

Dear Sir,-Sometime ago the editor of the Evening Herald stated in his paper that on account of the Morris Government's generous treatment of the teachers, nine-tenths of their number would support the Morris Government next fall. The learned and Honorable editor is laboring un- der a misconception, for there is a strong sentiment prevailing amongst teachers that they have little cause yet to be grateful to the Morris Gov- ernment. 'Tis time that he modified or extended the principle of the Teachers' Pension Fund Scheme, but many teachers believe he is in a large part handing back to teachers with one hand what has been taken from them, compulsorily, with the other, viz., their own money, and that in- stead of providing for the future of teachers' salaries should be sub- stantially increased at the present. #### Convicted of Murder, but Still Claims Innocence.

Waupon, Wis., March 18 .- Edward Eckart, of Pennsylvania, was to-day aroled from the Wisconsin Penitentiary after 37 years of actual time served behind the bars He was convicted of murder when 21 years old. Eckart's victim was Charles Peterson, also of Pennsylvania. The two were tramping in Wisconsin during the excessively cold winter of 1875. In a quarrel over a fire started beside the ilroad track near Jefferson, Peterson was killed and Eckart was sentenced to life imprisonment for the murder. He never has admitted the time, maintaining that Peterson was killed by a tramp.

In the thirty-seven years of prison confinement never a mark of demerit has been placed against Eckart. He cannot leave Wisconsin and his conduct must be exemplary in every way. In the third of a century of imprisonment his kin have deserted him and he does not know the whereabouts of i his wife and daughter.


