PLAN SUMMER SESSION FOR THE UNIVERSITY

Principal Falconer Makes His First Official Appearance at Evening Lecture.

It was of happy omen, perhaps, that President Falconer made his first official apjpearance last night at the university in connection with a popular summer course of lectures.

Toronto University, he said, had not given itself over to the view that anything very satisfactory was attained by examination or correspon dence alone. It was doubtful if the results of such methods were ade quate at all. The university idea was that the living teacher was the greatest force. The touch of person with person, and the direct influence thereby exerted leading outward and up-ward, were far and away more effective than any private reading or ccurse of correspondence could be.
The idea of a summer session w

still in a tentative stage, and had not yet come up to expectation. It would be seen if the opportunity af-forded would be taken advantage of in the summer course of lectures. He thought there must be a great numper who felt shut out from the advantages of the university, and during the few weeks available they might be able to gain something. He hoped that next year the conditions would be improved and suggested that something might be done as in the United States, where summer sessions had become customary.

He introduced Prof. Pelham Edgar,

who gave the first lecture of the series on 'English Poetry Since Tennyson," and who confined himself to English poets of the present time. Leaving Swinburne, Meredith, Morris Patmore, as having completed their work, and setting aside Henley and 1943 Child's One-Piece Bathing Sult. Bridges—the present Laureate was not even mentioned—he spoke of William Watson, Stephen Phillips and Laur-ence, Binyon as modelled on Milton and Tennyson. But Kipling struck the new note in 1892, the year of Tennyson's death. He paid ungrudging tribute to his originality, tho se verely criticizing his work.
