THE MEETING IN QUEBEC.
 To the Editor of the STAR.
 Dear Sir,—Having a spare time at my disposal I feel I will be doing your readers a pleasure—as I certainly am to myself—in giving them in a short letter the doings of the Irishmen in this good old city on behalf of the
BEYOND THE SEAS.
 Somewhere about six weeks since, a branch of the Irish National Land League was established here. Already a sum of one hundred pounds sterling has been remitted and at the weekly meetings new members continue to be enrolled. News of the expulsion from the House of Commons of the bravest of men who are endeavoring to obtain some measure of justice for unhappy Ireland, and the base conduct of the said disreputable Liberal Government in withdrawing the ticket-of-leave of the indomitable founder of the League, Michael Davitt, caused the committee of the Quebec branch to convene a
MA'S MEETING
 of "all lovers of justice, liberty, and fair-play." The meeting was accordingly held in the Masonic Hall on Saturday evening. The hall with a seating capacity of about two thousand was filled, and the audience comprised English, Scotch and French-Canadian as well as those more immediately interested. In order to make the demonstration as imposing as possible invitations were issued to a number of leading men, Irish and others. Amongst others so invited were the Honorable T. W. Anglin and Mr. Cosigan of your Province.
 On opening the proceedings the chairman apologized for the absence of Mr. Anglin and said a sympathizing letter had been received from him. The letter was subsequently read and its contents were in expression of Mr. A's regret at being unable to accept the invitation as he was suffering from a severe hoarseness. People wondered much as to where the sympathy came in.
MR. COSTIGAN
 was, however, promptly on hand, having arrived from Ottawa that morning, and his entry into the hall was received with a storm of applause.
 Two resolutions in full sympathy with the objects of the meeting and expressing condemnation of the arbitrary and brutal conduct both of its speaker and of the British Government were proposed and seconded in very able addresses by members of the League, and carried amidst enthusiastic shouts of applause.
 Other gentlemen, not members, were then called upon to address the meeting and in this connection a noticeable feature was the speech of
MR. TARTÉ.
 Editor-in-chief of the "Canada". In the course of his very able and eloquent address (which by request, was in the French language,) he showed an intention, I might say a thorough knowledge of the Irish history and the evils which have afflicted the country for ages. His reference to the community of feeling which ought to exist between Irish and French was received with rap-

uous applause. He said that, as might easily be understood, the French population, as a whole, did not understand the question—they required to be enlightened on the matter and his expression of his determination to leave nothing undone in this direction again called forth rounds of applause. It is only right to say here that it is precisely what Mr. Tarté has been doing through his paper for months back. My limits only allow me to give you the foregoing out of many points made by this gentleman. He was called to the front at the conclusion of his address and received a hearty round of applause.
 He was succeeded by Mr. Costigan, and my pen fails to give you an idea of the enthusiastic applause which greeted the veteran representative of the Irish Catholics of the Dominion. All rose to their feet and cheer after cheer went up so that it was some moments before he could attempt to speak. He expressed the hearty wish on behalf of which he accepted the invitation of his countrymen in Quebec to come a nonstop them and to testify by his presence at least in any movement affecting the "old land" and his deep detestation of the unconstitutional and cruel line of conduct of the British Government in their recent actions. He denounced the inconsistency of Mr. Bright and other Liberals, who after encouraging the Irish people into agitation were now so ready to throw them in a prison, simply because they sought justice a liberty de-hold that it was a "because Irish" or the descendants of Irishmen hold important public positions in this free country that they should hold aloof from anything designed to do good at home; on the contrary it was a "because Irish" that he was a pro-Canadian in the person of Mr. Tarté on that platform, because he was always impressed with the importance of cultivating a friendly feeling between the two Elements. He could speak more pointedly with regard to the French Element in New Brunswick where they formed about seventy thousand of the population and had it not been for their bad liberality, Mr. Anglin could never have represented Gloucester, nor could he, himself, represent Victoria, and therefore no Irish Catholic could come from that Province as a representative without their support. He always believed that he was studying the true interests of his own nationality in using all the means in his power to maintain that friendly feeling in New Brunswick and to render any assistance he could to the committee of the Quebec branch to convene a
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A TIGER IN AN INDIAN TOWN
 At Rangoon, in Burmah, recently in one of the most populous quarters of the town, a tiger was killed in broad daylight. 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OUR LOCAL LEGISLATURE IN SESSION.

HOUSE OF ASSEMBLY.

[From our Special Correspondent.]

FREDERICTON, Feb. 16.

The first struggle is now over, and we may now confidently expect that the business of the country will proceed with the least possible delay. The thing which gives the Opposition most annoyance today is not that they were outvoted, for this they certainly expected; but their amendment should have been treated with such perfect indifference by the members of the Government on one of whom speaking in reply, is considered too cool for anyone and gives genuine discouragement to the opposition ranks. There was a time when the government felt called upon to defend themselves against a non-confidence motion, but on this occasion their defence had gone to the country long ago in the shape of their acts, and so confident were they that both the house and country would sustain them, that they declined to occupy any time in discussion and called for a question at every lull in the debate. This action on the part of the government did more to strengthen the faith of any doubting members than on the arguments which it was possible for the opposition to present in whole columns of debate, did to shake that faith. That Mr. Covert was injudicious in wording his amendment is admitted by all, and the only wonder is that 13 men were found willing to vote for it. That he took it upon himself to move such amendment without the knowledge or consent of many members of the opposition, is a fact, and this fact has been repeatedly commented upon by members. Then the objection to lawyers occupying the government portfolios, even though their acts meet approval, was considered so lame and untenable that it drove from the opposition one or two members who otherwise might have been in sympathy, and nothing but a full knowledge of the fact that the amendment was conceived in weakness, and brought forth without due consideration prevented other members of the opposition from accepting the principle by voting against it. By this amendment Mr. Butler who has stuck to the opposition for many years through thin, (there has been no thick) felt compelled to leave them and in future he will be found voting with the government. In this Mr. Butler acted wisely and he now doubtless regrets that he did not do this some years ago. As might be expected Mr. Butler will be accused of having been swayed from the old path by the tempting offer of a seat in the Legislative Council. But it is only fair to the Government entirely of his own volition and is not slow in admitting it. So far as the Legislative Council is concerned, the great object of the Government is to get rid of it.
