



THE facilities for handling outward bound passengers are at the Canadian Pacific dock at Liverpool, England, are as perfect and speedy as any in the world. As will be seen from the picture above of future Canadian citizens boarding the "Montcalm", the travellers pass from the street and railway station levels to waiting rooms on the dock side, and crossing the bridged wharf, board the ship by the saloon deak where they are received and assigned to quartars. Their baggage is handled from below and with despatch. A travelling belt carrier operated by an electric-dynamo eliminates the necessity of many noisy and slow moving winch hoists which, when used and not too carefully operated, are the cause by 7.16 the same evening.

It is a safe policy to use from eight to ten pounds of timothy and a total of ten pounds of the two overs, the proportions depending, as noted above, more or less on the

nature of the soil being seeded. In the case of failure to secure atch of seed, due to weather or some other factor, it is possible to seed a field in the spring with oats peas and vetches and harvest if for hay. If the land is in good heart, a satisfactory tonnage of good feed will be secured, although in wet seasons there might be some difficulty experienced in curing it.





Canada is now second on the list as an exporting land, the per capita being \$100.63 per annum.

A new station is being built by the Canadian Pacific Railway at Fredericton at a cost of \$50,000.

Half a million Canadians look to the forests each day for their meals and lodging, and more than 100,000 Canadian workmen are engaged in converting forest products into one form or another.

The large party of Hebrideans who were brought to Canada on the Canadian Pacific Steamships "Metagama" and "Marloch" have gone to Red Deer, Alta, where they will form an agricultural colony.

Seven hundred farmers and farm Seven hundred farmers and farm laborers arrived in Canada recently on the Canadian Pacific steamer "Montcalm." These colonists are proceeding to Ontario and western points where they will take up farm

The project of a ship canal across Scotland from the Clyde to the Firth of Forth was brought to the fore again at a recent meeting of the Mid-Scotland Ship Canal Association, and there is a possibility of something being started in this connection in the near future.

A single pair of potato bugs would, without check, increase to 60,000,000 in one season; the hop aphis, developing thirteen generations in a single year would, if unchecked to the end of the twelfth generation, have multiplied to ten sextillions.

Canadian air pilots flew 294,449 miles carrying 9,153 passengers and 77,850 pounds of freight in 1922, according to a report of the Canadian Air Board. Saskatchewan pilots led in the Dominion, carrying 3,622 passengers. Manitoba pilots carried 1,622 people, and British Columbia pilots 1,122.

A company has been formed in London to exploit sunken treasure in Navarino Bay, off the west coast of Greece. The promoters state that there is a matter of \$45,000,000 in bullion and other forms still at the bottom of the Bay, where it was sunk with the united fleets of Egypt and Turkey by the united British, French and Russian fleets in 1827.

Last summer 4,000 forest fires cleared away at least ten times as many trees as were cut down for lumber, pulp and paper, and all other industrial purposes. A very large percentage of the fires were caused by careless campers and sportsmen who "thought it would die out" or cast away a lighted match or cigarette end. cleared away at least ten tim

Improvement of camping facilities at Banff for automobile towrists is now being made. The Mount Rundle camp site is being improved and enlarged, and will be equipped with all modern appliances. It is ex-pected that as a result of the open-ing of the Banff-Windarmere road this year, the tourist traffic through Banff will be the heaviest ever re-

At the annual meeting of the Canadian Pacific Railway, President E. W. THE MACKEREL **COMING SOON**

The Canadian fishery authorities are to keep a close watch for the appearance of macherel, the advance guard of which have already reached Cape Cod in their annual migration from southern waters to the far north Mackerel are in good demand this eason in New York and Boston and prices are fairly high. The main body of the mackerel schools now extends from the Highlands of Nave sink, N. J., to north of Massachusett and the first fish should be off Capo Sable in a week or ten days. The first arrivals are usually caught in traps off Shelburne or Yarmouth. Then the fish head north along the eastern shore of Nova Scotia, not many penetrating far up the Bay or Fundy. The greatest catches are usually made along the Nova Scotia coast and later in the strait and Gulf of St. Lawrence. Where the macker el come from and go, has long been a mystery.

The Canadian government will notify fishermen by radio as has peen done in the past few years, of the movements of the schools. The cruiser Arleux, well known at this port and in command of Capt. Wm. Milne of Shediac, is one of the vessels which has been engaged in this work for several years. Capt. Barkhouse of Halifax is another commander who has done good work for the fishermen in the mackerel in dustry, one of the most important in Canada.

In Gloucester, Northumberland, Kent and Westmorland counties, the only ones in New Brunswick which figure heavily in the mackerel fishing, immense quantities are some times caught. The fish are shipped in refrigerator cars to the big cities. and if the market is glutted the ties were taken by the fishermen of






