But provided there is cavalry or mounted infantry opposed to them, they bury their dead in the ravine or other secluded spot unobserved, or toss them into a river if one be at hand. Instances are not uncommon where the United States troops have seen the unwounded braves killing those of their fellows who were so badly wounded as to be unable to ride rapidly away.

It need not dishearten our brave fellows to be unable to find the actual corpses of the foe. When they win a vicory such that the rebels will leave their dead on the battlefield, it will indeed be a decisive one.



Let us consider what is the present position and what is the mode of conduct of the government adapted to that position. It is not a case of war. There is no war before us, actual or, I may even perhaps say, proximate, though I am slow to deal with epithets which are of course liable to some latitude of interpretation. I am not called upon to define, and I would find great difficulty in defining—since it does not stand upon any choice of mine or of my colleagues—the degree of danger that may be before us. [Cheers.] But one thing I will venture to say with regard to that sad contingency—an outbreak of war—a rupture of relations between two great powers like Russia and England.
