





To the Warden and Councillors of the Municipality of Annapolis Co.: for a number of years Gentlemen: I beg to present the m and severe Pains in record of my work during the past year, as Inspector for the enforcement of the Nova Scotia Temprance Being a new man in the position, a friend recommended without previous experience in en-1 forcing a new law so far as Annapolis county is concerned, it is not surprising that I have not accomplished all that I would like to have done; nevertheless I think my work compares favorably with that of my predecessors.

I have brought ten cases to trial, securing convictions in 4 of them. Two paid fines and costs, one served a term in jail, the other was too ill to be incarcerated.

The manufacture and sale of home brewed beer prevails extensively in likely to increase (unless checked) Sept. 28—The King vs. Stephen some parts of Annapolis West, and is under the new conditions produced by recent Order in Council and foreshadewed legislation. The proof of the intoxicating properties of this beer is difficult and expensive at present, because the analyst who tests it must be subpoened to give his evidence at the trial. In two cases tried before Stipendiary Hervey at Round Hill the expenses and fees paid to the Halifax analyst amount to \$28.25. This is deplorable and can be avoided by an amendment to our Act similar to the provisions of the Alberta Statute, whereby the certificate of the analyst produced in Court is held to be conclusive evidence of the amount of alcohol in the specimen examined.


