Sixteen Burned to Death in Hospital Holocaust at Rome.

Anglo-French Enquiry Into Turkish Atrocities--Belfast Has Night of Horror--U. S. Shipping Board Will Cease Building.

HOSPITAL HORROR.

ROME, May 18. A disastrous fire swept the historic hospital of Santa Spirito, one of the ancient and picturesque charitable institutions in Rome, early yesterday morning. Collapse of the pavement isolated the Chronic Ward. Sixteen bodies had been extracted from burning ruins at an early hour. Other patients were badly burned and one dangerously injured.

TURKISH ATROCITIES.

PARIS, May 18. The French Government has accepted the proposal of the British Government for an international enquiry into Turkish atrocities.

AGGRESSION FACT ADOPTED.

GENOVA, May 18. A non-aggression pact regarding the sea was adopted unanimously at a meeting of the political submission of the Genoa Conference today. The pact was not signed but was in the form of a resolution, the State pledging itself to respect

BELFAST HORRORS.

BELFAST, May 18. A wild night of firing in the Marston District of Belfast, with police and soldiers battling with gunners, was followed by further shooting today. At least four men are dead as a result of these disorders and several others wounded seriously.

WAS INDISCREET.

WELLINGTON, New Zealand, May 18. Magistrate Linton, Roman Catholic Bishop of Auckland, was acquitted today on a charge of having made an indiscreet utterance during a recent speech. The jury added a rider to the verdict that the Bishop had been guilty of gross indiscretion in using language capable of misconstruction and

calculated to offend a large number of New Zealanders.

PATRIARCH'S FORCED RESIGNATION.

RIGA, May 18. The Most Rev. Dr. Tikhon, Patriarch of all Russia, has abdicated under pressure of Provincial Clergymen, growing out of his opposition to the requisitioning by the Soviet Government of Church treasures to be sold for the benefit of the famine stricken people.

LEAGUE SUPPORTS GERMAN PROTEST.

GENEVA, May 18. The Council of the League of Nations adjourned yesterday after it had decided to support the German Government protest against Poland's treatment of more than a million Germans within Polish territory by refusing them citizenship.

U. S. RESERVES DECISION.

GENOVA, May 18. Reuter's to-day states a reply has been received from the United States with reference to participation in the projected commission at the Hague on Russian affairs, saying the United States reserves its decision pending further investigation and until the situation becomes clearer.

WINNIPEG FACES FLOOD.

WINNIPEG, May 18. With the water at the confluence of the Assiniboine and Red Rivers going up a foot a day, Winnipeg faces a grave flood situation as far as its low lying sections are concerned.

RAILWAY MEN REACH AGREEMENT.

MONTREAL, May 18. Representatives of the Railway Association of Canada and of their employees in the mechanical trades who

have been in negotiation here for the past month on a revision of the rules affecting working conditions, to-day concluded a mutually satisfactory agreement. Thirty-five thousand men are affected.

U. S. SHIPPING SITUATION.

WASHINGTON, May 18. The United States Government will build no more ships, Chairman Lasher of the Shipping Board declared in an address to-day before the annual convention here of the Chamber of Commerce of the United States. The President has placed before Congress a programme of Legislation that undertakes to overcome the difficulties now facing private ownership of ships, he added, and unless this legislation is enacted the art of shipbuilding in America will wither and die. America must have a Merchant Marine comparable to that of Great Britain, the speaker added, if it is to have a Naval power potentially equal to that of Britain.

STRATON GOVERNMENT NOT SUSTAINED.

ATHENS, May 18. The newly formed Cabinet of M. Straton failed to receive a vote of confidence in the Chamber of Deputies yesterday.

RUSSIA REPUDIATES GENOA.

MOSCOW, May 18. After receiving the report of M. Joffre, who has returned here, the Russian Executive Committee resolved that Russia shall make agreement in future with other countries on the basis of the Rapallo agreement with Germany.

KING'S HORSES SCRATCHED.

LONDON, May 18. All the King's horses entered for the Derby were scratched to-day.

L.S.P.U. Annual Meeting

OFFICERS ELECTED. The annual meeting of the L.S.P.U. took place last night in the Union Hall, Duckworth Street. A large number of members were present. The reports of the past year showed the organization to be in a very satisfactory condition despite the setback due to the destruction, by fire, of the Hall on Victoria Street. 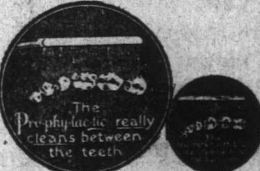

When King Charles Signed the Charter.

