



### Enlarging Digby's Cold Storage Plant.

It is learned that on the arrival of s.s. Digby at Liverpool, she will go on dock to receive a complete overhauling. Extensive alterations to the refrigerator plant will also be made. The present freezer has a capacity of 5,040 cubic feet, and this will be added to by a new compartment of 7,581 cubic feet, to be installed in No. 3 hold, between decks, while an additional compartment of 8,671 cubic feet will be built in No. 4 between decks. These new compartments will be built on the most modern system, and will be equipped so as to maintain a temperature of about 15 degrees Fahr. This additional refrigerator space will give the ship a total cold storage capacity of 21,292 cubic feet, or in other words about 250 tons, and will be of great benefit to local trade requirements, as large quantities of perishable goods are shipped between St. John's, Liverpool and Halifax. It will be about the latter part of March before the Digby will be ready to resume the ser-vice. 
