THE CEMETERY IN TORONTO.

To the Editor of The Church.

Rev. and Dear Sir,—Our Toronto papers have given you some insight into the various reforms and improvements which have of late taken place, and are now progressing in this good city.

A few months since, the crowded state of the churchyard attached to St. James's Cathedral was looked on with much apprehension, and the necessity for a more spacious and commodious burial-ground, in the vicinity of the town, forced itself on the minds of all.

Not that as an admitted principle, or established system, the present position of public affairs would be a safe or desirable one. We cannot always expect a Governor of the clear understanding, amiable disposition, and honest heart of the present incumbent of that high office; and we have no desire to see any infringement of the royal authority to be nothing.

As before remarked, this new burying-place is on a rising ground; in fact it is on a decidedly elevated level above the town, and on a clear day commands a view of the city and the bay.

This difficulty, we apprehend, is the real secret of the delay which has ensued. Individuals of talent, respectability, and stake in the country, are not to be found who will sacrifice their private ease or professional standing for the emoluments and influence of an office, the tenure of which may endure but for a month.

Not only are we sensible of the importance of fleets and armies for the defence of the country, but we know that they are indispensable; yet if the annual cost of but one regiment of infantry, which we believe is £40,000, were expended in providing for four hundred additional clergymen in this Province, we apprehend that it will generally be conceded that her Majesty's Government might be relieved in more than double that amount in the ordinary defence of the colony.

In this present condition of this Province, there is no one to be found who will sacrifice their private ease or professional standing for the emoluments and influence of an office, the tenure of which may endure but for a month.

Government, upon the breaking out of this unnatural rebellion, appeared willing to spare no expense in order to counteract the evil, and avert it in future; and the millions which have been expended here, in consequence of that outbreak are a substantial proof of their concern for the preservation of the country.

In short, it is perfectly obvious that no Colonial Government can be conducted on the system which, unhappily, the people of this Province have been encouraged to regard as an established one.

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REPORT OF THE COMMON COUNCIL OF TORONTO ON ROMAN CATHOLIC SCHOOLS.

To the Worshipful the Mayor, Aldermen, and Commonalty of the City of Toronto, in Common Council assembled.

The Standing Committee upon Public Schools beg leave to report— That your Committee have taken into their consideration the communication of G. A. Barber, Esquire, the City Superintendent of Education.

In this communication it is stated that an application has been made to him by certain gentlemen, representing the Roman Catholic population of this city, that a proportion of the School Fund, equal to the relative proportion of the population of that body, as compared with that of the Protestant denominations, be paid over to them for the purpose of enabling them to establish such Roman Catholic schools in this city as they may deem convenient or expedient.

On reference to the Provincial Statute 7 Victoria, Chapter 29, entitled "An Act for the establishment of Common Schools, &c.," your Committee are of opinion that this application cannot be acceded to.

By the 55th and 56th Sections of that Act, it is evident that such separate appropriations can only be made with reference to individual School Districts, and not to whole townships, towns, or cities.

And to enable the Roman Catholic population of each individual district to claim a separate appropriation it is necessary— Firstly—That the teacher of such district shall be a Protestant.

Secondly—That the requisition for such separate appropriation shall be signed by ten or more resident freholders or householders of such School District.

And, thirdly—That such requisition shall contain the names of three persons to act as Trustees of such separate school.

It is obvious, therefore, that it is only in conformity with these conditions that any separate appropriation of the establishment of Roman Catholic Schools in this city can legally be made.
