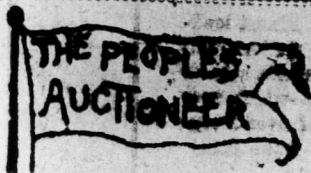

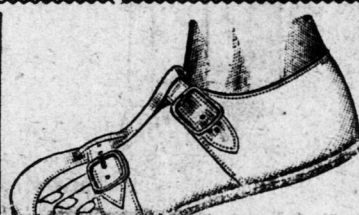

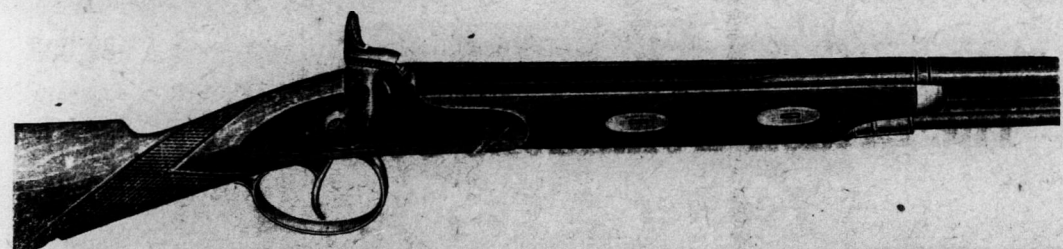

**Limit as Big as Newfoundland.**

An extraordinary story appears in the Montreal Star, of Saturday last. How extraordinary it is our readers will better appreciate from a perusal of it, and for this purpose we have published it in our issue to-day.

The story is that of Mr. Robert H. Reid, of Montreal, vice-president of the Labrador Pulp and Lumber Company.

According to the Star interviewer, Mr. Reid claims the Company controls more than 40,000 sq. miles. We would like to know from the Government if this is correct, for the limit appears to be on Newfoundland Labrador or at least on that portion of the Labrador where the Newfoundland Government is making grants of the right to cut timber. If it is correct, the Government must be receiving an enormous rental from the Company or any predecessor in title.

The information tabled in the House of Assembly throws little light on the matter. It throws some, however, for we find that on Sept. 22nd, 1909, the right to cut over 3,255,840 acres was granted to the Labrador Pulp and Lumber Company. This acreage does not amount to four thousand square miles, yet the return tabled states that \$18,852 was paid into the Department on October 25th, 1909.

If Mr. Reid is correctly reported the Company must now control more than ten times as much as was granted them in September, 1909.

The Minister of Agriculture, we notice is on his way to Toronto and will not be able to attend to this little matter of giving information about a domain the size of Newfoundland, and the rentals the Company has paid to the Department for this second Newfoundland.

Perhaps, however, the Premier will be able to obtain the information and publish it before he departs for his electioneering tour of Bonne Bay. And while the Premier is at it, he might tell us what he knows about the concessions given by the Dominion Government to the Company which will rule this second Newfoundland.

**Another Sensation**

Offices of Messrs. Anderson and Ritchie Broken Into Last Night—Suspect Arrested.

Sensational doings are getting prevalent in the city just now.

A few days ago the town was alarmed of the sensational robbery at Harbor Grace, followed by a grave crime committed on the West Coast, and today mercantile people generally were amazed on hearing the startling report that a business premises on Water Street had been broken into last night at an unknown hour.

At 7 o'clock this morning Mr. A. T. Ritchie and Mr. G. I. Anderson were telephoned at their residences by Sergeant Savage who acquainted them that someone had broken into their offices. Both these gentlemen referred to are commission merchants and their offices are in close proximity to each other situated off Water Street where the Newfoundland Produce Co. formerly carried on business. At 9 o'clock this morning they visited their place of business and found it in a wrecked condition as reported by the police officer. Mr. Anderson was interviewed by a Telegram reporter and gave a few facts of the case.