BIRTHDAY OF H.B.C. (By J. PREST, Associate Editor in the May Beaver.)

On May 2nd, 1670, King Charles the Second signed away the sole rights of the trade and possession to all territories bordering on the shores of Hudson Bay, but he had not the slightest notion at the time that he was giving "The Gentlemen Adventurers of England Trading into Hudson's Bay" three-quarters of a new continent. The original Company was composed of Prince Rupert, The Duke of Albemarle, Earl's Carvan and Arlington, Lord Carvan and John Hayes in the wealth of fur which abounded in this region.

The territory granted to the Hudson's Bay Company was a vast tract of unexplored wilderness as extensive as the whole of Europe. This rich "Edorado," abounding in fur, timber and mineral, was explored in part some two years previously by two adventurous Frenchmen, Radisson and Grosseillers, who had interested Prince Rupert, Lord Carvan and John Hayes in the wealth of fur which abounded in this region.

These three distinguished patrons were instrumental in fitting out an expedition to the shores of Hudson Bay. On June 8th, 1668, the good ship Nonsuch, of fifty tons burthen, under the command of Captain Gilliam, set sail from Wapping on the River Thames with a small crew of hardy seamen bound on a voyage of unknown possibilities.

On board this small craft went Grosseillers as leader of the expedition. After many buffetings by frequent storms, the little Nonsuch arrived at the mouth of a river flowing into Hudson Bay, now known as Rupert's River. At its mouth a fort was hastily built of rough hewn logs and christened Fort Charles.

The erection of the fort was under the direction of Grosseillers, who had previously visited the territory and knew the advisability of protection from the Indians who inhabited the region.

But a few days had elapsed when a party of Nodways appeared, greatly astonished at the presence of white settlers. After much parleying the Indians were pacified by the giving of trifling baubles, such as beads, colored cloth and knives, and the object of the settlement was made known. The Indians promised to bring beaver and other furs and to sell other tribes to return with them the following winter to trade. Grosseillers' hopes were realized to the full during the next winter, for he made treaties with the Nodways, Crees, Ottawas and other tribes. Solemn conclaves were held and promises made to trade with the white men. The following summer, on June 1st, and with a full cargo of valuable furs, the Nonsuch set sail again for England, arriving at the mouth of the Thames in August, 1669.

It would be difficult to exaggerate the satisfaction of the London merchants on hearing of the results of their first trading venture. They therefore counselled together, and considered the advisability of petitioning Prince Rupert, leader of the enterprise, to seek his cousin's aid (King Charles the Second) in obtaining an exclusive charter to trade and barter in this newly discovered region.

Hence, the beginning of the Hudson's Bay Company. The Royal Charter was signed May 2nd, 1670—just 252 years ago.

Building Activity in Moscow.

RUSSIAN CAPITAL CLEANING UP.

MOSCOW (Associated Press)—Moscow is beginning to show some building activity. After nearly six years, which practically every private building and some public buildings were permitted to fall into disrepair, both the Soviet officials and individuals are now in the process of a repair campaign. The houses where most of the foreigners were housed, and which six months ago was a nightmare of dirt, vermin and lack of service, have been renovated and is to be based on a pre-revolution basis. Long accustomed to carrying their own water, brewing their own beer and cooking their own food in their rooms, now are becoming accustomed again to the magic use of the elevator. Elevators are to be provided for the campaign against vermin is on in full swing.

MAINTAIN PRIVATE ENTERPRISE.

The large repair of apartment buildings and detached dwellings, many of which have fallen into a state of unrepair that they have been abandoned entirely, the Soviet has decided to utilize private enterprise. Persons or corporations who will take over and repair these structures, are given ten-year free leases on them and are free to whom they please and for the sums they please. They may transfer their leases to other persons and in these houses no limit is placed upon the amount of space any person may occupy. Musicians who for the past three or four years have been huddled in tiny rooms allotted them by the Government, are gradually moving in to new quarters, if they have sufficient funds to repair them.

Examining Egyptian Constitution.

PARLIAMENTS DIVIDED INTO TWO CAMPS.

MARSA MATRUH (Associated Press)—The making of a Dostour (constitution) is a matter of necessity for the British protectorate has been the paramount feature of Egyptian politics. The question as to who shall frame the Dostour, which has been under discussion in the native assembly since the first royal levee held by King Fuad at Abdin Palace, has divided the country politically into two diametrically opposed camps. The Nationalists who are adherents of Zaghloul Pasha, are demanding that the constitution be drawn up by a National Assembly elected by the people. The British officials who are supporting the Government of Premier Saad Pasha, who have just won the day, have in favour of appointing a special commission for the task.

