Lansdowne Public School Completely Gutted Yesterday When Fire Broke Out on Lower Floor - Mothers Thronged Spadina Crescent, Fearing for Children's Safety

The old Lansdowne Public School, opposite Knox College, on Spadina present site for nearly thirty years. yesterday afternoon, just a few minutes after a great majority of the pupils had been released for the day. The five hundred or so pupils under detention till 4 o'clock, upon hearing the fire signal, marched out in orderly fashion without a sign of panic. The estimated loss is \$40.000.

The cause of the fire is unknown It s believed to have started in the south wall, between the kindergarten n the ground floor and the room imnediately above it. In some quarters insmiths working on the new annex are blamed for the fire, while others give defective wiring as the cause.

Boys Gave Alarm. Herbert Terry, a lad of about 14 years, was the first to notice smoke and gave the alarm. Standing outside the premies with some comrades, the lad noticed a slight column of smoke coming from the south wall, below the window of the second storey. He notified a police constable, who turned in the alarm, while another lad ran into the school and informed the principal. A third ran all the way to the College street fire ball and notified the fire-



Dr. Jennie Gray Says Tight Skirts Mean Less Exercise.

"Fashion is retarding the physical deelopment of women," was an assertion nade by Dr. Jennie Gray in an address delivered before the Junior Suffrage As ociation on Monday night. Miss M. Amiraux presided. The subject of the

Amiraux presided. The subject of the address was the possibilities for women in nation-building.

Dr. Gray declared that the tight skirt was leading to women taking a car even for distances as short as several blocks. Walking was one of the greatest factors for physical development which the city dweller possessed, and walking to business, instead of using the cars, was a health opportunity that should be seized upon. The future race of Canadians depended on the women of today and their proper physical development. Such development was not possible with the styles now being worn. While the modern nations do not have the women bind their feet, as does China, the binding together of the ankles in such a way as to force the women to walk in a deformed manner was countenanced. to force the women to walk in a deformed manner was countenanced.

The health enjoyed by Canadians today was due to the fact that their fore-fathers lived the hardworking outdoor life that made for physical development. With the ever-growing city life such work was impossible for many, and showed the need of sufficient outdoor exercise outside working hours. Churches will hold their mid-week services Wednesday night and theatres will open Thursday. Dr. Herman Biggs, state commissioner of health, has instructed the local authorities that he has no objection to all places of public semblage being opened, provided that only vaccinated persons be admitted. There are now but 16 cases of small-pox under quarantine. Over 20,000 persons have been vaccinated.

#### CALGARY'S HEALTH IMPROVES.

CALGARY, Feb. 24 .- The general death rate of Calgary shows a remark able reduction of 22.18 as compared with the death rate of 1912. This is one of the statements in the annual report for 1913 issued by Medical Health Officer Mahood. The infant death rate showed a reduction of 24.85 per cent. per 1000 births over 1912. 

Those who object to annexation will naturally say that if people like to take the risk of living outside the city limits where fire protection is impossible, they must be prepared to accept the consequences. If they want fire engines they can stay inside the city boundaries. Land can be had inside the city as low as \$20 or \$30, and only greed takes people outside where land is cheaper.

People who want to be annexed to Toronto are unreasonable. All they would get out of annexation would be the opportunity to pay city taxes. What they get in return for city taxes has nothing to do with the case. It is cheaper to have your house burned down than pay taxes for a fire engine. It is cheaper to melt snow than to pay water rates. There is nothing like living on the cheap after all. It is possible to buy a newspaper for a cent. If enough people buy newspapers for a cent they can have a controller, with disciples in the city council, to tell them what to do, and keep other people from coming into the city by annexation or otherwise. Annexation is foolish, because it adds to the expense of the city and makes it more costly to deliver newspapers and put out fires and collect taxes People who are annexed do not pay Kingdom, since it cannot but result in taxes, and, if they do, they ought to its people having to pay more for the people who came in first. 



GHICAGO. Feb. 24.—Formors of expant sales had considerable to do today with rallying the price of wheat, Largely in consequence, the market which early in the session had been depressed, closed steady at an advance of 1-3c to 1/c net. 




