Post Master General the power of determining with the concurrence of the Government and the Executive Council what shall be deemed a Newspaper, printed Vote, &c. within the meaning of the Act.

This power is designed to spare the necessity of tedious actions in law, to ascertain doubtful points, and is conformable with a power which has been given to the Post Master General in this Country, in concurrence with the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury, by the late Act 4 and 5 W. 4, cap. 44.

I have now to draw your attention to a very important part of the Bill:—should the Post Office Revenue prove unequal to the expenditure, it is obvious that there must be some immediate means of supplying the want; a temporary deficiency in the Post Office Revenue, however short, must be attended with the most serious inconvenience, as affecting a service which could not stop for a day without injuring the Commerce, and confounding the general transactions of the whole Country. Impressed by this view, His Majesty's Government has determined with a full sense of the magnitude of the discretionary authority which the measure will place in the Governor, to propose a clause authorizing him to grant a Warrant for any sum within certain specified limits, which may be shown to his satisfaction to be necessary for the conduct of the Post Office Department.

In considering the limits to be assigned to this authority in each Colony, the Government has been guided by the following portions of a Report from the Deputy Post Master General at Quebec.

The Deputy Post Master General of British North America supposes upon a rough estimate that the deficiency in receipts, to meet the current expenditure in the management of the Post Office Department, may amount to even as much as £6,000 per annum, and he states that without some certain means of obtaining that, or any less deficiency, the business of the Department would come to a stand still; and the Framers of the Law would be upbraided for not having provided against such a contingency. Calculating the supposed deficiency at the maximum of £6,000, he proceeds to state that the following sums correspond pretty nearly with the proportionate amount of postage business transacted within the Province.

Lower Canada,	£2,000.
Upper Canada,	2,000.
Nova Scotia,	1,200.
New Brunswick,	600.
Prince Edward's Island,	200.
Total,	£6,000.

Conformably with the foregoing report £600 is proposed as the extent to which the Officer administering the Government may issue Warrants on account of the Post Office in New Brunswick.

"It

"It is contemplated to attach the privilege of Franking to seats in the Council and Assembly, in imitation of the right enjoyed by the Members of the two Houses of Parliament in this Country; I hope that this provision will be deemed just in principle and conducive to that distinction which it must be desirable to confer on individuals who form part of the Legislature of the Country.

"In carrying into effect the amendments in the old Law of 5 Geo. 3, c. 25, His Majesty's Government would have preferred, after having passed the necessary Imperial Statute, to have left the subsidiary Provincial Enactments to the discretion of the different Legislatures. But it was felt that the efficiency of the measure depended almost entirely on an uniformity of Legislation in the several Provinces, and this could only be accomplished by preparing in this Country a Draft of the Bill which the Imperial Act would render necessary. The only objection to this course has been that it might be construed into an interference with the deliberations of the Provincial Legislatures, which it is desirable to leave on all occasions free and unshackled. I should hope however that in a question of this nature, there is no reason to fear such an objection.

"I think it will be desirable that you should endeavour to impress on the Assembly the necessity of their abstaining as much as possible from amendments destructive of the uniformity of the Bill. There are some clauses nevertheless which are left wholly for the decision of the Colonial Legislatures. I allude to the punishments to be inflicted under the Act. His Majesty's Government have felt great delicacy in offering any suggestion on these points; and it is perhaps the most satisfactory course to leave them to the consideration of the Assemblies themselves, who will, I doubt not, devote to the subject that mature deliberation which its importance demands.

"It is of course necessary that all the Acts passed by the several Legislatures on the present subject should take effect from the same day. The 1st of January, 1836, is named in the accompanying Draft in order to secure ample time for the due consideration of the Acts.

That upon the question for adopting the amendment, the Committee divided, and it was decided in the negative.

The question was then taken on the first Section of the said Bill, and it passed in the affirmative.

The following was then moved as a Section to the Bill:—

"And be it enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief, for the time being, to appoint such and so many fit and proper persons as he, in his discretion, shall see fit, to act as Drill Sergeants to Drill Officers and Privates in the several Militia Corps of this Province, whose services as Drill Sergeants as aforesaid, with reasonable travelling charges, shall be paid for by Warrant of His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor or Commander in Chief, by and with the consent of His Majesty's Council: Provided always, nevertheless, that the sum of money to be drawn as aforesaid shall not exceed the sum of ——— Pounds in any one year."

Another Section was then moved to the Bill, as follows:—

"And be it enacted, That the Adjutants and Sergeant Majors of Battalions shall be allowed the sum of ——— yearly for their services, from the Funds of the Battalions to which they respectively belong."

Another Section was then moved to the Bill, as follows:—

"And be it enacted, That no Captain or other Officer of the Militia Forces shall in future either directly or indirectly treat their Companies upon days of muster or inspection with any Spirituous Liquor, Wine, Beer or other strong drink, under any pretence whatever."

The question being then taken on this Section, the Committee again divided,—and it was likewise decided in the negative.

The following amendment was then moved, "dele" the whole of second Section of the Bill and substitute the following—

"II. And be it enacted, That instead of the annual payment of thirty shillings, required from Aliens by the Sixteenth Section of the above recited Act, the annual sum of Ten Shillings only shall be hereafter required, any thing in the said Act to the contrary notwithstanding."

And upon the question, it passed in the affirmative,

That the following was then moved to stand as a third section to the Bill.

"III. And be it enacted, That so much of the twenty second Section of the above recited Act which requires payment from exempts, be and the same is hereby repealed," which also passed in the affirmative.

“ That upon examining the correspondence with the Government of Quebec on the subject of Saint Paul's Island, they find that the efforts of His Excellency Lord Aylmer to induce the Parliament of Lower Canada to adopt some plan for the construction and maintenance of Light Houses on that Island, have hitherto proved unavailing ; yet as His Excellency has not had an opportunity of laying the Resolutions of this House, dated 21st March last, upon that subject, before the House of Assembly of Lower Canada, Your Committee still hope that they will, at their next meeting, accede to the proposals of this House therein contained ; but, even if they should not, Your Committee still think that a duty as contemplated in those Resolutions is necessary, as they find that the annual expense for the support of the Establishment on that

Island, has for some years past been about £300, which has been provided for out of the general Fund of the Province. They therefore recommend that a Bill be prepared in accordance with the said Resolutions, imposing a duty on all Vessels (coasters excepted) entering the Ports of this Province in the Gulf of Saint Lawrence.

Your Committee further report, that they find by reference to the Laws of Prince Edward Island, that an Act was passed the last Session of its Legislature levying a Duty of Two-pence per Ton on Vessels clearing out therefrom, to be applied in aid of and supporting Light Houses; They therefore recommend that an Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, requesting His Excellency will be pleased to correspond with the Administrator of the Government of that Island on the subject of Light Houses on Saint Paul's Island, in order to ascertain if the Legislature of that Colony will contribute towards so beneficial a purpose.

Your Committee on inspection of the Report of the Commissioners of Lights for the Bay of Fundy, find that they have not expended the grant made by this House at their last Session, of £400, for placing a Beacon or Buoy, on the Quaco Ledge, in consequence of the inutility of such expenditure. Your Committee, in accordance with the recommendation of the said Commissioners, recommend that the said sum of £400 be re-appropriated to the Commissioners, for the purpose of erecting a Light House on the Thurum Cap, off the west head of Quaco Harbour.

Your Committee also recommend, that in accordance with the communication of Harris & Allan, the contractors for erecting and completing the machinery for a Fog Bell on Partridge Island, to the Commissioners of the Harbour Lights, that the sum of £10, for the erection of a Building to support or contain the Bell, be appropriated for that purpose, as the Light House to which it was intended to be attached was found to be a situation very unfavorable for the conveyance of sound—as the Bell, on trial, could not be heard at a sufficient distance to be of the service intended.

Your Committee further recommend, that the Light House at the entrance of Saint Andrews' Harbour, be placed on the establishment of Lights under the direction of the Commissioners of Lights, for Machias Seal Islands and Head Harbour, and that suitable provision be made for the support of the same.

"Your Committee, however, cannot recommend the adoption of any Legislative measures of a nature prohibitory or coercive, which they think would tend rather to retard than advance the object of the Petitioners.

"Your Committee have taken into consideration the Laws of the Province enacted for the regulation of Inns and Taverns: They are of opinion that some amendments are necessary, and they have prepared a Bill for that purpose; but they respectfully submit, that all Legislative interference must be futile and insufficient without the co-operation of the Benches of Magistrates in the several Counties, who should perform the important duty devolving upon them in an independent and conscientious manner; and on this subject, Your Committee do not hesitate to say, that many of the evils, now so justly complained of, arise in a great measure from the practice of granting Tavern and Retail Licenses to persons by whom the Public is rather distressed than accommodated.