TWO CHAMBER PARLIAMENT.

The commission already appointed composed of 31 members under the leadership of Rashdy Pasha, former Premier Minister. It is to draw up within four months a project for a constitution which will be thrashed out by the Egyptian Parliament which will have the right to amend it except in that which concerns the prerogatives of the throne. The Government project calls for a parliament to consist of two chambers: the members of the Lower House are to be elected by popular vote; the other half of the Senate is to be appointed by the Executive. The newspaper "Liberty," writes out that the Senate, being appointed, "will be able to check all the whims of the majority of the Nationalist representatives."

International City.

PLANS PROPOSED BY BELGIAN KING WILL BE COMPLETED.

BRUSSELS (Associated Press)—The striking idea of building an "international city" at the gates of Brussels which was first proposed by King Albert of the Belgians in 1904 has been revived and it is now proposed to erect the city and inaugurate it at the same time as the Brussels International Exposition in 1935. It is intended that the international city shall be a permanent institution where every country will have a building in which it will display not only its manufactures and products but examples of its art and progress of its social progress. These plans were first submitted to King Albert in 1912 by Hendrik C. Anderson, an American sculptor, formerly in New York, R. I., who then was living in Rome. Mr. Anderson was aided in preparing his plans for the international city by Senator La Fontaine, of Belgium. The idea now has been adopted by the Union of International Associations which has its headquarters here and which has announced the plan to the Belgian Government.

A short time later I was asked to play it in London and remembering my promise I sent word to Teddy. Teddy was telling me the other day that after six months in the trenches overseas he finally managed to get to London to see the performance and as he sat in his mud stained uniform watching the performance that had once been ours he had his first touch of homesickness," Billy flicked the ashes from his cigarette, and here we are again, who can tell we may play the Domino for St. John's before we leave but just now we are mighty busy with 'Sweethearts.' Just then the stage manager called Clifton and Wilde for their comedy scene in the first act.

Ghoulish Grafters.

HOW "SAVE THE CHILDREN FUND" IS BEING USED.

Very grave charges are being made in the London newspapers respecting the handling of the "Save the Children Fund," which, as everybody knows, has to do with Russia's starving millions. The London "Daily Express" alleges that three Russians, unnamed, obtained the handling of 50 per cent of "Save the Children" orders between April and October, 1921, and steered this sum, which was enormous, to firms in which they were interested. Competitors for this business further allege that they were not asked to furnish quotations in respect to prices, etc. It is also charged that the publicity agent for the fund, an unnamed lawyer, received ten thousand pounds sterling for his work over a period of twenty months, which seems a tall amount to take from the starving Russian children. But there is worse yet for the "Daily Express" charges that this same man also receives a commission on all goods purchased as well as a commission on all gifts in kind. That is to say, if a charitable person sends in a pair of boots, their value is appraised and a percentage of their appraised value is taken from the

funds in hand and put into the pockets of this already overpaid publicity agent.

The "Daily Express" states that it has in its possession copies of the contracts under which these transactions take place, but unfortunately there is a deadly line of blanks covering the identity of the names. The only name mentioned by "The Express" is that of Lord Weariside who states that he has "well and truly served the fund," but who apparently has refused to give any information respecting the nebulous gentleman who is doing so well for himself.—Saturday Night, Toronto.

Wrangel Island; Two of Them.

In this discussion as to whether or not Wrangel Island is part and parcel of Canada, do not mix up your Wrangel Islands, for there are two of them. One up in the Arctic Seas, where Stefansson's expedition sought safety when the Karink went to pieces in 1913, and the other on the Pacific Coast about midway between Vancouver and Skagway. The latter has a dump of an American town, containing the remains of an old Russian fort, and a century or so ago was the scene of many a hard fought battle, sometimes between Russian settlers and Indians, and at other times between various Indian tribes that still inhabit that coast.

Text books tell us that Wrangel Island in the Arctic Ocean, off the north east coast of Siberia, has been known by various names. From Columbia for instance, and Long's Island, and that it was discovered by Long the explorer, although Wrangel made an expedition in search of it. Baron Wrangel was Governor of Alaska under the Russian regime, and it was back in 1834 that he locked horns with the Hudson's Bay Company, in which year Ogden and Anderson, representing the latter, started out to establish a post in the Russian hinterland drained by the Sitkine river. The Baron, fearing this move would have a bad effect upon Russian trade, petitioned the Czar to rescind the privilege of navigating the Russian coast line, a concession granted some years previously to both Great Britain and the United States. This the Czar did, and Baron Wrangel proceeded to carry out the Czar's orders with an armed force.

