It is understood that as a result of the visit to Ottawa of Sir Cecil Spring Rice, the new British Ambassador at Washington, the Dominion will in the future have an official attached to the British Embassy at the United States Capital, in the capacity of an adviser to the British Ambassador on all matters pertaining to Canada.

Mr. Borden Justified.

In view of the inability of the Canadian Government to provide additional battleships the British Government has determined to hasten the construction of the three vessels necessary to maintain the Empire's proportional strength at sea.

The purpose of the Liberal Government of Great Britain is not to increase the humiliation of Canadians. Its purpose is solely to make good the breach in the Imperial defences, which the Prime Minister of Canada proposed to fill.

The Government and the people of the British Isles may rest assured that Mr. Borden's policy has the approval of the great majority of Canadians, and that this will be made absolutely plain when the issue is submitted to the electors.

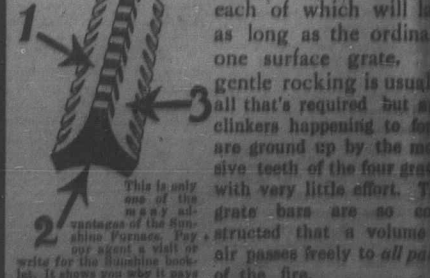

Supreme Court.

The spring sitting of the Supreme Court, at Kentville, Mr. Justice Ritchie presiding, closed Saturday, Arthur Dorie, who last fall attempted to poison his brother by poisoning potatoes to be used in the household, was sentenced to fourteen years in Dochester.

Samuel Gould, the leader of a gang which have terrorized a part of the country for some time, was convicted of stealing and burglary on seven different charges. He was sent to jail for fourteen years. Another of the gang, William Bainman, for stealing and burglary got seven years. Percy Ellis, of the same gang, was convicted of smaller crimes, and also got seven years.

Vernon Balkman for attempted burglary got five years. Another member of the gang, William Nichols, was given a lighter sentence, two years, on account of previous good character.

Owing to the pressure of criminal cases no civil cases were tried. Five jury cases and one non-jury case will be heard at a special session the third Tuesday in August.

Arthur Dorie is about twenty-five years of age, and resided at New Ross on the South Mountain. His brother owns a farm there, and it is stated that the motive for Arthur's crime was to get possession of the farm at the cost of his brother's life.

The prisoner at night time visited the farm, dug up a quantity of potatoes, inserted strychnine in them, and placed them back in the ground again. Later they were dug up again, and as Mrs. Dorie was preparing them for dinner she discovered the poison. The case was placed in the hands of Detective Kennedy for investigation, and he arrested Dorie on November 7. The prisoner later made a confession to the detective.

There was sufficient poison in the potatoes to kill one hundred persons. After being locked up Dorie made a key out of a mouth organ, and it is believed, he planned to make an attempt to escape from jail. The key was discovered before he got an opportunity to try and get away.

Samuel Gould and his gang belong to the Black Mountains. Gould was their leader and for years they had carried on depredations throughout a large section of Kings county. Their operations were bold, and they made some big hauls at several places. In their possession were found numerous keys and burglar's tools. One of them had a key of various designs, the majority of them being manufactured by the prisoners. They had robbed stores in Berwick, Cambridge, Coldbrook and Grenville, burglarizing stores in these places at various times.

Detectives Hurahan and Kennedy were sent up to Kings county in February and they rounded up the gang. The Halifax officers received valuable assistance from Constable Mott Thomson, of Berwick, and Constable Dumont of Cambridge.

The whole country was stirred by the daring depredations of the gang, and the arrest of its members brought relief to the people. All the convicted men are middle aged and married, with the exception of Nichol, who is single.