“The Committee have also had under consideration, the Petition of R. W. Crookshank, and others, Merchants of the City of Saint John, relative to the present rate of Duty on Wines, and they are of opinion, that the allegations in the said Petitions are entitled to much consideration. It evidently appears, that there being no difference in the Duties on high and low priced Wines, materially affects the consumption, and prevents the introduction of a sound cheap article, which, if imported, would soon have a tendency to supplant the too frequent use of ardent Spirits ; and they therefore recommend that the Duties be Ad-valorem, and regulated according to the cost of the article, first, however, placing a small Duty per Gallon on Wines of all descriptions. The Committee are of opinion, that some steps should be taken to prevent other Duties on Wine by Act of Parliament, being collected by the Officers of His Majesty’s Customs, than those under the late Act, being seven and a half per cent. Ad-valorem, as it is stated to be the practice to collect the Duty of £7 7s. sterling, per tun, ~~on~~ Wines—the cost of which would not give by the 7½ per cent. Ad-valorem Duties to the same amount.

“The Committee have also had the Petition of Thomas Marjoribanks and others, Bakers of the City of Saint John, praying a duty may be imposed on Biscuit imported into this Province under consideration, and are of opinion, that it would be inexpedient at present to grant the prayer of said Petition.

“The annual charges against the Province amount to nearly £20,000, independent of the appropriations for Roads and Bridges.

"The Committee would respectfully recommend, that the annual allowances usually granted out of the Ordinary Revenues of the Province to the Law Officers of the Crown should, after the present year, be discontinued; that in providing for the Ordinary Services, and in making all the other necessary appropriations, the nature and extent of the several services should be fully considered, and that in no case should more than a fair compensation be allowed.

"The inconveniences and losses arising from the want of the means to enable the Treasurer to make ready payments, have long been severely felt throughout the Province: The Committee therefore respectfully recommend, that the Revenue may be so increased, or the expenditure so reduced, as to insure prompt payments at the Treasury.

"The Committee consider the internal improvement of the Country as an object of the highest importance, and they are convinced that a strict and rigid economy in all the appropriations is absolutely necessary, in order to secure a proper share of the Revenue for opening and improving the Roads.

“ Since the Bank went into operation, a period of upwards of fourteen years, only about forty pounds have been lost by bad debts. The amount now outstanding is *all* considered good, and no real estate is held as collateral security for any part of it; a circumstance alike creditable to the Bank and the Community.

“ Your Committee having had free and full access to all the Books and discount Sheets, investigated particularly the proceedings of the Bank for the last two years, as regarded its transactions with the Public in loaning money, and they deem it their duty to state, that so far as they could discover, no undue preference has been given, but on the contrary, many instances appeared where accommodation had been refused to the Directors, and afforded to others.

“ With a view to shew the Public the causes which led the Bank to press upon the Commercial Community during the last Winter, to such an extent, for a proportion of the amount then due, your Committee examined the Books to ascertain how the Bank stood on the 1st November, 1833, and they found, that at that period

“That

“ That the Poll be kept open not to exceed eight days, exclusive of Sundays, in any County.

“ That it be made imperative on the Sheriff to move the Poll to any part of the County, by the request of at least one half of the Candidates.

“ That the form of Oath of a Freeholder's qualification be altered, and that he be required to state whether he holds by purchase, descent, marriage, or by what other tenure, and in what Parish his Freehold is situate.

“ That in case the qualification of any Candidate be publicly questioned at the Poll, by two or more Freeholders, he shall, within twenty-four hours thereafter, at the Poll, state on Oath to the Sheriff his qualification—where situate—and by what tenure he holds the same, and that it is worth the amount required by Law, for the qualification of a Candidate, over and above all incumbrances; and in default thereof, the Sheriff shall erase the name of such Candidate from the Poll Book.

“ That that part of the third Section of 31 Geo. III cap. 17, and that part of the 9 Geo. IV cap. 36, relating to incumbrances on the real estate of Candidates, shall not be construed to extend to any other incumbrances than Mortgages and Deeds of Trust.

“ That any person who may vote at any Election without being duly qualified, shall be liable to a penal Action at the suit of any one of the Candidates; which Action shall be brought within six months next after the close of such Election;—and the Defendant in such actions shall be liable to a penalty not exceeding Twenty pounds, nor less than Forty shillings.

“ That such part of the 4th Section 9 Geo. IV cap. 36, as relates to a Certificate of a vacancy occurring in the Representation of Kent or Gloucester, and requires such Certificate from a Member of the House in the County of Northumberland, be repealed.

“ That any Member may at any time vacate his seat by letter to the Speaker, which letter is to be signed in the presence of, and attested by a Judge of the Supreme Court, or Justice of the Inferior Court of Common Pleas; and that upon a Seat being thus vacated, the Speaker do forthwith issue his Warrant for the Election of a Member to fill such vacancy.

“ That the 10, 11 and 13 Sections of the 31 Geo. III cap. 17, and the 5 Section 9 Geo. IV cap. 36, be repealed.

“ THE Lieutenant Governor informs the House of Assembly, that he has received His Majesty’s commands to resume the collection of the Quit Rents in this Province, from the period to which they were relinquished by His Majesty, namely, Midsummer 1831.

“ SIR,

“ I HAVE had under my consideration your Dispatch, No. 15, of the 5th of March last, accompanied by an Address of the Assembly drawing attention to a former joint Address of the Legislative Council and Assembly, praying that Aliens, desirous to become naturalized in New Brunswick, might be relieved from the necessity of taking the Sacramental Test, as prescribed by the 2d Section of the Act 13 Geo. 2, cap. 7.

“ His Majesty’s Government feels itself precluded from acceding to the suggestion that it should recommend the Repeal of this Clause by Parliament. In order however to afford relief to persons of foreign birth who have been long resident in the Colony, with the wish to be deemed British Subjects, there will be no objection to consent to a Provincial Law enacting that individuals who have had their settled place of abode in New Brunswick for seven years or more, previous to the passing of the Statute, may become entitled to the privileges of natural born subjects by taking the Oath of Allegiance within three years after the passing of the Act, if they be of the full age of 16 at that time; if not, within three years from their attaining that age. The Oath of Allegiance administered under any such Provincial Act might also be made to include a Declaration that the party had been an actual resident for seven years, according to the intention of the Statute. I annex the form of an Oath which would meet both objects. It must be understood, that no Bill of the nature in question could be assented to unless it were entirely retrospective—neither could any provision be admitted respecting the renunciation of any allegiance, or supposed allegiance, to any foreign State. That question must be decided by the general Law of Nations, without being made the subject of any enactment, either remedial or declaratory. Finally, you will not be at liberty to assent to any Act on the present important and difficult subject, unless it contain a clause suspending its operation until the pleasure of His Majesty be signified.

“ I do not propose, by the foregoing communication, to urge upon the Legislative Council and Assembly any particular

icular measure respecting Aliens as a course recommended by His Majesty's Government. I feel that the Legislature itself must be the best judge what local circumstances may admit of or require on this subject. But in stating the inability of His Majesty's Government to adopt one particular mode of proceeding suggested by the Council and Assembly, I was unwilling to abstain from pointing out another expedient which occurred to me as a means of enabling the Legislature to accomplish the object it has in view.

"You will have the goodness to transmit a copy of this Dispatch, by Message, to both Houses of the Provincial Parliament.

*Extract of a Dispatch from the Right Honorable Earl of Aberdeen to His Excellency Sir Archibald Campbell, Bart. dated* "Downing Street, 24th December, 1834.

"I HAVE had under my serious consideration your Dispatch, No. 17, of the 24th March last, accompanied by an Address to His Majesty from the House of Assembly, respecting the recent offer which had been made to them of the Proceeds of the Crown Revenues in New Brunswick.

"From various parts of the Address, I infer that the proposals conveyed to the Assembly, through my Predecessor, must have been misapprehended in more than one important particular; and I have especially remarked the erroneous assumption that, in offering to surrender the proceeds of the Crown Lands, it was intended also to give up their management, and to place them under the control of the Legislature.