In 1839, a convention met in London to consider the situation, and a treaty was patched up which was advantageous to both Russia and the Hudson's Bay Company. So much for the man for whom the two Wrangel Islands were named, and as for the Arctic Wrangel, it is described as "mainly of bare rocks which rise to a height of 2,000 feet." Apparently nothing to get excited about (or wrangle over) no matter who owns it.—Saturday Night, Toronto.

Japs Restored Church.

BERLIN.—Advices received here from the former German colony of Kiachau, which was seized by Japan state that the Japanese authorities have formally restored the German Lutheran Christ Church in Isingtu, the capital, to the local German consistory.

Chinese Public Opinion Strong.

BECOMING MORE SELF-ASSERTIVE AND INDEPENDENT.

CHICAGO (Associated Press)—China is becoming more self-assertive and self-dependent since the early days of the Washington Conference, says Bishop Francis J. McConnell, resident Bishop of Pittsburgh of the Methodist Episcopal Church, who has been visiting in China recently. Bishop McConnell is a member of the Educational Commission of the Missions Board of America and Great Britain who were sent to China six months ago. His statement was made public by a Committee on Conservation and Advance of the Methodist Church here. "There are sure signs of the stirrings of a Chinese public opinion and of Chinese national sentiment in advance of anything yet observed there," the Bishop said. Speaking of the relations of the Japanese and Chinese, Bishop McConnell said: "The Japanese have made one notable failure and that is they have failed to make a friend of China. One does not have to be in a Chinese city long to note the intensity of the enmity of the Chinese toward the Japanese. He is utterly blind who rates this enmity as of no practical consequences in view of Japanese superiority in arms."

Using the Boycott. "The Chinese have found in the boycott a powerful weapon. With consummate genius for non-co-operation and passive resistance, China can free herself from all outside influence which she chooses to hate—when the time comes. And the time is coming soon in the years just ahead when China will inevitably come to a self-assertive, self-respecting independence of foreign nations. This is a plain-as-day fact that a stroller on Chinese streets cannot miss. "I do not think there is danger of another Boxer uprising. At least if there is such a rising the weapons used will not be swords and guns." Bishop McConnell said the presence of an ever growing liberal sentiment—not necessarily a liberal party—in Japan is not a myth. "If Japan does not embark upon a career of imperialistic conquest of China in the next ten years it is not likely that she ever will," he declared. "By 1932 the democratic forces will probably be, if not irresistible at least so effective as to make it impossible for war plans to be carried through in the old high handed fashion."

Britain Favors "White Australia."

MELBOURNE.—The Imperial British government, as a matter of Empire concern, is favorably inclined toward Australia's "White Australia" policy, reports Sir James Connolly, Agent General for West Australia in London. Sir James states that the policy would help close the back door to the Australian continent, and especially to the unpeopled semi-tropical territories of Northern Australia. It is possible, Sir James said, that the Imperial government would aid in the scheme of building railways and roads and equipping 2,000 farms in the territory for occupation by emigrants from British lands.

