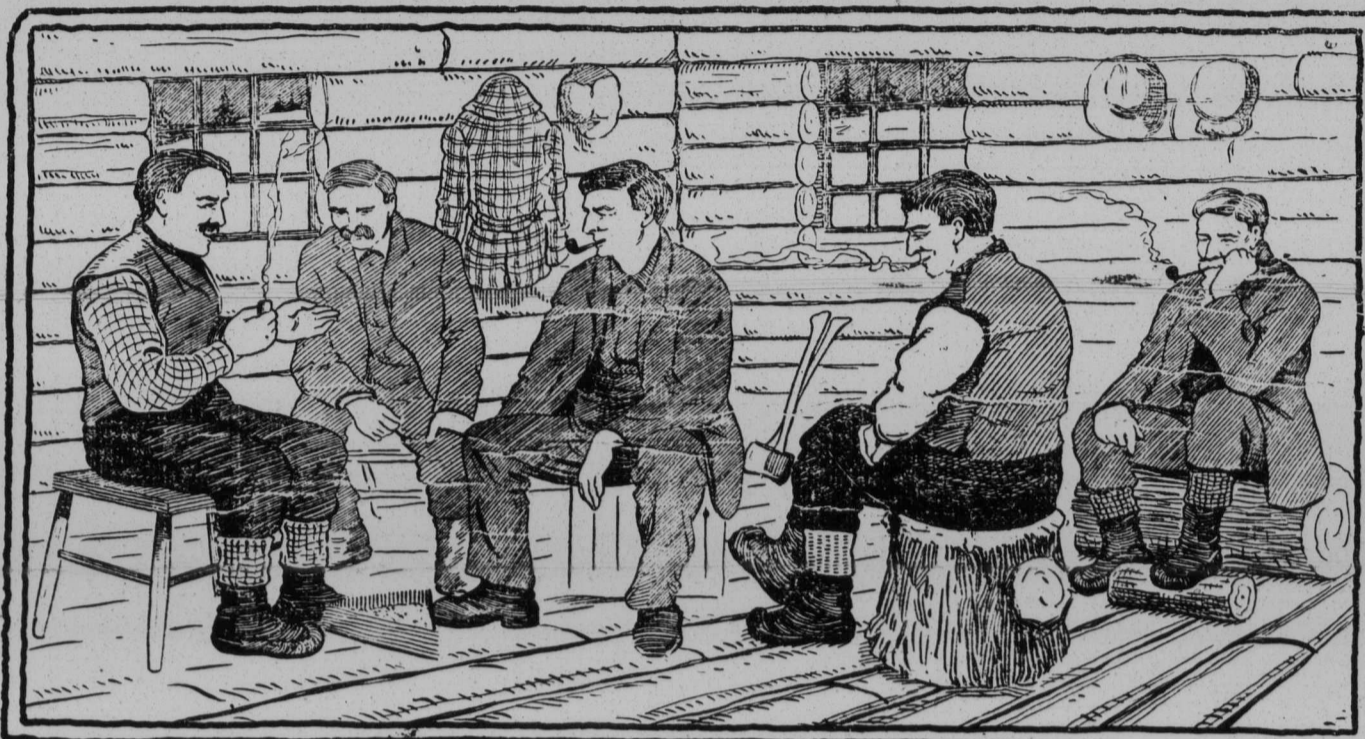

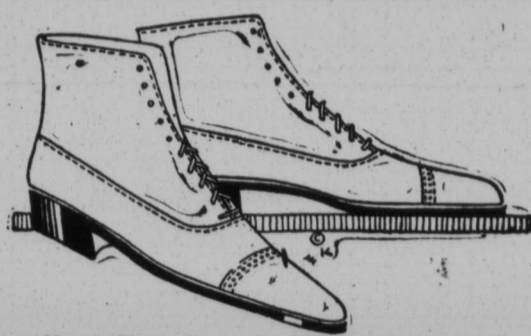

Newcastle Town Council Meeting

Newcastle, April 30—Town Council met in special session last night, all present but Ald. A. H. Mackay, who is ill, and Ald. A. J. Ritchie.