"From the course of their proceedings, as well as the tenor of the present expression of their sentiments, the Assembly must be understood to consider it an indispensable condition that the payments of the Land Company should be comprised among the objects to be surrendered to them. This is a condition to which His Majesty's Government cannot agree. His Majesty's Government would also be unable to recognise the interpretation which was placed on their former offer, so far as regards the control over the Lands belonging to the Crown in New Brunswick. Under these circumstances, I can only desire you to convey to the Assembly His Majesty's regret, that the objects of their Address cannot be complied with; and adverting to the wide difference between the views entertained by the Government and those manifested by the Assembly on this subject, it seems to me that no advantage could be anticipated from making any further proposals at present, respecting the cession of the Territorial Revenue."

Mr. Gilbert therefore seeks to obtain the value of said land, the quantity being one and one-twentieth Acres, as appears by the Certificate of the Surveyor. Mr. Gilbert has furnished a statement of his claim, as follows :—

“ That they have had under their consideration a Petition from sundry inhabitants of the County of Queen’s, praying that measures may be adopted by the Legislature for the purpose of connecting the water of the River Saint John with that of Gage Town Creek, by means of a Canal across Grimross neck ; and after a deliberate consideration of the matters therein contained are of opinion, that the accomplishment of this object would greatly improve the navigation of that part of the River called ‘ no man’s friend’ for all description of sailing Vessels and Steam Boats, and also tend in a particular manner to facilitate the passage of Timber Rafts at the above place ; for by means of a Canal there, a circuitous rout of near four miles would be saved, and the danger that invariably attends Rafts at that place during the Freshet of being carried by the force of the current into the Dug Way would be avoided.

“ And your Committee are further of opinion, that the above measure would be attended with great advantage and convenience to the inhabitants of Gage Town, and all persons residing in that Parish, and therefore do not hesitate to recommend the object of the Petitioners to the favorable consideration of the Legislature.

“ They have also had under their consideration the Petition of sundry inhabitants of the Parish of Woodstock, praying Legislative aid for the purpose of removing Rocks in and near the Maductic Falls in the River Saint John, and for the reasons set forth in the Petition, they are of opinion that a sum of money for this purpose might be usefully applied, if expended under the superintendence and direction of a competent person.

“ They are also of opinion from the report of the Representatives of the Counties of York and Carleton, that a small grant of money is necessary to improve the Towing Path on the margin of the River Saint John within those Counties, and also that a small sum is required for improving the navigation of the Tobique.

“ They are also of opinion, that grants of public money for improving the navigation of the great Rivers of the Province generally, would be attended with much benefit to the Country, by diminishing the expence of floating to the Sea board, our principal Staple of exportation.

Mr. Bliss, Master in Chancery, informed the House, that the Council had passed the following Bills without any amendment:—

A Bill to alter and amend an Act, to repeal an Act for the better security of the navigation of certain Harbours in the County of Northumberland, and to make more effectual provision for the better security of the Harbours in the Counties of Northumberland, Kent and Gloucester," so far as relates to the Bay and Harbour of Restigouche, in the said County of Gloucester:

A Bill to make perpetual the Acts of the General Assembly, relating to the surrender of the Principal in discharge of Bail: and

A Bill to continue an Act to regulate the Law, with regard to the course of proceedings on Indictments and Informations in the Supreme Court.

And also that they had agreed to

A Bill for the appointment of Firewards, and the better extinguishing of Fires which may happen in that part of the Parish of Saint Stephen, commonly called Mill Town, and its immediate vicinity, with an amendment, to which they desire the concurrence of the House.

Mr. Wyer, pursuant to leave, brought in a Bill relating to the navigation of the Inner Bay of Passamaquoddy; which was read a first time.

Mr. Putnam, Master in Chancery, informed the House, that the Council had agreed to the Bill, intituled

A Bill to continue an Act, intituled "An Act for regulating the Salmon Fisheries in the County of Gloucester," without any amendment.

Mr. Hill in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that they had gone into consideration of the Bill referred to them, and agreed to the same.

*Ordered*, That the Report be accepted and the Bill engrossed.

On motion of Mr. J. M. Wilmot,

The House went into Committee of the whole, in further consideration of the Messages from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor.

Mr. Taylor in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that they had the Message of the 19th February, on the subject of Quit Rents, again under their consideration, and he was directed to report as follows:—

That in the Committee the following Resolution was moved:—

"*Whereas* it appears by the Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, communicated to the House on the 19th February last, that His Majesty's Commands have been received to resume the collection of the Quit Rents in this Province from Midsummer 1881, the period to which they were heretofore relinquished: and

"*Whereas*, since the failure of all attempts to effect a satisfactory arrangement with His Majesty's Government for the surrender of the Casual and Territorial Revenues in this Province, there appears no alternative for the Legislature, but either to commute those dues by a Grant from the Provincial Funds, or leave the Country exposed to all the inconvenience which would result from their collection by the Crown; therefore

"*Resolved*, As the opinion of this Committee, that it is expedient to offer His Majesty's Government a permanent annual Grant from the Revenues of this Province of \_\_\_\_\_ pounds in lieu of all claims and demands due or to become due for Quit Rents in this Province: and further

"*Resolved*, As the opinion of this Committee, that an humble Address should be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that he will be pleased to communicate such offer to His Majesty's Government, and in the mean time to suspend any further collections of the Quit Rents until His Majesty's pleasure in regard to such offer may be known.

To which the following amendment was moved to be substituted in place thereof.

"*Resolved*. As the opinion of this Committee, that sufficient information has not been afforded to them to enable them to come to any conclusion on a subject of so much importance as that recommended by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in his Message of the 19th February last: That before this Committee could come to any decision with regard to redeeming, commuting or extinguishing the Quit Rents, it is but reasonable that they should be correctly informed upon the following points:—

"1st. Whether the sum required by His Majesty's Government as a commutation or for the redemption of the Quit Rents, is necessary towards the support of the Government of this Province, and if necessary,

"2ndly. To what specific purpose the same will be applied if granted by the Assembly.

"3rdly. Whether the Receipts of the Crown Revenues are not at present more than are required for all purposes of supporting the Provincial Grant, and whether there is

any

any apprehension on the part of Government that any diminution of these Revenues are likely soon to take place to such an extent as would require the addition of the Quit Rents, or a sum in commutation or redemption thereof, for the purposes aforesaid.

"4thly. Whether any further instructions have been received from His Majesty's Government, since the proposition made in 1830 by the Right Honorable Sir George Murray, except the remarks made by Mr. Secretary Stanley in reply to the Deputation; and further

"*Resolved*, As the opinion of this Committee, that any measure for commuting, redeeming or extinguishing the Quit Rents would be unequal and unjust in principle as regards the people of this Province.

"1st. It would be unequal, as the great Land-holders would be relieved in a much greater degree than others who may only possess small Farms, but who contribute equally to the Revenues of the Province.

"2dly. It would be unjust because a large proportion of the Revenues is raised from persons who own no Land in the Province, and who would therefore receive no relief: and further, it would create an unjust and invidious distinction between the old Settlers, and those who settled in the Province under the present system of selling the Crown Lands; and further

"*Resolved*, That any measure short of the absolute extinguishing of the Quit Rents would be in the highest degree unsatisfactory as a commutation or redemption would only transfer the collection of an exceedingly unpopular tax from the Home Government to the Provincial Legislature without any apparent necessity for such collection; therefore

"*Resolved*, That, with due consideration of this important subject, this Committee are of opinion that it is not at present expedient to entertain any proposition for commuting or redeeming the Quit Rents, but that the Imperial Parliament should be addressed upon the subject."

When several amendments were moved to the said amendment.

To expunge in the first clause of the said amendment, after the word "Committee" the following:—

"That sufficient information has not been afforded to them to enable them to come to any conclusion upon a subject of so much importance as that recommended by His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in His Message of the 19th February last, that before this Committee could," and insert "That to enable them to come."

Then to expunge the following clauses—

"2dly. To what specific purpose the same will be applied if granted by the Assembly."

"4thly. Whether any further instructions have been received from His Majesty's Government since the proposition made in 1830 by the Right Honorable Sir George Murray, except the remarks made by Mr. Secretary Stanley in reply to the Deputation."

And then in the last clause but one, to expunge the words "An exceedingly improper" and insert "The amount of the."

It was then moved that the said last amendments be withdrawn.

And upon the question the Committee divided—and it was carried in the affirmative.

The question was then taken for adopting the first amendment—

Mr. Partelow gave notice, that he should, on Monday next, bring under consideration of the House the subject of an humble Address to the Home Government, relative to the Quit Rents and other important matters connected with the welfare of this Province, and submitted several Resolutions embracing those objects, which he laid on the Table for the information of the House.

