PARTING WORDS of GEN. MICHEL.

CANADIAN VOLUNTEERS-THE DEFENCE

Previous to his departure from Montreal, Gen. Michel was presented with an address from the Mayor and Corporation, on behalf of the citizens, and with another from Col. Dyde, on behalf of the Volunteers. In reply, he delivered the following address, which will be read with interest by all classes, but especially by Volunteers:

Mr. Mayor and Gentlese.

I think I am entitled to consider the gentlemen of Montreal and her Volunteer Militia.

I think I am entitled to consider the gentlemen of Montreal and her Volunteer Militia as one united body of civil patriots, vieing with each other in devotion to their country, and loyalty to the crown of England. To you then, collectively, I tender my heartfelt thanks for the kindly addresses now presented to me. His Honor the Mayor has been pleased to speak favorably of my endeavours, both as a commander of the army in this country and as an administrator of the Government—Col. Dyde, of the encouragement I have given to the Volunteers of Canada. My business was to encourage the military spirit, the spirit of self-defence, that I might find in this country, and to give (if required) auxiliary said. What did I find in Canada? Loyalty to the backbone, a noble military spirit, a determination to be a country, respected by her powerful neighbour, and looked upon as such by the comity of nations. Could I, then, have done less than place any small ability or energy that I may possess at the disposal of Canada? On my arrival in Canada I found little more than a Volunteer force. You have now a fairly organized, well equipped force of over 32,000 men. But, good as your volunteers, admirable as they are for the reserve force of the Dominion, still we must recollect that they are the elites of the country, men so required in their different positions in life that serious injury arises from any protracted absence. In your first line of defence you must have a militia, and let your second be composed of theese patriotic volunteers. But our time is short; yet before we part I would wish you all to take home with you one or two points for your deep consideration, to be pondered over there, and in your civil lives steadily to you, men of Montreal. You are placed in a position held by no other city that I know of in the world. You are placed in a position held by no other city that I know of in the world. You are pl

The Shipment of Breadstuffs to

The Shipment of Breadstuffs to Europe.

The N. Y. Times says, the most authentic reports that we have of the harvest in England and the Continent of Europe are doubtless those which we receive through each week's returns of the shipments—eastward—of breadstuffs from this port. Since the harvest was gathered here, the exports have been increasing at a rate which clearly indicates a deficient harvest in the great consuming countries on the other side, especially in England. During the past week we shipped—principally to British ports—12,517 barrels of flour, 174,971 bushels of wheat, 78,362 bushels of corn. and 35,031 bushels of rye. The bulk of the exportation, excepting only rye, has been to England. The demand clearly shows that the harvest—in Great Britain especially—is far below the average. As a consequence thereof freights have gone up with uncommon rapidity, deubling almost within the last six weeks. During the past seven days the exports of cotton, the bulk of which went to Livespool, amounted to 2,402 bales, making the total shipments for the week \$3,134,082. THE IRISH HARP.—Long before the lyre was known in Rome or Greece, the Gael of Ireland had attsined a high degree of perfection in the form and management of the harp. The Irish harper made use of two kinds of instruments—the cruit and the clairseach. The latter is supposed to have been employed in producing martial strains, and used in banquet halls; the former thrilled from its chords the softer breathings of love and sorrow. The Pagan Gael would listen to no instruction of Druid and Ollay (priest and professor) that was not wedded to verse; and even when the Christian dispensation had supplanted Druidism, they continued to be in equal repute. In rank, the ministrels were the coequals of the nobles, and at the festive boards to them were assigned seats of the highest honor; extensive landed estates were settled upon them; many of them as late as the seventeenth crimary occupied stately castles. London, Oct. 18.—A dinner was given at Manchester, last evening to the Ministry, at which were present Lord Stanley, and nearly all the members of the Cabinet were present. In reply to the usual sentiment in honor of the Administration, the Premier made a speech in which he defended the action of the Government of the Before question and related some of defended the action of the Government of the Reform question, and related some of the attacks which had been made upon the Representation of the People's Bill—Lord Stanley, secretary of foreign affairs, also addressed the company. He spoke of the disturbed condition of Europe, but declared that, notwithstanding the threatening appearance of affairs, he still entertained hopes that peace would be preserved. While reviewing the present relations of Great Britain with foreign powers, he alluded to the controversy between his government and that of the U. S. in regard to the claims for indemnity. This controversy, he said, still remained open, but England had all along dealt with America in a friendly spirit. This discussion and time was already soothing the irritation which might have arisen one either side of the Atlantic.