Council first met in committee of the whole, Ald. Fish in the chair, to hear several reports upon the power question.

That of H. K. Smith, resident district engineer of the Dominion Water Power Commission, Halifax, was not so optimistic re Sevoile site as that of Mr. McKechnie. That of C. W. Lush, of the Foundations Co., Ltd., favored all engines up to capacity of 200,000 kilowatt hours per day; after that water power would be cheapest. An offer was also read from the Richibucto and Rexton Electric Light Commission offering to sell their Kouchibouguac plant, except the right to supply power to Richibucto, Rexton, etc., for \$75,000, as the plant is too big for the Kent County business available. The commission would build a smaller dam somewhere else to supply the Kent County towns.

Ald. Fish thought it would be a good thing for Chatham, Derby and Newcastle to get together and develop Gray Rapids on the main South-west Miramichi.

On the rising of the committee of the whole the council met with Mayor Doyle in the chair.

Ald. Fish reported that the committee of the whole recommended the following:

That the council secure further expert advice as to the best steps to be taken by the Town of Newcastle, as to the extension, supplementing and improvement of the present power system. Carried, on motion of Ald. Durick and Jeffrey.

Following committee were appointed to supervise the matter, Ald. Durick, Crocker and Sargeant.

Ald. Fish wanted to know if the committee were to select engineers to make reports.

Ald. Crocker thought the committee would have power to select one man for the hydro-electric investigation and as many more as required for the other departments.

Ald. Fish wanted reports from several persons.

The Mayor said that that was understood.

Ald. Crocker said that the committee could report progress each month to the council.

Chas. H. G. Gough was granted a license to conduct a billiard and pool room in connection with his tobacco and confectionery store.

A. D. Farrah & Co's offer to repair the street in front of their property, if the town would pay half, was referred to Public Works Committee.

Application of James Robinson for permission to bore a well to supply water to his new mill recently built on the site of the Anderson Furniture Factory, here, was presented.

It was moved by Ald. Sargeant, seconded by Ald. Crocker, that Mr. Robinson be given permission to bore a three-inch well on his property, not more than 100 feet deep.

Ald. Durick wanted conditions drawn up so as to safeguard the town in case the proposed well should interfere with the town's water supply.

Ald. Fish said that the town water pipes had been laid to the Anderson Factory. Why couldn't Mr. Robinson use town water.

Ald. Sargeant replied that it would cost him too much to use town water at the present rates. It was out of the question for him to do so. After looking into the matter it was thought better to let him bore a well for himself.

Mayor Doyle agreed that safeguarding conditions should be imposed. If the well should ever interfere with the town's supply, the town should have power to cap it.

Ald. Sargeant added to his motion that the town solicitor draw up an agreement between Mr. Robinson and the town protecting the latter.

Motion then carried.

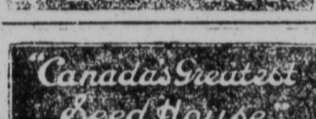

LEAGUE OF NATIONS COVENANT, AS COMPLETED, SHOWS MANY CHANGES

Washington, April 27.—The State Department made public tonight the text of the revised covenant of the League of Nations, as it will be presented tomorrow to the plenary session of the peace conference at Paris.

ARTICLE ONE The original members of the league or nations shall be those of the signatories which are named in the annex of this covenant and also such of those other states named in the annex as shall accede without reservation to this covenant.

ARTICLE TWO Any fully self-governing state, dominion or colony not named in the annex may become a member of the league if its admission is agreed by two-thirds of the assembly, provided that it shall give effective guarantees of its sincere intention to observe its obligations.

ARTICLE THREE The assembly shall consist of representatives of the members of the league.

