New York, April 19—A special cable to the 'Tribune' from London says:—Germany's efforts to extend and open up colonies are not very successful from a financial point of view. The total annual revenue of the eight protectorates which are under the rule of the Emperor William is only \$2,000,000, and the Reichstag has to vote \$7,500,000 to support them. Kiaochau revenue is \$90,000 and a subsidy of \$3,000,000 is required to make both ends meet. Again, the revenue of the protectorate in South-west Africa amounts to \$450,000 while the total sum required for government is \$2,000,000. But even these yearly subsidies do not always represent the full amounts that have to be provided out of the imperial funds. The estimates for the present year include the sum of \$800,000 to cover deficits that occurred in 1898 and 1899 in the budgets of the protectorates of East Africa.
