THE MARCHIONESS OF DONEGAL

Royal Canadian high commissioner to England, she was the bride.

The ante-nuptial settlement was even better than the one expected. Instead of buying her title for \$125,000 in cash, she granted him an annuity of \$40,000 a year and agreed should he die for five years to give him \$200,000. He did not live to win this fortune.

The money, with which the new marchioness endowed the lord, was not inherited entirely from her father. She had once been engaged to a young English heir who died shortly before the wedding day and left Miss Twining his entire fortune, a considerable sum.

As Marchioness of Donegal, she has a post in England but curiously consequently she takes precedence over the Countess of Devon, the Duchess of Manchester, the Countess of Essex and other American women in the British nobility.

The late marchioness made him one of the most discussed figures of the Anglo-Irish nobility. He had been a figure in a number of scandals, had run the second fortune and had more than once been imprisoned for debt.

He was first married in 1859, but separated before the wedding year. Four years later he married Mary Ann Williams Cobb, and in 1873 he began a suit for divorce. 

PREJUDICE AGAINST THE GROWTH OF SUGAR BEETS

Sugar Beets Largely Responsible for Failure.

There will be two factories producing beet sugar in the province this year—one at Berlin, the other at Wallaceburg. Last year there were four, the factories at Dresden and Wallaceburg were closed for various reasons.

The factory was "planted" too close to the Wallaceburg concern; acreage of beets sown was not large enough to sustain two large factories, and the smaller concern is being removed to Illinois. The Wallaceburg factory found business unprofitable owing to the limited acreage, and it has gone into liquidation with a considerable loss.

From the section in which is located the Berlin factory it is expected that the acreage sown will exceed that of last year by at least 1200 acres. Farmers are sowing smaller lots this year, as the scarcity of help a year ago prevented the growers from reaping the full fruits of their labors.

Question Not Settled. In the growing of sugar beets in the Province of Ontario, it has become an important factor in the life of the average farmer, or the diffidently successful operator of a small farm.