ARTICLE FOUR The council shall consist of representatives of the United States of America, of the British empire, of France, of Italy, and of Japan, together with representatives of four other members of the league.

ARTICLE FIVE Except where otherwise expressly provided in this covenant, decisions at meetings of the assembly or of the council shall require the agreement of all the members of the league represented at the meeting.

ARTICLE SIX The permanent secretariat shall be established at the seat of the league. The secretariat shall comprise a secretary-general and such secretaries and staff as may be required.

ARTICLE SEVEN The seat of the league is established at Geneva. The council may at any time decide that the seat of the league shall be established elsewhere.

ARTICLE EIGHT The members of the league recognize that the maintenance of a peace requires the reduction of national armaments to the lowest point consistent with national safety and the enforcement by common action of international obligations.

ARTICLE NINE A permanent commission shall be constituted to advise the council on the execution of the provisions of articles I and 8 on military and naval questions generally.

ARTICLE TEN The members of the league undertake to respect and preserve as against external aggression the territorial integrity and existing political independence of all members of the league.

ARTICLE ELEVEN Any war or threat of war which immediately affects any of the members of the league or not, is hereby declared to be a breach of the covenant.

ARTICLE TWELVE The members of the league agree that if there should arise between them any dispute likely to lead to a rupture, they will submit the matter either to arbitration or to inquiry by the council, and they agree in no case to resort to war until three months after the award by the arbitrators or the report of the council.

ARTICLE THIRTEEN The members of the league agree that whenever any dispute shall arise between them which they recognize to be suitable for submission to arbitration and which cannot be satisfactorily settled by diplomacy, they will submit the whole subject matter to arbitration of a treaty, as to any question of international law, as to the existence of any fact which if established would constitute or as to the extent and nature of the reparation to be made for any such breach, are declared to be among those which are generally suitable for submission to arbitration.

ARTICLE FOURTEEN The council shall formulate and submit to the members of the league for adoption plans for the establishment of a permanent court of international justice.

ARTICLE FIFTEEN If there should arise between members of the league any dispute likely to lead to a rupture, which is not submitted to arbitration as above, the members of the league agree that they will submit the matter to the council.

ARTICLE SIXTEEN Should any member of the league resort to war in disregard of its covenants under articles twelve, thirteen or fifteen, it shall ipso facto be deemed to have committed an act of war against all other members of the league, which hereby undertake immediately to subject it to the severance of all trade or financial relations, the prohibition of all intercourse between the nationals of the covenant-breaking state and the nationals of any other state, whether a member of the league or not.

ARTICLE SEVENTEEN In the event of a dispute between a member of the league and a state which is not a member of the league, or between states not members of the league, the council may be declared to be no longer a member of the league by a vote of the council concurred in by the representatives of all the members of the league represented thereat.

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ARTICLE NINETEEN Any member of the league which has violated any covenant of the league should be taken to give effect thereto.

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ARTICLE TWENTY-ONE The council shall formulate and submit to the members of the league for adoption plans for the establishment of a permanent court of international justice.

Montreal Went Dry Wednesday

Montreal, April 30.—Montreal, the last city in Canada to write "dins" to the liquor traffic, went dry at midnight today. "Nip" quencher, "snort," and a whole legion of pet names for the cap that cheers, became a dead language. The "black friends" "daily meeting," the "black ink fees," that lulled the "dins" into their suspicious, go into the discard; their usefulness as plausible excuses for staying out late is ended. May Day this year means more than moving time to Montrealers.

To the obviously inclined its special "dins" "brasserie" and the food bars, well to the choice acquaintance that "set 'em up again." No more bars, stand a sent in the corner, a champagne "cocktail," a tinned "brunch" (fleshless chicken), two long screws or an ice cream, and the "dins" cent stars. The bill is on as far as hard liquor is concerned, but by the referendum taken on April 19, the wines are still permitted. The final count of the referendum ballot left no doubt as to popular opinion on "the beer and wine question," the vote being overwhelmingly against total prohibition.