The place was locked up at 6 o'clock last evening and between that time and 6 o'clock this morning the robbery was attempted. It appears that the daring culprit gained access to the place through a eleven by twenty pane of glass. The glass was taken out with a cutter, but not all of it. The thief got into Mr. Ritchie's office first but not before he had cut himself badly by the piece of glass which remained in the sash of the window as every document in the building was besmeared with blood. All of the drawers in Mr. Ritchie's desk were forced open, but unfortunately for the marauder no money was got. He then visited the adjoining office used by Mr. Anderson, took a quantity of stamps, broke open drawers and desks and made an unsuccessful effort to open the safe. He threw a brand new Underwood typewriter worth \$130 down at a desk and smashed it. On leaving the disappointed robber got through a different pane of glass then the one he got in through which proves that he must have been disturbed in his operations. Evidently he heard men belonging to a school at the wharf talking and this made him decamp promptly. If the fellow had got the safe open he certainly would have struck a bonanza, as it contained a few thousand dollars. A fortunate thing for the own, is that Mr. Anderson had \$1,500 in his desk last evening but when close up time came his clerk, Mr. Lang secured it in the safe.

The police are now working on the case and hope to make an arrest shortly. They have a good clue as the miscreant, whoever he is, must be badly cut by contact with the glass. A man named Humby has been arrested as a suspect in the Ritchie robbery.

**General Booth's Will.**

Special Evening Telegram.

LONDON, To-Day. The summary of the will left by General Booth has been made public. All properties held by him as a General in the Salvation Army, all public trusts of both real and personal property, including copyrights, are vested in his successor as General for the time being of the Salvation Army, to be held by him "upon trusts affecting the same." By codicils his small private property, having net value of £487-190, approximately \$2,400, he gives to the Army, with the exception of certain private papers with memoranda, which are given to his eldest son, Bramwell, and a few articles chosen by himself which are given as mementoes to each of his children and his children-in-law. Another codicil deals with property estimated to value \$36,475, representing monies settled on him many years ago by the late Henry Reed for private use. It was this provision which enabled him to draw no stipend or remuneration from the funds of the Army. This property is divided among his children. Bramwell Booth is appointed executor of the will.

**Infanticide Case.**

Agnes Byrne, against whom the charge of infanticide is preferred, was up before Judge Conroy in his private office at the court this forenoon. After the evidence was taken of the following witnesses: Drs. Macpherson, Mitchell, Sergts. Byrne and Shepherd, two sanitary employees and Mr. Dwyer's farm servant, who found the body of the infant in the manure heap, the case was adjourned until next Monday week pending the return of Mr. W. J. Higgins who leaves to-morrow morning to meet the Court on circuit. Mr. C. H. Hutchings, K. C., is conducting the case for the prosecution, and Mr. Higgins is defending the accused who is further remanded.

**A Great Loss.**

Her little daughter accompanied her and Mrs. Dee had on her arm a satchel or hand bag in which there was \$65. The little girl held to the same arm on which the satchel was hung. When Mrs. Dee arrived at her home she was appalled to find that the satchel and its contents had vanished, how, she does not know. She might have dropped it, but thinks this very unlikely as either the mother or daughter must have heard it fall or certainly missed it quickly in such an event. The police have their own theory of the matter and to-day along Water and other streets are watching questionable characters who may be spending more money than it can be presumed is theirs. If a cut purse removed the satchel it is to be hoped that he will soon be made disgorge.

**Poison Charge Against Woman.**

PHILADELPHIA, Aug. 12.—Mr. Frieda Trost, proprietress of an uptown saloon, who was arrested yesterday on a charge of having caused the death of her husband, William Trost, within a week after her marriage to him, by administering poison, was committed to prison for her appearance to-morrow when an inquest will be started in the case. Edmund Guenkle, bartender for Mrs. Trost, was also committed as a material witness in the case which the police says will have sensational developments. After the arrest of the woman, the police says, they found a drugist from whom she purchased poison on Monday of last week, or shortly before her husband was taken ill. At the hearing to-day the coroner's detective testified that in his investigation of the Trosts he learned that Mr. Trost, who was a widow when she married a second time, was deeply in debt. An autopsy performed by a coroner's physician, the detectives said, showed that Trost's death was caused by poison. The police said Trost had a bank account of \$4,000 and that his life was insured for \$2,000.

