ANOTHER HOMESTEAD RIOT

BETWEEN THE STRIKERS AND COLORED WORKMEN.

Fifty Shots Fired, Not One Killed—Terrible Battle With Knives—At Least Two Dozen People Were Injured With Flying Missiles—A Number of Strikers Have Been Arrested.

HOMESTEAD, Pa., Nov. 13.—The period of comparative quietness which has prevailed in Homestead since the militia left did not last, and the pent-up feelings of the strikers broke out afresh in a riot, in which at least 50 shots were fired, but miraculously no person was killed, though a score were hit by flying bullets.

A party of seven colored non-union men were on their way to the beach, when a man, supposed to be a striker, attacked them. The negroes, Charles Carroll and Fred Lewis. Lewis was knocked down. This was a signal for a large crowd to gather at the scene of trouble. Lewis' companions came to his rescue and a terrible riot broke out. The colored men were treated their close quarters for several minutes, when the negroes made a dash through the crowd for their boarding house.

They were followed by the hoisting and Woodthirty crowd, which by this time numbered at least 2000, including the women and children. The crowd fired and threw stones at the fleeing negroes, and they in turn returned the fire with their clubs and how so many escaped instant death is a miracle.

At least two dozen people were injured by flying missiles, but as far as can be learned none were killed. The seven negroes and a number of strikers have been arrested. Great excitement prevails here to-night and more deputies have been asked for.

FRANCE AND PORTUGAL. A Difference That May Cause Reconstruction of the Later Cabinet.

PARIS, Nov. 13.—A dispatch from Lisbon says that the Ligeia harbor works contractor, growing out of the action of the Portuguese Government in seizing the plant belonging to M. Hensent, a French contractor. The seizure has recently been the subject of correspondence between the French and Portuguese Governments.

It is thought that the differences in the Cabinet will result in the opening of the Cortes, Ministers Bethoux, Amalari and Furtado resigning their portfolios.

PROTECTION GROWING IN FRANCE.

A System of Differential Freight Rates to Be Established in Favor of French Merchandise.

PARIS, Nov. 13.—With the view of checking the growing importation of foreign goods into French colonies and protectorates the Colonial Administration has requested French railway and steamship companies to establish a system of differential freight rates in favor of French merchandise.

BRITISH MINISTERS. Have Now a Firm Grip on the Work for Next Session.

LONDON, Nov. 13.—Cabinet Councils were renewed through the week, accompanied, as before, by rumors of disintegration. The general understanding is that Ministers have now got a firm grip on the work for next session.

Various small committees are shaping bills not only dealing with the main question, Home Rule, but others, notably one touching reform of registration and another touching the Land Bill.

CHICAGO IS IN TERROR. She Feels That Cholera Germs May Be Carried on the World's Fair.

BERLIN, Nov. 13.—The uneasiness occasioned in Chicago by the sending of Germany's exhibits to the Associated Press correspondents here to ascertain the extent to which this fear was justified.

It is said that most of the German exhibits have never been known to be carried such goods. Cholera may be spread by human beings or by the mites of clothing or pieces of cholera patients, but never by goods packed in a wooden case or by iron or stone.

TRAFALGAR-SQUARE SCENES.

CELEBRATION OF THE ANNIVERSARY OF BLOODY SUNDAY.

Processions Led by a Number of Young Girls Waving Red Flags—Revolutionary Orators—Scottish Band—Ready for an Emergency—It Was an Orderly Crowd, However.

LONDON, Nov. 13.—Trafalgar Square was today the scene of a great popular demonstration, the anniversary of "Bloody Sunday," in celebration of the restoration by the Liberal Government of the right to hold public meetings in the square. The day was clouded and threatened rain.

Nothing daunted the legions of unemployed, of Socialists and other sympathizers marched in bodies to the square, most of them coming from the east and southeast. A band was stationed there, which greeted the arriving processions, the first three of which were social Democratic bodies.

They carried red banners and were led by a number of young girls waving red flags. They took up positions at the base of the Nelson column, about three sides of which were covered by the national gallery provided three other platforms.

SCHEDULE ORDER MODIFIED.

STOCKERS ON THE WAY WILL BE ADMITTED.

The Time For Entry Will Not Be Extended—The Suspended Accountants Will Make Good the Deficiency of \$2500 If Necessary—Toronto Coffee is Above the Average.

OTAWA, Nov. 13.—The question of the scheduling of Canadian bills on the 21st inst. may be considered as definitely settled. When the order for scheduling was given the Minister of Agriculture, at the instance of the cattle shippers, asked through Sir Charles Tupper, that the order be modified so that shipments might be made from Canada up to the 21st to enable contracts already made for the export of stock to be fulfilled.

NO NEW DEVELOPMENT HAS TAKEN PLACE IN THE CASE OF THE SUSPENDED ACCOUNTANTS AND ASSISTANT ACCOUNTANTS OF THE HOUSE OF COMMONS EXCEPT THAT THE MATTER HAS BEEN REFERRED TO THE DEPARTMENT OF JUSTICE AND THAT THE TWO OFFICERS ARE SAID TO BE PREPARED TO MAKE GOOD THE DEFICIENCY OF \$2500 IF NECESSARY.

IT IS REMOVED THAT THE DEFICIENCY IS LARGELY COVERED BY ADVANCES MADE BY THE OFFICERS WHICH THEY HAD NO LEGAL AUTHORITY TO MAKE, BUT WHICH SHOW THAT THERE WAS NO INTENTION OF FRAUD OR DISHONESTY.

TORONTO COFFEE ABOVE THE AVERAGE. The Department of Inland Revenue has just issued a bulletin giving the result of analyses made of 141 samples of coffee collected in various parts of the Dominion during April, May and June last. It has been published that 29.6 per cent, were adulterated.

IN CASES OF GROSS ADULTERATION WITH CHOCOLATE, TOFFEE, RAISIN, OR BOTH, THE PARTIES WERE CHALLENGED AND GENERALLY PAID THE COST OF COLLECTING AND ANALYSING THE SAMPLES. IN SOME CASES PREVENTIONS WERE INSTITUTED AND ARE STILL PENDING.

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ST. CATHARINES' NEW COLLECTOR. ST. CATHARINES, Nov. 13.—Mr. John E. Cuff was daily installed as collector of customs at this port yesterday by Inspector McMichael and now occupies the official chair. Mr. Collier, the former collector, will retain the office of collector of canal tolls. This will make his superannuation allowance a little more respectable.

We continue to read the news despatches and to the comments of able editors that the presidential vote just cast in the United States means sweeping tariff reductions. The election has been watched with special interest in England.

Proceeding, he said that the universe had no religion, and that the only religion was that of the man who believes in chance is out of his place in civilization. There is no trusting to chance by the professional gambler. He does everything on scientific principles.

KILLED ON THE TRAIL

A Norwegian Plundered of the Fur-cape Price of His Farm.

WINDSOR, Man., Nov. 13.—A despatch from Edmonton on Saturday reads as follows: Yesterday evening Peter Skadmit, who arrived by train Thursday night from Crookston, Minnesota, was found lying unconscious on the trail, having been killed from the railway station in South Edmonton. He died about 1 p.m.