Among the places in the province which are under Scott Act several are evidencing an inclination to change, among them the City of Quebec.

With the coming of prohibition to Montreal the bars must undergo a change and premises are being altered accordingly. Some of the large hotels talk of opening cabarets where the bar used to be, making these places more on the line of European cafes. Many of the saloons will close entirely, but the majority have applied for the beer and wine license and will be found at their old stands under new conditions.

The "dry spell" may be a long one, but the old fishing bag that did service on many a previous occasion, was requisitioned today and the saloons and wholesale stores did a record business. There was no prearranged celebration. John Farley, corn died peacefully, but he'll have a long funeral.

Dog Tax To be Collected From Indians

It is announced that a dog-tax will be imposed upon all dogs owned by Indians resident on the reserves under the jurisdiction of the Department of the Interior. The Department considered the matter of the imposition of such a tax last year and late in the year decided that it should be imposed. The tax will go into effect on May 1st.

Rate of Taxation

The rate of taxation is as follows: one dollar for one dog, three dollars for each additional dog; two dollars for each Indian, five dollars for each additional Indian. The chief of each Indian Reserve may appoint a dog-tax collector who is to receive twenty-five per cent of the collections. In the event of the chief failing to appoint an appropriate tax collector, the Commissioner will make it.

Seeding Started In The West

Winnipeg, April 30.—A perfect spell of weather around Easter has put seeding all through the west far ahead, and has enabled farmers to do a great deal of spring ploughing into the bargain. Some districts would like more moisture, but on the whole it is many a year since the crop has gone in under better conditions throughout the Canadian prairie west. Last fall was so open that there was an exceptionally large percentage of fall ploughing. Add to this the great area brought under cultivation during the summer months by new breaking, and it would not be surprising to find that the total acreage in the west sets a figure not far behind that of the record year, 1917. Less acreage than usual, as a consequence, will be seeded on old stubble and this will tend to improve the general average yield. It is still a long day to harvest, with all the peril of a frosty May or dry June before us, but it is all to the good that seeding is progressing under such exceptional conditions.

Dominion Franchise Act Expected Soon

Ottawa, Ont., April 30.—The new Dominion Franchise Act, the draft of which was completed some time ago, is, it is understood, having its "C's" crossed and "T's" dotted by the Cabinet in preparation for its admission to Parliament. The main provisions of the bill have been guarded with the utmost secrecy, but there is good reason for believing that one of its outstanding features will be that it will disfranchise, for a certain period, all alien enemies and deserters from military service.

These provisions will, unquestionably, give rise to a big battle in the House. The Opposition is almost certain to fight against the principle of a Federal franchise, just as Blake and the Liberals fought against it in the debates, but facing this they will probably make an even bigger stand against any proposal to disfranchise alien enemies and military deserters, which they believe would be a measure to give a vote to those who are not entitled to it.

Whether the franchise bill is to be brought down before the budget is not quite certain. Both measures overshadow all others in importance. They are the measures against which the Opposition will make its two big demonstrations of the season, and also the measure which involves the only visible danger of a cleavage in the Unionist ranks.

to abolish the board of control and return to the old aldermanic system. A total of 2,023 votes were polled, 1,760 for abolition and 250 against. Twelve ballots were "spoiled." The terms of the plebiscite were that fifteen per cent. of the total electorate should be polled, which meant that 1,200 altogether had to come to the polls. The required number was almost doubled. The campaign of those in favor of the board of control was to remain away from the poll.