**Memorial Service**

THE LATE GENERAL BOOTH.

At the Methodist College Hall last evening a Memorial Service was held out of respect for the late General William Booth, who yesterday was interred in Abney Park Cemetery, near his beloved wife. The auditorium was filled with people and the service a memorable one. Among those present included:—Sir E. P. Morris, Mayor Ellis, Revs. Drs. Rogers and Fenwick, Revs. F. R. Matthews, B.A., J. W. Bartlett, C. H. Keslake, Haldane, Brigadier and Mrs. Morehen, Staff Capt. Cave, the Army officers and Superintendent W. Blackall.

Following the rendition of "God our help in ages past" prayer was offered by Rev. Mr. Matthews. Another hymn, "My Jesus, I love thee, I know thou art mine" was then sung. Scriptures were read by Ensign Hargrove, selecting John 17th. Rev. Dr. Rogers gave an eloquent address on "2 Timothy, 4 Chap, verse 7; "I have fought a good fight, I have finished my course, I have kept the faith," and Ch. 2 and 3: "A good soldier of Jesus Christ." The Doctor, in choice language spoke eloquently of the life and labours of the General. Following a duet by Messrs. Gaulton and Chaplin, an impressive address was given by Rev. Mr. Haldane. The hymn "Book of Ages Clasp for me" was then sung. Hon. J. A. Robinson made a brief address, after which the band rendered "Promoted to Glory."

Rev. Dr. Fenwick emphasized the great man's work in England and Brigadier Morehen told of the General's faithfulness to principle during the ages of struggles and persecution. A tribute was also paid to the new General of the army. A brief prayer by the Brigadier and Benediction brought a memorable service to a close.

## Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram. HALIFAX, Aug. 29. Hons. R. Watson and S. D. Blundford are here. The former leaves tomorrow for Philadelphia by the Carthaginian, and the latter for Toronto.

Special Evening Telegram. HALIFAX, Aug. 29. The Hon. Alonzo J. White, a native of St. John's, is dead. His family removed to Sydney from Newfoundland in the late 40's. In 1867 he was elected to the House of Assembly for the county of Cape Breton. This was the general election following the Union of the Provinces. In Mr. White, death claimed the last survivor of the entire membership of the Assembly of 1867.

Special Evening Telegram. CONSTANTINOPLE, Aug. 29. With reference to the proposal of the Austro-Hungarian Foreign Minister to secure the gradual autonomy of the European provinces of Turkey, the Ottoman Government has notified their representatives abroad, in the event of their being approached concerning the project, that the Porte will listen to no proposals affecting Turkey's internal policy.

Special Evening Telegram. NEW YORK, Aug. 29. A cable from Paris says—Religious papers are not told all the truth, according to the Vatican, concerning the Pope's condition that he is growing weaker daily. No stranger to the Vatican is admitted to the Pope's Mass because he must often celebrate the Holy Sacrifice in a sitting posture. The condition of his sister is causing grave apprehension to the Pope; and the mental suffering reacts much on his physical condition.

