Matters are looking squally in the Far East. The sudden departure of British warships from Wel-Hai-Wei under sealed orders, so closes, practical restoration to power of Li Huag Chang and the kicking out of the proressive young Emperor, indicates that some action is about to be taken to preserve British interests. The dispute in brief is this:

A British bank made a contract to loan money to the New-Chwang Railroad. Russia objected, and prevailed upon Li Hung Chang to repudiate the contract. Great Britain threatened to use force against China unless Li were dismissed from the Tsung-li-Yamen. The Emperor yielded and dismissed Li. And now Russia secures the turning out of the Emperor himself and the restoration of Li. What the answering move by Great Britain will be is a matter of interesting speculation. Whatever it be, it is safe to reckon that the independence of China is departed. The proud Empire is merely the shuttlecock between the battledores of two rival nations. And once in such a plight, a nation is not likely to get out of it. The end of China appears to be at hand, brought measur.

Hence their failure to don armor and slay the most terrible monster the world has yet seen. It men would only clamor for the suppres sion of consumption as they do for the suppression of wine and cider how soon its baneful career would be brought to an end! the restrictionists are true to the dominant principle that underlies their existence: they fight no evil which does not involve an attack on personal liberty. They are full of zeal and enthusiasm in their attempts to muzzle the people by means of curfews and prohibitory