ARBOR DAY

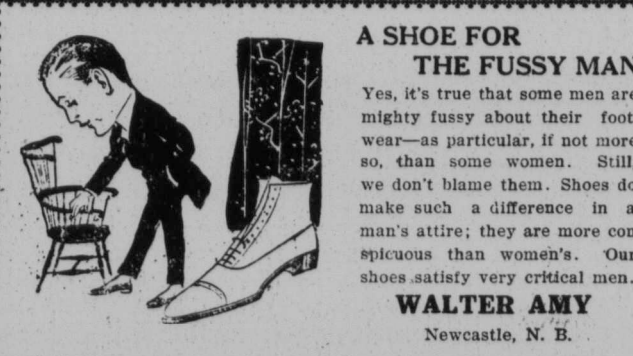

League of Nations Covenant as Completed, Shows Many Changes

(Continued from page 3)

the league, the state or states not members of the league shall be invited to accept the obligations of membership in the league for the purpose of such dispute, upon such conditions as the council may deem just. If such invitation is accepted, the provisions of articles twelve to sixteen inclusive shall be applied with such modification as may be deemed necessary by the council.

Upon such invitation being given, the council shall immediately institute an inquiry into the circumstances of the dispute and recommend such action as may seem best and most effectual in the circumstances.

If a state, so invited shall refuse to accept the obligations of membership in the league for the purposes of such dispute, and shall resort to war against a member of the league, the provisions of article sixteen shall be applicable as against the state taking such action.

If both parties to the dispute, when so invited refuse to accept the obligation of membership in the league for the purposes of such dispute, the council may take such measures and make such recommendations as will

prevent hostilities and will result in the settlement of the dispute.

ARTICLE EIGHTEEN
Every convention of international engagement entered into henceforward by any member of the league, shall be forthwith registered with the secretariat and shall as soon as possible be published by it. No such treaty or international engagement shall be binding until so registered.

ARTICLE NINETEEN
The assembly may from time to time advise the reconsideration by members of the league of treaties which have become inapplicable, and the consideration of international conditions whose continuance might endanger the peace of the world.

ARTICLE TWENTY
The members of the league severally agree that this covenant is accepted as abrogating all obligations or understandings, international or otherwise, which are inconsistent with the terms thereof, and solemnly undertake that they will not be inconsistent with the terms thereof.

In case members of the league shall, before becoming a member of the league have undertaken any obligations inconsistent with the terms of this covenant, it shall be the duty of such member to take immediate steps to procure its release from such obligations.

ARTICLE TWENTY-ONE
Nothing in this covenant shall be deemed to affect the validity of international engagements such as treaties of arbitration or regional understand-

ings like the Monroe doctrine for securing the maintenance of peace.

ARTICLE TWENTY-TWO
To those colonies and territories which as a consequence of the late war have ceased to be under the sovereignty of the states which formerly governed them and which are inhabited by peoples not yet able to stand by themselves under the strenuous conditions of the modern world, there should be applied the principle that the well-being and development of such peoples form a sacred trust of civilization and that securities for the performance of this trust should be embodied in the covenant.

The best method of giving practicable effect to this principle is that the tutelage of such peoples be entrusted to advanced nations who, by reason of their resources, their experience or their geographical position, can best undertake this responsibility, and who are willing to accept it, and that this tutelage should be exercised by them as mandatories on behalf of the league.

The character of the mandate must differ according to the stage of the development of the people, the geographical situation of the territory, its economic condition and other similar circumstances.

Certain communities formerly belonging to the Turkish empire have reached a stage of development where their existence as independent nations can be provisionally recognized subject to the rendering of administrative advice and assistance by a

mandatory until such time as they are able to stand alone. The wishes of these communities must be a principal consideration in the selection of the mandatory.

Other peoples, especially those of Central Africa, are at such a stage that the mandatory must be responsible for the administration of the territory under conditions which will guarantee freedom of conscience of religion subject only to the maintenance of public order and morals, the prohibition of abuses such as the slave trade, the arms traffic and the liquor traffic, and the prevention of the establishment of fortifications of military and naval bases and of military training in the territory for other than police purposes and the defense of the territory, and will also secure equal opportunities for the trade and commerce of other members of the league.