Special to Evening Telegram. PARIS, Aug. 29. Semi-official Turko-Italian peace negotiations are making good progress. A French newspaper says it has already been agreed that the Treaty shall contain no reference to the Italian annexation decree, or to any acknowledgment of Turkish suzerainty in Tripoli. Italy further consents to concentrate troops in a part of Cyrenaica when the armistice is proclaimed, to pay a heavy indemnity, and to evacuate those Islands in the Archipelago which she now occupies.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Aug. 29. With renewal of communications come reports of serious damages caused by floods in Eastern counties, though nowhere is the situation so serious as at Norwich, where a considerable portion of the city will require to be rebuilt. In Norfolk 80 bridges are washed down, and scores are cut off from the outside world. Peterborough became an island city. Ipswich, King's Lynn, Nottingham, Spalding, Leicester, and Stamford districts are all badly affected. Fortunately, although many animals have been drowned, few human lives have been lost. Reports from Norwich say that the rain has almost ceased falling and the floods are slowly subsiding. The Eastern dam which it was feared, would go out is still intact. Conditions are now improving, and the railroad to London by way of Cambridge has been reopened.

### A 40,000 Square Mile Limit.

Labrador to Have Mammoth Pulp and Paper Mills—Company's Capital Will be Increased by Twelve Million Dollars—Contracts for Purchase of all Output—Water Power Secured Only to Niagara is on the Eve of Development.

Quebec, August 24.—Mr. Robert H. Reid, of Montreal, vice-president of the Labrador Pulp and Paper Company, has just arrived in Quebec from New York and has chartered the steamer Wapanagog to take down himself and party to Labrador where the properties of the company are situated. The trip will be in connection with one of the bigger pulp and paper propositions ever launched in this country, as it means the increasing of the capitalisation of the concern from \$3,000,000 to \$15,000,000, the development of vast waterpowers second only to Niagara, namely the Muskrat Falls on the Hamilton River, and the construction of two large pulp and paper mills that will give employment to between fifteen hundred and two thousand laborers and their families, and at the same time, when in operation, have an annual output of something like 150,000 tons per annum.

#### A Large Combined Daily Output.

When interviewed at the Chateau by the Star representative Mr. Reid said that the mills would be erected at Hamilton Inlet and Sandwich Bay and would have a combined daily output of about 450 or 500 tons. At first only about 50,000 horse power would be developed at Muskrat Falls but the capacities of development were enormous, there being as much as 1,100,000 h.p. that might be generated. The engineers of the company had ascertained that there was at times as much as a million and a half h.p. going over the falls.

The company, said Mr. Reid, would not build any dam or storage reservoir for the present as these were unnecessary. They would simply have an intake built. The company, which has its headquarters in Montreal, has had a Federal charter since 1908, and this charter gives it powers which are very broad in scope. Among other things it has the right to construct and operate railroads, and later on it is the intention of the company to connect its roads with the proposed extension of the Quebec and Lake St. John Railway or whatever line will continue right through to Cape St. Francis or somewhere in the neighborhood. It will be remembered that Sir Rodolphe Forget has intimated that one of his concerns may make such a construction.

#### Orders From Large British Syndicate.

Contracts have already been made for the purchase of the output of the mills and it is understood that most of it will be shipped either to the Old Country or to the Atlantic seaboard of the States, that is to say, to Bangor, Boston and New York. Shipments will also be made to Wisconsin and Michigan. It is said that one large English syndicate that has placed a large number of orders with Labrador Company is the Walf Paper Co.

The president of the Labrador concern is Mr. John MacMartin, of Cobalt, and Porcupine connection, and his brother, Mr. Duncan MacMartin, is also one of the directors.

At present about five hundred men are engaged in the work of constructing the mills and it is expected that some large villages will soon arise as a result of the new industry. One of these is named Grand Valley and is situated at Hamilton Inlet. Already a sum of \$800,000 has been spent by the company at this place and Sandwich Bay, where there will be another town near Cartwright, the Hudson Bay fort. Engineers of the company have been working there for the last six years and it has operated lumber and saw-mills three or four years. All the money has been raised by private subscriptions and the bonds will not be placed on the market even to raise the extra capitalisation desired. The outlay for the construction of the pulp and paper mills will amount to four and a half millions and it is calculated that these will be in full going order before the end of two years.

Forty Thousand Sq. Miles of Limits.