Municipal Council.
WEEKLY MEETING.
 The weekly meeting of the Municipal Council was held yesterday afternoon. Mayor Cook presided and the full board were present.
 After the minutes of the last meeting were confirmed, the following matters were discussed:—
 Sir M. P. Cashin wrote in reference to the street widening at junction of Monkstown and Circular Roads, and suggested to the Council the advisability of moving poles which, if left in their present position, would become a menace to traffic. The Council decided to make the alterations referred to.
 Mr. T. B. Cliff wrote re the condition of a portion of Gear St., which, if not looked after, might become a dumping ground. The City Engineer will investigate the matter.
 At the request of the Dominion Secretary of the Great War Veterans' Association, the Council met a deputation from the Daughters of the Empire, to discuss matters in connection with the Soldiers' Monument, Garrison Hill.
 Mr. John Duff, Mundy Pond Road, offered a portion of his land for dumping purposes. The Council will accept his offer.
 The Secretary of the Truckman's Protective Union again asked for more equal distribution of the work in connection with various City Departments, amongst the members of the Association. At the present time the Council has not more than six carmen employed in connection with the whole service, and these are not even permanently employed, but should any extensive work be undertaken, they will be only too glad to accede to the wishes of the Union.
 Application of F. Mosler to have hopper removed from the front of his dwelling, in view of same being connected with water and sewerage, was referred to the City Engineer.
 Mr. F. W. Knight, complainant of the dump, opposite his dwelling, which was being filled from the opposite side of Waterford Pier. He also referred to other matters in connection with the Promenade.
 Applications were read from Wm. Hanlon and M. Doran, for position as Impounder. These, with other applications lately received, were given consideration. Mr. Peter Purcell was appointed to the position.
 Permits for repairs, subject to the Engineer's approval, were given the following:—R. G. Herder, Pleasant Street; F. Bursell, Southside; Wm. Beags, Young Street; A. Willar, Holloway Street; and F. W. Pike, Patrick Street.
 The following plans were passed, subject to the approval of the City Engineer:—R. G. Ash, extension, Patrick St. L. Stone, extension, Dick's Square; O. Brown, Garage, Blatch Street; M. Davy, Garage, Gower St.; W. P. Peany, dwelling, Scott Street; Martin-Royal Stores, rebuilding of premises, Water Street.
 P. Bulger's application for permission to use store, corner of Duckworth, and Cochrane Streets, for workshop, was referred to the City Engineer.
 Tenders for piling of Steer's, Ayre's, and Bowring's, Coves, were read as follows:—Jacob Bishop (for three coves) \$589; H. G. Herder (for three coves) \$768.10; A. Osmond, (for three coves) \$680; Wm. Cummings, (for three coves) \$984; H. Brown (Ayre's Cove only) \$340. The tender of Mr. Jacob Bishop, was accepted.
 Sanitary Supervisor Dwyer reported on the work in connection with his Department for the week, also pointed out that a number of houses on Colonial Line, Yonge and Chapel Streets, Queen's Road and Carter's Hill, are not connected with water and sewerage; also new houses recently erected on Franklin Avenue. It was ordered that the Plumbing Inspector take the necessary steps to

 The City Engineer's report, was tabled. It particularly referred to the dangerous condition of retaining wall at Kichham Place, and it was decided to issue tenders for the repairing of same. He also recommended that curbs and gutters be not placed opposite residence of any one individual, unless other residents of that street are prepared to follow suit. He stated the placing of small portions of concrete on any street would not result in the improvement desired, as part of the cobble drain would still remain.
 A new plan of the city, which has been in course of preparation by the Engineering Department, for some time past, is now fully completed, and it was decided to forward same to London to be lithographed.
 Regulations for cast iron tables, and other necessary castings, for Water Works Department, was tabled and the Council unanimously decided that, where at all possible, work of this kind be performed locally. The order was, therefore, placed with the Newfoundland Consolidated Foundry Company.
 Health Officer Brehm reported five new cases of diphtheria in the city during the past week.
 Councillor Ryan gave notice that at the next regular meeting, he would move for the naming of that district—known as the "Anner" recently included in the Municipal Limits, under the Municipal Act, 1921. It is the intention of the Council to name all such streets or districts after some of the Fallen Heroes of the Newfoundland Regiment.
 During the past week, a number of citizens were summoned for arrears of City Taxes, and in most cases, satisfactory settlements were made. Attention is now being given to those liable for the Poll Tax who have, so far, evaded payment, and some twenty delinquents have been summoned for Saturday next. The matter will be followed up until all parties liable realize their responsibilities of citizenship.
 Regulations for several services were accepted.
 Pay rolls and Accounts for the week were ordered paid.
 The meeting then adjourned.

The Attorney General's Reply to Mr. MacDonald.

MAKES SPEECH IN ANSWERING.
 On Wednesday at the House Mr. MacDonald asked the following question:

- (1) Whether the Act amending the Companies Act, passed at the first session of this Legislature and at present consolidated as the Reid Newfoundland Company to sub-divide their interests and resources in this Dominion into various Companies, in a manner impossible before the passing of the Act?
- (2) If so, did the passage of such an Act place the Government of this Dominion in a worse position regarding penalties or assets of the Company to meet such in the case of the Company's defaulting on their contract?
- (3) If so, why did the Government pass such an Act?