There are territories, such as South Africa and certain of the South Pacific Islands, which owing to the sparseness of their population or their small size, or their remoteness from the centres of civilization or their geographical contiguity to the territory of the mandatory and other circumstances, can be best administered under the laws of the mandatory as integral portions of its territory subject to the safeguard above mentioned in the interests of the indigenous populations. In every case of the mandate, the mandatory shall render to the council an annual report in reference to the territory committed to its charge.

The degree of authority, control or administration to be exercised by the mandatory shall, if not previously agreed upon by the members of the league, be explicitly defined in each case by the council.

A permanent commission shall be constituted to receive and examine the annual reports of the mandatories, and to advise the council on all matters relating to the observance of the mandates.

ARTICLE TWENTY-THREE
Subject to and in accordance with the provisions of international convention existing or hereafter to be agreed upon, the members of the league (a) will endeavor to secure and maintain fair and humane conditions of labor for men, women and children in all countries; and (b) will endeavor to secure just treatment of the native inhabitants of territories under their control; (c) will entrust the league with the general supervision over the execution of agreements with regard to the traffic in women and children, and the traffic in opium and other dangerous drugs; (d) will entrust the league with the general supervision of the trade in arms and ammunition with the countries in which the control of their traffic is necessary in the common interest; (e) will make provision of communication and of transit and suitable treatment for the commerce of all members of the league. In this connection the special necessities of the regions devastated during the war of 1914-1918 shall be in mind; (f) will endeavor to take steps in matters of international concern for the prevention and control of disease.

ARTICLE TWENTY-FOUR
There shall be placed under the direction of the league all international bureaus already established by general treaties if the parties to such treaties consent. All such international bureaus and all commissions for the regulation of matters of international interest hereafter constituted shall be placed under the direction of the league.

In all matters of international interest which are regulated by general conventions, but which are not placed under the control of international bureaus or commissions, the secretariat of the league shall, subject to the consent of the council and if desired by the parties, collect and disseminate all relevant information and shall render any assistance which may be necessary or desirable.

The council may include as part of the expense of the secretariat the expenses of any bureau or commission which is placed under the direction of the league.

ARTICLE TWENTY-FIVE
The secretariat of the league shall be established at Geneva and shall be composed of a secretary-general and such other officers as may be determined by the council. The secretariat shall be placed under the direction of the secretary-general.

ARTICLE TWENTY-SIX
The secretariat of the league shall be placed under the direction of the secretary-general.