The company has more than forty thousand square miles of limits to draw upon, all of which is well wooded. Ninety per cent of the wood is spruce, the black spruce being far more frequent than the white. At first only mechanical wood pulp will be manufactured. All of the spruce that measures more than twelve inches at the small end will be utilized for lumber, and Mr. Reid calculates that there will be 4,000 feet of wood between 12 and 28 inches for every acre. He also says that it is the intention of the company to cut scientifically, a task that will by no means be difficult for the reason that only about a fifth of the area of the limits will be cut over each year. There will be an extensive reserve growth under six inches, and as a spruce tree usually takes from 25 to 40 years to be fit for cutting, there should be a never ending supply for the mills.

erators' houses, will be in concrete, and there will be work for at least 1,500 men, and their families—regular work at that.

#### Quebec as the Base for Supplies.

The Labrador Pulp and Paper Company intends to make Quebec its base for all supplies and will, said Mr. Reid, open an office here next spring. The mills will be distant 1,050 miles from here, and this will mean only about three and a half days by direct route, instead of about seven or eight days by other routes which would, under ordinary circumstances, necessitate a roundabout journey via St. John's, Nfld.

The unskilled labor will be drawn mainly from the fishing population of Newfoundland, Labrador, and, according to Mr. Reid, a series of poor fishing seasons and other combinations have made these fishermen rather inclined to prefer the steady work of the woods and mills to the more hazardous and precarious occupation which they have been accustomed to practice. Besides, they are all good woodsmen.

Such skilled labour as is needed for the mills will be recruited from the Province of Quebec.

The party that will accompany Mr. Reid is composed of New York capitalists or representatives of various concerns interested in the plans of the company. One of them is Mr. G. A. Vassey, who is connected with the Harvester and Standard Oil and other big American trusts.

Another member of the party is Mr. Reid's engineer, Mr. Leigh Stanton, who represents Mr. Mortimer Foster, a well known hydraulic engineer and pulp expert.—Montreal Star, Aug. 24.

### Gen. Booth's Funeral.

Special to Evening Telegram.  
LONDON, Aug. 29.  
The funeral of General Booth took place to-day in the presence of a great throng. Rain poured down from laybreak, but when the procession had been marshalled, and about to start, the skies cleared. The hearse was decorated with dry palms placed over the "Blood and Fire" banner, which draped the casket. The celebrated battle flag, which the General had placed on Calvary, was also placed ahead of the coffin. Some flags of foreign deputations, and that of the English provincial corps were dipped in salute. The scene was most impressive, the delegates from the provinces and abroad stepping slowly to the solemn strains of the Dead March, by forty bands, as they passed to the funeral car, and came to full salute as they passed the coffin. The procession was over a mile long, and many comprising it carried Army banners for a short distance from the starting point in Queen Victoria Street. As the coffin passed the Mansion House, General Booth having been an honorary freeman of the City of London, the Lord Mayor appeared on the balcony, and saluted the coffin. The procession took three hours to traverse five miles to the cemetery. The burial service was simple, consisting mostly of part singing of Army hymns.

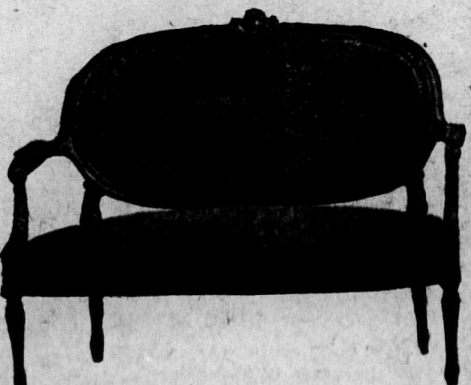

Eau de cologne will remove candle grease.  
 Cabbage should always be boiled in two waters.  
 Tar stains can be taken out with oil of turpentine.

 Use a milk skimmer to lift poached eggs out of the water.