The House adjourned until Monday morning next at 10 o'clock.

Mr. Hill, from the Committee appointed to prepare a Bill for the Naturalization of Aliens in this Province, agreeably to the Dispatch of the Right Honorable the Earl of Aberdeen, dated the 20th December last, reported, that they had attended thereto, and prepared a Bill under the Title of

“A Bill for the Naturalization of Aliens in this Province;” which he was directed to submit to the House.

The Bill being handed in, was read a first and second times.

On motion of Mr. Hill,

*Whereas* the Legislature have made provision for the support and encouragement of primary Schools, on a scale of liberality commensurate with the financial resources of the Province: and whereas numerous Petitions are annually presented by persons not legally qualified to receive the Provincial Bounty; which Petitions unnecessarily encumber the Journals, and occupy much of the time of the House in discussion of their merits; therefore

*Resolved*, That this House will not in future receive any such Petition from any School Master or Teacher of a Parish School, praying Provincial aid for services performed in that capacity.

To which Mr. Crane moved as an amendment to the second clause of the Preamble,

To strike out all after the word “presented” and insert “from persons seeking Legislative aid for teaching Schools in cases where all the requisites of the Law had not been complied with, thereby causing great delay and loss of time in discussing the merits of said Petitions, and when applications of this nature are successful, having a tendency to cause neglect in complying with the Provisions of the Act relative to Parish Schools.”

And upon the question it was carried in the affirmative.

A further amendment was then moved by Mr. Crane, to strike out all after the word “*Resolved*” and insert “That no provision will in future be made for applications of the above description, unless in cases where it is made to appear to the satisfaction of the House that all the requisites of the Law had been complied with by the person so applying, or that he or she has been prevented by circumstances beyond their control.”

Which was also carried in the affirmative.

The question was then taken upon the Resolution as amended, when it passed in the affirmative.

Application having been made by Mr. Wyer, a Member from Charlotte, Mr. Burns, from the City of Saint John, and Mr. Ford from Kent, for leave of absence,

*Ordered*, Thereupon, that leave be granted.

To strike out the word “now” and insert “this day three months.”

And upon the question it was carried in the affirmative.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

*Resolved*, That the House do agree to the Conference requested by the Legislative Council on the subject matter of the Bill to Incorporate sundry persons by the name of *The Saint John Bridge Company*.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Partelow communicate this Resolution to the Council.

On motion of Mr. L. A. Wilmot.

*Ordered*, That the Resolution of the Legislative Council communicated to the House on the 2nd instant, setting forth their reasons for excepting to the several Resolutions of Appropriation to the Clerks and Clerks Assistant of the Council and Assembly, be referred to the Committee of Privileges.

*Ordered*, That Mr. L. A. Wilmot, and Mr. Brown, be added to the said Committee.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

The House went into Committee of the whole, on a Bill for the establishment and regulation of Boards of Health in the several Counties in this Province.

Mr. Hayward in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that they had gone into consideration of the Bill referred to them, and agreed to the same with amendments, under the Title of a Bill to continue and amend the Act for the establishment and regulation of Boards of Health in the several Counties of this Province.

*Ordered*, That the Report be accepted, and the Bill engrossed as amended, under the amended Title.

On motion of Mr. Crane,

*Resolved*, That the Bill to Incorporate *The Norton Bridge Company*, be recommitted.

The House accordingly resolved itself into said Committee.

Mr. Hayward in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that having the Bill referred to them under reconsideration they made further amendments thereto, and then agreed to the same.

*Ordered*, That the Report be accepted, and the Bill as further amended engrossed.

Mr. Robinson, pursuant to leave, brought in a Bill, intituled “An Act to provide for opening and repairing Roads and erecting Bridges throughout the Province;” which was read a first time.

Mr. Woodward, pursuant to leave, brought in a Bill, to appropriate a part of the Public Revenue for the services therein mentioned; which was read a first time.

Mr. Brown, pursuant to leave, brought in a Bill to appropriate a part of the Public Revenue to the payment of the Ordinary Services of the Province; which was read a first time.

Read a third time as engrossed,

A Bill to Incorporate *The Norton Bridge Company*.

*Resolved*, That the Bill do pass.

*Ordered*, That Mr. Freeze take the said Bill to the Council, and desire their concurrence thereto.

A Message from the Legislative Council.

Mr. Putnam, Master in Chancery, informed the House, that the Council had agreed to

The Bill to continue and amend the Laws for raising a Revenue, and that they had agreed to the Bill to regulate Tavern Keepers and Retailers, without any amendment.

And that he was further directed to inform the House that

The Honorable Mr. Simonds was appointed the Conferee, on the part of the Council, on the subject matter of the Bill to Incorporate sundry persons by the name of the Saint John Bridge Company.

Mr. Partelow, pursuant to notice given on Saturday last the 7th instant, brought under consideration of the House the subject of Quit Rents, Casual Revenue, and other matters connected with the Province, and submitted the following Resolutions:—

*Resolved*, As the opinion of this House, that the recent determination of His Majesty's Government to resume the collection of the Quit Rents in this Province, is a measure deeply to be deplored, inasmuch as an exaction of such a peculiar description is calculated to excite agitation and discontent and should be resorted to upon the grounds of absolute necessity alone.

*Resolved*, As the opinion of this House, that the necessity of making such collection in this Province, as a provision for any part of the Civil List does not exist, but on the contrary the flourishing state of the Casual and Territorial Revenues under the control of His Majesty's Government, and solely at their disposal, renders the imposition of so impolitic a claim upon the Country extremely odious; for without it, there appears a clear surplus Revenue of about £7,000 per annum, over and above what is called the established Civil List of the Province, independently of the large amount received and to be received from the Land Company, and notwithstanding the very large Salaries of some of the Officers chargeable on the said Revenues.

*Resolved*. As the opinion of this House, that His Majesty would not have been advised to direct the collection of the Quit Rents in this Province, if His Majesty had been in possession of full information regarding the state of the Crown Revenues; the ground of necessity alone being held up for their enforcement, both in this Province, as appears by the Attorney General's letter to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor in 1833, where he states that the Quit Rents were "Dues necessary for the support of the Civil Establishment of the Colony," and in Nova Scotia by Sir Colin Campbell's Speech at the opening of the Legislature.

*Resolved*, As the opinion of this House, that no part of the Civil List should be paid for out of any other Revenues belonging to the Crown than those raised in this Province; and that as the resources of the Country at the disposal of His Majesty's Government, if carefully husbanded, are and will continue to be amply sufficient to support a well arranged and economical Civil List, adapted to its circumstances, without the necessity of imposing additional burthens; it is the imperative duty of this House, humbly and respectfully to make any suggestions for the gracious consideration of His Majesty, which may have a tendency to prevent a misapplication or an improper expenditure of any part of such Revenues.

*Resolved*. As the opinion of this House, that therefore a representation should be made to His Majesty's Government relative to the Salaries of some of the Officers before alluded to and paid from the Crown Revenues, comparing such Salaries with those enjoyed by Public Officers of high responsibility provincially appointed.

*Resolved*. As the opinion of this House, that His Majesty should at the same time be addressed on the general state of the Province, particularly with regard to the Casual and Territorial Revenue, the constantly increasing rates of duties imposed

posed at the Crown Land Office on Timber and Lumber, the variation in the price of Wild Land, and also that it be especially brought under His Majesty's notice, the inexpediency and impolicy of resorting to such an exaction as that of Quit Rents, when the small nett amount which would be derived therefrom, is not required for the purposes of Government; and further

*Resolved*, That information should be sought for from His Majesty's Government whether power is given to the Commissioner of Crown Lands or any other authority within the Province, at any time to impose such duties on Timber and Lumber licensed to be cut on Crown Lands, as well as to demand such prices for the Wild Lands of the Province, as he in his discretion may think fit.

*Ordered*, That a Committee be appointed to prepare an Address embracing the subject matter of the foregoing Resolutions, and that Mr. Partelow, Mr. Crane, and Mr. Woodward, do compose the said Committee.

Which were agreed to.

And on like motion of Mr. Partelow,

The House went into consideration of the said Address, when it was again read, and upon the question was unanimously agreed to by the House, and is as follows:—

### **To the King's Most Excellent Majesty.**

*The Humble Petition of Your Majesty's Legislative Council and House of Assembly of the Province of New Brunswick, in General Assembly convened:*

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,

**WE**, Your Majesty's faithful Subjects, the Legislative Council and Assembly of New Brunswick, have learnt, with much satisfaction, from the despatch of the late Secretary of State for the Colonies, dated 2d May, 1834, that it was not the intention of His Majesty's Government to propose to Parliament any alteration in those Duties affecting the Timber and Deal Trade of that year, and that no step will be taken without the fullest consideration of the Colonial interests involved.