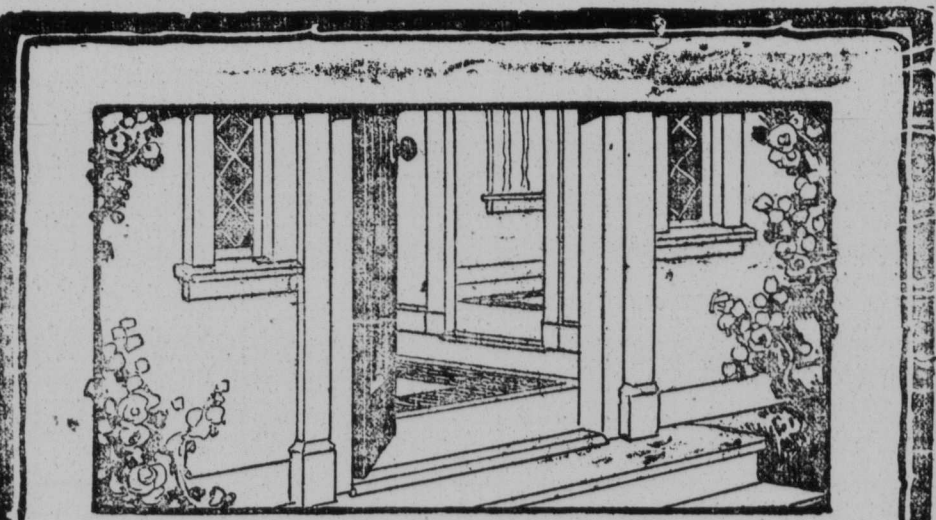

Grasses Do Best With Clover

Although timothy, which of course is the standard grass used with clover for hay and pasture, is a most desirable grass, it has some faults which especially show up when it is grown in red clover mixtures. It is a little too late and, as a result, it is not ready to cut until some time after the clover has passed its best stage. It follows that, if a particularly late variety of red clover is used, like for instance Swedish red clover which the last few years has given excellent results in Eastern Canada, the clover-timothy mixture has to be cut either when it is too late for the clover or when it is too early for the timothy. In both cases losses result which would not occur if the clover and the timothy reached their best stage for cutting at the same time.

With a view of ascertaining the comparative value of various grasses in mixture with clover, a great number of experiments have been conducted at several of the Dominion Experimental Farms and Stations during the last few years, and judging from the results obtained so far, there are several grasses besides timothy which it would be to use more extensively in mixture with clover.

Two of the most important ones are Orchard Grass and Meadow Fescue which both are excellent yields under suitable soil conditions and of high quality for both hay and pasture. They also have the advantage of being ready to cut just about when red clover is at its best and will thus help to furnish a hay of high quality.

Orchard Grass, or Cockfoot, as it is generally called in England, has been cultivated for about 150 years in Europe and is everywhere regarded as a grass of a very high class, especially in sections of intensive dairying. After cutting it produces quickly a second growth consisting chiefly of long leaves and for this reason it is a very palatable grass, especially where the second crop is to be used for pasture and where it is of importance to have a good pasture crop coming on as soon as possible after the first crop has been taken off for hay. The Orchard grass gives best returns on good, deep loams, well drained and well stocked with plant food. It is not very well adapted to light and dry soils or where late spring frosts or early autumn frosts are prevalent. Meadow Fescue has been cultivated in Europe during at least one hundred years and is rated among the best fodder and pasture grasses. Like Orchard grass, it has for pasture. This is especially the case where the winter climate is mild, because in such districts the leaves remain green and fresh throughout the winter. The meadow fescue is especially adapted to rich loams and will yield abundantly where the ground is well supplied with moisture, except where the soil is sour. It is much less sensitive to spring and autumn frosts than the Orchard grass and will therefore do better than the latter in the more northern parts of agricultural Canada.

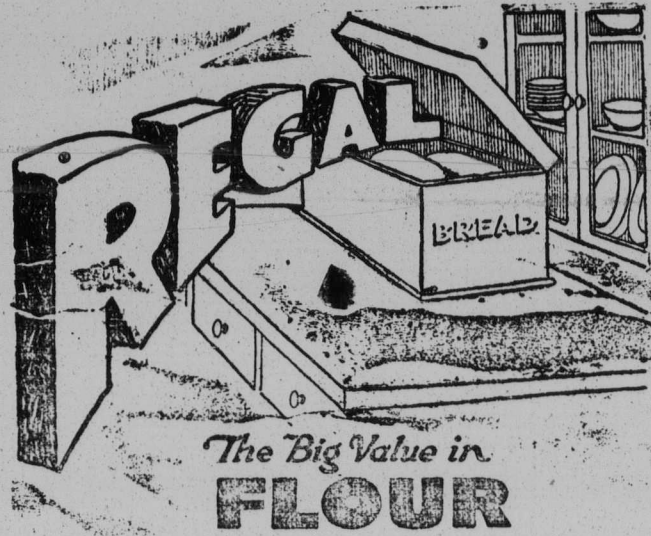

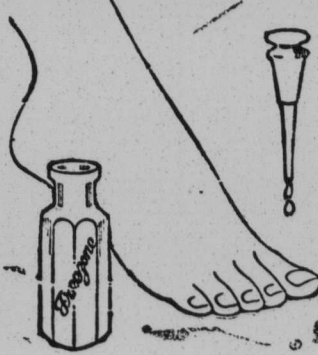