The Attorney General in replying said:—"I could answer this question by the simple and single word 'no'; but, I do not think the Member for St. George's would be satisfied with such an answer, and as the matter has been referred to on many occasions, I ask the indulgence of the House while I reply at some length. Now that this grave railroad situation has arisen it is just as well that the public are not beguiled by erroneous ideas and statements. As to whether the amendment to the Companies Act passed in 1920 enabled the Reid Newfoundland Company to sub-divide their interests or resources, and dispose of any lands which might be taken by the Government as security, I desire to say that under subsection 31 of section 4 of Schedule B of the Railway Contract of 1901, the Reid Newfoundland Company was given power to sell or dispose of the undertaking of the Company, or any part thereof. Under the same schedule they were given power to mortgage their assets, and to show it was clearly understood by the Government of that day that the Reid Newfoundland Company had power to sell or dispose of their assets, it was provided by section 12 of the 1901 Act that notwithstanding the sale or disposition by the Reid Newfoundland Company of its undertaking, or any part thereof, the security provided by clause 28 of the agreement shall remain with the Government for the purposes therein provided. Now clause 28 of the Agreement provides that the sum of \$250,000.00 which was deposited with the Government for the performance of the contract, for the construction and equipment of the Northern Railway, (that is under the 1893 Contract), shall be held by the Government as security for the due and faithful performance of this Contract by the Contractor." It is evident therefore that the Reid Newfoundland Company could at any time:

1. Sell or dispose of its assets or any part thereof.
2. Could mortgage its assets or any part thereof.
3. Could take advantage of the Companies' Act 1898 and become a Limited Liability Company.
4. Could form up separate companies and assign its undertaking of any part thereof to such separate company.

To show that the amendment of the Companies Act of 1920 in no way gave the Reid Newfoundland Company any powers which they did not already possess, I draw attention to the fact that the company had actually, in pursuance of its powers, sold and disposed of the following assets:—
 S. S. Bruce, S. S. Lintrose; Lands to the Anglo Newfoundland Development Company; Lands and timber areas to the Timber Estates; Lands and timber areas to the St. Lawrence Pulp and Lumber Company; Lands and timber areas to the Terra Nova Sulphite Company.
 To show that the Reid Newfoundland Company could, without the consent of the Government, mortgage any of its assets before the amendment to the Companies' Act of 1920 was made, I find that on 6th Sept., 1918, when Sir William Lloyd was Prime Minister, the S. S. Glencoe, S. S. Meikle, S. S. Sagona, and the S. S.

Kyle, were mortgaged to the Royal Trust Company, to secure a sum due on account current, with interest at 6%. Now all these assignments, and transfers were made before the passage of the amendment to the Companies' Act of 1920, and the amendment passed in 1920 in no way altered the relations, either contractual or otherwise, between the Government and the Reid Newfoundland Company.

While on this subject, I desire to draw attention to a portion of a leading article in this (Wednesday) morning's Daily News, in which it says that the blunder of 1920 was followed by the base betrayal of the country's interests when the amendment was made to the Companies' Act, which permitted the Railway Company to transfer all its other holdings to private companies, thereby alienating the only security held for the non-performance by the Reids of their contractual obligations. I do not desire to say anything of the rest of the paragraph, but I draw attention to two statements of fact which are made in the article. First, I desire to say that the amendment to the Companies' Act did not permit the transfer of all its other holdings to private companies and, secondly, as for alienating any security held for the non-performance of their contractual obligations, I desire to say that I cannot find in any contract 1893, 1898, 1901 or 1910 any clause which states that the assets of the Reid Newfoundland Company were to be held by them or by the Government as security for the carrying out by them of their contractual obligations. The only reference to security for the performance of the contract is contained in clause 28 of the Agreement of 1901, which provides that \$250,000.00 shall be put up as security for the performance of the contract. It must be remembered that the Reid Newfoundland Company has no assets either in lands or in anything else which they hold from or was given them by the Government. The only assets they have, have been transferred to them by Sir Robert Reid. In 1898 Sir Robert Reid was given a certain amount of land to operate the road for fifty years. In 1901 when Sir Robert Reid came into power he took back the lands and paid Sir Robert Reid \$850,000 in cash in lieu of the lands. The payment was made to Sir Robert Reid, and not the Reid Newfoundland Company.

And other things have ruined my life-long dream. But hark, I hear a footstep. Who is there?

Oh yes, of course, my Council's coming here. (Enter a Secretary.)

SECRETARY—Sir Richard, are you ready for the meeting?

The Council waits, and time, you know, is fleeting.

