We now offer to the English government their choice of two things—that is, the destruction of the British empire or the independence of Ireland. SIR CHARLES TUPPER Certain rumors of some time back are now confirmed, and it is announced as a thing settled upon that Sir Charles Tupper will at an early day resign both his position in the dominion government and his seat in the house of commons. He does not by any means retire from public life, however, but it is understood that he will succeed Sir Alexander Galt as Canada's ambassado or high commissioner at London. As he has been suffering severely from over-work and ill-health the change ought to be to him a great relief. He is not a likely man to indulge in all the luxury of "sweet do ing nothing" which the duties of his new position might permit. But these duties will be so light, compared with those he has been carrying during recent years, that the change will be to him almost like one from