Experience has proved, that so long as this highly important question is involved in doubt and uncertainty, prudent persons will be deterred from investing capital in the establishment of Mills of approved construction, Stores, Wharves, and other works requisite for conducting the Trade in those articles extensively and advantageously.

The building of Mills fitted with machinery manufactured in the Mother Countries, would have the immediate effect of greatly improving the quality of Deals and all other kinds of sawed Lumber in these Colonies; and there can be no doubt that the Trade in these articles or in squared Timber never can be carried on to the greatest advantage of which it is susceptible, either to the Parent State or to these Colonies, unless those concerned in it are assured, that no change unfavorable to the North American Colonies will be made, until time shall have been given for a reasonable profit to be derived from the capital to be invested in such establishments.

We need not enlarge on the policy, the vital importance, of fostering a Trade, the healthy and hardy character of which affords the best nursery for Seamen—which employs upwards of two thousand sail of British Shipping—offers cheap transport and immediate employment to vast numbers of Emigrants—secures an increased and a continually increasing consumption of British manufactures—and

which

which so manifestly and powerfully tends to strengthen the ties that bind us to the Parent State; for we have the most confident expectation that the consideration which Your Majesty's Government will give to interests so vast and important, both in a Colonial and National point of view, must lead to the rejection of the solicitations of those who desire a change that would prove ruinous to the Colonies, and beneficial only to Foreign Countries, and the comparatively few British merchants who are commercially connected with those Countries.

Craving leave to refer to former Petitions of the Council and Assembly, laid before Your Majesty in the years of 1831 and 1833, respectively, it now only remains for us, most humbly to entreat Your Majesty, that this subject, so important to the mercantile and manufacturing interests, and to the maritime power of the United Kingdom, as well as to the prosperity of the North American Colonies, may receive the most serious consideration, and that no change in the scale of duties on Timber and Deals, unfavourable to British interests, may be made.

And as in duty bound will ever pray, &c.

At D. expunge “XXIX” and insert “XXXI.”

At E. expunge “XXX” and insert “XXXII.”

Expunge Section XIII and insert the following :—

“And be it enacted, That the said Company shall and may erect and set up or cause to be erected and set up one or more Gate or Gates, Turnpike or Turnpikes, in, upon and across the said intended Bridge or within twenty yards thereof, together with Toll Houses, and proper and necessary buildings, conveniencies and fences near to each Gate or Turnpike, across the said intended Bridge, or the road or avenue immediately communicating therewith, and within twenty yards of the said Bridge ; and that the respective Tolls following may be demanded and taken by such person or persons as the said Company shall from time to time appoint at each of the said Gates or Turnpikes, for each and every time of passing over the said Bridge, (that is to say ;)—

“For every foot Passenger, three pence ; For every Horse, Mare, Gelding, Mule or Ass with one Person, one shilling and three-pence ; For every additional Horse, Mare, Gelding, Mule or Ass, one shilling ; For every Carriage drawn by one Horse or Beast of draught, with one person, two shillings ; For every Horse or Beast of draught more than one drawing a Carriage, six-pence ; For every person more than one with a Carriage, two-pence ; For Neat Cattle, four-pence each ; For Sheep, Calves, or Hogs, one half-penny each : Provided always, That no Toll be exacted from Children under five years of age.”

*Resolved*, That the House do concur in the said proposed amendments, and that they be added to the said Bill by way of Ryders.

*Resolved*, That a Conference be requested with the Legislative Council on the subject of the last Conference; and

*Ordered*, That the Managers of the last Conference do request the same.

A Message from the Legislative Council.

Mr. Putnam, Master in Chancery, informed the House, that the Council had agreed to the Conference requested on the subject matter of the last Conference, and that the Honorable Mr. Simonds is appointed the Conferee on the part of that House; to meet such Conferees as the Assembly may appoint.

On motion of Mr. Crane,

*Resolved*, That Mr. Street take the said Resolution to the Council, and desire their concurrence thereto.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

The House went into Committee of the whole, in further consideration of the Address to His Majesty on the subject of Quit Rents and other matters connected with the Province.

Mr. McLeod in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that they had the Address referred to them again under consideration and made further progress therein, and he was directed to ask leave to sit again.

*Ordered*, That the Report be accepted and leave granted.

A Message from the Legislative Council.

Mr. Putnam, Master in Chancery, informed the House, that the Council had agreed to the Resolution of Appropriation of the 4th March.

Read a third time as engrossed,

A Bill to appropriate a part of the Public Revenue to the payment of the Ordinary Services of the Province, and for other services therein mentioned.

When an amendment was moved thereto, to strike out, in the grant to the Speaker and Members of this House, after the words "General Assembly," the following:—

"The sum of fifteen shillings per day, such attendance to be certified by the Speaker," and insert the words—"the sum of thirty pounds."

And upon the question it was carried in the affirmative.

*Ordered*, That Mr. L. A. Wilmot take the said Bill to the Council, and desire their concurrence thereto.

On motion of Mr. Street,

"Whereas, the Legislative Council have not concurred in the Bill for altering and amending

amending the present line of Great Road of communication between Fredericton and Miramichi: And Whereas, there are doubts entertained as to whether a better line of Road may not be found on the North side of the South West Branch of the Miramichi River from Swim's Ferry up, than the line recommended by Alexander Goodfellow and others, on the South side of the said River from Robert Doak's up, especially as it is thought that a good site for a Bridge across the Miramichi may be found above Bois's on that Branch of the said River: And Whereas, there is an application from the Land Company, to have the Great Road of communication between Fredericton and Miramichi altered from the present line, and to extend through the Companys' Land: And Whereas, it is highly desirable to have these Lines thoroughly examined and explored before adopting either: therefore

*Resolved*, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that he will be pleased to appoint three fit and proper Persons to explore and examine a line of Road on the North side of the South West Branch of the Miramichi River, from Swim's Ferry up, to the most eligible site for a Bridge across the said River; and also to examine the line of Road recommended by the said Land Company, and the one recommended by Alexander Goodfellow and others, and to report to this House at the next sitting of the Legislature, the result of such examination and explorations, and their opinions particularly, as to which of the two lines it will be most desirable to adopt as the Great Road of communication between Fredericton and Miramichi, and especially as to the expediency of carrying the Road on the North side of the said River from Swim's Ferry up, instead of crossing at Doak's as at present established, and as to where the best site for a Bridge across the said River may be found, and the probable expense of erecting the same, with all other particulars as to the difference in the distance and expense of making the said Road agreeable to the line recommended by the Land Company, and that recommended by Alexander Goodfellow and others: And further, that His Excellency will be pleased to direct the money granted the present Session for that Road to be expended as follows, viz:—One hundred pounds thereof, towards bearing the expense of the above explorations; a sum not exceeding One hundred pounds, other part thereof, in keeping the old Road between Bois's and Fredericton in repair, a sum not exceeding One hundred pounds, other part thereof, in keeping the old Road between Bois's and Robert Doak's in repair; and the residue of the said One thousand five hundred pounds in making and finishing that part of the said Great Road lying between Swim's Ferry, (opposite Doak's) and Newcastle; and further

*Resolved*, That should any thing occur, to prevent the expenses of the said exploration from being paid from the above mentioned source, that this House will provide for the same at the next sitting of the Legislature."

*Ordered*, That Mr. Street, Mr. Woodward and Mr. Miles, be a Committee to wait upon His Excellency with the Address.

On motion of Mr. Wyer,

*Whereas*, by the recent regulations relative to the granting of Licenses to cut Timber, Mill, and other Lumber, on Crown Lands, published in the Royal Gazette of 11th instant, by the Commissioner of Crown Lands, it appears, that in future, Permits for Timber Berths of unlimited extent for a term of five years will be granted; and also, that an additional Tonnage Duty of 6d. per ton on Timber, 6d. per thousand on White Pine, and 1s. per thousand on Spruce Mill Lumber will be required: And Whereas, such regulations, with others of a very objectionable nature, will not only open a door to the granting of very extensive reserves, and thereby throw a decided advantage into the hands of Capitalists, to the manifest injury of the enterprising Trader and Lumberer, but by increasing the duty, tend greatly to embarrass and injure the Trade, the old rate of duty having been found by experience even greater than the Trade will bear: therefore

*Resolved*, That an humble Address be presented to His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, praying that he will be pleased to prevent the above mentioned regulations, so far as relates to the granting of Timber Berths of an unlimited extent, and

and the increasing the Tonnage Duty on Timber and Mill Lumber, from going into operation, the same being calculated, in the opinion of this House, very materially to injure the Trade and prosperity of the Country."