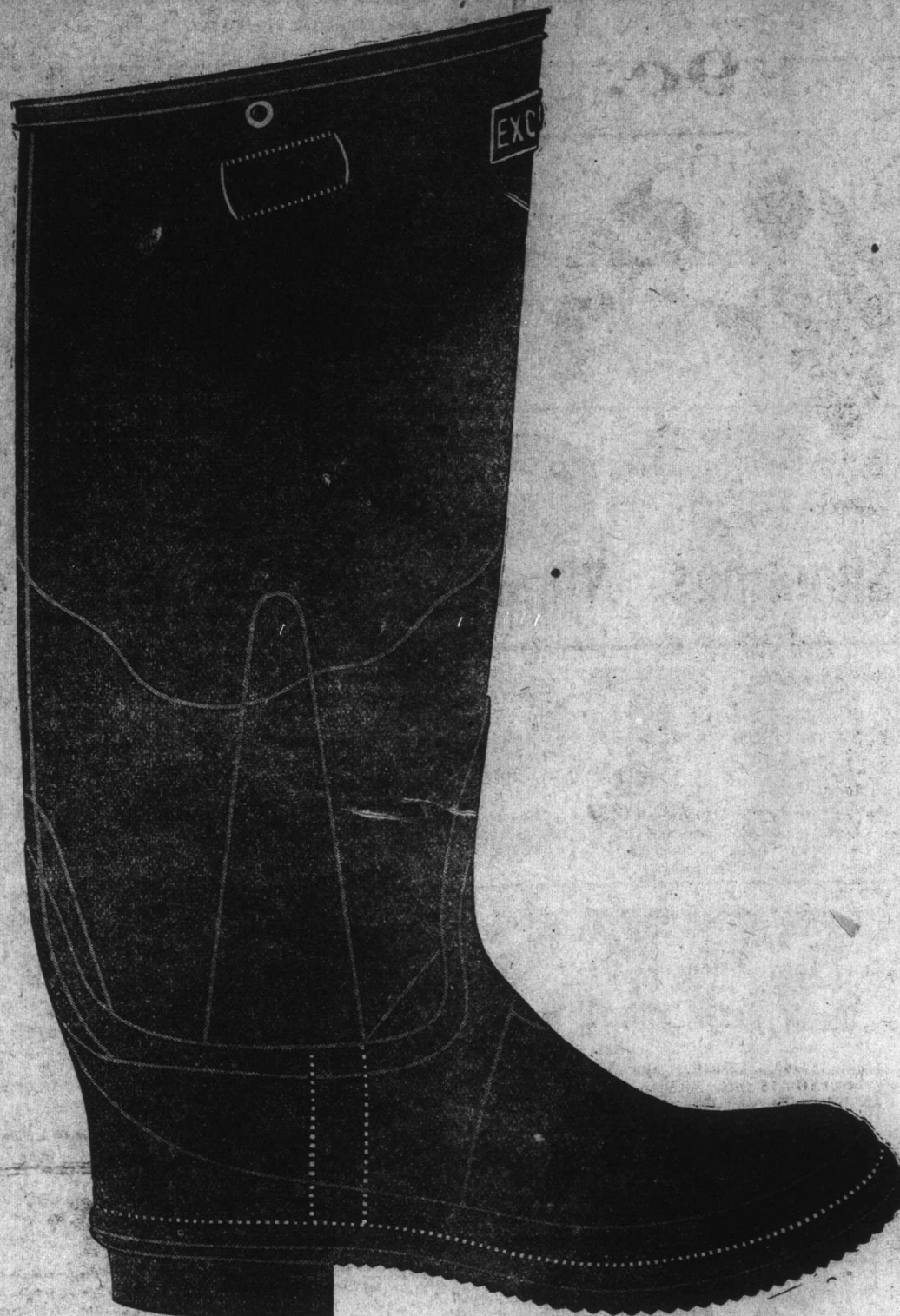

Giant Soldier Honored in Death.

ARCHAEOLOGISTS UNCOVER TWO BIG BURIAL CHAMBERS IN NEW MEXICO.

Two burial chambers are among the numerous recent discoveries in the Aztec ruin, an enormous pre-historic pueblo community dwelling near Aztec, N.M. The excavation work is being done by the American Museum of Natural History as a part of the Archer M. Huntington Archaeological Survey of the Southwest. In his latest letter to the museum, Earl M. Morris, who is in charge of the work, writes:—

"Beneath the debris adjacent to the famous Painted Room opened in 1920, there has been found a second chamber perfectly preserved in every detail. The pine and cedar beams in the smoke-brown ceiling are as sound as when the trees were felled, and on the walls—the marks of the quartzite pebbles with which they were faced are as bright and fresh as if the artisan who shaped them, though dead these thousands of years, had but finished yesterday, gathered up his primitive tools and stepped out of the finished chamber.

