The Rev. W. J. Smith, B.A., one of our field secretaries connected with the department of temperance and moral reform, gave a brief address. Mr. Smith is a graduate of Victoria

University, Toronto, Ont. He is member of the Hamilton Conference and in 1909 he was honored by an election to the Presidential chair of that assembly.

The aim of the department of Church work represented by him is: (1) The suppression and annihiliation of the liquor and white slave traf-

(2) Promotion of child-welfare and the condition of women workers. (3) The conservation of the home as an honored institution.

(4) The procuring of such laws will serve the human interest indicated above.

American Concern Assigns Liabilities Are \$30,000,000

New York, June 25.—The biggest mercantile failure in the history of the United States was precipitated to-day when receivers were appointed for H. B. Claffin Company, this city. This company, it is estimated, owes more than thirty million dol-

lars which at the present time, it is unable to pay. The assets are said to be \$44,000,000. John Classin, the head of the concern and its chief individual stock holder, is owner of a chain of nearly thirty other dry goods enterprises throughout the country which are involved in his failure. Receivers for several of those were named to-day and similar action, it was announced, would be taken in the case of the rest. Their business will be continued under a receiver's -management until their financial affairs have been adjusted.

From three to five thousand banks in all parts of the United States compose the bulk of the Classin creditors. They hold notes aggregating the major part of the liabilities.

According to Classin the failure was due to the unprecedented shifting of trade centres from New York, which compelled the concern to rely mainly upon its retail stores in other cities for profits. Interested merchants were closeted with J. P. Morgan and other prominent bankers day and night for the past week in an attempt to avert the failure. It is understood that thirty million dollars was ne-

"Mr. Morgan and others were not generous," said one who participated in the conferences, "but it was a question of raising the whole amount or none at all."

The receivers appointed say that the failure is of such tremendous proportions that it will be several weeks before it will be possible to know where they stand.

Though the failure is perhaps the most important in the history of the dry goods trade in this country, New York bankers predict the chief and perhaps only potent general effect will be the temporary demoralization of the dry goods trade.

London, June 25.—American fir arms, ammunition and heiresses were the subject of some amusing banter to-day, between the rival Irish fac tions in the House of Commons.

Premier Asquith was asked to take special steps to prevent arms entering Ireland from the States, in re sponse to an appeal from John F Redmond, leader of the Irish Nationalists to Michael J. Ryan, president of the United Irish League, Philadelphia, for aid to the Nationalist Volunteers in Ireland.

Conduct Quebec, June 26.—After a day spent mostly in consideration of technical evidence from John Reid, a naval architect, the Empress of Ireland wreck inquiry yesterday exhausted the list of witnesses summoned to give testimony before it and heard the address of one of the counsels, Geo. Gibson, of Quebec, representing the National Sailors' and Firemen's Union of

Great Britain. The Empress inquiry looks like creating a record for investigations of its character, being much shorter than that of the Titanic tragedy, and a number of other probes into big marine disasters.

Lord Mersey commented on the speed with which the inquiry had been carried on and also on the fairness with which counsels have acted towards each other.

There is another statement in the Budget Speech to which I should like to refer, although the matter has al ready been debated by this House This statement is in relation to th

Railway Contract of 1909. The Minister deals with this Con tract and labors to show the ad vantages of this Contract over previous Contracts, and particularly as to the Contract of 1893 for the construction of the railway across the country. He speaks of the increased cost of rails, materials, locomotives rolling stock and equipment of al kinds, and he speaks of the difference in facilities for handling materials owing to the nature of the country.

Nullifies the Argument Now, there is one clause in th Contract which entirely disposes o the argument of the Minister, and that is in relation to rolling stock and extras; and this clause affords an open door through which all these increases may escape to the relief of the Contractor and come to bear directly on the people of this country. The cost of equipment and rolling stock is only barely provided for, and provided for on a money basis in the

1909 Contract. The Contract of 1893 for the construction of the cross country line specificially provided for a certain amount of rolling stock and specifical ly mentioned the number of freight and passenger cars required for equip ping the cross country line. These items were included under that Contract in the payment of \$15,600 per mile and when they were supplied the line was fully equipped as required by that Contract.

No Definition

The 1909 Contract says the obliga tion of the contractor will not be fulfilled until each branch line thoroughly and efficiently equipped. There is no definition of what thoroughly equipped means. The contractor may add rolling stock and He Who Knows! that undefined condition of being thoroughly equipped.

The equipment so furnished is not included in the \$15,000 a mile, but for the purposes of payment is reduced to a cash value, at the same time avalue is made of the rolling stock supplied under the 1893 contract which is subtracted from the value of the rolling stock, etc., supplied under 1909 contract, and the difference is to be paid as an extra to the contractor.

Newfoundland bonds. t is difficult to understand why the lovernment has not adopted the eximple of the other Colonies and auhorized four per cent. bonds.

Last year our three and a half per ent. stock fell fell considerably. Take our 1912 loan. It was quoted in December, 1912, from 92-94, whilst in December, 1913, it was only 87-89. At 89 after making allowances for commissions and other amounts hargeable to the loan, we would, in ill probability, net 85 or 86; or in ther words the loan would cost 15 er cent.

A Big Loss

Even if the Prime Minister realizes he same percentage as the last loan we are going to drop, by reason of paying the railway contractor in gold nstead of in bonds, six hundred or six hundred and fifty thousand dollars on the three loans, one of four nillion dollars and the other two, at wo million dollars each.

Looking at the conditions and the revelations during the present session, and particularly the contents of he Budget, which the Minister Finance read the other day, is it any wonder that our efforts during the early part of the session asking the Government to open two districts, by filling the offices of the Ministers of Justice and Agriculture were unavailing and unaccepted?



Servia Agrees to Give Formal Recogni tion to the Roman Catholic Church -New Archbishop and Bishop to be Appointed-Agreement as to Marriage Laws and Church Property.