*Ordered*, That Mr. Wyer, Mr. Street and Mr. Taylor, be a Committee to wait upon His Excellency with the Address.

Mr. J. M. Wilmot, a Member for the County of Saint John, applied for leave of absence, which was granted.

On motion of Mr. Partelow,

The House went into Committee of the whole, in further consideration of the Address to His Majesty on the subject of Quit Rents and other matters connected with the Province.

Mr. M'Leod in the Chair of the Committee.

Mr. Speaker resumed the Chair.

The Chairman reported, that having the Address referred to them again under their consideration they made amendments thereto, and then agreed to the said Address.

*Ordered*, That the Report be accepted.

The Address, as amended, being then agreed to by the House, was ordered to be engrossed.

Mr. Street, from the joint Committee of the Legislative Council and House of Assembly, appointed to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, to request that His Excellency would be pleased to cause the Petition of both Houses to His Majesty on the subject of the Timber and Deal Duties, to be laid at the Foot of the Throne, reported, that they have attended to that duty, and that His Excellency was pleased to say, he would have much pleasure in transmitting a Petition of so great importance, both to the Mother Country and to this Colony.

The engrossed joint Address of the Legislative Council and Assembly to His Majesty and the Imperial Parliament upon the subject of the North Eastern Boundary of the United States, was read and is as follows:—

*"The Humble Address of Your Majesty's Legislative Council and House of Assembly of the Province of New Brunswick, in General Assembly convened:*

"MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,

**WE** Your Majesty's faithful and loyal Subjects, the Legislative Council and Assembly of the Province of New Brunswick, feeling that the interests of this Province are deeply involved in the question now in dispute, between Your Majesty and the United States of America, relating to the Boundary between the British Territories in North America and the said United States, are induced to address Your Majesty upon this subject, with sentiments of unshaken attachment to Your Majesty's Person and Government.

"Deeply impressed with a sense of Your Majesty's constant wishes to promote the prosperity of all parts of Your extended Empire, we have the fullest confidence in the determination of Your Majesty's Government, to maintain Your Majesty's rights, and preserve the integrity of those Your North American Dominions, in the settlement of this most important question.

"We beg leave most humbly to represent, that a speedy settlement thereof is earnestly to be desired, as well for the quiet and welfare of the Inhabitants of those parts of Your Majesty's possessions which are claimed by the United States, as for the general benefit and advancement of this Province.

"And as in duty bound will ever pray, &c."

And on motion of Mr. L. A. Wilmot,

*Resolved*, That a Committee be appointed to join such Committee as may be appointed by the Council, to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with the Address, and to request that His Excellency will be pleased to transmit the same to His Majesty, to be laid at the Foot of the Throne.

*Ordered*, That Mr. L. A. Wilmot, Mr. Woodward and Mr. Hayward, be the Committee



Committee for that purpose, and that Mr. L. A. Wilmot acquaint the Council with the appointment.

Mr. Connell, a Member for the County of Carleton, applied for leave of absence, which was granted.

A Message from the Legislative Council.

Mr. Putnam, Master in Chancery, informed the House, that the Council had agreed to

A Bill to Incorporate sundry persons by the name of the Saint John Bridge Company.

A Message from the Legislative Council.

Mr. Putnam, Master in Chancery, informed the House, that the Council had appointed the Honorable Messrs. Botsford and Lee a Committee of that House, to join the Committee of the Assembly, to wait upon His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor and request he will be pleased to transmit the joint Address on the subject of the Boundary Line between this Province and the United States of America, to be laid before His Majesty.

The engrossed Address to His Majesty on the subject of Quit Rents, Casual and Territorial Revenues and other matters connected with the Province, was read and is as follows :—

**“To the King's Most Excellent Majesty.**

**“THE HUMBLE ADDRESS OF THE HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.**

**“MAY IT PLEASE YOUR MAJESTY,**

**66** **Y**HE Assembly of New-Brunswick again most humbly beg leave to approach Your Majesty with those sentiments of loyalty and affection, for which this Colony has been so greatly distinguished.

“Having been informed, by Message from the Lieutenant Governor of the Province, that he had received instructions from Your Majesty's Government to resume the collection of the Quit Rents, unless such an offer of a permanent annual grant should be made to Your Majesty to commute the said Rents, as would induce their suspension until Your Majesty's pleasure should be known; the Assembly felt, that under the peculiar circumstances of the Country, they could not be justified in making such offer, but that they would be best discharging the high and responsible obligations they owed their constituents, in bringing the subject under Your Majesty's most gracious notice, and in a free and frank manner afford Your Majesty the reasons which actuated them in their decision, in the hope that they will be favourably considered by Your Majesty, and lead to the results prayed for.

“The Assembly deem it unnecessary to advert to the vexatious and almost obsolete nature of the claim, the length of time which elapsed (47 years) before it was demanded, and the fact of such a reservation in the grants being considered of so little consequence, that in the numerous transfers of Land it has been practically lost sight of: These are matters which have previously been urged on the consideration of Your Majesty and Your Royal Predecessor; neither will the Assembly dwell upon the litigation and confusion which will inevitably ensue upon any attempt to enforce this impolitic exaction; but they do most humbly contend, with all due submission, that no necessity exists in this Province to make the collection as a provision for any part of the Civil List; and they have good reasons for believing that the want of a sufficient amount to provide for the Civil Establishment of the Province is the only ground for resorting to these Rents. In taking this view of the subject the Assembly are justified, by reference to the Attorney General's letter to the Lieutenant Governor, laid before the Legislature in 1835, in which he states, that the Quit Rents were “dues necessary for the support of the Civil Establishment of the Colony,” and also by Sir Colin Campbell's Speech at the opening of the Legislature in Nova Scotia, wherein it is clearly set forth, that if any other resources had been at the disposal of Your Majesty within that Province, which could have been made available for the payment of the Civil List, no claim for these Rents would ever have been exacted.

“The

“The Assembly call your Majesty’s attention to the relative situation of New-Brunswick and Nova Scotia with regard to the Crown Revenues : In the former they are in a most flourishing condition, and notwithstanding the excessively high Salaries of some of the Officers and the Contingent expences connected with the Civil Establishments, chargeable on the said Revenues, there is a surplus of about £7,000 per annum, after paying what is called the established Civil List, at your Majesty’s disposal, independently of the large amount that is and will be paid in by the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick Land Company : Our sister Province, on the other hand, does not possess such advantages ; the Casual and Territorial Revenues there not being nearly sufficient for the ordinary purposes of Government, and as it is but just and fair that Colonies circumstanced as both Nova Scotia and New Brunswick are, should support their several Civil Establishments from Revenues arising within their respective Territories, without, as formerly, looking for any provision from the Imperial Parliament, it is not to be wondered at that a grant should be sought for by Your Majesty’s Government from the Legislature of Nova Scotia to make up any annual deficiency that had arisen, while at the same time it afforded Your Majesty an opportunity of cancelling a claim upon the inhabitants of that Province, the collection of which would have caused much dissatisfaction.

“The Assembly trust that Your Majesty will see the striking difference in the circumstances of the two Colonies ; the one with a flourishing Revenue under no Legislative control, without the least necessity of Your Majesty being obliged to apply any new burthen upon Your most faithful subjects, by the imposition of additional Duties on the sources whence those Revenues are derived, or to resort to a claim always considered harassing and objectionable in its nature, and though small when individually applied, vexatious in principle and extremely expensive in enforcing ; the other without an amount of similar resources to pay its Civil Establishments, and consequently affording Your Majesty reasonable grounds of resorting to means at Your Majesty’s disposal to induce the Legislature to make up the deficiency.

“Nor can the Assembly conceive from a dispassionate retrospective consideration of the growth of this Colony, and the facilities which it affords to the prosecution of an attainment of honorable independence to the industrious settler, if a judicious policy were observed in the management of the Crown Lands and Forests, that there will be such a falling off of Your Majesty’s Revenues, as will make it indispensibly necessary for a future appeal being made to the Legislature to grant any portion of the Civil List from other Revenues created by them ; on the contrary they are of opinion, if these Revenues are properly husbanded they will continue to afford Your Majesty a large annual surplus, after paying the necessary Civil charges of the Province ; and in this they are borne out by the receipts for the last three years, the recent competition for wild Lands, and the unexpected investments of the Nova Scotia and New-Brunswick Land Company, by which a great amount of British Capital and British Industry has been diverted to and concentrated in New-Brunswick.