 One secret of good tea or coffee is to make it with freshly boiled water.  
 Japanese lanterns can be used year after year if they are put away carefully.  
 Change dish water often—it is better both for the hands and the dishes.  
 If you wish to save a lemon that has been cut, turn it upside down on a butter dish.  
 A charming nursery screen can be covered with the prints that the small child loves best.  
 Never bang an oven door, if you don't wish your bread or cake to fall. Close it gently instead.  
 To take machine oil out of white materials, dip the spot into cold water while it is fresh.  
 Slight scratches on mahogany furniture can be removed by rubbing with a bit of pecan meat.

Use cold milk to soak the cake or bread crumbs in for your pudding, if you wish it to be light.

The dentist who spreads a cavity until you could throw a sack of Portland cement into it.

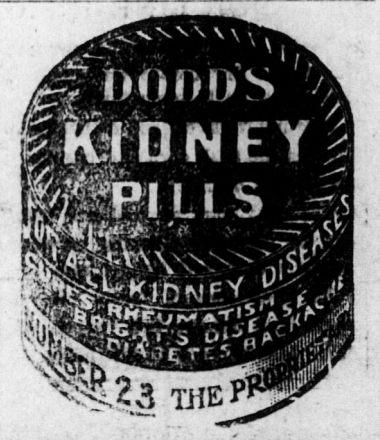
The optician who uses a pair of \$12 glasses to remove a cinder in the eye.

### Cable News.

Special Evening Telegram. LONDON, Aug. 29

Several London newspapers print editorials expressing satisfaction with the action of the British Charge d'Affaires at Washington. In presenting the British note of protest threatening appeal to the Hague. The Chronicle regrets that such a difficulty has sprung up so near to the occasion of celebrating the hundred years of peace, and hopes nothing may happen to mar that event. The Mail says it is one of the tragic comedies of public life that Taft, who seemed destined to become the universal peace-maker, should be known, even in his own country, as a treaty-breaker. Whatever excuse may be offered, the President must recognize that he has acted in defiance of American public opinion. The News and some other papers point out that the provision authorizing the President to grant American ships of all kinds lower tolls than foreign ships unquestionably proclaims American's right to discriminate, and that therefore the dispute ought to go to the Hague for arbitration.

Special to Evening Telegram. PEKIN, Aug. 29

The proposed incorporation of Tibet as a province of the Chinese Republic is meeting with strong opposition in Britain. The British Government contends that Tibet should be permitted to manage her own affairs, without Chinese interference. Sir John Jordan, the British Minister, presented the Government here to-day with a memorandum, in which the Tibetan situation is reviewed. The note suggests that the Chinese Government should station a representative at Lhasa, who shall advise the Tibetans on questions of Foreign Policy, and who shall be protected by a bodyguard of Chinese troops. The British Government objects to the sending of a Chinese expedition now in the borders of Tibet, also to the maintenance of a large military force in the country. The note recommends the drawing up of a new Anglo-Chinese agreement, which it makes a condition of recognition by Britain of the Chinese Republic.

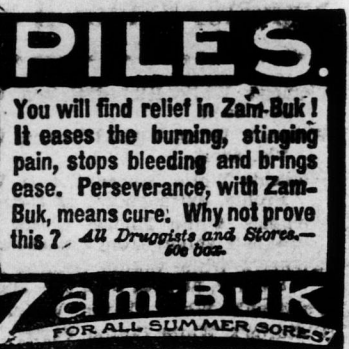

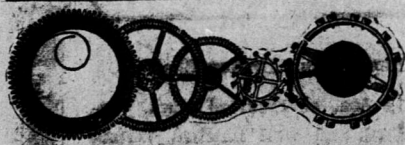

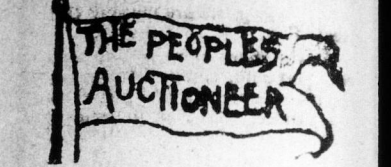
