This bill, it is alleged, was nade out and presented to the Reid Newfoundland Company for payment by Mr. Squires early in November, 1916, and whilst he was Minister of Justice. The facts in connection with it are said to be that one of the officials of the Reid Newfoundland Company called on Mr. Squires at his law offices about the 1st November, 1916, to get from him a statement of account of monies collected by that gentleman for the Reid Newfoundland Company, and also to ask him for a settlement of his electric light bill, which had run up to something over \$1,000; that Mr. Squires in the course of the conversation re-marked that the Reid Newfoundland Company owed him something for professional serices, and took a sheet of his letter paper off the desk and proceeded to make out a bill; that just as he commenced to write he paused, and, in the presence and hearing of the official of the Reid Newfoundland Company, above referred to, discussed his position as Minister of Justice and stated that he would date the bill for services back to the time before he took office as such; that he then proceeded to write out the bill as above, and that when the bill reached the Reid Newfoundland Company, Sir William D. Reid was in Montreal, and those in charge of the Company here at the time knew nothing about