“But the Assembly are of opinion, that to make this a matter of certainty it will be necessary that a reduction of some of the Salaries chargeable upon Your Majesty’s Revenues should receive your Majesty’s gracious consideration, as they are entirely beyond the circumstances of the Country to afford, and so far above those allowed other Officers of great responsibility and of Provincial appointment, that the Assembly sincerely trust Your Majesty will bring down the Salaries alluded to, in such a degree as will, in some measure, comport with those paid for by the Colony, and they subjoin a Schedule, to which they humbly beg reference.

“The Assembly urge this, with due submission, on your Majesty’s consideration, as a subject of all others deserving particular attention, for, independently of other reasons which might be given to Your Majesty, the very fact of such enormous Salaries being enjoyed by a few individuals in a young Country, where wealth is comparatively unknown, has a tendency to encourage and promote habits of extravagance and luxury among those of moderate incomes, (with-whom alone they can associate) which frequently end in poverty and distress.

“There is another subject of deep and vital importance to this Colony, which they have to bring under the notice of Your Majesty, and to which Your Majesty’s gracious attention is sought by your faithful Commons.

“ It

"It is universally understood as well as generally believed, that the Commissioner of Crown Lands is subject to no efficient control; duties for Licenses to cut Timber on Crown Lands have been at different times increased, and within a few days an additional Duty of  $3\frac{1}{2}$  per cent. on Timber has been laid; the price of Lands has been and is fluctuating but constantly advancing; and the power with which he is vested is generally viewed by the Mercantile and Lumbering interests of the Country with such alarm that an opinion very generally prevails, exactions of such magnitude might be required at a moment's notice as materially to affect, if not altogether to destroy, the export Trade of the Country. The Assembly beseech Your Majesty graciously to afford them information on those points, and that Your Majesty will not allow any increase to be made hereafter, either in the price of Timber or Wild Lands, until the intention be made known to Your faithful Commons, in order, that if they think such increase not called for, time may be afforded them to lay their reasons at the Foot of the Throne; intimately acquainted as they are with all Sections of the Province, and deeply interested in its settlement and improvement.

"The Assembly need scarcely mention that they are ready, as they have always been, to provide for the Civil Establishment of the Province, upon a scale commensurate with its resources, in the event of all the Crown Revenues in the Colony being placed under the control of the Legislature, and the sources whence they are derived; but this, from the recent Dispatches of the Secretary of State for the Colonies, appears far from being the intention of Your Majesty's Government, yet they cannot refrain from urging upon Your Royal consideration, the benefits which would result to Your Majesty and the people of this Province, by placing the nett proceeds of these Revenues under the control of the Legislature, as it must be manifest to Your Majesty that they have means of knowing the proper objects for public encouragement, which cannot be available to Your Majesty's Government.

"The Assembly, in conclusion, most humbly trust, that for the reasons stated, and others which have formerly been brought under Your Majesty's notice, Your Majesty will be graciously pleased to dispense with the collection of the Quit Rents in this Province, and that Your Majesty will be pleased to give these their other representations such consideration as to Your Majesty may seem meet.

The Members were counted, and there not being a quorum,

The Speaker adjourned the House until to-morrow morning at 10 o'clock.

## TUESDAY, 17th March, 1855.

### Prayers.

A Message from His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor, by Mr. Jouett, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, requiring the immediate attendance of the House in the Council Chamber.

The House attended, and being returned,

Mr. Speaker reported, that he addressed His Excellency to the following effect:—

*May it please Your Excellency,*

The Assembly, during the present Session, diligently applied themselves to the consideration of all matters which have been brought before them: Many Bills have been passed, which, I trust, will, in their operation, prove beneficial to the Province.

The Assembly also passed an Appropriation Bill, wherein provision was made for the payment of the Ordinary Services—for improving the Roads of communication—for erecting and repairing Bridges—for supporting Institutions of acknowledged public benefit—for encouraging the establishment of others of a like

character, and for satisfying many just individual claims upon the Treasury: This Bill also made provision for the payment of the expenses of the Speaker and Members of the Assembly, agreeably to the usage which has invariably prevailed for Thirty four years—a provision which is essential for the preservation of the rights of the constituency of the Province. Provision was not made in this Bill for the payment of the expenses of the President and Members of the Legislative Council, no precedent for such provision being found in the Journals of the Assembly; the Assembly, moreover, considered that such provision would have been inexpedient and improper.

The loss of the Appropriations of the present Session, is most deeply to be lamented;—great inconvenience will thereby be experienced by such Public Officers as depend upon annual grants, and by all persons who have just claims upon the Treasury; the general improvement of the Country will be arrested, and the usefulness of Institutions of acknowledged public benefit may be most injuriously affected.

Under these unfortunate and discouraging circumstances, I feel assured that Your Excellency will adopt such measures, as to Your Excellency may seem best calculated to avert, or to mitigate, the evils which are now impending over the Province.

The Assembly have also passed a Bill to continue and amend the Acts for raising a Revenue, by the operation of which a sufficient sum will be received into the Treasury, to have carried the Appropriation Bill into full effect.

This Bill I now present to Your Excellency, on behalf of His Majesty's faithful and loyal Subjects the Commons of New Brunswick, and pray Your Excellency's assent thereto.

That His Excellency was then pleased to give His assent to the Bill presented by the House, under the Title of

A Bill to continue and amend the Laws for raising a Revenue in this Province:

And also to the following:—

A Bill to repeal all the Laws now in force, for regulating, laying out and repairing the Highways and Roads, and for appointing Commissioners and Surveyors of Highways, in the several Towns and Parishes in this Province, and to make more effectual provision for the same:

A Bill to regulate Tavern Keepers and Retailers:

A Bill, intituled "An Act to authorize the enlargement of the Sittings of the Courts of General Sessions of the Peace and Inferior Courts of Common Pleas in this Province:"

A Bill to continue an Act, intituled "An Act to amend an Act, intituled 'An Act to repeal an Act passed in the fiftieth year of the Reign of His Majesty King George the Third, intituled 'An Act to declare the qualifications of Church Wardens and Vestrymen in the several Parishes in this Province, and of the persons having voices in their election, and to make other and more effectual enactments in lieu thereof, so far as relates to the Parish Church of Saint Andrews:'"

A Bill to revive an Act, intituled, "An Act for the more speedy and effectual punishment of persons keeping disorderly Houses:"

A Bill to alter the time of holding the November Term of the Inferior Court of Common Pleas for the County of Gloucester:

A Bill to continue an Act, intituled "An Act for the better extinguishing of Fires that may happen within the City of Saint John, and to repeal all the Acts now in force relating to the same;" and also, "An Act to amend the Act for the better extinguishing of Fires that may happen within the City of Saint John:"

A Bill further to continue an Act for the more effectual punishment of persons who shall be guilty of the trespasses therein mentioned, in the City of Saint John:

A Bill to revive an Act, intituled "An Act in addition to and in amendment of an Act, intituled 'An Act to revive and make perpetual an Act authorizing the Mayor, Aldermen and Commonalty of the City of Saint John to make regulations for the more effectual prevention of Fires within the said City:'"

A Bill to continue an Act, intituled "An Act to repeal all the Laws now in force for the regulation of Seamen, and to make more effectual provision for that purpose:"

A Bill for prohibiting and suppressing of Lotteries in this Province:

A Bill to continue an Act, intituled "An Act to extend the provisions of an Act, intituled 'An Act to repeal the Laws now in force for appointing Firewards, and the better extinguishing of Fires, so far as the same relate to the Town of Fredericton, and to make regulations more suitable to the said Town, to the Towns of Newcastle and Chatham and their vicinities, in the County of Northumberland:'"

“**H**AVING given my assent to all the Bills which you have passed, I have only to express my extreme regret, that I am under the necessity of closing the Session without there being any Appropriations for the year.”

That His Honor the President of the Legislative Council then said,

"*Honorable Gentlemen of the Legislative Council,*

"*Mr. Speaker, and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly,*

“It is His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor's will and pleasure that this General Assembly be prorogued until the third Tuesday in May next, and this General Assembly is accordingly prorogued until the third Tuesday in May, then here to be holden.”

