No dinner should be considered

Will Tennyson's Prophecy Be Fulfille

(By J. W. Mitchell).
In Tennyson's Locksley Hall, written between seventy-five and eighty years ago, there appear lines which we must in the light of events, regard as truly prophetic. They foreshadow a great war of nations and the use of great air forces therein, and predict that it will lead to a union of the free peoples of the world in some kind of "parliament" or "federation" that will mean the end

The prophecy is the reasoned pro-phecy of a true seer. Of course, as is usually the case with poetry, much is left to be filled in. By inference, Tenryson says that the relation of nation to nation rests upon a false and insecure foundation and that it will take a great world war, intensified in its horror through the application of modern science and inventions, to h the peoples this great truth and

hem to found their relations upon 1-rock of truth and righteous

A further lair interchee to be grawn from the closing lines in the extract given below is that out of the war will grow a realization, quickened by the spirit of unviersal brotherhood, of the interdependence of nations and their moral obligation to be each other's keeper. In short, there will grow up an international spirit and law that will insure, in future, the settlement of international affairs, not through the application of arbitrary might and brute force to satisfy passion, vain national pride, lust of conquest or the caprice of a despot,-but through either the direct, frank, square-dealing of one notion with another, or, failing this, an international court of arbitration, whose guiding principle will be equity and justice, broad-based upon the Golden Rule.

The following are the lines to which we refer:

"For I dipt into the future, far as human eye could see, Saw the Vision of the world, and all saw the heavens fill with commerce argosies of magic sails, Pilots of the purple twilight, dropping

down with costly bales; Heard the heavens fill with shouting, and there rain'd a ghastly dew From the nation's airy navies grappling in the central blue.

Far along the world-wide whisper of the south-wind rushing warm. plunging thro' a thunder storm: Till the war-drum throbb'd no longer, and the battle-flags were furl'd In the Parliament of man, the Federation of the world.

The great world war, with its aerial navies "grappling in the central blue," we have already experienced. Tho world now yearns for the fulfilment of the balance of the prophecy, the conclusion of a peace settlement which will both satisfy the ends of justice and insure a permanent peace. It is no more in the best interests of the criminal nations themselves than those of the Allies that there should be undue leniency and a miscarriage of justice. But the largest, the most difficult problem to solve is that of the insurance of a permanent peace. Should the representatives of any nation take a narrow stand, based upon selfishness, they should either be instructed from home to modify their stand or be recalled and replaced. Failing this, the representatives of other countries should politely inform them that they will not be permitted to stand in the way of the conclusion of a just and permanent peace arrange-

It is fair to assume that at the peace conference no unjust demands will be made of any individual nation to sacrifice its inherent rights. Hence, should any nation after the catastrophe through which the world has just passed, take a course which will, even in the slightest degree sow the seeds of a future war, it will, by such act, stand before the world as a criminal of the class which plotted, planned and precipitated the armageddon the world has just experienced.

May the representatives at the peace conference of the great free nations of the world fully justify their selection and through their wisdom inaugurate "the Parliament of man, the Federation of the world," which the poet and prophet so ardently wished and hoped for three-quarters of a century ago.