"This room was the tomb of a warrior who lay in solitary state against one wall immediately back of the recessed altar in the Painted Room. The body was that of a veritable giant over six feet and an inch in height, who towered head and shoulders over the average men of his tribe. Death came to the stalwart defender of the village when he was in the prime of life, in the height of his glory, as well, if one may infer the esteem in which he was held by the excellence of his tomb and the number of burial accompaniments.

"The mighty frame had been wrapped in a mantle of feather cloth, enshrouded with a mat of woven rush stems. Back of the body there were four magnificent pottery bowls, a cup and a basket. Upon the skull rested a large spherical vase with a neatly fitting cover, both of them exquisitely wrought and ornamented. Within easy grasp of the right hand were the wooden handles of two stone battle axes and beside them a beaked knife of quartzite, as well as chips of flint and prongs of antler for arrow making. A circular shield three feet in diameter, unlike anything previously found in the ruins, covered the warrior from his thighs to temples.

"This shield is an example of coil-basketry technique, but unusually thick and strong. The outer surface had been coated with gum and thickly spangled with flakes of mica. When held in the sunlight, because of the numberless reflecting surfaces, the great disk would have shone with dazzling brilliance, perhaps sufficiently intense to have confused the vision of the archer who sought to drive an arrow through the shield to the living flesh behind it.

"A fallen chamber not far distant from the warrior's tomb contained 13 skeletons. These bodies had been laid away at different times and covered with ashes and sweepings from the floors of the village. Twelve of the burials, those of nine children and three aged persons being merely wrapped in matting with occasionally a jar or cup beside the skull.

"The 13th, however, was one of the most extraordinary which has come to light in the whole ruin. The remains were those of an old woman who had been wrapped and bound and placed in one corner of the room. A stout splinter from a broken ceiling timber had been hewn to a point, then driven through the pelvis and wall into the earth below. This shrunken body thus impaled presented a spectacle so gruesome that at sight of it even the most hardened excavator shuddered.

"Of course, a doubt will always exist as to how the stake happened to be where it was found. It may have been driven after the body was covered and hidden from view by some one who had no idea what substance was so stubborn that the blows of his stone hammer beat the head off the stake to a pulp before the point would sink to the desired depth. But it is equally probable that an old crone who had fallen into high disfavor in the village, perhaps a witch, was so subjected to this particular cruel form of execution and torture."—New York Times.

On Top of the World.

Stirring Adventure in a Land Where no Man Dwells.

A land of utter desolation! Such, briefly, is the description of the extreme north of Greenland.

No man dwells there. There is hardly any vegetation.

There are some thrilling stories of this land told by Mr. Knud Rasmussen, in his newly-published book, "Greenland by the Polar Sea."

The author led an expedition to map accurately the extreme northern limits of the huge island that hangs down like a monstrous pear from near the North Pole.

The job—as can be imagined!—was no easy one. At times they journeyed along the sea-ice fringing the coast. Above the explorers, on the land side, towered gigantic glaciers, "which in a single sneeze threw gleaming ice-mountains out into the frozen ocean."

HAD TO EAT THEIR DOGS.

Of the seven members of the expedition who started, two perished, and the other five were perilously near sharing their fate. On one occasion they were compelled to eat their dogs raw.

Under such conditions one can imagine their joy on finding two 9lb. tins of New Zealand mutton deposited by an expedition of 1875. The meat was still in excellent preservation.

"For some time," says the author, "we were thus able to live grandly on food originally meant for Arctic colleagues who had travelled here before any of us were born."

On another occasion some coffee was found, and a little port wine which had spent fifty years of frosty nights near the Pole! But a barrel of sugar had been detected and rifled by a sweet-toothed bear.

GUIDED BY AN ESKIMO.

The latter part of the journey was the worst. It was literally a race with death, for the provisions of the little party were exhausted. One of them lagged behind and was eaten by wolves. Another gradually became unable to eat such little food as was obtainable, and begged the others to go on without him.

This they had to do, for they were by this time without sledges, and carrying him was quite out of the question. He faced death calmly and heroically, merely asking for a hot drink so as to enable his numbed fingers to pen a few last words of farewell.

Meanwhile Rasmussen, pushing on ahead to seek assistance, fortunately came across a nomad Eskimo hunter, and guided and helped along by him, eventually reached the base, whence relief was despatched to his remaining comrades. But for this the whole expedition must have perished.

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