# REPORT

ON THE LATE

## ATTORNEY GENERAL'S ACCOUNTS.

Mr. Partelow made the following Report to the House :—

**T**HE Committee of the late House, to whom were referred the Accounts of the late Attorney General Wetmore, have to report, that the Chairman repaired to Fredericton in the month of August last, when all the Books, Papers and Documents of the late Attorney General, with the Province, were freely placed at his disposal by the Executors; and having had at the same time free access to the various Reports, Accounts and Documents, under the charge of the Clerk of the House of Assembly, the following report is made up therefrom. The Executors had previously furnished the undersigned with a statement made up from the Books, of the late Attorney General, which will be noticed in proper order.

It appears by reference to the Journals of the Session of 1823, that Bonds then remained in the hands of the late Attorney General for collection, amounting to

From the above it will be seen at one view, that Eight thousand three hundred and fifty-nine pounds, two shillings and nine pence half-penny, in Bonds and Securities remained in the hands of the late Attorney General, at the time of his death, exclusively of a large amount of interest due thereon, which remain to be accounted for.—Besides this large sum, costs to the extent of Seven hundred and twenty-two pounds twelve shillings and seven pence are charged the Province, on suits for the recovery of the Bonds and Securities alluded to, which also must be kept in view, when an account is obtained of the ulterior proceedings that have taken place against the parties. by his successors in Office. In some of the cases it will be observed, by in the preceding Statement, that the costs are not carried out in the column intended for them. This is only where a large payment has been made on account of a Bond or Bonds in Suit, and Your Committee considered it would much simplify the matter, by making the costs in such cases a part of the principal, and carrying out the amount due, in the column, intended for the Bonds. The costs on the various suits alluded to, will be observed by reference to the detailed statement.

Your Committee now proceed to the investigation of the statement of accounts rendered by the Executors, adverted to at the commencement of this Report. They stand in order as follow :—

No. 1. Is an account of costs charged in the late Attorney General's Books on the various suits instituted against parties on Treasury Bonds and Securities, from March, 1822, to the time of his death, February, 1828, amounting to £1,233 14 10

Besides this, various sums to the extent of £65 17 0 are charged for what is termed "*ruling the Sheriffs*,"—which it is questionable, whether the Province ought to pay. Proceedings of this description it appears have only been found necessary, (with one or two exceptions,) in the County of Northumberland.

Of course, in this large bill of costs, every thing is included, whether the actions were brought to final issue or not, and if the House sustain the charges thus made, such parts of them as have been recovered by his Successors in Office, in ulterior proceedings, must be accounted for by them to the Province.

In the investigation of this statement, No. 3. of course reference had to be made to the late Treasurer's accounts, and it was discovered that there was a short credit of £65 0 0 in 1822, and £60 0 0 in 1828, to the Province, when compared with the sums for which the late Attorney General had receipts.		
This having been communicated to the Executors, by the Chairman of the Committee, a short time since, the amount £125 0 0 was promptly paid into the Treasury, and it will appear in that Officer's account next Session, under date of 15th January, 1835,

The charge of £65 17 0 made for "*ruling the Sheriffs*" of course is not included in the above deductions—the propriety of that claim being submitted to the decision of the House.

Your Committee recommend, that immediate information be sought from the present Attorney General, regarding the Bonds which have come into his possession since the late Attorney General's death, in the course of prosecution at that time; what proceedings have been had thereon; the amount recovered from each party, and the costs; and how much of such costs were earned by the late Attorney General, and received by the present one, in order that it may be ascertained how far the Bill of Costs, now charged the Province, by the former, may be sustainable, and to what extent the present Attorney General may be liable to the Province, for the costs collected by him, and which, being earned by the late Attorney General,

are claimed by the Executors from the Province. Until this be obtained Your Committee would respectfully recommend, that no proceedings be taken on this Report—as from the complexion of matters, there can be no doubt there will be a large deficiency in the receipts, when compared with the amount of Bonds in the late Attorney General's hands, at the time of his death, and that much, if not nearly all, of that deficiency arose from proceedings which took place in the County of Northumberland. The Sheriff of that County has already appeared before the House by Petition, which was referred to Your Committee, but they judged it proper to make no Report thereon, until the desired information be obtained from Attorney General Peters.

It may be proper to remark, that monies have every year been paid over to the Treasurer by the present Attorney General, since his accession to office, on account of Bonds, which were in the course of prosecution by the late Attorney General Wetmore; but no specific statement has accompanied his annual accounts, of the kind now sought for.

The late Acting Attorney General, now Judge Parker, has long since furnished his Account for the short time he held the Office.—This will be noticed in a subsequent Report.

All which is respectfully submitted to this Honorable House.

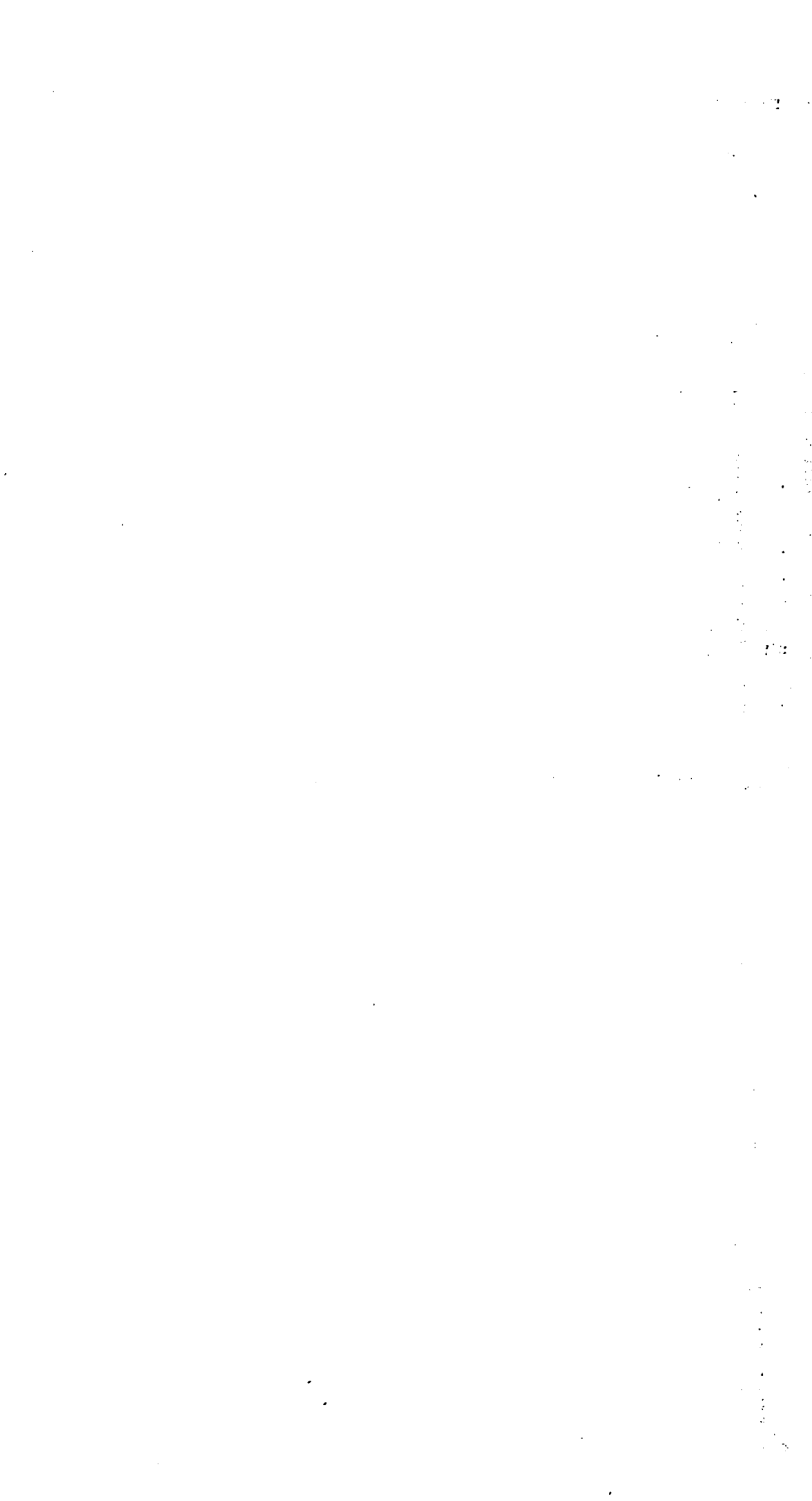
