In connection with an address cently delivered by President Eliot of Harvard University on "The Ethics of Corporate Management," Eugene E. ten an instructive letter to The Chicago Legal News on the German method of treating this vexed question of capital increases. He says that the twin evils of overcapitalization and extravagant

"have been made the subjects of strictest statutory regulation in Germany, ever since the great 'swindling promoters' panic' of 1873. The capitalization of corporations has become a judicial proceeding there. The promoters are required to apply to the county court, which appoints appraisers or commission-ers to determine the proper capitalization or increase of capital a corporation. Evidence is taken as to the amount of money paid in or to be paid in for the corporate purposes or the value of property to be conveyed to the company, and its earning power. A state's at-torney represents the public interest in the proceeding and protects it with the usual German thoroness. A decree of the courts is entered finally, and upon this the corporation is permitted to proceed. violation of the decree by the pro-moters or corporate officials is severely punished. Since the enactent of this law overcapitalization in Germany has been rare, and not until nearly thirty years later did any important violation of the law in this respect become public. was the great Malt Drying Corporation swindle of 1901. It prompt-ly resulted in the punishment, expatriation or suicide of the participants in it. "The law has been found to work most excellently, and, while Ger-many is not absolutely free from corporate mismanagement, it is nevertheless true that official misconduct in corporations is rare and industrial securities have become favorite and measurably safe investments for the surplus capital of the people. The high ability of the average German corporation managers has made profits reasonably certain and dividends are usu ally satisfactory. The country suf-fers, like others, from ups and downs, but the tremendous evils of overcapitalization, inordinate salaries and the consequent drain of grafts and swindling as we know them are no longer possible there. "In respect to salaries, the prac-tice is as follows: Instead of great salaries, there is a logical and fixed division of net profits after a definite requirement for writing off matters of depreciation and making reserves for betterments, improve very moderate, but good living sal-aries. Then the stockholders re-ceive first a dividend of not less than a per cent. Then the division than 4 per cent. Then the directors, who receive only their expenses before that, are entitled to a moderate percentage of the remaining net earnings, and the officers to a like percenatge. The then remaining net profit is subject to the vote of the stockholders for dividends or other corporate purposes. Directors are never permitted to declare or fix the amount of the dividends."

connected with the telephone, electric power, mining, street railway and other nopolistic propositions would have worn a very different aspect. An amendment of the company law on such lines would be an important public boon. The simple fact is that if monopolistic corporations and combinations are not brought under control, the political situation of the country will rapidly become intolerable, if indeed it has not already reached that stage. As Canada expands, facilities for overcapitalization and its attendant evils increase and multiply to the lasting injury of the nation. Nothing can be expected from the present Dominion government, unless the people, who are the sufferers, show themselves determined upon early and drastic reforms.

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Expenditure Jealously Looked After -Army Service Corps in Need of Improvement.

Last night at the Canadian Military stitute Lieut.-Col. W. G. Gwatkin director of operations and staff duties at Ottawa, delivered an address on 'Mobilization."

"Mobilization," he said, "in its primary significance means the rendering of an army mobile with a view to active operations in which are included all the arrangements necessary to facilitate transition from a peace to a war footing, and no scheme would be complete which disregarded the wast-age of war and made no provision for the upkeep of a force already mobiliz-ed and in the field. He said the royal navy has guaran-teed the safety of the British dominions from invasion by see

He said the royal navy has guaran-teed the safety of the British dominions from invasion by sea. He laid down as two main principles the placing on a war footing with the least possible delay a first line of defence of 100,000 men, and the training, organizing and equipment of the second line of defence, drawn from the men of the population in reserve, with a view to maintaining the first line undi-minished in numbers and efficiency. He affirmed that the army service corps is not in a position to undertake the services which are required of it. Officers should be properly qualified. Our cousins, across the border, have taught, us how dangerous it is to en-trust the leadership of troops in war to gentlemen whose appointment is due to political influence rather than pro-fessional experience. (Hear, hear.) He next gave a description of mobili-zation in the old country. Proceeding he stated that in case of war it was likely that the order to mobilize would be delayed until the last moment, there would be a general rush to arms, the numbers would be far in excess of the equipment, and they would be demanding arms which were not forthcoming. 


